### New Information On Income Taxes

Due to the lowering of the personal exemptions of single individuals from \$1,000 to \$800 and for married couples from \$2,500 to \$2,000, the Deputy Collectors of Internal Revenue for the Second District of Texas will be required to assist a much greater number of individuals in the preparation of 1940 income tax returns than ever before.

Under existing regulations set forth by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, no Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue is required to

prepare any income tax returns. He is only required to advise with any taxpayer relative to items of income and deductions to be included on the returns.

In order that the deputy collectors of the Second District of Texas shall be able to assist as many people as possible during the coming income tax filing period, it has become necessary that their assistance be limited as follows:

1. No corporation, estate or gift tax returns will be prepared. Only advice will be given relative to the filing of these classes of returns.
2. No complicated individual tax returns disclosing incomes from

various sources in excess of \$10,000 will be prepared.

3. No return will be prepared for any individual who does not have available all complete information.

4. No individual return will be prepared which requires additional schedules (such as stock market transactions). In no instance will any schedules be prepared.

### Boy Scouts Will Celebrate Birthday

Boy Scouting's 31st birthday, to be celebrated February 7-13, will give action to the 2200 Boy Scouts and Cubs of the South Plains Council, comprising 20 counties. L. R. Grimes, council chairman said today. Actually February 8 Scouting will be 31 years old.

All over the council Troops, Packs and communities will commemorate the founding of Scouting in America with pot-luck dinners, banquets, parent meetings, Courts of Honor, programs and the like.

On February 8, at 6:30 p. m. central standard time, President Roosevelt will speak from the White House to the 1,600,000 men and boys in Scouting and all the nation in his annual talk. With him will be Dr. James E. West, chief executive, and Walter W. Head, president of the Boy Scouts.

That day, Saturday will be a big day for South Plains Scouts. In most every town, Scouts will "take over the reigns of the city" in handling the government, learning by doing. Many gatherings will be held to hear the nation-wide broadcast over NBC, CBS and MUTUAL. Sunday, February 9, is Scout Sunday during which time Scouts and Cubs will attend church in units. Sermons will be built around the Scout theme.

### Making Crop, Feed Loans

Emergency crop and feed loans for 1941 are now available to farmers in Lynn County, and applications for these loans are now being received at The First National Bank by Fred N. Warren, Field Supervisor of the Emergency and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration. Lucille Knight, Committee member, will be at the office to take applications.

These loans will be made in the past, only to farmers whose requirements are small and who do not obtain a loan from any other source, including production associations, banks, or other private concerns or individuals.

As in former years, the amount loaned will be limited to the applicant's necessary cash requirements for preparing and cultivating crops or in purchasing or providing for his livestock.

Borrowers who obtain loans for the production of cash crops are required to give as security a lien on the crop financed or, in the case of loans for the purchase or provision of feed for livestock, a lien on the livestock to be fed.

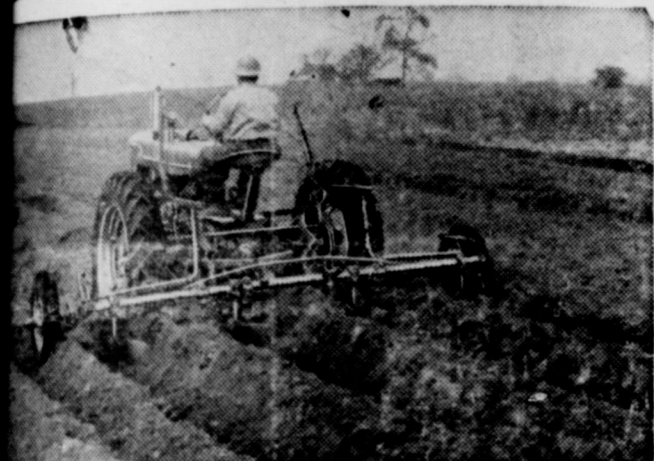

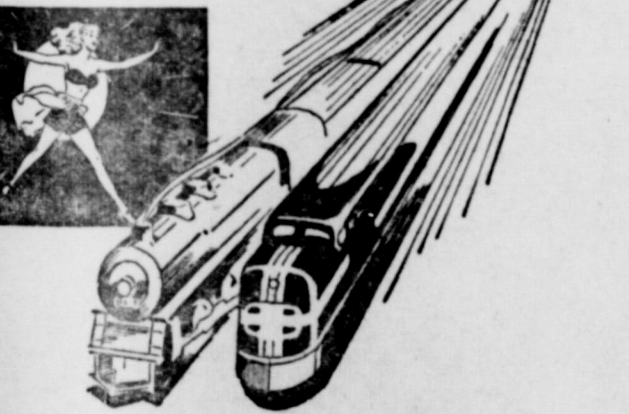

**Formby Is Given  
Committee Places**

AUSTIN, Jan. 29.—Eleven Committee appointments for the session of the 47th Legislature have been assigned to Senator Marshall Formby of this District. The assignments were made by Lt. Governor Coke Stevenson.

Senator Formby of McAdoo was named as a member of the highly important Finance Committee, one of the two most important Committees in the Senate. The Finance Committee, known as the Appropriations committee, passes on appropriations for schools, colleges and other appropriations for the entire State.

Governor Stevenson appointed Formby, who is not an attorney, but 160-acre farmer, as Chairman of the important Committee on Stock and Stock Raising, and as a member of the Agriculture committee.

Other Committees Formby was named on besides Finance, Stock and Stock Raising, and Agriculture, include Contingent Expense, Counties and County Boundaries, Criminal Jurisprudence; Vice Chairman of the Federal Relations Committee; Public Building and Grounds; Public Debts, Claims and Accounts; State Institutions and Departments, and Penitentiaries.

Senator Formby recently was honored by being appointed on the Inauguration committee and by being appointed by the Dean of the Senate on the Patronage committee in the Senate.

## Halsey Is Given Committee Places

AUSTIN, Jan. 28 (Special)—Appointments to membership of four committees was received today by State Representative Hop Halsey of Lubbock, representing the ninety-ninth district in the House of the 147th legislature.

Committee announcements were made this morning by Homer Leonard, of McAllen, speaker of the House.

Halsey, although a freshman member of the House, drew three particularly important committee assignments, including the powerful Committee on Appropriations which allocates funds for all state institutions. His other three committees will be Highway and Motor Traffic, Legislative and Congressional districts, and Public Health.

### Of Particular Importance

Of particular importance to Halsey's district are the committees on Appropriations, Highway and Motor Traffic and Legislative and Congressional districts. The young representative already has a bill in the hopper calling for legislative redistricting essential to giving West Texas a fair representation in the legislature. At present, West Texas especially Halsey's home district, is badly discriminated against in the matter of representation.

With a change in truck laws in the offing, the Committee on Highways and Motor Traffic will be one of the busiest "on the hill," observers here believe.
