Lee Campbell Killed By Falling Bulldozer

Burgess Lee Campbell, 29, of Holliday and Iowa Park was fatally injured Sunday afternoon near Fruitland when a bulldozer fell on him as he was unloading it from a truck float preparing to cross a weak bridge.

He was taken immediately to a Bowie hospital, where he died.

Lee had been employed by the John B. Barbour Trucking company for the past 10 years and was considered one of the best bulldozer operators in this area.

A graduate of Holliday high school, Lee attended Texas A & M college before entering the navy during World War II.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. J. Frank Blackburn, pastor of Scotland Methodist church, and Rev. W. B. Reaves, pastor of the Holliday Methodist church, on Tuesday afternoon from the Holliday church. J. A. Tanner & Son Funeral Home of Iowa Park was in charge of arrangements.

Pallbearers were W. S. Carson and S. Rhodes of Holliday, A. B. Shields of Vernon; J. B. Barbour Jr., John Mixon, Leonard Skaggs, Kenneth Caldwell and Pete Wyatt, all of Iowa Park.

Besides his mother Mrs. Burgess Campbell of Holliday, Lee is survived by a brother Bob of Wichita Falls and two sisters Mrs. Vaughn Lee of Presque Isle, Me., and Mrs. Buster Eoney of Midland.

Those who knew Lee best knew him to be quiet, reserved, strictly business, most dependable; admired and respected by all.

Good Food, Thrilling Rides In Prospect at T-O Fair

A mile of midway thrills—along with hundreds of taste-tempting, palate-pleasing food and drink offerings is the promise shown for the 1953 Texas-Oklahoma Fair's silver anniversary, Sept. 28 to Oct. 3, according to Midway Chairman T. Leo Moore and Ernest Birk.

Food of endless variety, along with practically every soft beverage bottled, will be ready for the Fair visitor this fall, the chairman said, as new concession stands have been started by local groups, and others refurbished.

First to tee off in the big clean up, fix up campaign along the Fair midway is the Optimisses club of Wichita Falls with a completely new modern stand to be located on the north side of the midway.

With construction already begun on the stand, officials of the club happily are predicting the "best food ever" from the new stand. The Optimisses have for several years operated a small stand on the midway, and will this year inaugurate

a wider variety of menu items with the building of the new stand.

The stand will have a 20 foot front, and Fairgoers may be served also from two 30 foot side openings.

New stands completed in 1952 included the Couples class of the First Methodist church in Wichita Falls, and the Borden Milk company buildings, both of which face the main midway.

Food and drink stands will be operated by the Civitan club of Wichita Falls, the Valley View seniors, Iowa Park seniors, Wichita Falls Rebekahs, Nomads of Avardale, Iowa Park Juniors, and Iowa Park Band Boosters club.

Applying for permits for stands this year are the DeMolay chapter, Wichita Falls, and the Junior Chamber of Commerce convention club. The Jaycees have operated stands at several of the annual fairs.

In the entertainment field the midway will have an even greater offering, Moore said, with new rides

and shows being contracted by Alvin VanDyke, partner in the VanDyke brothers firm which has charge of Midway attractions.

Outstanding in the big lineup of rides featured during the 1952 Fair were the fantastic Sky-Wheels. This ride and others are being sought for the big Silver Anniversary of the T-O Fair.

"We had 22 major rides last year and we plan to have an even greater variety to offer in 1953," Moore stated recently. "We are constantly on the alert for new rides and shows of merit."

Rides on the midway will begin operation Monday, September 28, opening day of the Fair, with a special matinee for children. Then throughout the week the giant rides will be in constant operation to offer every thrill known in the field to the Fair's many visitors.

"Everyone of every age will find something on the midway to please him," stated Chairman Moore.

Bob Ford Didn't Kill Jessie James, Lions Club Speaker Says

Frank O. Hall, oil editor of the Wichita Daily Times, told members of the Iowa Park Lions club Tuesday, he was convinced that historians are wrong when they say Bob Ford shot Jessie James to death on April 3, 1882 in Missouri.

Hall gave an account of his research into the life of James and theorized that the killing of Jessie was a hoax. He believes another man fills the Jessie James grave in Missouri, and that J. Frank Dalton, who died only two years ago, was really the noted Missouri outlaw.

"We send men to their death with circumstantial evidence; I see no reason why we can't bring a man back to life with the same kind of evidence," Mr. Hall said.

Soil Conservation

Range management has a definite place in each co-ordinated farm and ranch plan that has rangeland. In setting up a range plan, first consideration should be given to the range site and its condition, that is the grasses, forbes and brush now growing.

