Buffet luncheon in fellowship hall for the church membership concluded activities. More than 100 remained to eat and visit.

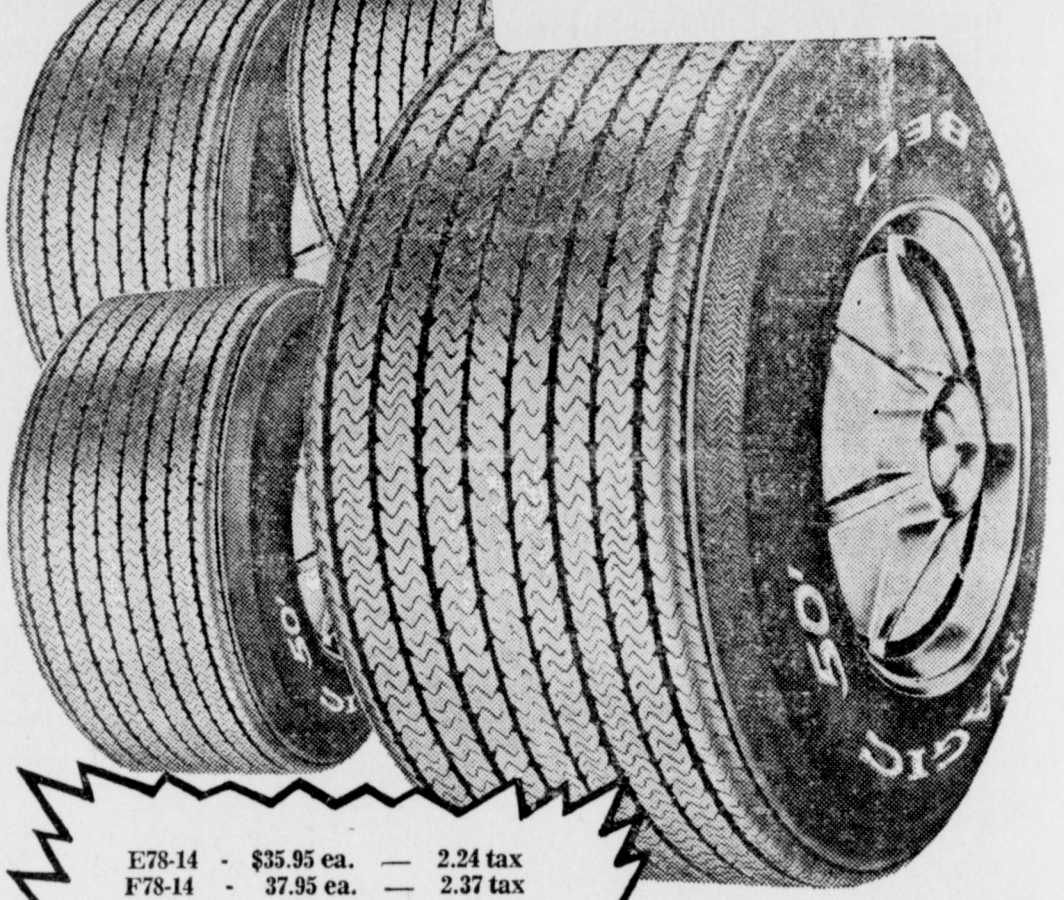

Bird Lore

For some birds migration has already begun. Our purple martin houses stand silent as martins have already departed from our area. Chimney swifts and night-hawks are left to patrol the air for flying insects.

Until last Sunday our scissor-tail flycatchers were still with us. For some time large numbers of them have been congregating at Lake Gordon and in the north part of town in preparation for migration. Quite often large groups will come to the same area late each evening, then wander away feeding during the day. And then one day they all head for Central America.

Our little 3-inch hummingbirds which make their way to the Gulf of Mexico from various summer habitats in the USA are still with us. Their tiny wings must beat 50 to 75 times a second for their 8-hour non-stop journey across the 500 miles of open water. Miracles like these we cannot scientifically explain.

From Sept. 15 to Oct. 31, managers of the Empire State building in New York City turn the floodlights off the top 30 stories on cloudy or foggy nights. The diffused lights confuse the birds and they fly into buildings. This is repeated in the spring for the northward migration.

We generally speak of four principal migration routes used by the Central, and the Mississippi Flyways. We in this area are directly in the Central Flyway, so expect to see some uncommon species right in your own backyard!

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



A Field Day will be held Sept. 3 at the SCS plant materials center at Knox City. This facility serves Texas and Oklahoma.

Livestockmen, seed dealers, sportsmen and others interested in the search for improved plants are being invited to attend.

Harvey Davis of Temple, executive director of the Texas State Soil & Water Conservation Board, will be the principal speaker. New grasses, legumes and other plants being evaluated at the Center will be discussed during the day. Some 1200 strains of 325 plants are being grown at Knox City.

Chief goal of plant materials work is to find new strains that will solve specific conservation problems. Since livestock and livestock co-exist on the same land, the search extends to the grasses, legumes, forbs & shrubs which have dual values. Such plants are needed by land owners and operators for including in the range seeding mixtures, for use in travel lane seedings, in border plantings and other uses.

Strains that appear promising at Knox City are then grown and evaluated under field conditions on farms of SWCD co-operators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections that prove superior are then released by Conservation Districts to seed growers. They grow seed and sell it to the public.

A new grass variety Mason Sandhill Loegrass was released this year. Selection 75 Kleingrass

was released in 1968. Other grass strains put into use by SCS are El Reno, Uvelde, Vaughn sidacas grama; King Ranch bluestem; Green sprangletop; and Greenville switchgrass.
