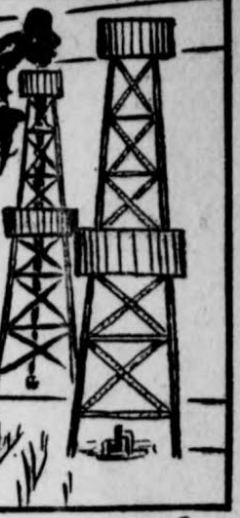

Mrs. George E. Trammell Takes Position of Methodist Church Secretary, Education Director

Rev. Guy Perdue and his staff of church officers and members are announcing recent appointment of Mrs. George E. Trammell as church secretary and educational director of the Iowa Park Methodist church.

Mrs. Trammell was born Hazel Lane, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. C. Lane of Luray, Kans. She was graduated from high school there and attended Kansas State college at Hays, where she received the B.S. degree.

She taught in the Hays elementary school after her graduation from college.

In 1943 she was married to Geo. E. Trammell of Hays. He served eight years in the army, being assigned to the Panama Canal zone during World War II.

Mr. and Mrs. Trammell taught in the federal school of the Indian Service in South Dakota for four years, where they worked with children of the Sioux tribe.

The Trammells moved to Iowa Park Nov. 4, 1952 and live on West Aldine. They have one daughter Georgia Kay, 9 years old, a fourth grade pupil.

Mr. Trammell is employed as a civilian instructor at Sheppard Air Force Base.

John Parish Receives Letter of Commendation For Marine Service in Korean Campaign

In a special ceremony last Friday evening at the Naval Reserve center at Wichita Falls, John R. Parish was signally honored when a letter of commendation was presented him for his service in Korea.

John, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ruben Parish and husband of Jean Parish, served in Korea with G-2 in the marines from June 1, 1952 to Jan. 1, 1953. From January to June 5 he was with the flash ranging section of a marine artillery unit.

Mr. Parish has already been given the Purple Heart for injuries received when a land mine exploded while he was in combat with the enemy.

He received his honorable discharge a few months ago and is at home with his wife and son and working in the dairy business with his parents.

Death Takes A. J. Weeth, Pioneer Wichita County Businessman, Farmer

Albert J. Weeth, 74, a longtime resident of Wichita county, died Thursday morning in a Wichita Falls hospital following an illness of about three weeks.

Mr. Weeth was born in Chalco, Nebr., Feb. 24, 1879, came to Texas in 1889 and settled between Wichita Falls and Iowa Park. He was at one time associated with the Bert Bean Coffee company for 10 years, and until his retirement was engaged in farming.

He was married Sept. 23, 1904, at Clara to Miss Minnie Heisermann, whose father was a pioneer. Mrs. Weeth survives her husband.

Funeral services will be held at 2:00 p.m. Saturday at the St. Paul Lutheran church, with burial in the Clara cemetery. The body will be taken to the church at 1:00.

Mr. Weeth is also survived by a daughter Mrs. Gilbert Fahrenkamp of El Paso; a son Charles of Wichita Falls; two sisters Mrs. W. F. George of Iowa Park and Mrs. Edd Heisermann of Clara; and three brothers: Walter of Omaha, Nebr., Milton of Panhandle and Gilbert of Vernon.

W. H. Kiel, Father of Mrs. Archie Bryant, Dies After Long Illness

Funeral services were held for William Herman Kiel, 64, Sunday afternoon, Oct. 18, in the First Methodist church of Wichita Falls, with Dr. Alfred Freeman, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by Dr. Earl G. Hoggard of the Floral Heights church and Rev. Guy E. Perdue of Iowa Park. Burial was in Riverside cemetery at Wichita Falls.

Mr. Kiel died early Friday morning at his home about 5 miles east of Iowa Park on Highway 287.

Mr. Kiel was born in Hunt county Aug. 23, 1889 and moved to Wichita county with his parents Mr. and Mrs. John Kiel when he was two. He lived on the farm settled by them all his life.

On Jan. 28, 1912 he married Miss Lillie Ellen Sunday, member of another pioneer family, at her home north of Iowa Park.

Mr. and Mrs. Kiel owned the Sand Beach swimming pool and skating rink on their property. Although he had been in ill health for a year, Mr. Kiel was still active as a farmer and stockman.

Mr. Kiel served as a member of the county PMA during World War Two and was on the Government Farm Board. He acted as chairman of the AAA office of this area for six years. Although most of his interest was in Wichita Falls, he always remembered the Volunteer Fire Department of Iowa Park each year with a donation and some kind of entertainment.

Besides the widow, Mr. Kiel is survived by a son James of Wichita Falls and daughter Mrs. Archie Bryant of Iowa Park; two brothers Dr. O. B. and Fred of Wichita Falls and five sisters: Mrs. Mark Moore, Mrs. T. R. Boone, Mrs. C. E. Nolan, all of Wichita Falls, Mrs. W. C. Chapman of North Hollywood, Cal., Mrs. Jack Caldwell of Pasadena, Calif.; and two grandchildren William James and Suelien Bryant of Iowa Park.