Often a pasture has plants such as mesquite that must be controlled, then overseeding may be necessary, after which grazing with proper numbers of livestock, and range rest from grazing contribute to a range site producing the highest amounts of grass and beef per acre.

Ivan Monaghan, district co-operator of Wichita Falls, has a 55 acre pasture that was infested with mesquite. He cleared the mesquite by dozing and then finding much bare ground in need of seeding, overseeded to King Ranch blue-stem. Less than a pound of seed per acre was used but sufficient numbers of plants have been grown to meet the need.

Other co-operators are resting their pastures from grazing to gain vigor on the ground, restore plant vigor, and produce seed. Among these are Joe Cunningham and Hollis Atkinson of Wichita Falls, John Barbour and Henry Wolf of Iowa Park, and Terry Brogdon of Electra.

The experiment station at Spur reports their experiments found that ranges on which 51 per cent of the grass grown was grazed produced 29 pounds of beef per acre, whereas on pastures on which 75 per cent of the grass was grazed 27 pounds of beef per acre was produced. Other findings in favor of moderate grazing were larger gains per day and a higher grade of beef produced.

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





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Coaches for Oil Bowl Teams Have Good Records as Mentors

Coaches for the all-star Texas and Oklahoma football squads that will battle in the 18th annual Oil Bowl game in new Midwestern university stadium at 8:00 p.m. Aug. 21, are outstanding mentors with excellent records.

The Texas boys will be prepared by Max Bumgardner of San Angelo junior college and Floyd Wagstaff of Tyler junior college.

Bumgardner was a standout for the Wichita Falls Coyotes and the Texas Longhorns during his playing days. He captained a Wichita Falls district championship team in 1940 and won all-district honors. Bumgardner played in the 1941 Oil Bowl game. He earned a freshman numeral at Texas and lettered a year later in 1942.

After 28 months of military service, Bumgardner returned to T.U. and played two more years at end, winning all-Southwest conference rating and third team All-American selection in 1947.

In three years at San Angelo, Bumgardner has tutored squads that won the 1950 and 1951 Pioneer conference championships.

Floyd Wagstaff has produced five Big Six conference winners at Tyler junior college in the school's six years of football history. His teams have won 58 and lost 7 games. Tyler JC teams have played in four bowl games, losing to Pasadena 27 to 26 in the 1951 Little Rose Bowl, and taking the Texas Rose Bowl in 1947, 1949 and 1950.

Before going to Tyler, Wagstaff was football and basketball coach at Kilgore high school eight years.

The Oklahoma squad will be tutored by Elvan George of Ada and Cleodius Beavers, who is moving this fall from Greenfield to Comanche.

The Ada Cougars won the top bracket Oklahoma championship in 1951 and 1952, the first time a team has repeated in sooner history. George went to Ada as assistant in 1938 and two years later moved to the head coach's post, a job he has held since.

George played at Pauls Valley four years, then was center for Centre college, Danville, Ky., two years before returning to Oklahoma and completing his playing days at East Central State college, Ada.

His Ada team won conference titles in 1940 and district 2A title in 1944. Ada has won its district for the past three years.

Beavers played football four years at Grandfield high school. He was a fullback at Cameron A & M, Lawton, one year; then saw three years service with Oklahoma City university.

A coach only seven years, Beavers prepped the Grandfield team to an Oklahoma Class C crown in 1948. His club was runnerup for the title in 1949.

Last fall in his first year at Greenfield, Beavers produced the Oklahoma Class C runnerup with 18 gridgers available most of the campaign. Greenfield had a total enrollment of 88 boys and girls.

Outlook Favorable For Egg Producers. County Agent Says

Storage holdings of shell eggs on June 30 were the lowest on record for that date. Stocks of frozen eggs were 7,000,000 pounds below the figure for a year ago. Then to make the picture still more favorable, says E. T. Haws, county agent, the egg-feed price ratio is the most favorable since 1949.

But the latest reports indicate that egg production in Texas is still declining from the peak reached in 1945. This means that more eggs will have to be shipped into the state to meet the demand. Haws says the present situation might cause some producers to think they would profit because of higher prices; however, this is not necessarily true. For if the eggs needed in Texas are not produced here, they will be shipped from other states. He poses this question for Texas egg producers: "Should Texas lose this segment of the poultry industry?"

Mr. Haws says producers should buy chicks for replacements to keep production as near the same level throughout the year as is possible. Fall purchases of chick replacements is one means of maintaining uniform production.

Haws also reports that 13 Wichita county 4-H boys received 1300 baby chicks this week. They will feed these broilers for a period of 10 weeks. These birds will be shown in the Texas-Oklahoma Fair, the county 4-H broiler show and Dallas show.
