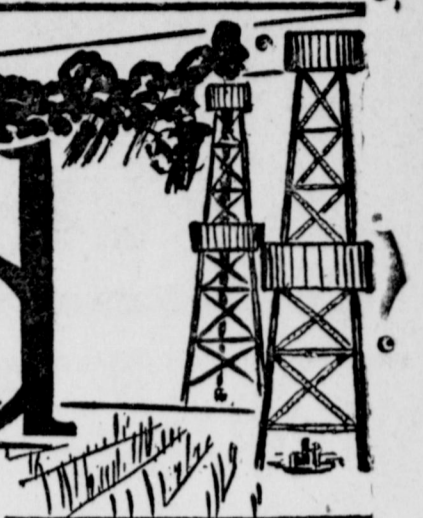

My goodness, it's amazing what one learns in a new situation. After a month of proofreading assorted advertisements, catalogs, and magazines, I can now tell you that there is a boutique in this city which will sell you or yours a simple frock for work or play at the drastically reduced price of \$225. I must clue all of my friends.

Or, I could tell you that chocolate covered caterpillars, ants and grasshoppers come packaged 12 jars to the case, unless you prefer a mixture of all three at 10 large jars to the case.

I can tell you that steel belted radial tires are the very berries for your car; that there is only one safe way to anchor your tanker during a hurricane; that all the political candidates think ill of their opponents and consider themselves truly swell; and that your flange will rust if it isn't lined with plastic.

You probably knew all that and more, but are you aware that the English language is about to meet its demise? I'm sure of it. Our Mother Tongue is ailing, thanks to the advertising industry, which has taken so many liberties with grammar, punctuation and spelling that I'm sure Noah Webster is in a perpetual spin.

We have one PR gal who sends in copy by the ream, carefully mangled to her own specifications. Not only is the result a grammatical nightmare, she insists that not one comma be added or deleted, not one misspelled word be corrected, or she will take her business elsewhere. She has the journalistic style of a teenybopper and the tact of a mature porpoise.

Just yesterday I read four entire pages of small print in which almost every word had been abbreviated. (Chas Jones chrm bd dir & asst mgr drlg oprns 14 yrs) It couldn't have been more difficult to read or less interesting if it had been spelled out in Portuguese, and I have had to proof-read Portuguese copy twice to date.

Advertisers, of course, are at a disadvantage. Their interest is in selling a product, not in winning a Pulitzer Prize for good grammar. We are all familiar with their creativity in spelling old words new ways to catch the readers' attention. (kat, tru, Xmas, etc) And because of space limitations their "sentences" are often fragments—a word here, a phrase there. Punctuation is almost non-existent.

I sympathize but not from the depths of my soul. Having been thoroughly drilled in the mechanics of our language, it fair drives me up a wall to read some of the garbled garbage that crosses my desk and not be able to change it.

Furthermore, knowing how much those people make while they turn out said garbage does bad things to my ego, especially since I was turned down by several agencies for "lack of experience."

Right now I am still feeling very grateful just to be employed and acknowledge the fact that without these ungrammatical slobs I would quickly return to the streets in search of work. But wun us theze daze i'm going 2 luze mi kule & reely tel'm awf.

Former Missionary Will Preach Here Sunday and Show Slides

The Rev. Mr. William D. Hall, former missionary to India, will be guest speaker at Iowa Park Christian church at the 10:55 a.m. worship service, and the fellowship dinner at noon next Sunday.



A native of Illinois, Hall is associate professor of missions in Brite Divinity School, TCU, in Ft. Worth. His sermon topic will be "What Doth the Lord Require of Thee?" After the dinner he will show slides of India and answer questions about the work. He has a BS degree from the University of Illinois and BD from Yale university. He did one year of special study at Cornell university in preparation for the mission field.

Hall's experience has been varied, beginning as teacher in a one-room rural school in Illinois, then a home missionary in Tennessee, seven years in the Bilaspur District, Madya Pradesh, in India. Then to the national staff of United Christian Missionary Society in Indianapolis, Ind. In 1956 he became associate professor of missions at Brite. Hall is author of four books. "Six Hundred Million Neighbors" was published this year as result

Hawks 28 Huskies 19

Iowa Park Hawks ended their 1972 football season in a blaze of glory by defeating the Hirschi Huskies 28-19. The game was run off on Memorial Field in Wichita Falls on Thursday, Nov. 16.

