Section I. Finding of Necessity United States, the statutes of the A.D. 1971. State of Texas, and the Ordinances of the City of Iowa Park by minors under the age of eighteen (18) years are increasing at an alarming rate; that in a great many of the cases a lack of prop-€r supervision and control of the minor child by his parents or meeting Monday, September 27, guardian is evident, that the in-creasing problem of criminal offenses by children will not be solved by sanctions imposed upon the children alone but that it is necessary that sanctions be imposed upon parents whose neglect of their duty to properly super-vise and control their children is a proximate cause of the delinquency of those children.
