\$2,000 CASH TAKEN

High school vault burglarized Monday

Police are searching for a highly knowledgeable burglar who successfully broke into the Iowa Park High School vault Monday night and took an estimated \$2,000 in cash.

"He knew as much about this building as I do," commented Principal Bob Dawson.

The break-in was discovered about 3 a.m. Tuesday by Patrolman Robert Dean, who discovered the southeast door of the gymnasium standing open, and called Dawson to aid in investigation.

Dawson and Dean went first to the administration office, where they found Mrs. Mike Priddy's desk had been ransacked, but nothing apparently taken.

They then looked in other rooms of the office, and discovered the damaged wall between the vault and Kenneth Davis' office, where a hole approximately 13 by 15 inches had been knocked out to gain entry.

Money taken was in a metal cabinet, protected with a hasp and padlock. The vault's door is of heavy steel with a combination lock.

Dawson explained the money was for several activities: \$415 for activities, to make admission change; meal money for track and tennis teams; and petty cash kept in envelopes for various organizations on the campus.

Some \$3,300 which had been

collected for driver's education training had already been deposited. Most money earned by organizations is deposited in a student activity account at the bank, but the petty cash was held out to minimize accounting for minor expenditures.

Money for the track and tennis teams' meals is drawn from the bank at the first of the season, and held in the vault. Coaches, prior to leaving on competition trips, draw the amount needed, signing a register kept by the secretary.

ENTRY GAINED

The burglar gained entry by cutting a side out of an evaporative airconditioner duct located above the hallway by the gymnasium. A grill was knocked out, and the burglar dropped some 12 feet to the gym floor.

Apparently not bringing adequate tools to knock a hole in the cinder

block wall of the vault, the burglar gained entry to the boys' basketball coach's office through a small door vent, about the same size as the hole in the wall. There he got two metal tools used to move the gymnasium's folding bleachers.

Knowledge of where the money was kept indicated to Dawson that the burglar knew his way around the building, and knowing where the tools could be found was even more a tipoff.

Rather than risk being seen forcing entry to the administration office hall doors, the burglar then knocked out a small glass in the hallway door to the teachers' lounge, reached in and unlocked it.

Another indication to Dawson that the intruder wanted nothing more than the major source of money was that the soft drink machine in the lounge was not bothered.

A section of the ceiling in Davis' office was removed, possibly indicating the burglar sought to enter through a false ceiling in the vault. However, a four-inch layer of concrete in the vault's ceiling prohibited entry from above.

A sheet of wood paneling was removed, allowing the burglar to reach the cinder block wall. The bottom of the hole was approximately four feet above floor level.

The burglar removed the envelopes containing money from the filing cabinet, took them back through the hole, removed their contents in Davis' office, and left the residue scattered on the floor.

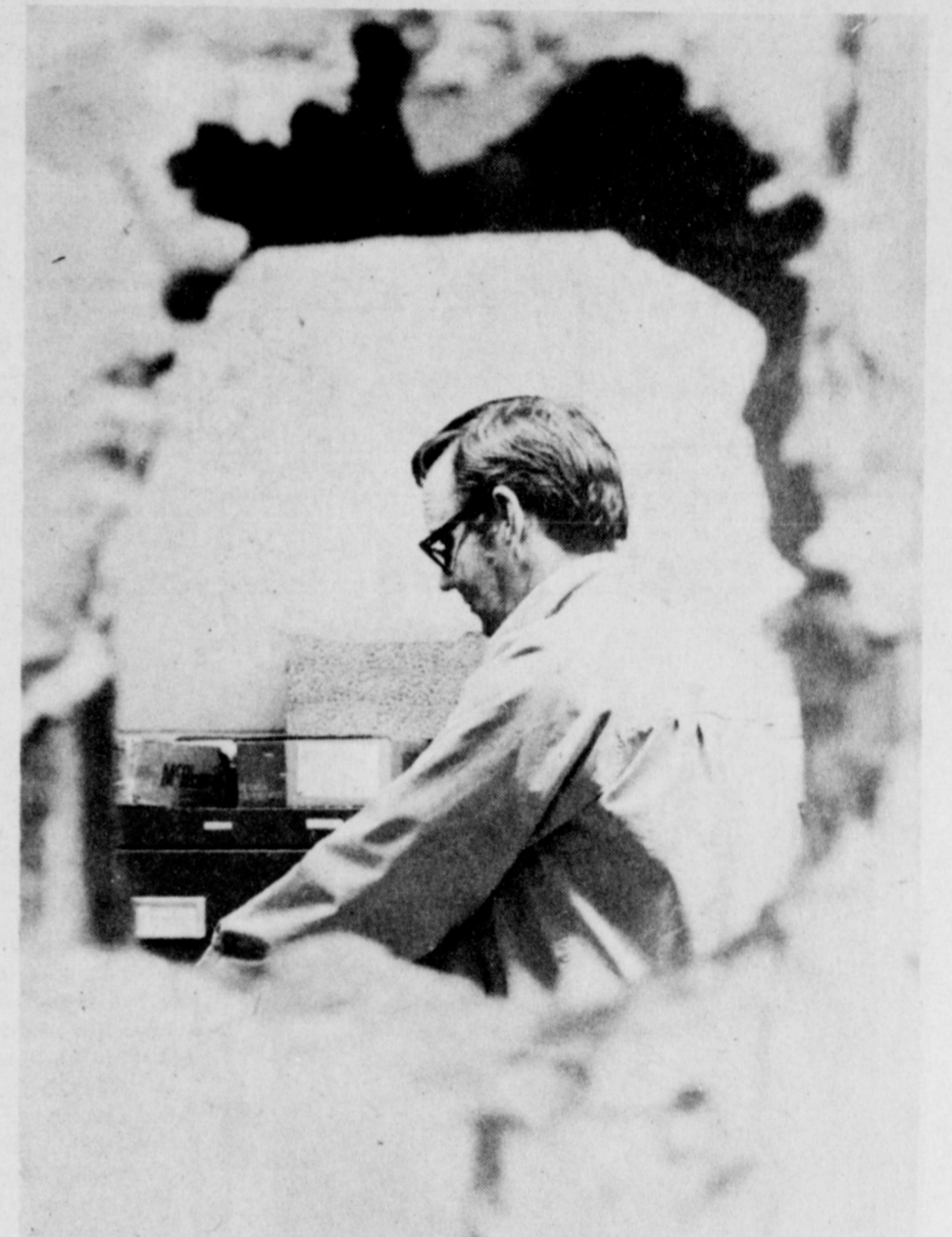
He apparently did not notice that he could have exited the vault by pushing on lever inside the heavy steel door, for use in emergency.

