THOUGHTS ON THE NEW VOTE . . .

Okay, folk, let's hear it for the 18-year-olds. Everyone has had a chance to raise old billyned because they didn't all register after legislation was passed enfranchising them.

We've heard "I told you so" a-plenty and "That's youth for you." We have statistics enough to paper the National Archives plus four mobile homes. Now how about telling the other side of the story.

How about those millions of voters over 21—way over 21—who have been registered for years but somehow just couldn't make it to the voting booths? How many of those who scream the loudest about irresponsible young people have fulfilled their own responsibilities as citizens?

How many are the parents and teachers or ministers and friends of those 18 to 21 who didn't register. And how many ballot-waving adults can claim to be a whit more informed about campaign issues and personalities than their junior counterparts just emerging from high school and college?

Those who see only ingratitude in the lack of response among potential new voters remind me of the people who take their neatly packaged economic, educational, or social programs onto Indian reservations, then blame the failure of the program on the recipients instead of lack of planning, organizational weakness, or incompetence on the part of those who expected spectacular success and maybe a Nobel Prize.

I know of instances in which Indians who had been living in shacks were provided modern houses, complete with gas, electricity and indoor plumbing in a government research project, and were called "ungrateful" because they built fires in the middle of the living room, or slept outdoors. It never occurred to the officials to teach them how to use the new equipment or to help them adjust to new surroundings. When the Indians complained that the houses were made of concrete instead of logs or that the buildings were too close together, they were again "ungrateful."

It never occurred to planners to consult with the tribes or to educate themselves in Indian tradition. They had a program, and it had to succeed.

The analogy isn't exactly parallel, but it's close enough to make a point or two. First, we expect more of others than we are willing to exhibit in our own lives. And second, people do not often behave according to our expectations solely out of gratitude. There are many other factors to consider, not the least of which is example. If some of America's youths do indeed lack a sense of responsibility toward their citizenship, we need to examine the situation and ask ourselves if we have paved the way with our own neglect. Before we condemn an entire segment of America's population, we need to ask if anyone bothered consulting them about lowering the voting age, if they were totally in favor of it, or if only those who pressed for it on their own and subsequently registered truly wanted the privilege of voting.

Until the answers come, we can do something constructive. Let's praise those young people who do evidence a desire to become more involved and give them our encouragement. And let's give a hand to those of all ages who have been faithful, informed voters as long as they have had the legal right to do so.

City Now Using Water of Lakes Buffalo & I.P.

Delbert Todd, president of the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 board of directors, reported Tuesday the maintenance work at Lake Buffalo has been completed. He said water is now being pumped from Buffalo and Lake Iowa Park for treatment and use by families and businesses of Iowa Park and outlying areas.

The City is not taking water from Lake Gordon at this time. In fact, part of the water coming from the two larger lakes is being deposited in Lake Gordon.

Todd believes there is enough water in Lakes Buffalo and Iowa Park to supply the need through July. It is calculated that the new pipeline to Wichita Falls will be laid by that time.

The board of directors have named Floyd Adams to fill the unexpired term of the late Miles Hines.

We understand some nice fish are now being taken from the lakes, but Todd said not to quote him as saying so. He doesn't want any disappointed Ike Walters on his neck.

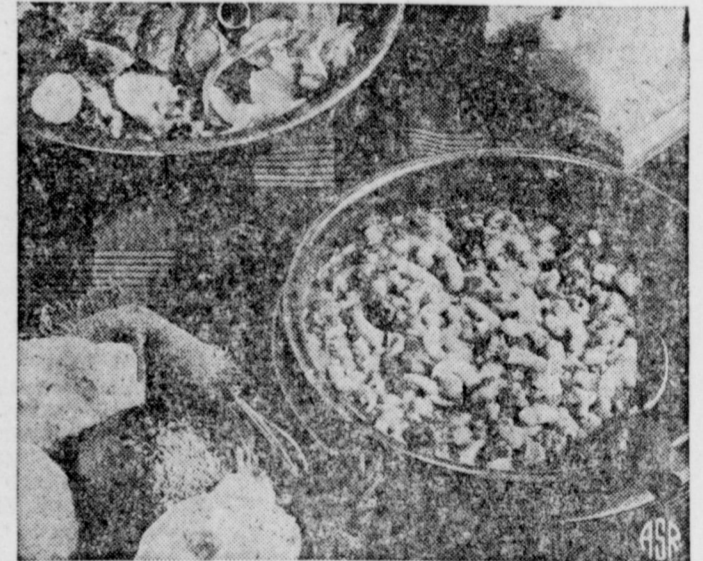

NUMBERING HOUSES
ORDINANCE NUMBER 58 (199)
 An ordinance regulating the numbering of houses in Iowa Park, Texas.
 Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that the numbering of houses in the City of Iowa Park,

Texas, shall be as follows:
 That Wall Street shall be the dividing line East and West, and West Daisy and East Pasadena Streets the dividing line North and South. Uneven (odd) numbers shall be on the East side and South side of the streets. Even numbers shall be on the West

side and North side of the streets. Each lot shall be numbered; that is, if the lots are 25 feet then they shall have a number; if the lots are 50 feet or more than 50 feet they shall have a number.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 58A

An Ordinance Regulating the numbering of houses in Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas.

Whereas, the house and lot numbering system in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, is ordained by City Ordinance Number 58 (199), and,

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that all house or building numbers in the City of Iowa Park shall be in accordance with the numbering system ordained by the City Council in City Ordinance Number 58 (199). Any variance from correct numbers assigned by the City of Iowa Park or assignee by the said city shall constitute a violation of this ordinance and shall be punishable by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$200.00, and each warning after non-compliance with this ordinance shall constitute another violation, subject to another fine. Thirty days shall be allowed to each property owner or resident to put up correct house numbers. Passed to the second and final reading and approved on this the 29th day of May, A.D. 1969. Mch20, Apr6

Bird Lore

Iowa Park is a bird sanctuary—a place where our feathered friends can live undisturbed and carry on their business of raising families.

Birds are part of the earth's most precious possessions. They were created by the Almighty not only for their beauty and melodious songs but to control the insects. Every bird eats certain kinds of insects, so we need all kinds of birds to eat all kinds of insects.

A house wren feeds 500 spiders and caterpillars to its young during summer afternoon.

A swallow devours 1000 leafhoppers in 12 hours.

A pair of flickers consider 5000 ants a mere snack.

A Baltimore oriole consumes 17 hairy caterpillars a minute.

A brown thrasher can eat over 6000 insects a day.

A purple martin consumes its own weight in insects each day. Its average weight is 4 ounces and that is approximately 14,000 mosquitoes. However it eats what is available—flies, dragonflies, beetles, moths, locusts, weevils and other bugs.

So many people will give insecticides too much credit. Over 400 kinds of insect pests have already developed an immunity to them in spite of greater and greater strength of these sprays.

Most birds are protected by state and federal laws, and those that are not are safeguarded in Iowa Park because of ordinances against shooting within the city limits.

Responsibility for conservation of birds is everybody's obligation. So, why not help!
