Ambitious summer work program set by school

An ambitious program of work to be accomplished on school campuses this summer was outlined Tuesday at a called meeting of the Iowa Park school board.

Trustees limited the priority projects within the framework of \$75,000 budgeted for the work.

Two of the projects, both concerning the football field and area,

have been discussed since the stadium was constructed in 1970, and trustees said the work had to be done now and could no longer be put off.

Highest on the list of work to be done is repair or replacement of a six-inch sewer line at the high school, which is said to have been poorly installed and creates a major problem.

Construction of a retainer wall at the base of the east berm at the stadium was given second high priority, with trustees explaining the estimated expenditure of \$20,000 was necessary to protect the new all-weather track.

Probably the longest-discussed project is the need for paving and curbing a road from the east high school parking lot to the stadium road, then surfacing the road and parking lot between the tennis court and field house.

Trustees then decided to advertise for bids to have the W.F. George school building demolished.

Bids will also be sought for the enclosing of the east wall of the junior high cafeteria, covering the existing windows. Also included will be the finishing of the exterior wall where the hall from the remodeled portion of the building and the old structure will be severed.

Along with the work around the junior high will be new sidewalks, replacing those which have been used for years.

Two projects at the high school will be to cover repair and damaged areas. The floor of the basement will be covered where repairs were made to correct water seeping from beneath the building.

Also to be repaired will be the wall in the hall between the gymnasium and cafeteria, where vinyl covering has been damaged. Ceramic tile will be installed.

Two rooms will be enlarged by removing walls in two structures at the junior high, one in the blue metal building and one in the vocational building.

Other projects which were considered but postponed due to lack of available finances were: patching and sealing of parking lots and drives on campuses; building a press box and storage building at the baseball field; installing of a speaker system at the high school vocational building, connecting it with the main building; painting and repairing of the ag barn; repairing the junior high football field fence; replacing the loud speaker system at Hawk Stadium; installing lights at the tennis courts; replacing carpet in the high school auditorium.

CORRECT MINUTES

Trustees voted to correct the minutes of their meeting when establishing the above scale salary for Georgann Higgins last year.

The minutes had originally read her salary was \$600 for coaching, but that had been marked through and \$300 inserted. After this was called to the board's attention during recent personnel sessions, the decision to make the correction was reached.

However, during the May 11 meeting, the board voted to increase her salary to \$600 for the coming year, in effect not giving her a raise after the correction. No change in the latest salary setting has been made.

Two representatives, Mike Dodd and Dr. Erwin Soell, of the newly

organized Iowa Park Tennis Association approached the board for consideration to allow use of the courts for tournaments operated by the organization.

There was no problem on this, they were told, but further consideration was needed by the board on a request to give club members priority of

courts for match play whenever wanted. A decision or alternate to the plan is expected at the next meeting of the trustees.

Unless there is an emergency requiring board action, there will not be a trustee meeting in July, it was decided.

Discussion clears air about big grain stink

Unpleasant odors and dust from Robert Johnson Grain Co. prompted a special meeting last week of the Iowa Park City Council that attracted about 25 residents.

Although no immediate solution to the problem was disclosed, it appears disgruntled residents will try to cope with the inconvenience, and Johnson assured them he is doing all he can to minimize the unpleasantness created by his grain and fertilizer handling facility located at 211 S. Victoria here.

While some residents were obviously in an uproar at the outset of the meeting, most persons walked away from the session with a better understanding of Johnson's situation.

As City Atty. Mike Hubbard put it, communication is the key to solving most problems in modern society. He said, "99 per cent of all problems can be settled and worked out as long as we're talking."

The meeting was held last Thursday at Texas Electric Service Co. Reddy Room and lasted about an hour.

All members of the council were present along with City Administrator Gene Britton, Robert Johnson and H.C. Johnson.

Mayor Johnny Crawford opened the special meeting, explaining it had been called because of complaints received from residents in the vicinity of Johnson's business.