As usual, Iowa Park lost the toss and kicked off to Hirschi, but recovered the fumbled ball. This good fortune was wasted because the Hawks could not muster even one 1st down.

The punt forced Hirschi to take charge on their own 18. After 7 plays, another Husky fumble gave the Green and White another opportunity on the 47 yard line.

Again we couldn't move and again in bad shape with possession on their 8. Their next kick gave us possession on IP 41.

Five straight first downs resulted in a Mean Green touchdown which Hallford stretched into 7 points, Iowa Park. There were at this stage only 50 seconds left of the First Quarter.

Lightning struck the Hawks on the next Hirschi possession. They had possession on their 23 after the kickoff. Suddenly the Hirschi quarterback found himself guarded by nobody, so he beat a hasty path 77 yards long to paydirt. The good kick tied the score.

On our next possession, the Graves Boys used only three 1st downs to care out another 62-yard drive and put the score up to 14.

Hirschi couldn't go. In fact a pass interception soon gave Iowa Park possession. Four 1st downs later and the score had mounted to 21-7 Iowa Park.
At this juncture the Huskies put on some of their best offensive plays of the game. They went 59 yards in four 1st downs and hammered out another six points. Halftime found the score 21-13, Iowa Park.

Iowa Park has been noted this year to have a pretty strong last half. The wind was strong and the temperature just above freezing, so play was not so brisk as usual. After the Hawks had run up another 7 points, they slacked off and were content to go on the defensive. With time fleeting, the Huskies finally succeeded in getting another 6 points.

