Brennan on the Bayou

O, TANNENBAUM!
Ah, ah, ah . . . You just did a no-no. You burned your Christmas trees again, didn't you? Uh-huh. The last time I heard of a community's proposed tree burning, two teen-aged boys took the mayor to court for breaking an anti-pollution ordinance—and won. Not a twig was scorched.

Now I hate to be tacky with you, truly I do, but such shenanigans must cease. I mean it was bad enough to cut down the trees in the first place, knowing they would be thrown away, but then to use them to pollute the air . . . well that doesn't make any kind of sense.

So once again, guys, here's a little refresher course in conservation. In the first place, living plants including trees help cleanse the air by collecting particles of dust and other junk on their greenery. Second, they generate oxygen. Third, it takes about half a human lifetime to grow a decent sized evergreen. And fourth, the earth's resources are finite.

Let me tell you what to do with your Christmas trees:

1. If you have a fireplace and insist on burning, at least you could use it for heat or give it to someone who could use such fuel.
2. Strip off the needles to put in a compost heap or around outdoor plants. They make great mulch and help neutralize alkaline soil.
3. Cut off whole branches, needles and all, and make small lean-tos over outdoor plants that need protection from the cold.
4. Leave the stand on, cut off branches to within 3 or 4 inches of the trunk, paint or shellac the whole thing and use it for a coat-rack.
5. If you have a green thumb, poke the branches into the ground or into potting soil with good drainage. They have been known to take root and grow.
6. Be creative. Cut the trunk into sections, add a board or two, and treat yourself to a little table or footstool. I still have a statuette I carved from the trunk of a Christmas tree.
7. Stand the whole tree up outside and hang fruit or suet on it for birds to enjoy.
8. Persuade your city to invest in a machine that "eats" trees, not just at Christmas time but all year. The wood chips that result can be composted for fertilizer or used as is in flower beds.

Now that you've sworn never again to waste a tree by burning, you may want to plan ahead for next year. Living trees are expensive, but if you start looking now, you'll find a bargain eventually.

You can get a small Norfolk pine and enjoy it indoors year round or invest in one you can plant outside. Also there are ways to make truly gorgeous trees with all kinds of materials. Magazines will offer helpful hints there

So don't make me fuss at you again. I'm getting tired of it and would hate to have a dumb old tree come between me and my friends. Do your thing. Spread the good word. And may all your Christmases be green!

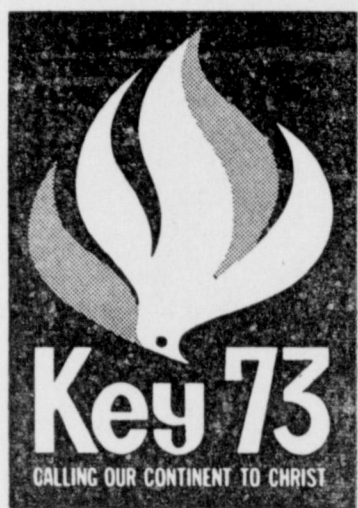

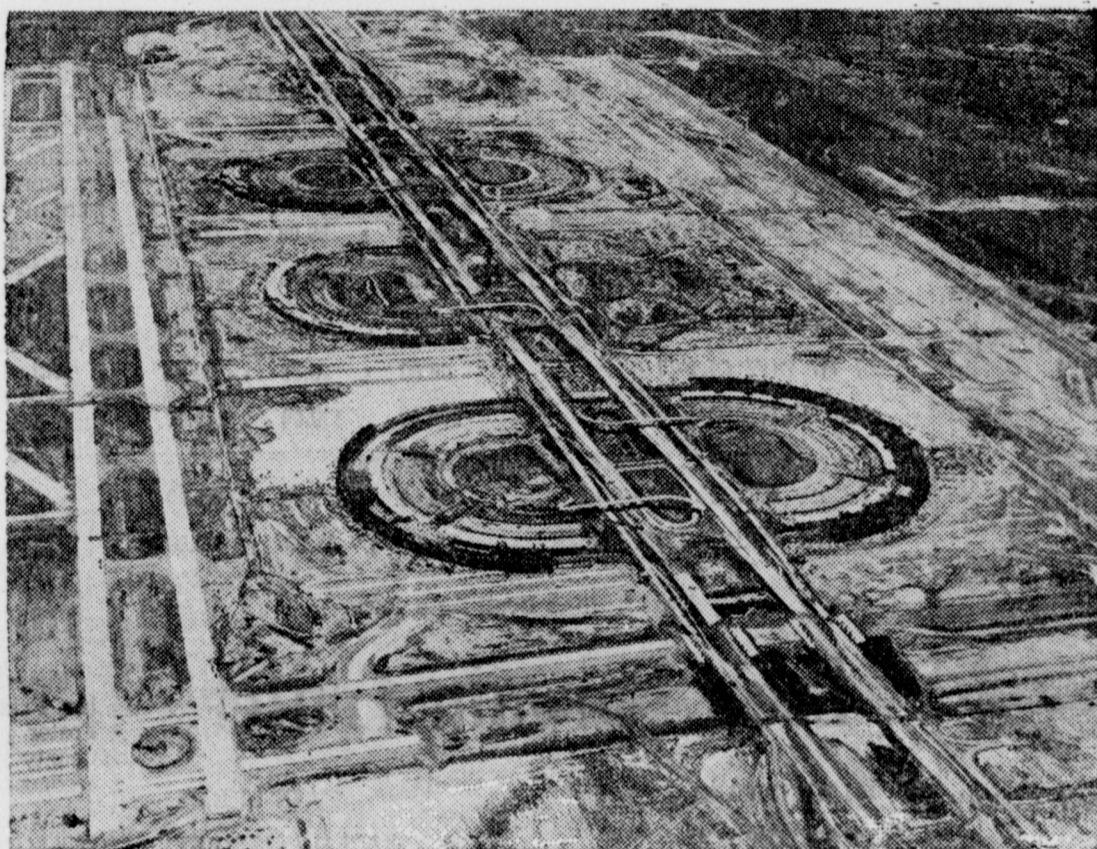
Darlene Johnson, Fred Pavlovic Announce their Engagement
