Parents Responsible

Ordinance 102A

Parental Responsibility Ordinance
An ordinance of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, to declare a necessity of this Ordinance of Parental Responsibility for the conduct of minor children and to prescribe penalties for violations of the provisions of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

Section I. Finding of Necessity

The City Council finds that offenses against the laws of the United States, the statutes of the State of Texas, and the Ordinances of the City of Iowa Park by minors under the age of eighteen (18) years are increasing at an alarming rate; that in a great many of the cases a lack of proper supervision and control of the minor child by his parents or guardian is evident, that the increasing problem of criminal offenses by children will not be solved by sanctions imposed upon the children alone but that it is necessary that sanctions be imposed upon parents whose neglect of their duty to properly supervise and control their children is a proximate cause of the delinquency of those children.

Section II. Contributing to Neglect or Delinquency of Children

Any parent, legal guardian or other person having the care or custody of a minor child under the age of Eighteen (18) years who shall by any act, or by lack of supervision and control over said minor child, encourage, contribute toward, cause or tend to cause said minor child to become neglected or to commit any delinquent or criminal act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section III. Curfew for Any Minor Person Under the Age of Eighteen (18)

No minor under the age of Eighteen (18) years shall loiter, idle or congregate in or on any public street, highway, alley, park, school, or other public place, or other place normally open to the public, including but not limited to shopping centers, places of amusement, private recreation areas or similar places, between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 5:00 a.m. Sunday through Thursday, and 12:30 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. Saturday and Sunday mornings, unless the minor is accompanied by the parent or guardian, or some adult over the age of 21 years delegated by the parent or guardian to accompany the minor child, or where the minor child is upon an errand or other legitimate business directed by his parent or guardian.

Section IV. Violation of Curfew Hours

Any parent, legal guardian or other person having the control or custody of any minor child under the age of Eighteen (18) years who shall assist, aid, abet, allow, permit or encourage said minor to violate the provisions of Section III of this Ordinance, either by overt act, by failing to act or by lack of supervision and control over said minor child, is guilty of a misdemeanor. The fact that a child under the age of Eighteen (18) years is apprehended while on the public street, highway, alley, park, school or other public place, or other place normally open to the public during the hours defined in the above Section III, shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of this Section on the part of the parents, legal guardian or other person having the care or custody of said minor child.

Section V. Penalty

Any person found guilty of a misdemeanor under the terms of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

Section VI. Separability

If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid or unenforceable by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections, sentences,

clauses or phrases of this ordinance as an entirety and it being the legislative intent that the provisions of this ordinance are separable and that the ordinance shall continue in effect notwithstanding the invalidity of such section, sentence, clause or phrase.

M. C. Yeargan Honored by Church

The Rev. Mr. Maurice C. Yeargan, former pastor of Iowa Park Presbyterian church, was elected recently Pastor Emeritus by the Central Presbyterian church of Sulphur, Okla., where he was pastor for 11 years following his move from Iowa Park.

Pastor Emeritus is an honorary office, awarded solely for the purpose of expressing appreciation to a pastor for giving much more of himself than was required, and particularly to Mr. Yeargan for his long and faithful service.

Mr. Yeargan, a native of Alabama, was graduated from Davidson college in North Carolina, where he met and married Ruth Hill. He received the bachelor of divinity degree from Austin Seminary, Austin, Texas. He was ordained to the ministry at Anson in 1928.

The following year, a new building was built by the Presbyterians there. Following that pastorate, Maurice served in Raymondville, Robstown, Iowa Park, Sulphur and Plain Dealing, La. In all but two churches, some addition to buildings, or new ones were erected. During his pastorate in Iowa Park, the education building was built and paid for—the membership increased about 50% and the annual financial contribution increased about tenfold.

In the course of his ministry, Mr. Yeargan has served as moderator of two presbyteries, and he has represented presbytery as a commissioner to the General Assembly of the church on four different occasions. He has served on several boards and committees of the Church.

Mr. Yeargan taught a high school Bible course in Raymondville for two years in the 1940's. He worked in numerous Roll Call and finance drives for Red Cross, and during World War II served as Home Service Chairman. He was commissioned by Gov. Coke Stevenson as chaplain in Texas State Guard (organized to take place of National Guard which was federalized during World War II).

Other civic activities have included work with Boy Scouts, Salvation Army, Chamber of Commerce, membership in Lions, Kiwanis and Rotary clubs, serving as president of Sulphur Rotary and delegate to two International Conventions.

In addition to pastoral work, Mr. Yeargan was employed on part-time basis as chaplain of the State Veterans hospital in Sulphur for two years.

Mrs. Yeargan, while running her home with an able hand, has contributed much to the work of the church by teaching Sunday School classes, sponsoring young people's groups, and acting as a counselor for church summer camps.

She has held membership in various clubs in the communities where they have lived, and has been active in business as well. During World War II, Ruth was secretary of the Office of Price Administration for Willacy county at Raymondville; she wrote a regular column for the weekly

newspaper, the Willacy County News; and was a reporter and feature writer for the Valley Morning Star of Harlingen. At one time she wrote news commentary for Station KRGV, Westlaco.

Mrs. Yeargan has had published two volumes of poetry, poems published in two anthologies, and has written lyrics to a sacred song, published several years ago. She organized and taught in a private school while they were living in Robstown.

