Candidates draw ballot positions

Candidates in both the city and school elections drew for positions on their respective ballots this week, and absentee voting for the April 1 election will begin Monday and continue through Mar. 28.

The order in which names will appear on the school ballot for the three-year terms are Roy Boutwell,

Delbert Catlin, Dan Nethery, Jerald Brown and Christy McKinzie. The two drawing the most votes will be the winners.

Order of names of candidates for the one-year unexpired term are Martha Dudley, Margaret Soell and John J. (Jerry) Hutchins. One will be elected, to fulfill the unexpired term

of Hoyt Watson.

Catlin and Boutwell are incumbents, and Dudley was appointed to serve until the special election in Watson's place.

Three candidates are seeking the mayor's post. Their names will appear in the following order on the ballot: George Trammell, Gene Lowery and Johnny Crawford.

Crawford is the incumbent.

Alderman candidates will be listed on the ballots: Johnny Lee, Gregory Ross, Luther Skinner, Joe Singer, Eldon Thompson Jr., Lita Watson and Billy Gilmore.

Ross, Singer and Watson are the incumbents. The three candidates receiving the most votes will be elected.

Absentee balloting will be at the school administration building, in the school election, and at the city hall, in the city election.

Polls on April 1 will be at the Bradford and Kidwell elementary buildings for both city and school elections, and a third poll for the school voting, at the Valley View campus.

Hunter takes over Experiment Station

Iowa Park native Tim Hunter has been put in charge of the local Agriculture Experiment Station.

Announcement came as a surprise to local residents, when it was made Saturday evening by Chamber of Commerce president Bill Steger. Even recently-retired superintendent Virgil Woodfin said it was the first word he had heard on his replacement.

Hunter took over Monday as

research associate, and at the same time assumed the administrative duties as well.

He said his primary duties will be to supervise and coordinate the research efforts of the project leaders.

Project leaders are staff members of the Research and Extension Center at Vernon who are conducting research at Iowa Park, he explained.

The local station has three full-time workers and one who works part time.

Hunter, a graduate of Iowa Park High, said Woodfin would be available as a consultant to help him get oriented to his new duties.

After graduating with a bachelor's degree from East Texas State Univ. in 1975, Hunter was employed as a technical adviser with Valmac Industries in Waldron, Ark.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Alton Hunter, Tim is married to the former Phyllis Lowry of Conway, Ark.

Trustee meet date is moved

The city council will meet at 7 p.m. Monday night at the city hall, but school trustees have postponed their regular monthly meeting until next Thursday.

Supt. Faris Nowell said trustees postponed the Tuesday's meeting because it conflicted with the county junior stock show premium sale in Wichita Falls. They will meet at 7:30 p.m. Thursday in the junior high library.

Probably the major item on the trustee agenda, which has not yet been set, will be the contracts for all school personnel. Should trustees stick by their current policy of extending only one-year contracts, all administration personnel contracts will not be acted on, as they have another year on their current pacts.

Chamber honors deserving citizens

A near-record crowd of 405 attended Saturday night's annual Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce banquet and stood applauding approval as three citizens of the community were honored for their efforts.

Only one larger crowd has attended an Iowa Park Chamber banquet, and that was some eight years ago when Gov. Preston Smith was guest speaker.

Receiving plaques from the Chamber were Mrs. Charlie Lee, Outstanding Citizen of the Year; Arch Hughes, Outstanding Senior Citizen; and Virgil Woodfin, recipient of the newly-created Agriculturist of the Year.

The banquet traditionally signals the changeover of Chamber leadership, and outgoing president Keith Aulds turned over the reins of the organization to Bill Steger. He introduced the two vice presidents, Richard Davis and Bill Bates, as well

as Mrs. Ray Pittman, secretary.

Steger also presented a scroll to H.M. Nipper, president of the Industrial Development Corporation, in appreciation for the work that organization has done over the year, which includes enticement of Cryovac to the city.

Before he relinquished his office, Aulds pointed out several of the accomplishments of the Chamber during the past year, which included purchasing numerous new Christmas decorations for the retail district, welcoming 345 new families to the community, and hosting a Class B state football playoff game.

