I know of instances in which Indiars who had beer: living in shacks were provided modern houses, complete with gas, electricity and indoor plumbing in a government research project, and were called "ungrateful" because they built fires in the middle of the living room, or slept outdoors. It never occurred to the officials to teach them how to use the new equipment or to help them adjust to new surroundings. When the indians complained that the heuses were made of concrete instead of logs or that the buildings were too close togeher, they were again "ungrateful."

It never occurred to planners to consult with the tribes or to educate themselves in Indian tradition. They had a program, and it had to succeed.

The analogy isn't exactly parallel, but it's close enough to make a point or two. First, we expect more of others than we are willing to exhibit in our own lives. And second, people do not often behave according to our exrectations solely out of gratitude. There are many other factors to
