### Sheriff's Posse Elects **Up to Tuesday**

about normal, 673 having been issued through Tuesday, accord-ing to Albert Lovell tax assessorcollector.

Deadline for paying poll taxes is January 31, and Mr. Lovell stated he would like to encourage each person to pay their tax if they wish to vote in 1962.

Also, for those who are exempt they must have been 60 prior to January 1, 1961. In other words you must be 61 years old to vote without paying a poll tax in 1962. Callahan County does not require a person to get an exemption receipt.

For a person who is 21 years of age, they must get an exemp-tion receipt at least 30 days prior to the election in which they desire to vote.

Any citizen who is blind, has

lost a hand or foot, or is perma-nently disabled, or a disabled veteran of Foreign Wars with 40 percent disability, pay only \$1.00 for a poll tax receipt.

This year a policy change is being made in assessing proper-ty for taxes, Mr. Lovell stated. Each person who has not ren-dered their property, will be mailed an inventory of property list, and the tax office is asking that these be looked over fo correctness, add the personal property, and return to the tax

In order that a tax payer re-ceive credit for a homestead exemption, the inventory will have be signed and returned to the Tax Assessor-Collector County