The first resident to speak was Mrs. C.P. Simmons, who has lived 25 years at 702 E. Pasadena. She said the grain elevator smelled bad every year, but that the stench abundant the past few weeks was the worst ever.

"This out smells anything I've ever smelled it's never smelled this bad before," Mrs. Simmons maintained.

About half way into the meeting, on the suggestion of Deryl James, Johnson explained how he came to acquire the smelly wheat which had been stacked on the ground near his plant.

The wheat came from a burned Houston elevator and had been banned from human consumption and

designated for feedlot use.

He said purchase of the wheat came at a slow time of the year "and somehow or another we have to make the payroll."

Johnson said only about one-tenth of the original shipment remains at his plant. He said the remaining wheat has been moved to storage facility with cement walls and floor, and it has been covered with heavy plastic.

"At this time, I can't smell it," Johnson said.

His comment drew some snickers from the audience.

Johnson said the area where the grain had originally been dumped, had been scraped to the original earth foundation and that the area had been capped with three to six inches of sand.

Johnson said the one-tenth of the original shipment would be removed from its present location shortly after wheat harvest. "We just don't have the time or the manpower to do it right now," Johnson explained.

On a question from Connie Rowell, Johnson said the remaining smelly wheat would be removed from the makeshift storage facility within two weeks after wheat harvest is over. He said it would be around July 15, but warned the odor would recur when transportation begins.

George Hammond of 508 E. Pasadena produced a letter from Texas Air Control Board concerning the controversy. It appeared the letter primarily addressed unpleasantness from Johnson's fertilizer operations.

Johnson said he no longer uses the fertilizer blender, thus eliminating dust problems from that facility.

H.C. Johnson said they have plans for a new blending plant that has been approved by the state air control agency.

Hammond questioned Johnson if he realized the amount of dust produced during wheat harvest.

"Any idiot can see that," Johnson

Sheriff candidates air views

Iowa Park will join Wichita County voters in a special Democratic runoff election June 5 to decide the sheriff's race here.

The runoff election resulted from the regular May 1 primary election when none of the five candidates received a majority of the votes.

The runoff election will have John Gibson pitted against incumbent Jim Voyles.

In the earlier primary, Gibson collected the most votes, 7,561, while Voyles received 6,346. The other three candidates combined for 2,643.

At the Iowa Park polls, Voyles came out ahead 743 to Gibson's 456, and the other candidates received a total of 94 ballots.

Most political observers indicate the total voter turnout will be the deciding factor in the June 5 runoff, citing a fear that less people will vote in June than in May.

Whoever is elected will not face a GOP candidate in November general elections, and the term will be for four years.

Current annual salary for the sheriff is \$19,193, according to Joe Gowdy, Wichita County auditor. The sheriff's department has 32 personnel.

For the 1976 fiscal year, the department was allocated \$133,194, Gowdy explained.

Gibson, 42, of Wichita Falls, has a business degree from North Texas State University at Denton. He was a Wichita County

deputy sheriff two years, and served six years as a deputy U.S. Marshal stationed in Wichita Falls and serving 12 counties.

"In this position I handled all civil and criminal matters in the division, besides being assigned to other divisions in the U.S.," Gibson said. "During this time I received many hours of on-the-job training, along with numerous classroom hours taught by the FBI and other federal agencies."

"On my own time I attended classes presented by the Wichita Falls Police Department," Gibson said.

Voyles, 61, of Iowa Park, has had 16 years of experience as deputy, chief deputy and sheriff in Wichita County. He is a graduate of seven FBI schools as well as the Nortex

Law Enforcement Training School, Texas State Police Academy and the Texas Narcotics Bureau.

Voyles said he has more than 330 certified hours of specialized training and classroom instructions in law enforcement and is certified by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education.

Each candidate was posed a half dozen questions, and their replies were supplied to the Leader in writing. The first three questions deal with criminal justice issues likely to face the 65th session of the Texas Legislature.