Among those projects which will be undertaken, at least in laying the groundwork for the future, will be attraction of a motel with restaurant and meeting facilities, and construction of a nine-hole golf course, Steger pointed out.

Though Mrs. Lee has been a resident of Iowa Park only four years, she has become extremely active in community affairs, but in a low profile, according to Miss Ethyle Kidwell, who made the Citizen of the Year presentation.

She described Mrs. Lee's quiet leadership in numerous areas, including volunteer work and serving on the Friendly Door board, serving as chairman of many civic drives, including the Bicentennial Swimming Pool fund drive, as a member of the City Parks and Recreation Board, the county heart association board and Community Council.

Mrs. Lee's husband served as president of the Chamber during 1976, and was Master of Ceremonies at Saturday's banquet. He is manager of Cryovac.

It took several minutes for Rev. Jim Connatser to relate all the services rendered to the community and its citizens by Hughes, the Senior Citizen of the Year recipient.

Himself a former Citizen of the Year honoree, Hughes has served as mayor and alderman on the city council, a school trustee, Boy Scout leader, and numerous years as head of the Little League Baseball program here. Hughes has also served as chairman of the First United Methodist Church board.

The Agriculturist of the Year presentation was appropriately made by Lester Brooks, who was superintendent of the Iowa Park Experiment Station before retiring,

and Woodfin succeeded him.

Brooks related that during Woodfin's 32 years service at the Station, he was also extremely busy working for the community's welfare through various organizations such as the Lions Club. Additionally, he was always helpful to area residents wanting information on growing and caring of pecan trees, a specialty of Woodfin's.

The Master of Ceremonies used some of his own dry wit when introducing the evening's speaker, noted Dallas humorist Joe Griffith, when he was reading off the numerous jobs Griffith had held. He paused and commented "We apparently have a speaker who can't hold a steady job."

And when it was suggested that he might introduce the several election campaigners in the audience, Lee told the audience "I think before you get recognized, you need to get elected and serve one good term, and then we'll recognize you."

The evening's steak dinner was prepared by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners, and served by members of the Future Homemakers of America. Invocation was delivered by Rev. Ken Flowers and benediction by Rev. Clyde Markee.

Members of the Chamber's board of directors whose terms expire this year are Lee, Dr. Erwin Soell, Oliver Newman, Bob Hamilton, Aulds, Wayne House, Luther Shaw and Danny Parkerson.

Those serving through 1979 are Bill Bates, Ralph Beall, Bob Birk, Everett Boulware, Nipper, L.W. Teel, Herb Skinner, Harrell Sullivan and Joe Matlock.

Elected this year for three-year terms were Steger, Tom Key, Helen Rich, Davis, Mike Robertson, Rip Smith, Bud Burch, Dr. Richard Carver and Allen Gilstrap.

Mexican food, which has been a part of the Southwestern diet since the "American Occupation" has definitely become a part of the national cuisine and is very popular with many people in Iowa Park. Fortunately, the modern cook in a modern kitchen does not have to do things as in the old days to get the full flavor of real Mexican cookery.

In old days, chile, beans, corn and tamales from the vander with his tinkling bell were all that people could get. The corn was hulled and ground on metates and spices were blended through long simmering by the cooks themselves. Today, commercial ingredients may be substituted for those that formerly called for laborious preparation.

CHILI CON QUESO

1-10 oz. can Old El Paso tomatoes and green chillies
1-4 oz. can Old El Paso chopped green chillies
2 T vegetable oil
1 lb. Velveeta cheese
¼ cup milk

Fry tomatoes and chillies and green chillies in 2 T vegetable oil for a few minutes. Add milk and cheese and stir until cheese is fully melted. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve with chips.

GUACAMOLE SALAD

1 can old El Paso tomatoes and jalapenos
2 cups mashed avocados
1 t onion juice
¼ t garlic salt

A few drops of lemon juice
Blend all ingredients together until creamy. Serve with chips.

TACO SALAD

Taco shells
Taco seasonings
1 lb. browned meat
Lettuce
Tomatoes
Cheese
Avocado wedges

Break shells into bite-size pieces. Mix all ingredients in a large salad bowl and serve.

