with good doctors, but have you ever tried to find competent medical men in a city where you don't know anyone? The yellow pages may have thousands to choose from, and names tell you nothing about the ability of the attached

I have always made the mistake of waiting for an ailment to crop up before locating a physician. By then it's too late to be choosy. At age 11 I suddenly developed severe pains in my right side. Dr. A diagnosed it as nervcusness and told me to relax. The condition persisted into my freshman year of high school, whereupon Dr. B in a different city said it was spastic colon and took me out of gym classes for all eternity. Three more years of suffering and umpteen absences later, during my first year of college, Dr. C. removed my appendix, saying it should have been done long ago.

Then there was the car wreck in '61. The door caved in on me, Paragraphs bruising my person head to toe, but otherwise no damage was evident. The other guy's insurance merely interviewed me for a few thing wrong with you that medicine will cure." Gee thanks for the compliment, Doc!"

A month later the pain was still there, though the bruises were gone. I went back to Dr. B. a monstrous man, to see if was any damage. He walked up behind me, put his arms around my ribcage, and nearly me squeezed me into unconsciousness. "Well, your ribs weren't cracked. If they had been they'd have broken and we'd have heard the snap." Great, Doc. Swell. He added, "Don't waste your money on x-rays. Go home and be glad you're alive." I never went back to him.

Still years later the pains persisted. I went to three different doctors in New York, each on the recommendation of a friend. The first ran some tests then died before he could interpret them to me. The second said nothing could be done Number three said something was wrong but he didn't know just what.

Today, 11 years after the accident, I learned there had been bone damage and the pain will recur sporadically from now on.

Fortunately it can be treated but I'd like to have a refund of those seven years of appendicitis and 11 years of aching bones plus all the medicinal wild goose chases and fees in between. However, 5:45 and can well be a part of doctors do not readily admit mistakes, much less pay for them.

If a mechanic fails to repair your car or damages it in some way, he is responsible for righting the situation. Except in extreme cases, that rule does not apply to doctors and the human chassis. Add to that the element of unfamiliarity with new patients and top it off with a couple of courses at Midwestern in Freud, and it becomes very difficult to establish a trusting re-

Doctors are very busy people, and society is becoming more and more mobile. For those who must find a new doctor and have no means of knowing which one will serve them best, the problem is a crucial one without a satisfactory solution.

## Kindergarten Praised

out press releases concerning the for parents to read. Kindergarten program being conducted in Iowa Park school district. It reads as follows:

program being run at Iowa Park this year. The Texas Education Agency has provided funds for the program which is to be run as a prototype for other schools who may wish to observe the kindergarten before they progress with plans of their own. Texas educational planning indicates that all school districts will provide kindergarten for five-year-olds by 1977. Kindergarten will be available to children age five years and 7 months in 1973.

Mrs. Georgia Martin teaches the Iowa Park kindergarten. This is her first year with kindergarten students. Previously she has taught second grade. She has the assistance of a high school home economics student, Loretta Robertson, who serves as an aide half the day. Mothers and special education students also help with serving lunch each day.

Twenty-four students are enrolled. Written into the original plan for kindergarten was the stipulation that the students be ones who might have some difficulties entering first grade because they were not ready for academics or because of handicapping conditions. Fifty children were tested before participants

were chosen. To accommodate the kindergar ten classroom, one room of Bradford Elementary School was remodeled. Additions include an observation room with a one-way mirror which can be used by visi-Fantasy of Lights mirror which can be used by visitors who may want to observe the class without the interruption that going into the classroom brings.

The observation room is also equipped with speakers that transmit the sound of the classroom into the observation room. The observation room doubles as a storeroom for the wide assortment of materials required to run the kindergarten. The parents' lending library is also housed in the obser-

vation room. Toys and games that will increase the child's learning are available in the lending library. Several of the items are a balance beam, a record palyer and records and a casette recorder and tapes. 



It also helps to alleviate the collection and disposal problem for governments and citizens and health hazards produced by the very nature of the refuse.

In Texas approximately 5 lbs of solid waste are produced by each person each day. More than \$55,000,000 are spent each year by communities for collection and disposal of domestic solid waste, not including industrial and agricultural wastes.

In Texas there are about 900 organized land disposal sites for municipal refuse which occupy 40 square miles of land. It is estimated there are more than 1000 other promiscuous dump grounds.

Some of these sites meet State Health Department requirements but many do not. As many os 20 million junk and abandoned automobiles are lying around the USA -and 7,000,000 cross the line from transportation to junk each year More than 200 million tires are discarded each year.

More than 48 billion cans and 26 billion bottles are produced annually in this country-most of them throwaways.

In all of these discarded items there are re-usable materials. The steel, aluminum, glass, rubber and paper can be reclaimed at great savings of natural resources.


