**"CITY ORDINANCE"**  
 "An Ordinance defining dance halls and declaring the same to be public nuisances prohibiting permitting the use of premises as dance halls, and participating in dancing in such dance halls, as herein defined, and fixing penalties for the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance."

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

Section 1. That all dance halls as defined in this ordinance, situated within the limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, are hereby declared to be public nuisances, and as such

the same are hereby declared to be unlawful.

Section 2. For the purposes of this ordinance, any place situated within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell at or in which people engage in dancing and where anything of value is paid, directly or indirectly for admission to such place, and or for the privilege of dancing at such place, and or for the expense of music furnished for such dancing, is hereby declared to be a dance hall.

Section 3. Any person who shall operate and, or be interested in operating a dance hall, as that term is defined in Section No. 2 of this ordinance, within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars and not more than one hundred dollars.

Section 4. Any person who, as the owner of any property and or as agent of any property situated within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell, shall knowingly permit the same to be used as a dance hall, as that term is defined in Section No. 2 of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars.

Section 5. Any person who shall dance at or in any dance hall, as that term is defined in Section No. 2 of this ordinance, within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than five, nor more than twenty-five dollars.

Section 6. That if any provisions of this ordinance shall be held and determined by any proper court of last resort to be invalid or uncon-

stitutional the remaining portions of this ordinance not so held to be invalid or unconstitutional shall be and remain in full force and effect.

Section 7. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its final passage, approval and legal publications, and it is so ordered.

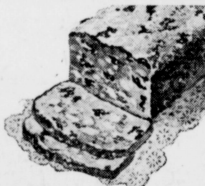

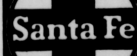

### NOTICE FARMERS

Since the AAA program has a direct effect on every farmer and ranchman in Lynn county, great care should be taken in electing the men who will administer that program in the county during the coming year.

That's the advice C. A. Lawrence, Secretary of the county A. C. A. committee gave to AAA cooperators this week in reminding farmers that community meetings would be held on December 13 and 14 in the five districts of the county.

In the community meetings all farmers and ranchmen cooperating with the AAA have one vote each. At each of these meetings will be elected a delegate and alternate delegate to the county convention to be held December 16, the three-man community committee and two alternate committee men.

At the county convention attended by the delegates from the five districts, the three-man county committee and two alternate committee men will be elected. The newly elected committee will take office January 1 and will serve one year.

Community and county committees have very important duties to perform and these duties vitally concern the interest of every farmer in Lynn county. For this reason, every farmer in the county should make a point of attending the meeting in his district to help elect the committee men. Time and place for holding the meetings in each district are listed as follows: District No. 1, Gordon, Friday night, December 13. District No. 2, Tahoka, Saturday afternoon at 2:30, December 14. District No. 3, Draw, Friday afternoon at 2:00, December 13. District No. 4, O'Donnell, Saturday afternoon at 2:00, December 14. District No. 5, New Home, Friday night, December 13.

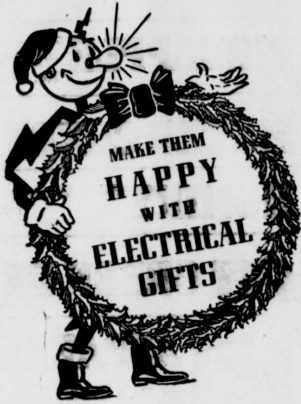

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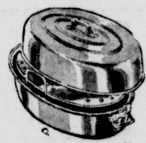

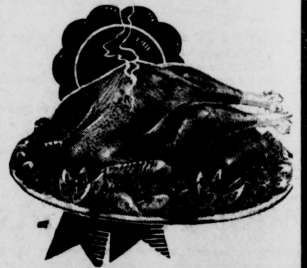