MANDATORY SENTENCES

Both candidates were asked their stand on suggested mandatory prison

rubber gloves, and numerous other items.

Sibley has divided the town into 24 sections for a door-to-door solicitation between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m., and again from 4 to 6 p.m. Saturday. Other units will be calling on residences in the rural area.

In addition, the supply truck will be parked at the Park West Shopping center, from which sales will be made between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.

Prior to the door-to-door solicitation, sales crews are calling on businesses and industries for advance orders, which will be delivered Saturday.

All profits from the sales will go to the Bicentennial Swimming Pool fund to help complete the financing of the pool's dressing room building.

Additional volunteers, as well as more pickups or station wagons, are being sought by Sibley.

Other out-of-town guests were Miss Mary Butcher from California and Francis Rains from Burkburnett.



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
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


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


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Headings-Johnston wedding is held in Church of God

Cook of the Week

Most Americans seem to have a strong liking for something sweet at the end of a meal whether it is a culinary masterpiece from a pastry shoppe or something easy to prepare at home. Pies and cakes have been important menu items in Southern cooking for a long time. During the 18th century pies were often the dramatic dessert that climaxed the meals and it was during that period that most of the traditional recipes evolved.

Modern cooks have a knack for keeping alive old culinary techniques and recipes and use many new approaches to old favorites. Mrs. David Lawson's recipes used this week attest to how modern recipes with dramatic, sometimes exotic, names are concocted from mostly basic ingredients. The Apollo Mollos recipe illustrates the point.

Mrs. Lawson and her husband, who is a building contractor, moved to Iowa Park June 1, 1975. They

have two children, Jeff, a fifth grader and Tracey, a fourth grader.

Mrs. Lawson finished high school at Lockett and attended San Angelo Junior College. She is a member of the Lockett Baptist Church. In Iowa Park, she is leader of Girl Scouts Troop 29. Her most recent hobby is leather crafting.

APOLLO MOLLOS

- 2 sticks margarine
- 4 eggs
- 3 squares chocolate
- Dash salt
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1 cup pecans
- 2 t vanilla

Melt chocolate and butter. Beat eggs and sugar, pour into chocolate mixture. Add flour and salt and mix well. Add nuts and vanilla. Bake in lined pan 30 minutes at 350°. Remove from pan immediately. Cover hot cake with one package large marshmallows.

ICING

- Mix until smooth:
 - 1 stick butter
 - 4 ounces Pet milk
 - 2 squares chocolate
 - 1 lb. powdered sugar
 - 1 t vanilla
- Pour over cake and let set for several hours.

HEIRLOOM PIE

- 1-unbaked pastry shell, chilled
 - 1/2 cup margarine
 - 2 cups granulated sugar
 - 1 T flour
 - 1/4 t salt
 - 1 t vanilla
 - 4 eggs
 - 1 cup milk
- Bake at 450° for 10 minutes; reduce heat to 350° for 30 minutes or until firm.

22 MINUTE CAKE

- 2 cups flour
 - 2 cups sugar
- Bring to boil and boil for two minutes:
- 1 stick margarine
 - 1/2 cup shortening
 - 1 cup water
 - 2 1/2 T cocoa
- Pour over dry ingredients

Add:

- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 2 eggs
- 1 t soda
- 1 t vanilla

Mix well; pour into greased and floured pan. Cook at 350° until done. While still hot ice with:

- 1 stick oleo
 - 1/3 cup milk
 - 2 1/2 T cocoa
- Let boil 1 minute. Add powdered sugar to form desired consistency.

CHOCOLATE-PECAN PIE

- 1-6 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate chips

- 2/3 cup evaporated milk
- 2 T butter
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 T flour
- 1/4 t salt
- 1 cup nuts
- 1 t vanilla

Heat chocolate pieces, milk and butter. Combine eggs, sugar, flour and salt. Stir in the chocolate mixture, pecans and vanilla; pour in unbaked pie shell. Bake 40 to 50 minutes at 375° or until firm. Cool before serving.

