GAS MAINS TO BE LAID IN O'DONNELL SOON

According to a statement issued by officials of the West Texas Gas Co., who were in the city Monday of this week, O'Donnell, will be burning gas by the first of June.

Ditching machines are expected to be at work on the digging of the ditches in the City of O'Donnell by last of March acording to information given out by the officials

Do you believe in yourself and is that belief sufficiently well founded to be a reliable mainstay in your en-

One of the most interesting miracles that the Messiah performed was that in which He accomplished the heal-

ing of the boy who was an epileptic.
It is especially interesting because the first appeal was to the disciples who wholly failed in their efforts. The father of the child was a little weakened in his faith by this failure and when he applied to Jesus for help he did so with some evidence of doubt us to the results.

The reply of the Messiah was "If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth." And when His followers asked Him why they had not been able to perform the healing they were told that it was their unbelief that hindered them.

Of course this belief was not intended to have been in themselves or in their personal powers but in what Jesus often called to them "The

It is in the belief in the truth about ourselves that we should, and that the wise man does, find the basic elements of success and advancement.

If we do not have confidence, which is only another name for belief in ourselves, we are not likely to get far in accomplishment. But that belief must be based on fact, on the truth, on the realities which exist in us and upon which we can call with faith and re-

Believing in oneself is absolutely

necessary to any successful action. The man who does not believe in himself cannot make a speech worth listening to, he cannot write a book worth reading, he cannot run a winning foot race nor even successfully plow a furrow.

He is like a smooth-shod horse on glare of ice.

FIELD OFFICE OF U. S. V. B. NOW LOCATED IN AMARILLO, TEXAS

A field office of the United States Veterans Bureau, is now located in the American Legion Home, Municipal Auditorium, Amarillo, Texas, under the supervision of Mr. J. W. Sebastain, who is in a position to handle various kind of cases for the ex-service men within the Panhandle district, with the exception of giving them ratings for disabilities, which ratings are awarded in the Regional Office, such cases as filing claims for compensation, hospitalization, and emergency cases.

No examinations for the purpose of compensation are made at this station. The station does not keep the case files on men of this territory and for this reason it is diffucult to discuss compensation matters pertaining to individual cases without first securing the complete status of the case from the Regional Office at Oklahoma City. The manager of the field Staiton does have authority to handle emergency cases to authorize examination by the designated Medical Examiner for the purpose of determining need and feasibility for hospital treatment of any ex-service men of any war military occupation or military expeditions, honorably dis-charged. The Field Station will al-so assist ex-service men and women in the preparation of any sort of claim against the Veteran's Bureau and advise them regarding the type of evidence necessary to establish such a claim.

The manager of the Field Station at Amarillo will welcome communications from the ex-service men and women in the Panhandle District regarding their problems with the Veteran's Bureau, who will attempt to assist them in solving these problems.

One thing is to be remembered in applying for hospitalization or compensation. A copy of discharge certificate is necessary or a certified copy made from the original and certified to by an officer authorized to administer oaths.

It is not necssary to make application for loans on Adjusted Service Certificate through this station as each and every Postmaster throughout the United States has been furnished with blank note forms and you may secure these forms at your local Post office. All applications for loans should be forwarded to the U. S. Veteran's Bureau, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, if you reside in the territory served by that office, or to the Regional Office in the territory where you reside. Any cretificate must be two years old or older before a loan

Mother's Cook Book

"Go forth this day with the smallest expectations, but with the largest patience, with a keen relish for and appreciation of everything beautiful, great and good, but with a temper so genial that the friction of the world shall not bear upon your sensibilities."

WHERE there are growing children, and in fact where there are aged members of the family, soups, especially the nourishing kinds are invaluable. A cream soup is sub-stantial enough for a main dish for luncheon and good for a winter night for supper, if the main meal is taken at noon. Here is a soup which will 'stay by" and make a full meal with bread and butter:

Cream of Potato Soup. Scald a quart of milk with a slice of onion. Cook two or three potatoes,

according to size, until soft; mash. add one-half cupful of cream or two tablespoonfuls of butter. Add the scalded milk, bring to the boiling point, season well with salt and pep-

Veal and Celery Soup.

Cut up three pounds of veal, break the bones, cover with four quarts of cold water and simmer for four hours: strain and return to the heat. Add two bunches of celery and two chopped onlons; simmer until the vegetables are well cooked. Press through a fine sleve, thicken with two tablespoonfuls of cornstarch mixed with two cupfuls of milk. Add two tablespoonfuls of butter in small bits; reheat and serve with croutons.

Veal and Sago Soup.

Take two and one-half pounds of veal, three quarts of cold water, one fourth pound of pearl sago, two cupfuls of scalded milk, four egg yolks and sait and pepper to season. Finely chop the meat, cover with water bring slowly to the boiling point and simmer two hours, skimming occasionally. Soak the sago in cold wato cover, one-half hour; stir into the hot stock, cook 30 minutes and then add the milk. Pour the mixture slowly over the well-beaten eggs and season with salt aud pepper.

Sweetbread Soup.

Reheat one quart of veal stock and add two cupfuls of cream which has been beaten with two egg yolks. Take from the heat, season to taste, then add one cupful of parboiled sweetbreads cut into bits. Carnish with a cupful of whipped cream and a bit of minced parsley.

Egg Soup.

Butter six slices of stale bread, sprinkle with sugar and brown in the oven. Reheat two cupfuls of veal stock, two cupfuls of milk, three egg yolks lightly beaten. Add a table speonful of butter, season with salt and pepper, minced parsley and a grating of nutmeg. Pour over the


