Dangerous road conditions close schools here

Lingering snow and ice forced the cancellation of school classes here Wednesday, and the prospects of more weather had school officials looking at the possibility of calling off classes again today.

Supt. Faris Nowell said he had decided Tuesday evening, after talking with trustees and other school officials, to close the schools Wednesday

"We won't be able to tell for sure until late today whether we will be able to hold class tomorrow or not," Nowell said about noon yesterday. He pointed out that if more snow and ice were to be added to the already dangerous road conditions later Wednesday, it would be too hazardous to run the buses today.

Asked about when the day or days of school missed due to weather might be made up, the superintendent said it was not now known, because no extra days had been worked into the school's schedule.

He did point out, however, that the extra days might be taken from the week-long Easter holidays, by holding a teacher workday on a Saturday, or maybe even by receiving permission from the state commissioner of education not to have a make-up.

Iowa Park was forgiven for days missed when schools were closed last year because of a curtailment of natural gas during an extremely cold

Snow began falling in the area Monday evening, and stacked up to about two inches by Tuesday morning. Then the situation was aggravated when a freezing drizzle coated the white blanket with a thin layer of ice. About half an inch more

snow fell Tuesday evening.







Johnson facing sentence

H.C. Johnson of Iowa Park, who in December was convicted on eight counts of issuing false grain warehouse receipts, is scheduled to be sentenced at 1 p.m. Monday.

The sentence is to be read in the federal courtroom in Wichita Falls by U.S. Judge Robert Hill.

Johnson, brother of missing Iowa Park grain dealer Bobby Johnson who also is under federal indictment, faces a possible \$5,000 fine on each count and a possible prison term of five years on each count.

The maximum penalty Johnson could draw would be 40 years in prison and a \$40,000 fine, Judge Hill said.

In December Johnson was found guilty on eight counts of issuing false grain warehouse receipts, but the jury which deliberated nine hours in reaching its decision found him innocent on 18 other counts.