OATMEAL CAKE

- 1 stick oleo
- 1 1/4 cups flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup oats
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 t soda
- 1/2 t cinnamon
- 2 unbeatens eggs

Pour boiling water over oats and let stand. Mix oleo and sugars thoroughly. Add eggs and beat well. Sift flour, soda and cinnamon together. Add flour mixture and oats alternately to sugar, oleo and egg mixture; add nuts or coconut if desired. Grease and flour oblong pan, pour cake batter in and bake at 350° until done.

ICING

Bring to a boil and boil about one minute:

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 stick margarine
- 1 t vanilla

Spread on cake while still warm.

In the runoff, Iowa Park

Democrats will return to the polls to decide between Hubert Thompson and A.L. Bohannon for Precinct 3 constable.

Wichita County Democrats will be deciding between incumbent Jim Voyles and John Gibson in the sheriff's race.

State-wide, there will be runoffs for the Texas Railroad Commission and Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

He also suggested Iowa Park residents and businesses must try to live with one another, and that the special meeting had been called so that both parties could understand their respective situations.

people will continue to be hurt and even killed.

"The subject of gun control is now being considered," Gibson continued. "I do not believe this is the answer.

"Guns will always be available to the criminal, even if they are homemade. Laws must be passed to protect the everyday citizen, not the criminal," Gibson stated.

JURY BRIEFING

The question was posed, should jurors be told the effect parole eligibility laws have on the length of sentences.

"The people chosen to serve on juries are good, honest citizens doing their civic duty," Gibson said. "They simply do not understand the laws governing sentencing and parole.

"I feel there is a definite need for all jurors to know exactly what they are doing at the time of sentencing. The only way they have to gain this knowledge is to be told. Yes, I think there is a change needed in this law, as well as in others," Gibson said.

Voyles answered, "I believe we need to amend the constitution to allow juries to be told of the effect parole eligibility laws will have on sentences because this awareness will possibly result in juries giving higher punishment and therefore, in the long run, act as a deterrent."

BAIL DENIAL

Candidates were asked if bail should be denied a person who commits a crime and already is out on bail for a previous wrongful act.

"More and more we are seeing criminals who are out on bail for a previous wrongful act being arrested for other crimes," Voyles stated.

"Therefore, I am definitely in favor of changing the bail law to deny bail to anyone who commits a crime and who is already out on bail for a previous offense," Voyles stated.

When we speak of wrongful acts we cover everything from speeding to

murder, and from first offenders to habitual criminals," Gibson explained.

"I don't believe a person charged with minor offense, or a first offender should be denied bond. The people we should be concerned with are the repeat offenders.

"Those people who find it easier to make a living by stealing rather than working," Gibson said. "I firmly believe the repeat offender should be denied bond if he is already out on bond."

The remaining question posed to the candidates deal with drug trafficking, problems demanding priority attention, cooperation among all law enforcement agencies and problems created by Wichita County becoming increasingly metropolitan.

Voyles elected to combine his reply to the remaining questions.

"As Wichita County grows and becomes increasingly metropolitan, we see the frequency of crime increase with it," Voyles answered.

"Now, the answer in effectively combating this increase is to have a sheriff's department that can keep pace with it.

"And what we're talking about here is putting more deputies in the field," Voyles stated. "And in order to put more qualified and highly trained deputies in the field takes money.

"Our budget must be increased annually to allow us to hire additional personnel to combat the increase in crime that comes as the county grows," Voyles said.

Gibson elected to answer each question separately.

On the trafficking of contraband, Gibson said, "In my opinion the only solution to this problem is to start at the top and work down, which simply means we must cut off the supply.

"We should devote much of our time to stopping dealers, pushers, and the people who are bringing the junk into our area. We must have programs to educate our citizens as to the danger

to themselves and to the community if this movement is allowed to continue.

"We must have officers who will work to help the people of our county with this problem," Gibson said.

