CLEAN UP IS URGED

A good old fashion spring house cleaning in every city and community in Texas would do a great deal toward furthering good health in this state, according to the State Health Officer, who said this week: "From a practical standpoint the old adage that 'Cleanliness is next to Godliness' is still well worth emphasizing."

A general cleanup program of state-wide proportions for our citizenship should include surface cleaning, drainage, the graveling of streets and alleys, the cleaning of all parks and playgrounds, and the clearing of weeds and rubbish off of vacant lots.

The destruction of mosquito breeding places and rat harborage, the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the general cleaning up of all premises will be of inestimable value in helping to keep down summer health hazards such as poliomyelitis, typhoid, and cholera.

Good community housekeeping and ordinary sanitary measures require the prompt removal of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases and insure good health protection thruout the state.

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that many diseases are fifth borne and the only possible way to control them is to eliminate the insanitary conditions responsible for their spread.

SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON
By George Mahon

This is being airmailed from Washington Saturday afternoon. An 8c stamp is required for this purpose today, but the odds are very heavy in favor of a 5c airmail rate within a few weeks. The House passed this week a bill establishing a 5c airmail rate -- a program which some of us have favored since V-J Day. The 5c spread between the regular mail and the airmail rate has retarded airmail. There is little doubt but that the Government will make more revenue out of the 5c rate than the higher rate on account of increased volume.

The chances are that airmail will be expanded to the point where practically all first class mail except that which is local in character will go airmail. The more mail that goes by air, the more our aviation industry is supported and the greater the backlog of experienced pilots in this country.

At present we have a large number of airmen who have been discharged from the service and who would like to have a way to get in a little flying time in order not to lose their ability to pilot an airplane.

The Army has a lot of surplus planes and there are many available air fields. General Carl Spaatz, who took General Hap Arnold's place as head of the U. S. Army Air Forces, will be before our Military Appropriations Committee Monday to ask us to put thru an appropriation of one billion, two hundred million dollars for the Air Forces for the coming fiscal year. I am going to ask him to expedite the Army program for reserve pilots so that these discharged veterans under a well supervised plan may have an opportunity to continue to fly. I would like to see a National Guard unit in aviation established in West Texas.

The National Guard will have a bigger and better program in the future than it has ever had in the past. The Guard was a great factor in the victory which we won in the war and it will represent a large reserve force for national defense in the future.

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the Committees of the House. This is the committee of the House, supported by many patriotic organizations, which investigates and gives publicity to the un-American activities of individuals and groups within our country. The measure was bitterly contested, but the final vote was 240 for and 81 against.

Advantages of Army Given

If you re-enlist within 90 days after discharge and do so before July 1 of this year, you may retain your present grade you held when discharged and will also receive an enlistment bonus of \$50 a year for all previous service.

When you re-enlist for three years you may choose your branch of service and overseas theatre.

Also if you re-enlist before July 1, 1946 you may receive family allowances for the term of your enlistment period. If you have been out more than 90 days, and was discharged on or after 12th of May, 1945, you may, if enlistment is accomplished on or before June 30, 1946, be enlisted in a grade according to training and experience.

Many men are now enlisting under these provisions and receiving their grade held at the time of discharge back or only one grade under.

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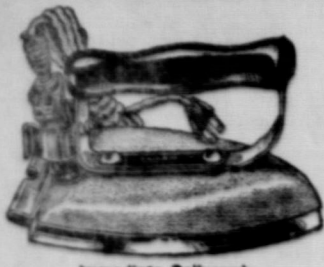

ABILENE MAN HEAD OF AREA POLIO FIGHT

Infantile paralysis has hit 26 Texas Counties, with 47 cases reported according to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

All of the Foundation's chapters in the state are prepared as never before to cope with the disease by furnishing every possible aid to the polio victims, the statement said.

"If polio breaks out in your community," the Foundation advises, observe the following rules: Avoid new contacts; watch for symptoms such as headache, unexplained fever, a cold or even an upset stomach. Phone your doctor immediately if these symptoms occur. The chances are you may not have polio, but if it should strike, prompt action is the first step toward recovery.

Additional precautions include: Don't get overtired; avoid chills; observe strict personal and community cleanliness; avoid removal of tonsils or adenoids prior to and during the polio epidemic season; don't swim in polluted water; see that waste and garbage are covered. Acting as liaison officer between national headquarters of the Foundation and its Texas chapters is William Sims, Box 1838, Abilene, phone Abilene 9111, covering west Texas.

office without opposition — and held the post until the fort was abandoned and the Griffin "Flat" became a Country village.

The ex-colonel, so say those who knew him, was one of the boys, always ready to take part in a game of chance, or go the rounds of the saloons — and more than once, after a festive night, he appeared on his bench in the morning sporting black eyes and a swollen countenance. But this didn't, in the least, interfere with his administration of justice.

Sitting back in his chair, he would assess a fine on his comrades of the night before without the slightest hesitation, notwithstanding their looks of astonishment and their muttered comments. But they knew better than to protest too openly — the Colonel set more than law books to back up his decisions.

He kept in the pigeon holes of his desk — prominently placed so that all might behold — an ornate brass barreled horse pistol and a long bladed Turkish knife, and when the effects of too much fire-water made some of his defendants obstreperous, Smithers emphasized his decisions by letting his right hand rest near the butt of the pistol or the haft of the knife. It seemed that the weapons — commonly called "The Colonel's peacemakers" — had the desired effect for the justice never had to use them. The big horse pistol became almost legendary.

As one cowboy described it: "The Colonel mows prairie grass for his hen nests with that gun. He just fills it to the muzzle with bird shot, then steps down into a gulch so that his arm can come on a level with the grass, then gives a sweeping motion as he pulls the trigger and down goes the grass."

Anyhow, such stories were told that none among those coming up for arrangement ever dared question the judge's ruling — especially after getting a glimpse of him sitting on the bench picking his teeth, as he sometimes did, with that terrible Turkish knife.
