1970 , an average of 642 tornadoes and 11 peaths occurred annually. During tha period, yearly totals for tornadoes varied
from 437 to 912 for tornado deaths
from 28 to 516 . Preliminary reports in. dicate that 879 tornadoes occurred in
1971, causing 147 deaths. This raised annual averages since 1953 to 654 torna-
does and 118 deaths. does and 118 deaths.
