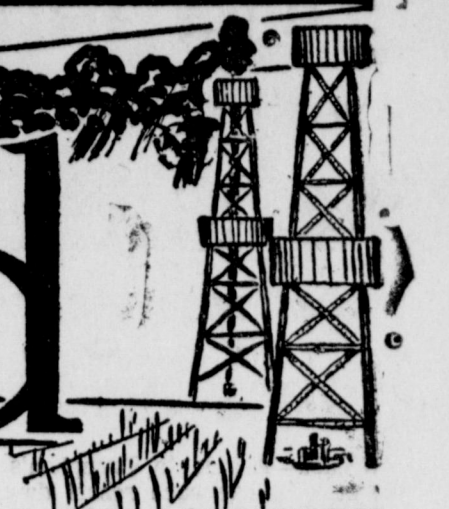

My big break came when, as a reporter for the New York Times, I received the Pulitzer Prize for my coverage of the meeting between Albert Schweitzer and Mahatma Gandhi at Schroon Lake. Since then it all has been laughter and leisure, free-lancing and living on royalties from the movie that was made from my best-selling autobiography "Lawrence of Arabia."

I did live in Iowa Park some years ago and still retain fond memories of the Tex-Okla Fair and going downtown on Saturday nights to watch the Zephyr come through. It's all true, as sure as my name is Brennan, and if you don't believe me, ask Mrs. Hines.

Water Pipe Line Complete

Workers completed Tuesday of this week connecting Iowa Park and Wichita Falls with a 16-inch water line. Use of the line through the years will prevent a water shortage in Iowa Park, since it can carry as much as 1,000,000 gallons of treated water per day from the Wichita Falls pumping station.

Testing of the line and clearing it for purity will take approximately eight days, according to engineering and health experts.

This new source of palatable, safe water is the culmination of several years of hard work by former mayor Erwin F. Soell and the City Councilmen who worked with him to get voter-approval of the project. Defeated once by the citizens, the dire results of an extreme drought in the past several years, forced a change in attitude on the whole question.

A large expansion in the sewage disposal plant has been completed, two large storage tanks for pure water, and now the 16-inch water line—all have been brought into being by the present administration.

With the present set-up going full blast, Iowa Park businessmen can now go under industrial expansion in dead earnest, and the economic and population growth their efforts deserve can be expected.

Our Day of Rejoicing can be expected momentarily.

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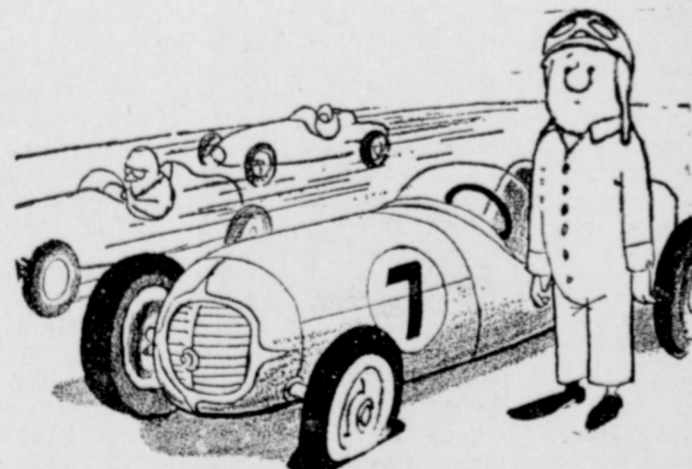

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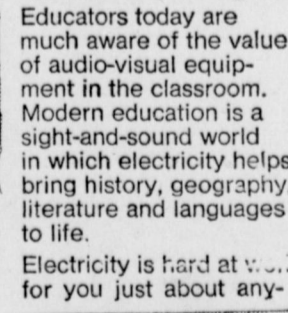
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Bird Lore

The bluejay has inspired many adjectives in his time: bold, sly, brassy, thieving, mean, greedy, smart, cunning and others. A few of these he deserves.

Jays with their loud squawks save much bird life throughout the year. Their shouts of danger immediately hurry every bird in hearing distance under cover.

In spring the male is quite gentle with his mate, feeding her tidbits and singing to her in a soft melodious voice. The jays are also good parents, maintaining quiet and secrecy in their nesting area.

I've watched some that will dominate the feeders, while others wait their turn.

There will be those who add, "Have you ever seen a jay rob a nest of eggs or helpless young while the frantic parent, no match for the bigger jay, screamed in futile agony?" This happens occasionally, but grackles, not jays, are often predators at nests.

Snakes and cats get baby birds quite often. Even that lovable little wren has been known to destroy the eggs of another bird. There are many threats to eggs and young and parent birds, so let us instead ask, "Have you ever watched a bluejay plant an oak tree woods?" Acorns don't have wings to be carried on the wind like maple seeds and elms. Somehow they get planted just deep enough and spaced far enough apart to grow tall and strong. Human hands did not plant them. Who or what did?

One answer is that squirrels did, burying them for a time when food has become scarce. But this is only part of the answer. There is another agent responsible for those mighty oaks—and that is the handsome blue and black and white feathered friend, Mr. Bluejay.

Just because one jay is bad doesn't necessarily mean all are bad. So, when you think of all the names he is called, add one: forester.

There are Stellar jays in the west, Green jays in Mexico, Gray jays (Canada jays, "camp robbers") in Canada and our northern states; Scrub jays in Florida—but there is none more full of personality than our Bluejay.

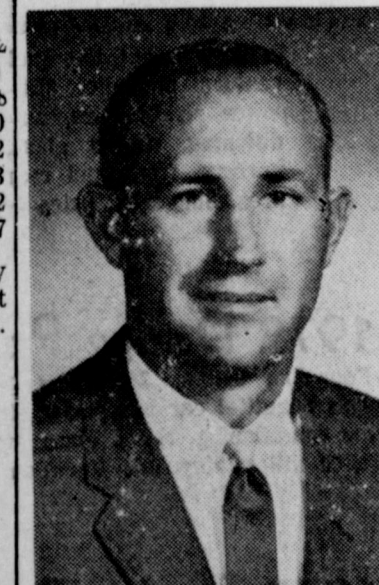
