The bale was ginned from 1880 lbs of seed cotton and was gathered from 13 acres of irrigated Paymaster 54B seed.

In 1955 the first Lynn Co. bale was ginned Aug. 27th by Troy Copeland who farms 7 miles northeast of here. Locally W. W. Boydstun ginned the first bale Aug. 30th In 1954 the first bale was Aug. 20th by Ervin Gillam.

Mr. Martin, manager of the gin, said he expected the total local and area ginnings to be as good - if not better than last year. A good 2 inch rain would increase the crop a quarter or more, farmers agree.

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
