Since our building was in a bad shape of repair, considerable expenses were incurred in the moving and repairs.

The building has been moved from the school ground to a permanent site just north of the grade school building on land leased from Mrs. Ethel Tabor.

The improvements include the moving, concrete block foundation, asbestos siding, and vinyl asbestos tile floors with masonite sub flooring.

The building is now ready for the girls to use except for the laying of a short gas line so that the stoves may be connected.

Not all of the building repairs have been paid for, it will take a major part of the 1959 United Fund allotment to pay off the repair bills and our participation fee to the Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council.

These repairs have put the building in good condition, and with minor upkeep expenditures should serve the girls for many years.

Good Farm Records Can Save Dollars

Farmers may save several dollars on income tax by keeping good records, reminds C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist.

Small leakers are the ones that sometimes prove costliest, Bates points out. An oversight of only \$25 in expense items may cost an additional \$5 tax. So, records should include all items of expense and income that will help determine net profit or loss from the business.

To simplify filling out the tax forms, Bates recommends classifying various items in categories corresponding to the various headings used in tax forms. For recording sales, the following groups are recommended: (1) sale of livestock raised, (2) sale of produce raised, (3) other income, (4) sale of items purchased for resale and (5) sale of assets that may receive capital asset treatment.

A depreciation schedule should be kept on farm buildings (except dwelling), fences, machinery, equipment and purchased livestock used for dairy, breeding or draft purposes. These items depreciate each year and this loss is deductible for income tax purposes at the end of the year in which it occurs.

Bates advises consulting your local county agricultural agent about your tax problems. The county agent also can provide a copy of the 1959 Farmers' Tax Guide which should be helpful in your tax management this year.

Cotton Farmers Choose Allotments

Operators of upland cotton farms will have until March 16, 1959, to choose between the Choice (A) and Choice (B) allotments and price supports for their farms. Tommie Harris, Chairman Callahan County ASC Committee said recently. That is the final date for registering the operator's choice at the county ASC office.

The Chairman emphasized, however, that no election of such a choice can be filed until after the farm operator receives a notice of the price support levels applicable to the 1959 upland cotton crop under the (A) and (B) allotments. That will be soon after the Secretary of Agriculture announces the national price support levels for the 1959 upland cotton crop about the end of January.

Every cotton farm operator, therefore, should be on the look-out for a notice from his county ASC office early in February, informing him of the price support level available for cotton produced on Choice (A) and (B) allotment farms and stating the deadline for filing the operator's choice in writing at the county office. The notice form will have a space where the operator can write his choice of either (A) or (B).

If the farm operator elects the Choice (A) farm allotment and complies with it, his 1959 upland cotton crop will be eligible for price support at not less than 80 per cent of parity. If he elects and complies with the Choice (B) allotment—which is 40 per cent larger than Choice (A)—his crop will be eligible for support at a level which is 15 per cent of parity less than under Choice (A). The operator must elect the same choice for all farms which he operates.

In accordance with legislation enacted last summer, farmers will have this opportunity to choose between the (A) and (B) farm allotments since setting quotas will be in effect for the 1959 upland cotton crop. In the December 15 referendum on quotas for upland cotton, farmers voting approved the quotas by more than 92 per cent.

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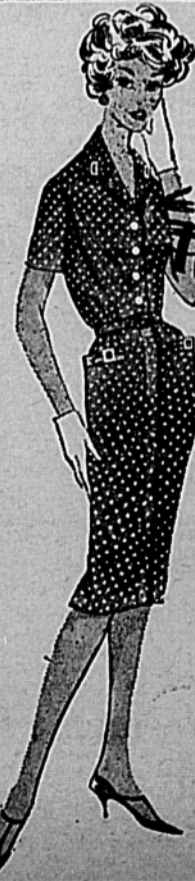

IMPORTANT: WHEAT PRODUCERS.

During the 1959 crop year, all acreage will be measured with a steel tape, rather than a measuring wheel which has been used in the past. The use of steel tape requires the assistance of the farm operator in determining such acreage. This office is authorized to employ only one man to measure your crops, and it will be greatly appreciated if you, the farm operator, will assist the reporter in measuring your wheat acreage.

The measurement of wheat will begin during the second week of January. If it is not possible for you to assist the reporter in measuring your acreage, please contact him and arrange for another person to do so. The following reporters will be employed to measure wheat: John McIntyre, John Purvis, Jack Farmer, and Chester Waggoner.

1959 COTTON ALLOTMENT NOTICES

1959 cotton allotment notices were mailed to the farm operators on Dec. 5, 1958. It is very important that the 1959 operator on each farm receive his cotton allotment notice. This is due to the decision he is required to make in regard to planting either the Choice A or Choice B allotment.

If you received a cotton allotment notice in regard to a farm for which you are not the operator, please return it to this office.

To be classified as the farm operator, you must be the person who is in charge of the supervision and conduct of the farming operations on the entire farm.

FINAL DATES

To make application for:
New grower peanut allotment—February 13, 1959.
New grower cotton allotment—February 16, 1959.
To release cotton or peanut allotment—April 3, 1959.
To apply for additional cotton or peanut allotment out of released acreage—April 10, 1959.

PREMEASUREMENT OF COTTON ACREAGE— If it is the desire of any cotton

producer to have his acreage premeasured, he may do so by paying a rate of charge of \$10.00 per farm plus \$4.00 for each plot over one. Final date for requesting premeasurement service is February 27, 1959.

