turbed over two national trends in the wildlife picture. First is the declining area of game range, Second is the increasing number of sportsmen going into the field.

Somewhere the two trends will cross each other and the result is bound to be the disappearance of some of our game species.

Much of the lack of game habitat is due to the tendency toward "clean" farming practices. The farmer likes to look down his fence rows and see no brush and litter to mar the beauty of a straight fence. Neither does he like odd corners of brush. Clean farming demands destruction of those areas, and consequently of the game

At the annual North American Wildlife conference there was considerable discussion of "clean" and "balanced" farming. The latter is a great stride toward conservation of soil, but clean farming is frequently destructive of that re-

Sometimes rigid, small creel and bag limits are imposed on game in the belief that it will restore fish and game numbers. Unfortunately it doesn't seem to work that way. Intensive surveys by many states has proved that creel and bag limits are an excellent means of dividing the available game among more sportsmen but it has little effect on the long range cycle of game production.

Even where seasons have been closed on a species their numbers have not materially increased. Increase in numbers is in direct relation to available food and cover

One state has had a closed season on bob-white quail for many years. It has been intensely enforced, but quail numbers have decreased as the cover has been stripped from

For the angler things look much better. As the soil resource is more intensely developed there is greater need for impounded water in farm ponds and small lakes, nearly all of which will produce anastounding amount of fish.

As better farming practices are applied there will be less erosion and runoff into the streams. As the streams clear, fish production

#### Note on Fishing

Fish strike lures and flies for two reasons. Either they think the lure is something edible, or it angers them. Fish are curious creatures and frequently follow a lure for yards without striking.

Therein lies the secret to the success of the most universal lure known, the spinner. A small spinner behind which is attached a minnow or other bait has been declared by some of the best anglers to be the finest lure of them all.

Upon nearing the spinner to see what the thing is about, the fish notes the bait. If it is edible and a part of his staple diet, he strikes and is hooked.

(Editor's Note: This sounds simple and sure-fire. Like the man said though, "Some days there jest ain't no fish!")





#### CONGRESS By Frank Ikard

Sometime ago I mentioned the fact that Congress was considering expanding the present upstream flood control program. Most people in our part of the country are familiar with this program and know how important it is to proper soil and water conservation as well as flood control. A bill dealing with this passed the House several weeks ago, and just recently has passed the Senate with what appears to be crippling Amendments

The Department of Agriculture has been almost put out of the picture entirely. Another blow to the bill requires that any dam of over 2,000 acre feet of water must be approved by Congress. In addition, any small watershed project will have to be approved by the appropriate State agency.

In other words, it looks like the bill in its present form would seriously handicap the good start that has already been made on this program. But all of those who have worked on this legilation for a long time and who are intensely interested in it still hope that something yet might be done to maintain the progress that has already been made and to make it possible for the program to be expanded

in the future. During this session of Congress the establishment of an Air Academy to train officers for the Air Forces was authorized. Just recently, a site for this Academy has been selected at Colorado Springs. The Academy will be similar to West Point and Annapolis and will

provide a four-year college course along with military training. The first school session at the Academy will begin next year, Like the other Academies, students in the Academy are nominated by

Members of Congress. Generally speaking, the physical and mental requirements are high to gain admission; however, if anyone in the District is interested in making application to attend the new Air Force Academy, I would be glad to hear from them.

There has been a lot said in the last few days about the possibility of Red China gaining admission to the United Nations. 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

#### Need of Additional Highway Patrolmen Cited by Safety Expert

The Highway Safety council said this week that "understaffing of the Texas highway patrol is the most serious handicap facing enforcement of safety measures on the highways of the state.

In a report to members, executive director G. C. Morris said that "Texas is one-half to two-thirds deficient in providing patrolmen to protect the public safety on highways beyond city limits.

"Texas has made progress in reducing the highway death toll. In 1953 our death rate was 6.4 for each 100 million vehicle miles traveled, and this was the lowest in our

"We do not have sufficient patrolmen to assure a continued decline in the accident and death rate. Unless we do what needs to be done, increase in travel will re sult in an upward trend in the death rate. Our highways will become more dangerous instead of more safe.

"By minimum standards Texas should have between 1,173 and 1,603 highway patrolmen. Texas actually has only 470. Virtually every state with a better safety record has far more highway patrolmen, although no state has a greater area to be patroled."

Morris concluded: "At a minimum, we should add 200 patrolmen next year and continue to increase the force annually. Each year traffic accidents cost nearly \$150,000,000 in economic loss, which is more than 20 times what we spend on operation of the Department of Public Safety."

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

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
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