ENCHILADA CASSEROLE

1 lb. ground meat, browned
1 medium onion, chopped
1 large can chili (without beans)
1 lb. Velveeta cheese, sliced
1 pkg. frozen tortillas

Fry tortillas one at a time until soft; place tortillas on bottom of 9" casserole and layer a bit of onion, chili and cheese. Place another layer tortillas, onion, chili and cheese, then pour remaining chili over top.

Bake at 350° for 30 minutes, then top with remaining cheese and cook until melted.

CHICKEN SPAGHETTI

1 cooked chicken, boned and diced
1 medium onion, chopped
1 medium bell pepper, chopped
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 lb. Velveeta cheese, sliced
1 lb. long spaghetti

Cook spaghetti in chicken broth with onions and pepper. Add water if needed and partially drain.

In a 13x9 pan, mix chicken, cream of chicken soup and part of cheese; then stir in spaghetti, onions and green pepper and season to taste. Bake at 350° for half hour, then top with remaining cheese and cook until melted.

Serve with a salad, green beans, garlic bread and dessert.

GOOD STUFF

Crust:
1½ cups flour
1½ sticks margarine
1 cup chopped nuts

Press into 9x13 pan, bake 20-25 minutes at 325° until crusty brown; set aside to cool.

First layer:
Mix:
1-8 oz. cream cheese
1 cup powdered sugar
1 cup Cool Whip

Spread over cool crust.

Second layer:
1 pkg. instant vanilla pudding
1 pkg. instant deep chocolate pudding
3 cups cold milk

Spread on first layer.

Third layer:
Spread on a fluffy layer of Cool Whip and top with a shredded Hershey bar.

The club members, many of them dressed in long dresses, aprons and bonnets like pioneer women wore, were hostesses for a buffet luncheon in the Fellowship Hall of First Christian Church to initiate activities.

Tables were decorated with nostalgic sculptured

horse-drawn wagons, carts and windmills, handiwork of Jerry Robertson, who loaned them to the club for the occasion.

Mrs. Joe Singer welcomed guests and Mrs. W.G. Steele offered the invocation.

Miss Ethyle Kidwell,

program leader, paid tribute to the pioneers of Iowa Park and challenged members and guests to reaffirm their determination to be worthy of them. Her competent presentation of the program was spiced with humor that started with "A Recreat for Washing Clothes" which ended with "when you have

finished set and rest for a spell." She took advantage of "setting and resting" during the different phases of the program.

Special music was furnished by a barbershop quartet from Iowa Park High School composed of Norman Flowers, Lee Gwinn, Chris Lester and Scott

Mrs. Clark discussed the schools in Iowa Park which had their beginning in 1889 in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson, grandparents of Frances Boyd Smith of Wichita Falls, who was a guest. She traced the development of the school system from the first one-room structure in the

south part of town to the present time.

Mrs. Sewell gave a brief history of the 11 churches in Iowa Park noting that the Methodist Church was the first one established. Her father, the late C.C. Davis, pastored the church at one time.

The program was concluded with "Early Recollections" by Tom Corridon, the first white child born in Iowa Park.

Seventy-five members and guests attended the function.

Worth Quoting

"Teaching ought to be a profession, adopted like any other as a life-labor, because it affords scope for the talents and culture of those who select it, and brings reward and satisfaction commensurate with the labor.

"That it is not such a profession is due in part to false principles in the management of education interests. Our teachers are too much at the mercy of those who employ them....The teachers are employed by the year, and are constantly dependent on the committees, knowing full well that they are liable to be displaced at any time to make way for somebody else, or a penalty for some act that is really a merit, but has displeased somebody with power and influence in the Board on which they are dependent....

"Every teacher is a tenant at will, and his term expires each year....The result is that the teacher regards his position as precarious, and is induced by the instinct of self-preservation to follow a course and make reports which will suit the committee rather than such as are approved by his own judgment. He will not venture, in fact, to have any judgment, and his experience goes for nothing. He is

neither at liberty to utilize it, nor has he any encouragement to make suggestions.

"The consequence is that those who understand best the interests of the several schools have the least power over the policy of directing them.

"The position is at once humiliating to honest pride and destructive to honorable ambition....

