





Percy Phillips, vocational agri culture teacher, returned from Dallas last Sunday evening after spending three days last week at tending an In-Service Education meeting for teachers of vocational agriculture.

Highlights of the three day meeting included addresses by Dr. Kenneth McFarland of General Motors, W. A. Browning, assistant commissioner for vocational agriculture, and Dr. Tyrus R. Tim, head of the department of agricultural economics and sociology, A & M college; George McCarthy, of Universal Mills; R. N. Craig, farm shop specialist, A & M.

While in Dallas Mr. Phillips had a breakfast meeting on August 7 with Area Suppervisor J. B. Payne of Stephenville and public relation officials of the Texas Electric Service comany. Purpose of this meeting was to discuss possibilities of mproving the teaching of farm lectrfication by using latest information and equipment furnished free by TESCO.