REQUEST FOR COST-SHARE 1959 ACP PROGRAM

Producers who are interested in applying for Federal cost-share under the 1959 ACP Program are requested to submit their application at least one week in advance of the intended starting date. The 1959 Program will include the following practices:

1. Seeding an approved grass on pasture or cropland.
2. Deferred grazing.
3. Controlling pricklypear, mesquite, oak, and cedar.
4. Constructing dams.
5. Constructing terraces.
6. Stubble mulching.
7. Subsoiling cropland.

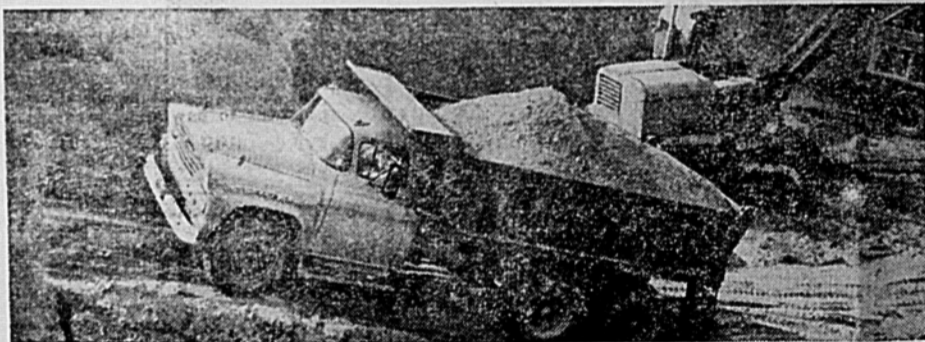

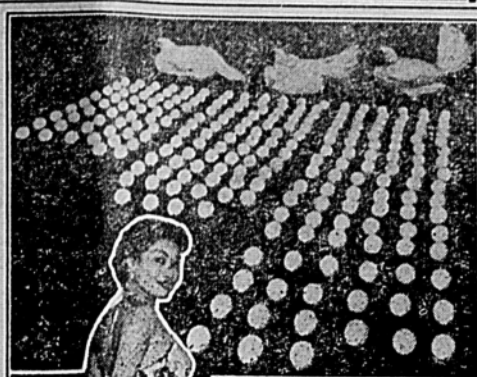

The law allows a business a wide choice of ways to set itself up, to finance and manage itself.

You may have sole ownerships, partnerships, joint ventures, corporations; and within these classes you have many different forms.

To meet modern business conditions, to get full tax advantage, and to protect investors, for example, the law provides many ways for a company to finance itself. And these, in turn, influence the kind of management it can have, and the way it conducts its affairs.

We sometimes speak of "stocks and bonds," for example, as if they were one and the same.

But when you buy a share of stock in a company, you "own" an "undivided" part of everything it owns, but no particular pieces of its property.

But what do you have when you buy a corporation's bond or debenture? You own nothing of the company. Instead you are lending money which it promises

to pay back with interest when your bond "matures."

Unlike a stockholder, a bondholder as a rule has little to say directly about who manages and how he manages the company. Remotely a bond buyer by withholding or lending money may influence a company's ability to expand. The bondholder gets only his interest payments, which come before the stockholder's "dividends," since he takes less of a risk than the stockholders.

Safety Inspection Deadline April 15

The Texas Department of Public Safety warned motorists of the inconveniences of a last-minute rush at safety inspection stations before the deadline, April 15.

More than 3,000,000 of the 4,000,000 Texas motor vehicles have yet to receive their 1959 safety inspection sticker.

In urging motorists to "do their safety shopping early" and avoid the rush at the 4,400 inspection stations, the safety department warned that those who fail to do so will be subject to traffic summons after April 15. The average cost of the safety inspection since the program began six years ago is \$1.19 for needed repairs and \$1 for the inspection fee.

The inspection stations check such items as brakes, lights, horns, mirrors and windshield wipers and have found that 39 per cent of the vehicles have needed some adjustment or repair.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the safety department, said this is an improvement over the general condition of motor vehicles six years ago when the inspection program

began. At that time more than 50 per cent needed repairs

"We hope that owners of motor vehicles will take advantage of the inspection facilities now and avoid the inconveniences of waiting in line as the April 15 deadline approaches," Colonel Garrison said. "This safety factor is important to safe driving on our streets and highways—and that is our goal."

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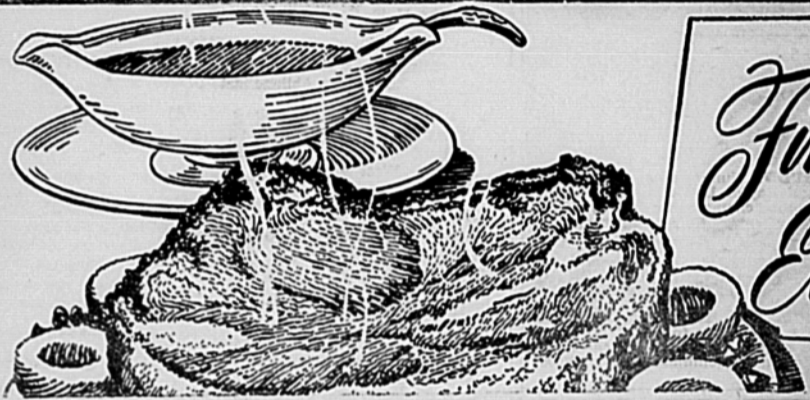
