## School Board Hear Reports

A full agenda dispatched with no litches confronted the school board in regular meeting Tuesday evening. All trustees were present with the following school personnel: Ferris Nowell, Bill Steger, Harold Cowley, John Sibley, Bob Cole, James Ward.

Reports from elementary principals indicated the situation is well in hand with regard to the new year's work. Sibley reported a building load of 337 at Bradford with 27 in special education at the Blue Building under his supervision. The kindergarten program is going well, the observation room is ready and visitors are invited. He is quite pleased with the new purchasing system.

Cole said 45 of his 68 first graders at Kidwell have kindergarten training and are oriented to the program of public school with the first day. Kidwell will likely have a kindergarten class next year. Its building load is 311.

Ward is enthusiastic about the success of the schedule of all 5th and 6th grade classes at Valley View. The building load is 358: 169 in 5th, 180 in 6th, and 9 in special education. He made special mention of the music and art departments and the smoothness with which the physical education program is working.

Steger reported 96 per cent of the current tax collections are in and the overall collections for the year totaled more than 100 per cent. He also said student participation in cafeteria service is good and the 5c increase has made no difference.

Steger's suggestion that the board advertise for sale the temporary water systems installed in the schools last year was accepted.

Bids on two buses to be sold were opened. Ten had been submitted. High bid on the 1965 Chevrolet was \$1,302.80; on the 1969 Chevrolet was \$718.36.

Bids on janitorial work were accepted as follows: \$275 per month by James Smith for Kidwell; \$350 per month by Gene Shawver for high school; 50 per month for the vocational building at high school, by Paul Tigrett. These are bids made for night work.

Bids on other units for janitorial services will be opened at 1:00 p.m. Sept. 22.

Mrs. Martha Taylor of Chickasha, Okla., was elected to direct the Junior High choir.

The board voted to buy school-bus Medi-Pay insurance with the benefits made payable to the school. A \$200 limit plan is to be used; the school to make payment not to exceed the limit of policy. There are 600 students riding the buses daily.

Approval was given for Evening Lions to rent the high school cafeteria for a stew supper on the evening of the game with Brownwood

A request was at hand from the Good Shepherd Lutheran church for chairs, and it was voted to give them an assortment of unmatched folding wooden chairs.

Total spent to date on the field-house is \$33,011 with much yet to be done. It is thought it can be used by the time of the Jacksboro game, though not complete.

The contract with Mathis Chevrolet for the Vocational Agriculture pick-up was renewed. Approval was given for seven trips by agriculture students from Oct. 7 to April 16. April 23 or 24 was suggested as time for the annual FFA banquet.

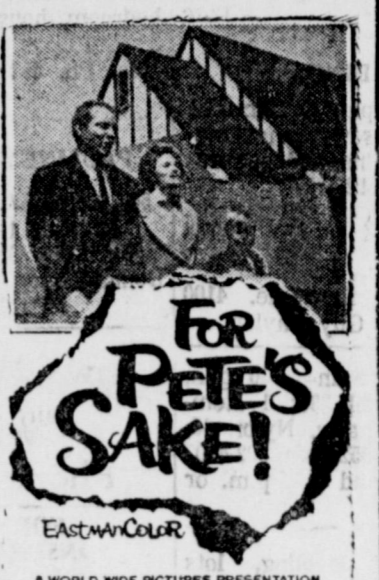
We cannot quit last Friday's game without mentioning the half-time shows produced by bands and pep squads and cheerleaders of both schools.

## Water Pipe Line Complete

Water from Wichita Falls is now being pumped into the new line and leaks are being discovered and repaired. When the line is okayed and purity of water has been certified, Iowa Park will have good, palatable, soft water again!

City aldermen voted Monday night to allow a 7.4% rate increase in gas rates to be charged by Lone Star Gas Co. The company had asked for 10% with automatic annual adjustment. The new ordinance does not have such an arrangement.

Mayor Gordon G. Clark named a new city planning and zoning board: Gene Lowrey and John Hughes, Lee Turner, and Frank Harlin.

Vocational horticulture students of IPHS will provide plants for beautification of the space surrounding Lake Gordon.