Train Victim Brought Home for Burial

The death of Chief Petty Officer Ralph K. Gilstrap, 28, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. O. Gilstrap, still remains a mystery. His body was found near the New York Central tracks near Little Falls, N.Y., Monday, Oct. 12.

His ship, the USS Pickering, had just completed a world-circling voyage and had docked at Boston. He was enroute to visit a sister Mrs. Pauline Barnard in Flushing, N.Y. It has been established he didn't jump from the train of his own accord.

Ralph's body was accompanied to Iowa Park, Saturday morning by his close friend Chief Valdemar A. Plan of Ontario, Calif. Funeral services were at 3:30 in the Methodist church with Rev. Guy E. Perdue officiating.

Air Force Chaplain Praises United Nations Before Local Audience

The fight against hunger, disease and poverty which is being carried on by the United Nations was emphasized in an address by Maj. John Hingson, USAF, at a meeting in the high school Thursday morning.

The occasion was the annual UN observance sponsored by the Iowa Park Council of Church Women.

To set the stage for the program which was attended by junior high and senior high school students, faculty members and citizens, Mrs. O. R. Owens led the group in singing "America" and "God Bless America." Miss Sue Giesert played the piano accompaniment.

Prin. James E. Elms introduced Mrs. Homer Blalock, UN chairman of the council, who was in charge of the program. She announced the winners in the essay writing contest recently sponsored by the local unit. Miss Henriann Zaliski, a junior student, was first place winner, and Miss Janet Dickerson, a senior, won second.

Mrs. Blalock read the poem "A Prayer for the United Nations" to precede Major Hingson's address. The speaker served in both European and Pacific theaters during World War II. Following cessation of hostilities he was on Occupation duty in Germany three years. During that time he had opportunity to see how the WHO and IRO departments of the United Nations were alleviating suffering throughout the world.

Major Hingson expressed confidence that the UN is laying the foundations for a world in which all God's children can be secure.

MORE SHADE FOR IOWA PARK

The city beautification committee wants "more shade for Iowa Park."

During the extremely hot days of the past summer, citizens of Iowa Park became definitely shade-conscious.

Tourists have complimented Iowa Park on the shade in the city park and wondered why there are so few trees in this part of Texas.

Arrangements are in the making to take orders through the Chamber of Commerce from those who would like to plant trees on their property.

Small trees, easily planted, may be sold in bunches of 5 for \$1 perhaps. These will be of a variety well suited to this climate and soil.

Before the nurseryman can order, he must be given some idea as to how many to order. The city beautification committee chairman, Mrs. Bonnie Hudson, advises you to call this office, 2431, if you are interested.

Trees will probably be ready for delivery in January. Location for trees can be made now and holes dug before the ground freezes, if desired.

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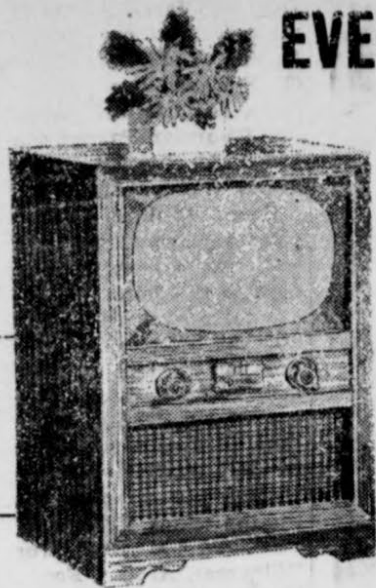

The bride attended Iowa Park High School and was a member of the Hawk band and the Future Homemakers of America.

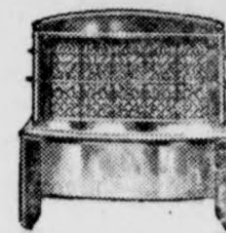

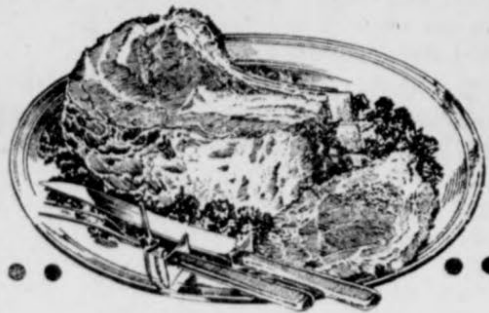

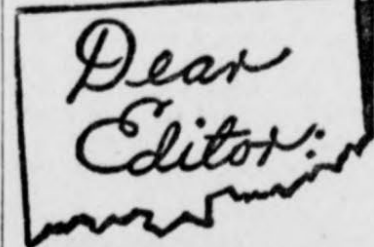