On the growth of Wichita County and problems encountered by the sheriff's department, Gibson said, "I feel that our county has outgrown our present sheriff's department. In many ways the department is still being operated as it was in 1959-60.

"This is unfortunate because the criminal element did not stand still.

"They advanced with the times," Gibson continued. "These people study their profession. To compete we must employ well-trained, dedicated officers, educated in all areas of criminal activity.

"It is a known fact with a population increase comes a crime increase. To offset this we must have a full-time, hard-working sheriff's department—one which is not afraid to do their job for fear of making some voter mad. "There must be complete cooperation between the sheriff's department and all other law enforcement agencies," Gibson said.

"The sheriff must work for each citizen, not just a chosen few. Under no circumstances should politics come between the sheriff and his duty to his people," Gibson added.

On problems that demand priority attention, Gibson answered, "Since I am not directly involved with the sheriff's department it would be difficult for me to point out the many problems facing it.

"I do know by the continued turnover in the staff there seems to be a personnel problem. The merchants tell me they can get no help with bad checks.

"This is bad for the consumer as well as the merchant," Gibson maintained. "Unless something is done we may soon find ourselves doing business on a cash basis.

"I do not intend to make a

collection agency out of the department, but I do plan to put a workable plan into effect.

"The people in the oilfield constantly complain about thefts and break-ins, many have said they can get no help from the sheriff.

"I have been told by people in our rural areas that when called the department would not come out, if they did several hours had passed.

"By their own admission a drug problem exists in the jail," Gibson added. "There seems to be a problem with prisoners. Not long ago inmates were taken to the hospital to be treated for cuts received from a sharpened instrument during a fight.

"Three officers and a prisoner were shot during a booking-in.

"Recently a prisoner was held by trustees and severely beaten by other inmates," Gibson said.

"What has happened to jail supervision? I am sure other problems exist, but these are just a few which need immediate attention," Gibson said.

John Brown, public information officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety, presented a program on gun safety Thursday night to members of the Red River Valley Citizens Band Club.

About 30 persons attended the regular meeting held at ASCS office here.

New members who joined the club included Kerry Adams, Edgan Slaton and Jerry Burden. James Mason is president of the radio group, and Mike Hooper was program chairman.

In addition to Brown's talk and demonstration on safe use of firearms, Paul Shea presented a plan for disaster preparedness.

Next meeting of the group will be an ice cream supper slated for June 17.



City hires attorney

Holliday City Council voted Tuesday night to hire an attorney.

Mike Hubbard, an Iowa Park attorney who also provides legal services for the City of Iowa Park, was selected by the council here.

It marks an important step in the new city administration's plan to revamp the municipal ordinances.

Alderman Ben Ezzell summed up the council's feeling when he remarked, "Can we afford one (an attorney)? Or can we afford to be without one?"

It was a unanimous decision by the council to hire Hubbard, who met two weeks ago with some members of the council.

Alderman Gene Harmon was the only councilman absent from Tuesday night's session.

Hiring Hubbard was the only official action taken by the council Tuesday; however, they spent one and a half hours discussing some basic issues facing municipal operations here.

It appears many Holliday residents utilize 55-gallon drums which oftentimes are too heavy for city crew members to hoist up to the trash truck.

Mayor Leo Chappell asked the council to begin thinking about implementing an ordinance that would limit the size of trash contained for pickup.

"You couldn't burn in those 30-gallon cans," said Aldermen Fred Ford Maier. Chappell said an ordinance would concern cans placed out for pickup.

A city ordinance already prohibits putting some materials in pickup containers such as rocks and other heavy materials, it was noted.

Ezzell added he would like for city crews to begin returning cans to their proper places, such as in racks provided by the residents.

Councilmen also decided to look into the possible ways of providing hospitalization insurance for city employees.

They talked about the problem of persons driving cars across Fireman's Park.

Chappell gave a report on his investigation of methods to handle stray animals. He read a letter from Wichita Falls City Manager Gerald Fox, indicating Wichita Falls Animal Control might take Holliday's animals if no other source is available.