"The teacher once appointed should be sure of his position. He should be removable only for cause and after a fair trial of any charges that may be brought against him. There is a good deal of talk about cutting down salaries, but a matter of far more importance is securing teachers that would be worth even more than is now paid. The pecuniary inducements are hardly sufficient to secure the best qualifications, especially under the discouragements that weigh upon the profession....

"Our school is ... inefficient for the reason that so little attention is paid to encouraging and building up the profession of the teacher, and will never have strength to produce the best results until this radical defect is remedied."

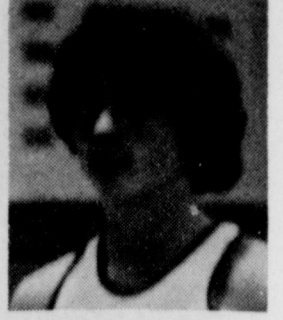

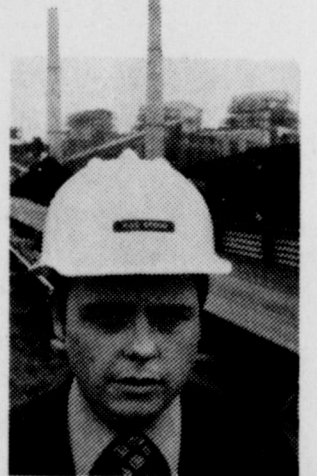

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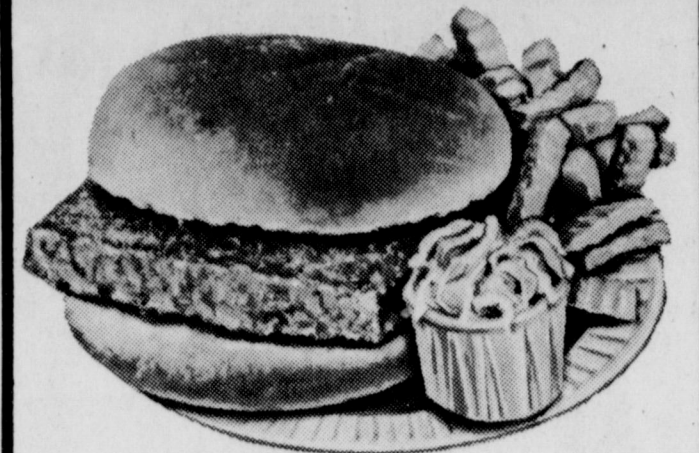

Hard winter means good crops, according to area old timers

A hard winter means a good crop year according to the "old timers". However, local farm producers are not leaving their cotton, grain sorghum, nor corn production to chance. Efforts are being made to store as much soil moisture as possible to make the dry summer months ahead.

The main moisture saving measure being practiced is subsoiling or deep chiseling to break the plow layers or pans so moisture and roots can penetrate well into the soil profile.

Fred Dwyer of Wichita Falls is plowing his cotton land with a Big Ox type plow

which is operated to a depth of 12 to 18 inches. Some fields are being subsoiled in two directions, insuring complete breakage of the plow layer. A harrow is pulled behind the plow to help smooth the land.

Additional plowing will be done until there is a well prepared seedbed. Prowl preplant herbicide will be applied on the tight land and Treflan will be used on the sandy fields. Wild oats are more of a problem on the sand, and these fields will be kept in cotton for two years. Wheat can follow the Prowl treated fields on the tight land.

His seedbed will be left flat. A six row planter with

double disc openers will seed his cotton in 30 inch rows. This row width will accommodate cultivation if needed to conserve moisture by covering soil cracks.

A new producer to the area is Stan Hoyer, an Iowa corn producer who recently purchased the Paul Redding farm near Kamay. He is going after the plow pan with a little different rig. A double tool bar is being used with the subsoilers on the front bar. These subsoilers are located so they will break the hardpan directly below the row. Disc bedders are mounted on the second bar plowing up beds behind the subsoilers.

Hoyer will be growing

irrigated corn on about one-half of his acreage. The remainder will go into cotton. Since the corn comes off in August, wheat for grazing purposes will follow the corn.

Cecil Jarvis of Friberg Cooper is removing several shanks from his chisel plow so the depth of chiseling can be increased. His 150 acre field to be planted in cotton is being plowed several times to assure fracturing the plow pan.

