numbering system in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, is ordained by City Ordinance Number 58 (199),

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that all house or building numbers in the City of Iowa Park shall be in accordance with the numbering system ordained by the City Council in City Ordinance Number 58 (199). Any variance from correct numbers assigned by the City of Iowa Park or assignable by the said city shall constitute a violation of this ordinance and shall be punishable by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$200.00, and each warning after non-compliance with this orviolation, subject to another fine.

Thirty days shall be allowed to put up correct house numbers. Passed to the second and final 29th day of May, A.D. 1969. Mch30,Apr6