It appears installation of a grain handling facility here by Robert Johnson Grain Co. is causing Ed Tiger some headaches.

Aldermen Jimmy Blankenship and Red Denney were inspecting the situation before the meeting, and it seems the ground around the grain facility has built up so it drains onto Tiger's property.

Chappell said Tiger had a "legitimate complaint," but there's nothing the city can do.

As was the case in an earlier hassle between Tiger and the grain company, Chappell reiterated, "Again, this is a private matter."

An attorney advised the council last month that the city had no jurisdiction in the controversy, and that any legal action would have to be brought by the private sector.

"I don't see what we can do about it," Chappell said. "It's bad, but it's just the way it is...to me, it's a private matter between Tiger and the company. I am in deep sympathy with his problem."

However, the first matter of business for the new city attorney is likely to be an ordinance prohibiting the installation of a fertilizer handling facility here.

Denney said, "We need to get started on the ordinance tomorrow."

Ezzell also indicated Johnson's operation had blocked two alleys, and that it should be prohibited by ordinance.

Denney mentioned the need for a zoning ordinance to prohibit some construction within the city limits.

"Let's not just mention these and forget them," Chappell told the council. "We should follow through to the best of our ability."

He said the council needs time to study the different problems, so they can institute effective ordinances.

City Hall to close

Board moves to sell bonds

Holliday school board convened in special session Monday night to act on several documents prerequisite to selling bonds for construction of a new high school here.

All members of the school board attended Monday night's meeting in addition to Supt. Ray Coe.

Members of the tax board of equalization were sworn into office. Members include Don Talley, Freddie Cramp-ton, Alvin Parish Jr., Sam L. Lawson and Mike Robertson.

The board of equalization will meet at 2 p.m. June 28 in the Holliday school cafeteria, according to Talley, who is secretary of the board.

Minutes for the board's May 10 were approved with corrections.

On a motion by Trustee Jack Ayres, the board voted to amend the minutes to say trustees voted to authorize head coach and athletic director Don Lucy to contact Grady Graves and offer him a position.

It was noted that Graves had not formally applied for a coaching job when the board voted on his employment at the mid-May meeting.

Most of Monday night's one and a half hour called meeting was devoted to legal matters surrounding the bond issue which voters here approved in April.

On the recommendation of Herb Smith, a Wichita Falls financial consultant, the board unanimously voted to apply for a bond rating in preparation for selling the bonds.

The application for a bond rating will be made to Moody's bond rating service in New York.

Smith indicated application for the bond rating would cost the district \$600, but would save an estimated \$23,000 on the overall financial picture. He said having a bond rating could make a substantial difference in today's "unstable" economic scene when the district puts the bonds up for sell.

The board is slated to meet in special session again at 7:30 p.m. June 15 to award sale of the bonds.

Although no action was taken on the specific issue, the board reviewed a certificate for the order authorizing issuance of the bonds which will total \$1.25 million.

Chuck Goldner, a Dallas attorney working on the project, explained the nine-page legal document.

The board approved an official notice of sale and authorization of publication.

Also approved was a preliminary official statement which was compiled by Smith to be used by the bond rating service and bond bidders in making their decisions.

The statement is a fiscal and physical description of Holliday Independent School District which includes a description of the construction project and a list of major taxpayers.

Smith praised the school board for its "super decision" in putting the bond election to the people when it did. He said the board members were wise in their assessment of expected growth throughout the district and for realizing the need for expanded educational facilities here.

Smith stressed the point that the Holliday school system had an enrollment of 486 during the 1973-74 school year which grew to 513 in 1974-75 and presently stands at 565 students.

In other action related to the bond issue, the board approved a contract with Wichita Falls architect Bob Pardue which will pay his firm 7 per cent of the project cost.

The board also approved the 1976-77 band budget for \$6,690. Last year's band budget was \$5,000, and the increase was attributed to several major instrument purchases.
