Proposed

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR. 1)

General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Section 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years, or until his successor shall be duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Section 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Section 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

Bird Lore

This has been a summer for the birds! Even when it was so cold I could hardly stay outside, our mockingbirds were busy building in the red honeysuckle.

After completion I was sure she would wait until warmer weather to lay her eggs, but we knew exactly what she was doing, and raised a family very early in the spring.

The cardinal too was serenading his love both morning and evening from atop the maple tree. Then the martins arrived. They started immediately to select an appropriate room to raise their brood. Our yard sounded like a friendly neighborhood get-together.

Our little hummingbirds are here in an unusually large number this summer. Most are female rubythroats, but I am delighted to have one female rufous. The John Kiblers have a male rufous and a black-chinned. These last two have strayed a little from their western habitat and are most likely beginning their fall migration to their wintering area in Central and South America, a distance of 2500 miles with a 500-mile on-stop flight across the Gulf of Mexico. Hummers are great fun. I wish everyone had the pleasure of their company.

The only new feathered friend I can add to my backyard list is a Carolina wren. This one is a large rusty wren, rufous above and buffy below with a conspicuous white stripe over the eye. Its song is remarkably loud and clear and makes me search for a much larger bird. It is sometimes known as the Mocking Wren because of its imitative powers.

I hope you have been watching the eastern kingbird as it perches on the wires downtown, darting back and forth catching flying insects. This large black and white flycatcher has a white band at the tip of its fanlike tail.

Yes, it has been an exciting season and most of the familiar bird friends have been accounted for.

Birds like many kinds of flower seeds, so if you have a lot you might try harvesting them to save until needed.

Please Save Water

Mayor Gordon G. Clark has submitted the following statement concerning water use in Iowa Park during the present emergency:

Twenty million persons in the United States do not have running water, so despite restrictions on the use of our water, we are a very fortunate people.

The city officials appreciate the co-operation you have given us in conserving our meager water supply. Water Superintendent Tom Compton tells me that if everybody will co-operate in conserving water we can probably make it without resorting to ditch water.

Again let me remind you that there is to be no watering of lawns or using a sprinkler for any watering purpose. To water roses and shrubs, let water run very slowly on each individual plant.

Anyone violating these rules will have his water supply cut off and the cut off valve padlocked.

Latest estimated date for use of Wichita Falls water for drinking purposes is late in September, according to those who are installing the 16-inch pipeline to Iowa Park.

After service is completed, a few days will be required to clear up the water coming through the line and make it safe for drinking.