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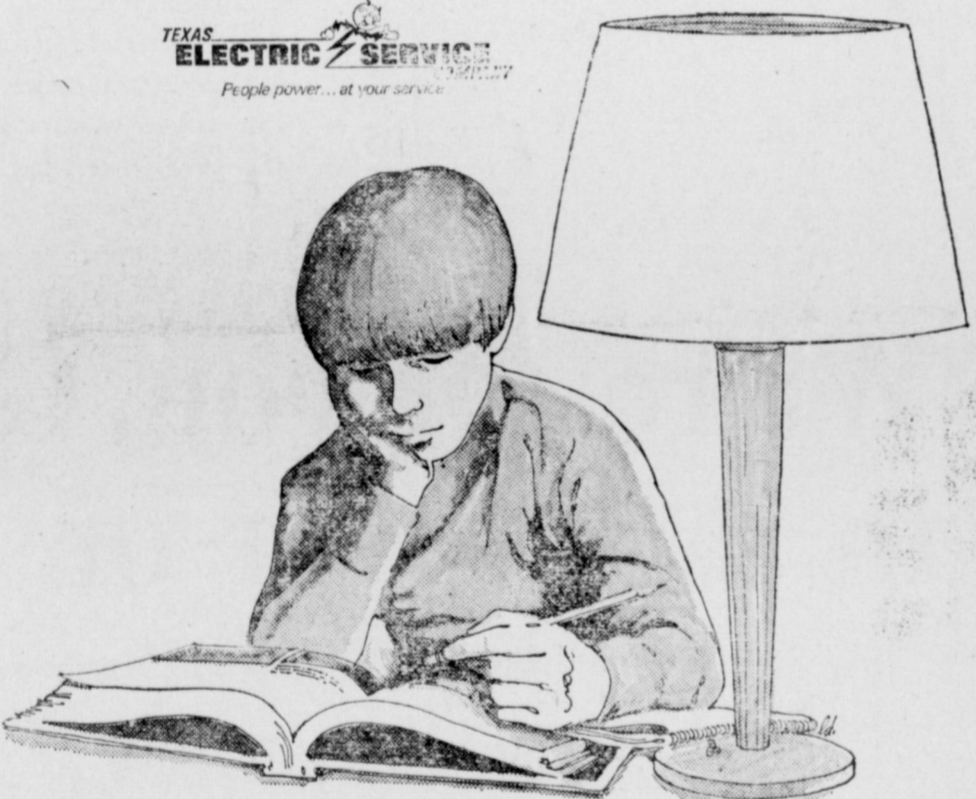

TILL IT'S PURPLE MARTIN TIME

Dear little bird, so high up there In summer's azure sky, You have your flight all charted now

And soon away you'll fly. You've made our days so cheerful With antics and with song, The time you're here is all too short;

The time away . . . too long! You've trained your youngsters very well To dip and soar and sway; You've shown them how to find their homes

And soon you'll sail away. . . To countries far from our own shore

Where jungles steam and swarm With insects that you'll catch on wing. And where the days are always warm.

We never cease to marvel at The many things you do. This time, each year, our hearts go sad

To bid farewell to you. Your cheerful song, your friendly ways

Make each day so sublime, We'll not forget, but count the days Till it's Purple Martin time!

It is important, now that the martins are gone, to lower your houses and close them for the winter. If you allow sparrows and starlings to roost in them all winter, your martin colony will have a difficult time reclaiming them next spring.

It is also time to begin thinking about winter bird feeding. The fall migration will soon be in full swing and then winter residents will be moving into your neighborhood.

Winter songbirds of Wichita county are: yellow and red shafted flickers yellow-bellied sapsuckers Sky's phoebe brown creeper sage thrasher mountain bluebird ruby-crowned kinglet water pipit cedar waxwings myrtle warbler Audubon warbler Brewer's blackbird pine siskin American goldfinch rufous-sided towhee lark bunting Savannah tree vesper Harris' fox white crowned, Lincoln's and song sparrow slate colored junco Chestnut-collared longspur

Other birds that stay with us throughout the year are belted kingfisher red-bellied, red-headed, downy and ladder-backed woodpeckers eastern phoebe horned lark Carolina chickadee tufted titmouse Bewick's wren Carolina wren mockingbird robin eastern bluebird loggerhead shrike starling eastern and western meadowlark red-winged blackbird boat-tailed and common grackle brown-headed cowbird cardinal house finch field sparrow English sparrow