While in Iowa Park Mrs. Yeargan was secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, and deputy tax collector for Wichita county. At Sulphur she was secretary to the board of education of the public school for several years before she resigned.

Mr. and Mrs. Yeargan make their home in Sulphur and enjoy reading, walking and travel. He still fills the pulpits at various Presbyterian churches. During the past five months they have been residing in Iowa Park to be near the medical facilities here and in Wichita Falls.

The Yeargans have one daughter, Mrs. B. G. House, and three grandchildren: Gary, Alan and Cynthia—all of Iowa Park.

Mrs. Marilyn Jo Birzer was awarded the BA in Education by Wichita State university last Saturday. She earned the degree at Wichita, Kans., with majors in both elementary education and special education.

She was a member of National Honor Society in high school.

Marilyn Jo Bell is a 1968 graduate of W. F. George high school, Iowa Park. She was married in 1969 to Joe Birzer. They reside at 1655 Denver in Wichita.

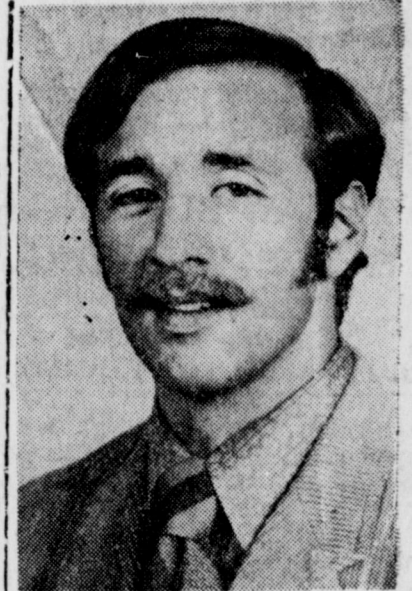
he accomplished Time limit has been extended to June 5. Day Camp itself will be June 12-15.

In Kentucky they saw the home which inspired Stephen Foster to write "My Old Kentucky Home." And in Bardstown they dined at Talbot Tavern, opened in 1779 during the Revolutionary War, the oldest Western Stagecoach Stop in America. Abraham Lincoln's family stayed here during the trial over ownership of the farm they occupied. The Lincolns lost the case and moved to Indiana and Illinois.

At Shakerstown, near Lexington, they stopped in the community occupied by the Shakers, a religious sect, once prevalent in the East but almost non-existent now. The women were dressed in their costumes with white collars, bonnets, aprons and long skirts. The Texans witnessed a sheep shearing and the animal they saw fleeced produced five pounds of wool. This community is typical of the Shakers in that it is self-supporting. They make everything they use. All men are brothers, the women are sisters; and the community center serves as the church, school and recreation facility.

Emma saw again in the house in Burgin, Ky., where her father was born. The outside has ocer weathered boards but the log walls are there. The tobacco barn built with wooden pegs is still in use. The Ballards live there and after 100 years they are caring for the Denny family burying ground on the farm.

The women stopped in Shelbyville, Ten., birthplace of Kathleen's father. She talked with a cousin who resides there. The women did not pass up the opportunity of attending Methodist church services in Elizabethtown, Ky.

Heading home, the travelers enjoyed another visit at the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City. As they neared Iowa Park they became aware that wild flowers here are more in abundance than any they saw on the trip.

Boys Ranch

Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Pace made a trip to Lubbock recently where they visited his brother Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Pace; his sister-in-law Mrs. Bob Pace; and two nieces. They accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Pace to Amarillo with a stopover in Tulsa to see the Quince Workman family, Mrs. Tom Pace's brother-in-law.

Highlight of the trip was their visit to Cal Farley's Boys Ranch on the return trip to Lubbock. The Paces have long been interested in Farley's work and have supported it with memorials through the years.

Mr. Julian Bivins of Amarillo, who gave the original land on the historic Tascosa, was a friend and classmate of Perle when she was in her teens and lived in Amarillo. Her niece and husband Ed Mullins, who now reside in Perryton, were among the first teachers at the Ranch. It was founded in 1939 by the late Cal Farley.

At present, Boys Ranch covers 4100 acres, has about 50 buildings and its own bank, a post office, and a fully accredited 12-year curriculum school. Buildings are designed to provide for 500 students, including Junior High, which was built with help of the United Peace Officers of America.

A 14-trades vocational program is maintained and the boys are given practical experience in a skill which they can use when they leave the Ranch. Much of the construction on new buildings, food preparation and maintenance is done by the boys under supervision of qualified instructors.

Non-denominational religious training is promoted through the Ranch's chapel in the chapel; and a new \$800,000 religious complex is now under construction.

Over 350 boys have a completely normal life in a home-like family atmosphere with a staff of couples. Today over 2500 boys in every state in the nation can look back on Boys Ranch as "their home."

It is completely supported by contributions and is not in any way affiliated with fraternal, religious, civic or governmental organizations.

The Methodist Foundation of the Wichita Falls District and Bryant Edwards of Henrietta have built brick homes there, which are occupied by boys from this area.

Mr. and Mrs. Pace feel it is worth the time and effort if one is in the Amarillo area to make the 26 miles extra and tour the Ranch, meet some of the boys, and see them at work.