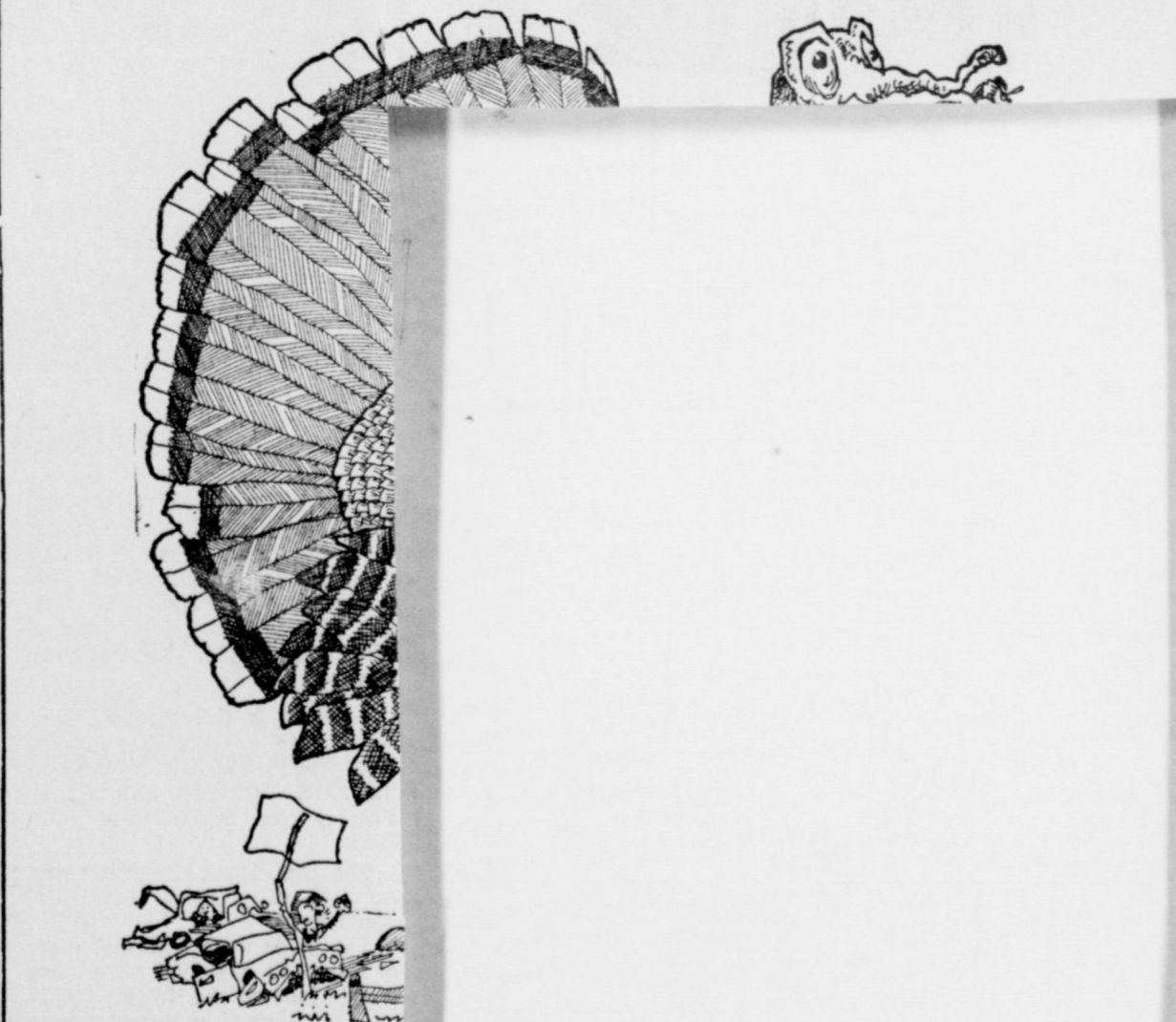

CORRECTION OF PRINTING OF ORDINANCE NUMBER 178

The Ordinance that was printed in the newspaper the last edition was given to the printers with the omission of one word.

In paragraph one, the word SOUTH should appear and the sentence should then read "along or within ten (10) feet of the South or North Side of Roadway of Loop 370 (old Highway U. S. 287) within the city limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, extending from Atlantic Street to Johnson Road."

Money to Spend

The City of Iowa Park is going to receive some of the Revenue Sharing money that is being returned to the local areas under the Revenue Sharing Bill that was passed recently by the Congress.

The amount of money that will come to Iowa Park is not large but it will help do certain things that should be done.

One of the more important undertakings is to enlarge the City Hall and remodel the existing building, this to include having a better facility for Corporation Court and detention facilities.

Another important thing contemplated is improvement of the streets that are in bad repair.

Another item that has been in the thinking is improvement in the parks and recreational areas of the City.

City Hall is aware of the fact that each citizen has an idea of what the money should be used for, but there are some guidelines that must be followed and everything that is desirable will not be able to be done.

If the citizens of Iowa Park wish to send to the City Hall an idea or ideas about improvements that can be done with this revenue sharing money, will you please write it down in a letter and send it to the City Hall so a determination of where the money is to be spent can be set up on a very rigid priority basis.

This is to take place over the next five years, and as you see things just cannot be completed all at one time.

Bird Lore

by Lafayette Stankewitz

It is enjoyable to feed the birds during the cold days of winter when weed seeds are gone and insects have become scarce. Our feathered friends must search for food and if you have been thoughtful enough to put out seeds your yard may become a haven for many beautiful birds.

Soon the cedar waxwings will be arriving in great flocks. These birds are winter visitors. They nest in the Northern states and spend the winter moving throughout the South in happy bands, searching for food. It consists largely of fruit of no value to man. They are especially fond of pyracantha, holly and hackberries. Waxwings also eat many kinds of insects, including small moths, inch worm caterpillars, leaf-eating beetles, including the elm-leaf beetle that has become destructive to elms in recent years.

This is a crested, brown bird a little larger than a sparrow, yellow below, tip of tail dark yellow, black about eyes and on chin, under tail whitish. Adults have minute waxy red droplets on tip of wing feathers.

A few goldfinches can be seen around our cedars during the winter. Their yellow and black plumage will be dull compared to their summer dress.

The pine siskins visited our yard one winter and I would be pleased to have them around this year since the arborvitae have so many seeds, a favorite of this species. These finches are small and dark streaked with two light wing-bars and have some yellow showing on edges of feathers and tail.

Be on the lookout for red crossbills a winter visitor in our area and a bird that is also especially fond of the seed of the arborvitae. The male is brick red and is about 6 inches long. The narrow long bill with its crossed tips at once distinguishes this finch.
