AIR WE GO AGAIN

The Bayou is under an air stagnation alert today. A jolly lot of good that does. Smokestacks continue to belch out foul fumes, city buses are still obnoxious to follow, and cars pour out leaded carbon monoxide just as they did yesterday. Nothing is changed by the bulletin except our awareness of an increased hazard in inhaling.

If the weather bureau issued a hurricane warning, most of us would busy ourselves with preparations for the big blow or evacuate the area. With a tornado warning, we'd seek immediate safety. But when they tell us of dangerously contaminated air, life goes on tra-la. It is as if a doctor examined a patient, diagnosed the problem as smolpox, and neither doctor nor patient did anything to cure the malady or prevent its spread. Forget it. Go on to more important matters, and for Pete's Sake don't offend anyone.

The Bayou is sinking. We know it, the city fathers know it, federal agencies know it. Houses list to one side, porches fall off, drive ways cave in, plaster cracks, and still mammoth industries pump massive amounts of water from underground wells. And because those industries refuse to draw from the city water supply, city water rates continue to increase annually.

But we won't close them down; we won't even suggest that they consider the damage they're doing. They pay lots of taxes and employ lots of people who pay lots of taxes, so we wouldn't want to offend them even if their fumes do make us gasp for breath, and their pumping destroys our once-beautiful homes.

You have already read about my neighbor who chose to water her lawn and wash her cars during a severe shortage of water and electricity. With people like that running loose, how can we ever hope to solve our environmental problems? What do you do with a senator who scoffs at reports from renowned authorities, saying: "What do they know? They're only scientists."

Those who are struggling to return this planet to a viable state are outnumbered by those who either don't care or care only for their own welfare right now without regard for the future. We are responding to programs which bring the most money the fastest, easiest way and let the future be damned.

There are those who say the key is education. I disagree. Every day some agency says, "Look, folks, you're killing yourselves and destroying resources which don't really belong to you and you alone." And still we go right on, fearlessly, relentlessly wasting day after day, year after year. Instead of co-operating, we pull in our own individual directions regardless of who must pay for our recklessness. So long as we are comfortable, we are happy, and the thing now is to be happy at all costs.

She gave incidents that have taken place in the U.S. that would provoke thought as to where the line between liberty and license ended.

Mrs. Dyer described freedom of speech as a precious heritage but stated that since the words are used by both democracies and totalitarians it poses a problem. She gave suggestions by leading judges and law enforcement personnel concerning how those can be stopped who threaten disruptions: Each case should hinge on evidence laid before a jury; civil authorities should stop incitement before it spawns violence; citizens must act to protect ordered liberty; states must update their laws; appellate judges must balance their concern for the First Amendment.

