-000 Milk Standards To Be Set

Recent State Board of Health action is expected to be a strong factor in assuring Texas of ad-equate Grade A milk supplies, despite seasons of short milk production.

The board last week adopted specifications which will permit the reconstitution of Grade A dry milk solids into Grade A fluid milk. The specifications are contained in a supplement to the standard milk ordinance and code which some 150 Texas cities--including all ma-ior membrics contained in a jor population centers--have adopted.

When the new specifications are assembled in printed form they will become formal regulations and will have the full weight of the Tex-as milk grading and labeling law behind them.




