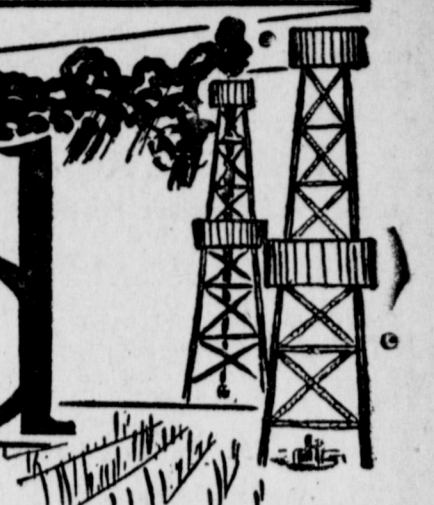

## Bands Rate High at Vernon in UIL

Iowa Park school bands did well in UIL contests at Vernon, Tuesday and Wednesday. High school made Div. I in sight reading and Div. II in concert. There are five divisions in grading the music groups. IPHS was the only school in AAA or AAAA which was ranked I in sight reading. There were only two in AA bands ranked Div. I.

Larry Kingsley is director, and 96 students performed in the contests. Judges of sight reading were from Borger, Pampa and Pearce high schools. Judges of concerts were from Irving and Fredericksburg high schools and SWTU at San Marcos.

Junior high band under direction of David Mooney rated II in both sight reading and concert, which is commendable.

Judges of concert were from Panhandle, Petersburg and Lubbock. Sight reading judges were from Howard Payne university at Brownwood, Crane high, and the Hutchinson school in Lubbock.

Equalization board to consider City of Iowa Park ad valorem assessed evaluations was appointed Monday night by Mayor Gordon G. Clark and approved by the City Council. Members are Frank Harlin, Sam Hunter and Lee Turner.

First business meeting of the equalization board will be on May 1.

The aldermen voted to raise the deposit on residential water meters from \$10 to \$20.

The council approved payment to a pension fund for volunteer firemen. Other city expenses approved included \$1,983 to Titus Mitchell and \$1,859 to O. N. Newman for special legal work on water improvements; \$8,843 for consulting engineering on water and sewer works by Riewe and Wischmeyer; and \$14,053 for laying water line by Opex Construction Co.

The mayor and aldermen set up a public hearing on Cable Television to be held at 7:30 Friday night, April 28.

## Bird Lore

by Layette Stankewitz

Everyone knows the hummingbird. It is less than four inches long and the smallest of birds in the North. The ruby-throat is the only eastern species. Ruby-throats are metallic green above; males with glowing red throats, females with white ones.

These birds migrate to Central and South America, a distance of 2500 with a non-stop flight across the Gulf of Mexico.

I know that hummingbirds are one of a kind in many respects. In addition to flying forward and backward they can move straight up and down or hover apparently motionless in mid-air.

The female feeds her young through a long hollow bill as from

a squirt gun. After mating, the male deserts the female and shirks all responsibilities. Perhaps the mother does not require much help and protection because these tiny birds have few enemies. They are too able and swift for most birds. Then too their long needle-like bills are very irritating weapons even to the mighty eagles and hawk.

I think one of my most exciting "bird joys" was seeing a little ruby-throated hummer's nest at the W. L. Bean home. It was saddled on a long limb of an elm tree over a bird bath and about the size of a walnut. It was the most lovely cradle imaginable with two tiny eggs about the size of white beans.

Some of us enjoy feeding the hummers from glass feeders that can be bought commercially. I fill mine with syrup from a mix-

ture of 1 part sugar and 4 parts water and brought to a boil to pasteurize. Add red food coloring.

Syrup must be changed at least once a week as birds won't take old syrup. Wash the feeder only with warm water and a brush—no soap or detergent. At first hang feeder near flowers where hummingbirds have been seen. After they begin using it, it may be moved to other locations, even outside your window.

Others prefer to plant plants to attract the hummer. They prefer deep-throated nectar-rich blossoms like the trumpet vine, red honeysuckle, flowering currant, Turk's cap, larkspur, scarlet sage, geranium, bee balm, Carolina jasmine and many others.

What draws the hummers to certain flowers? Color. Yes, they are remarkable little birds!

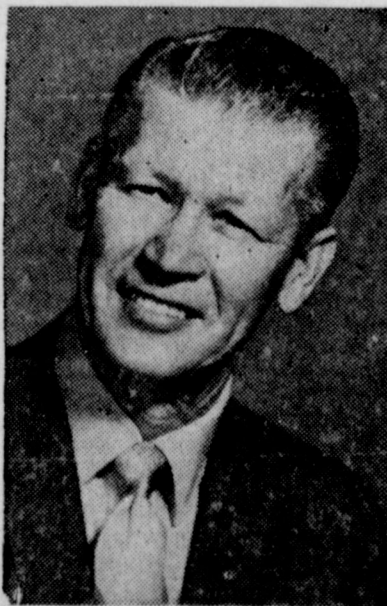