An experienced cotton producer, Harrison McAlister, from Electra makes an important observation. He says, "a good cotton crop is made from moisture stored in the soil profile. If we get enough summer rain to make a cotton crop, the insect damage will be excessive".

The performance of the GP 3755 cotton variety pleased Larry McAlister in his demonstration north of Iowa Park. His field size variety demonstration included about 20 acres each of GP3755, Tamecot SP 37, and LX 571. The grade prices were included in evaluating these varieties.

The top producers was GP 3755 with 490 pounds of lint per acre. The staple length was 1 1/32 inch, and the average price per pound according to grade was \$44.80. Tamecot SP 37 followed with 470 pounds of lint per acre with a 1 inch staple and an average price of \$43.65. His LX 571 made 460 pounds of lint per acre, a 1 inch staple, with an average price of \$42.10.

In dollars and cents this means the GP 3755 grossed \$220 per acre, the SP 37 grossed \$205 per acre, and the LX 571 made \$194 per acre. This means the top variety made \$26 per acre more than the bottom variety. The production costs were approximately the same since the entire field received the same treatment. As the yield per acre increases, the harvest and ginning costs increase slightly on a per acre basis.

The terms of board president Lonnie Brackeen and Royce Coats are up for grabs, and both incumbents filed for another stint on the panel of trustees.

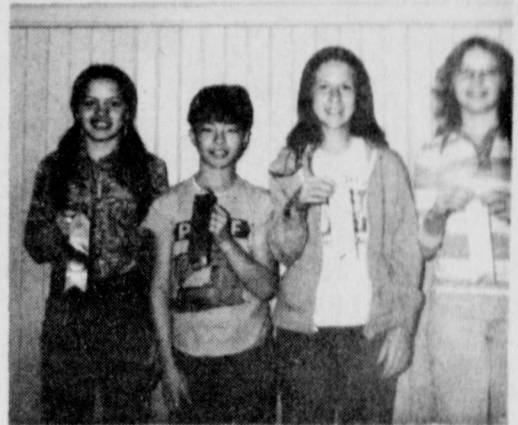

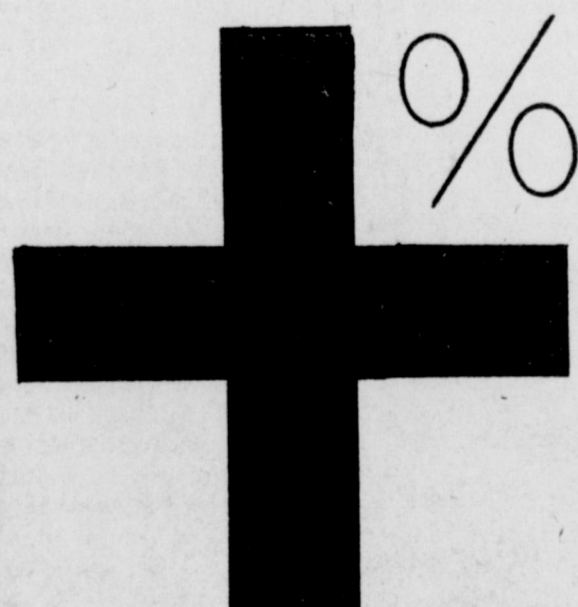

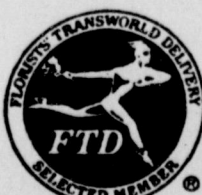

SECTION 1. ORDINANCE NUMBER 22, the title of which is described above, which was passed by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Pleasant Valley, Texas on the 5th day of August, 1968 is hereby amended so that Section 1 shall read as follows:
"Section 1. RATES TO BE CHARGED. The following rates are hereby established and shall be collected by the Town. The minimum monthly bill for water service shall be \$9.00 for which amount each customer shall be allowed 3000 gallons of water, such amount of water to be used during the current month. For larger consumption the rate shall be: Next 3,000 gallons, \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons; Next 4,000 gallons, .90 per 1,000 gallons; All over 10,000 gallons, .80 per 1,000 gallons.
SECTION 2. THE TOWN SECRETARY shall cause a copy of this ordinance to be published in the Iowa Park Leader, a newspaper.
