The Bureau of Industrial Conservation expects, in cooperation with the USDA, to salvage an average of a half ton of scrap iron from each of the six and a half million farms in the United States.

In Callahan County the collection of scrap from farms averages slightly over a half ton per farm to date and Mr. Jennings, dealer of Cross Plains, reports that he is still buying scrap iron and aluminum from Callahan County farmers.
