

SAN DIEGO, Texas — George B. Parr, the Duval County political power, said Ralph W. Yarborough would get his vote for Governor.

Parr interrupted a coffee-cup cafe conference with Roy Harrington of Austin, secretary - treasurer of the CIO State Council, to say that he was not particularly for Yarborough.

"It's just that I'm against Allan Shivers," said the political boss.

Parr said that on Wednesday night he went to Falfurrias to hear Yarborough make a campaign speech. Parr said he sat in the bleachers at the school stadium where Yarborough spoke and did not speak personally to the candidate. Some Parr-backed local officials sat on the platform with Yarborough.

"We haven't talked since before he announced," said Parr.
