





These cover crops can be used in rotation with cash crops or to improve such grass plants as K. R. bluestem or Blue panle.

Legume seed should be in-lated and drilled deep enough to protect the inoculant from the sun. 100 pounds of 13-39-0 ferti-

Best results will be obtained from cover crops if they are pro-tected from heavy grazing and left on the land as long as possible.
