Rural Fire Preventi'n

County Judge Calvin Ashley and fire chiefs in the county have joined with Farm Bureau President Ed Foster jr., to proclaim the week Oct. 8-14 as Rural Fire Prevention Week in Wichita county. Ashley urges all rural citizens to be fire safety minded during this week and every week.

"Utmost care should be used in handling all petroleum products. All buildings should be properly protected from lightning; and fire hazards should be removed,' said the judge.

Fire chiefs urged all to check their homes for fire hazards: "A large number of home fires are caused by faulty wiring, overloaded circuits, pennies behind fuses or circuits overfused, and appli-

Rural fire usually are three to six times as destructive as city fires because of the time involved in getting to the fire.

Foster noted that "Texas Farm Bureau has been active in promot ing fire prevention by sponsoring more than 200 graphic fire demenstrations to schools each year, by offering fire extinguishers to members at reduced rates, sponsoring some 100 volunteer firemen to the Firemen's Training School each year, as well as paying a fire department \$75 for answering fire calls involving Farm Bureau

If you intend to feed the birds this winter, now is the time to begin. Do it consistenly and ragularly beginning before they really need it.

I try to feed in two locations so aggressive birds like sparrows, cowbirds, starlings and grakles will not get all of it. These I feed mixed grain at the back of the yard. I place sunflower seeds in a feeder near my window for my cardinals and house finches. not continued throughout the entire to capacity each day, for some

will stay until the last seed is gone. Decide the amount you will feed and put it out late in the afternoon so they will find it first thing in the morning. Being able to find food early will help to replace heat and energy when the weather is cold; and will often save a bird's life.

You can feed birds many things besides seeds. I use peanut butter mixed with meal and rolled into balls, and place them on my window ledge for mocking birds, cardinals and wrens. I cut up apples and raisins for the robins.

Most birds like crumbs and suet. I grind suet and put small amounts out each day. It is nourishing, especially for insect eaters and will not freeze. I keep a supply of bird pie on hand for times when we have snow and ice storms. I also have natural food in the

yard: holly, pokeberry, elderberry, cherry laurel, pyracantha, Russian olive, Chinaberry, honeysuckle and Virginia creeper. Birds need water any time of

year and cannot survive without

it. Be sure to thaw out their water bowl if it has frozen overnight. Just a word of warning: It is better not to feed at all if it is not coninued throughout the entire



ORDINANCE NO. 31

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Pleasant

An ordinance prohibiting the disposal of dry kitchen refuse, kitchen garbage, rubbish, and trash, upon any public street, road, alley, or on the premises of any person, natural or artificial, within the corporate limits of the Town of Pleasant Valley, Texas, provided, however, the provisions of this ordinance shall not prohibit any person, natural or artificial, from using his own premises for the disposal of the materials herein set out, providing a penalty that any person, firm, corporation, or association of persons, their agents, servants, or employees, violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10 and not exceeding \$100, and each and every day that any such violation occurs shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

ORDINANCE NO. 30

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Pleasant Valley, Texas:

An ordinance making it unlawful for any person, natural or artificial, to park or cause to be parked any automobile, truck, tractor or other similar or like kind of vehicle which is propelled by motor, upon and public thoroughfare, public street, or alley within the corporate limits of the town of Pleasant Valley, Texas, for a longer continuous period of time than 48 hours, fixing the pun-ishment therefor, and each and every day that any such violation occurs shall constitute a separate and distinct offense, provided that the provisions of this ordinance shall not be applicable to any vehicle involved in a collision or motor failure if towed or moved within 48 hours from the time of such collision or motor failure off of and away from said public thoroughfare, public street

Any person, natural or artificial, found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100 and not less than \$10 for each offense.