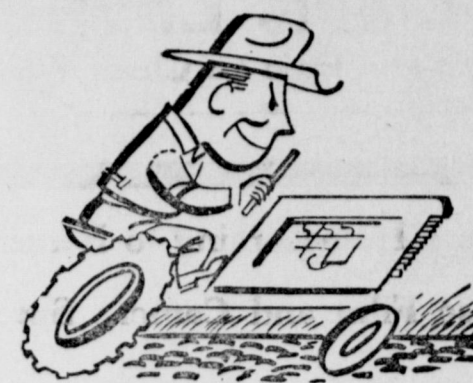

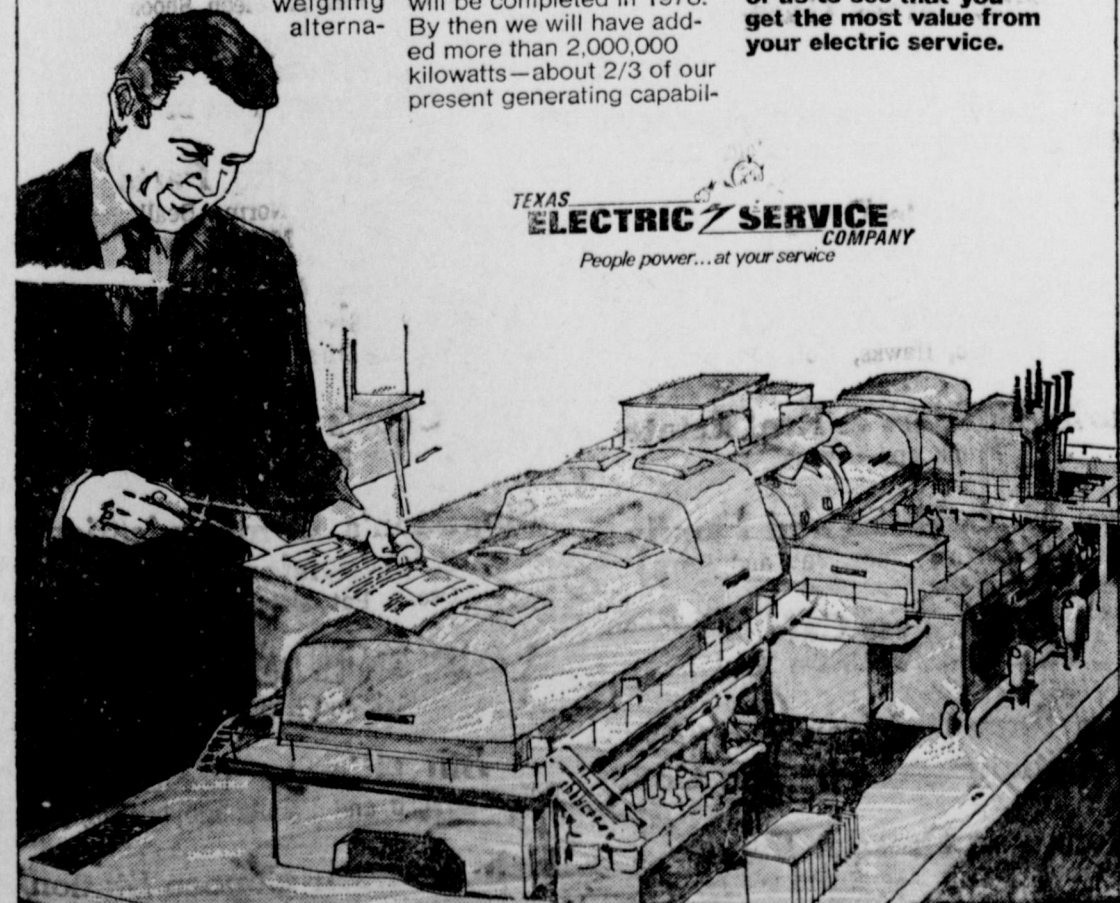

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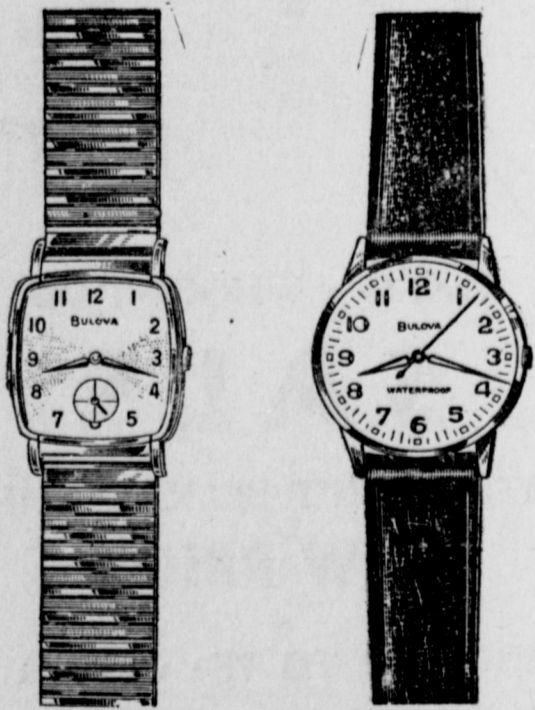

Bird Lore

One of the nicest things about summer's end is getting to know some of our summer residents better. It's a time of resting for birds and it is possible to study some species that show up in our yards for food and water.

Erma Kibler has had orioles to sip her hummingbird syrup hanging from a vial on a post.

Young barn swallows that nested on the light fixture in the Arch Hughes garage can be seen each evening perched on her folding clothes rack.

The little hummingbirds that enjoyed the syrup feeders just a few days ago are now feasting on the Turk's Cap, Abelia and the Cypress Vine.

I have seen the little Bewick's wren checking to see if the moph-head hanging on the clothes line will make him a good winter roost.

Last week we saw the green heron, the smallest of our herons, on the Sefciks' pond. It looked quite dark at a distance, almost black, but the back is greenish blue. At close range the neck is chestnut brown. The legs are short, yellow or orange in color. Though not always seen, he raises a dark, shaggy crest when alarmed. The young have dark backs and chests and necks are brown and white streaked.

Another interesting bird we saw was the belted kingfisher, the diver with a big bill. They appear throughout North America wherever the water is clear enough to reveal fish. And they may dive 50 feet for a fish dinner. These birds are 11 to 14 inches in length and have blue-gray backs, white underparts, ragged crests, and the females have rusty breast bands.

Another bird close by was a young marsh hawk, identified by his russet underparts and white rump.

This has been a good year for dickcissels and one showed up recently at a bird bath. If they are about, you'll know it because of their clatter. They are supposed to call "dick-ciss-ciss-ciss" or something similar. One of his common names is Little Meadowlark because of his black-bibbed yellow breast. He is about sparrow sized. Soon this one will migrate to his winter home in Central America.

Yes, we sense nature is applying the brakes that bring summer to a stop, and the feeling of fall is in the air.