A specialist in finger printing was called in from the Wichita County

Sheriff's office, to assist in the investigation.

The building was broken into one time before, following Bacalaureate

service last spring. But at that time, only some records filed in Herman Escue's counselor office were vandalized, and nothing taken.

Burglars use unlocked door

The front door of the Jiffy Food Store on Johnson Road apparently was left unlocked, and a burglar gained easy access to \$125 worth of cigarettes and soft drinks early Monday morning.

A passerby found the door open and reported his discovery to police here, who think the burglary took place between midnight and 1:45 a.m. Monday.

A preliminary investigation showed the store's front door had not been properly secured and burglars took an estimated \$125.98 in soft drinks and cigarettes.

Police here received a report Sunday morning from the Rev. Ken Flowers that four windows had been broken out of the Wichita County Tax Office at 220 W. Park.

The home and auto of Dafford Gambill, 302 E. Diamond, were reportedly burglarized and attacked Saturday.

Four tires on an auto parked at the home had been punctured and a tool box and tools valued at \$60 had been taken from the porch of the residence, police said.

Trustees cut career education program

Discussion among Iowa Park school trustees surfaced last week when the panel voted 5-1 to reassign personnel now administering the career education program here.

The controversial decision will in effect dissolve a portion of career education as it exists today. However, administrators said students here will continue to receive career education through different channels.

There are two well-defined sides to the issue.

The majority of school board members claim local financing of career education as it exists today is money ill spent. In an obvious move to trim local spending, the majority feels the same goals can be achieved at less cost.

The lone dissenter on the board, Roy Boutwell, claims career educa-

tion as it exists today is a worthwhile program. A coming state-wide mandate from Texas Education Agency will force Iowa Park to reinstate the program in 1980, he said.

Minutes of the May 8, 1973, trustee meeting reflect the career education program originally was approved to be financed with federal funds. "Teachers now employed, once the program expires, will still be utilized within our system," the minutes state.

The original grant was for \$50,000 from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to cover salaries and the purchase of equipment and supplies.

An additional \$15,000 came the second year to cover salaries, according to Harold Cowley, school business manager.

Federal funding expired Aug. 31, 1975, although local funds continued to pay the salaries of personnel for two additional years.

Salaries for the program were budgeted for \$19,195 this year, Cowley said. If the program were continued local taxpayers would spend \$20,500 next year on the salaries of Penny Nowell, career education coordinator, and Gayle

The board's decision to reassign Mrs. Nowell and Mrs. Lyles will not affect the junior high occupational orientation program being carried out by Tom Venhaus or high school vocational counseling by Carl King, both locally funded.

Although their work encompassed all grades, Mrs. Nowell and Mrs. Lyles concentrated their efforts in kindergarten through seventh grade, Cowley explained.

Their duties included arrangements for students to hear speakers and to visit various businesses for expanded exposure to help students select a profession.

Similar functions previously were the responsibility of teachers and principals, who Cowley sees as reassigning those duties when Mrs. Nowell and Mrs. Lyles are assigned to different parts of the school system here.

On the 1980 TEA mandate, Cowley said the state will require "some type of career education program ... they don't say what kind of program." If trustees decide to take that route, Cowley thinks teachers and principals can administer a program to satisfy state requirements.

"We're not trying to cut the quality

Spruiell, who made the motion last Thursday night to delete career education.

Referring to the March 8, 1973, minutes, Spruiell added, "It was never intended to be a locally funded program."

"We just don't figure we can keep this program on local funding."

Praising Mrs. Nowell and Mrs. Lyles for the capabilities as educators, Spruiell said the district could realize a better return on its investment by returning Mrs. Nowell to the classroom and utilizing Mrs. Lyles as a teacher's aide.

Spruiell said board members also are getting a lot of flack from taxpayers. Several weeks ago a group of Burkburnett school district land owners asked to be annexed into the Iowa Park school district. It was discovered they would be paying \$500 more in taxes here than in Burkburnett.

CITES EFFICIENCY

Citing a need for better efficiency in school operations here, Spruiell added, "We can have a real good, functional career education program with our principals and teachers carrying it out."

Boutwell disagrees. Moments after the motion passed last week, Boutwell went on record saying he was opposed to the deletion of the program because it was "ridiculous to cut out a program we already have" and must reinstate according to TEA requirements by 1980.

"I think it's a shame this school district can spend money on everything but education," Boutwell said.

Boutwell, indicating there may be a personality conflict on the board, said other items he had supported in

majority of the board.

He had supported hiring an additional second grade teacher and use of computers in the classroom. Both were turned down, he said.

"But we can hire a field house maintenance man and put Grasstex in the field house ... This money is being ill spent," Boutwell claimed.

The discrepancy between Burkburnett and Iowa Park school taxes, Boutwell said, "is a good excuse, but not the reason."

"I'm for being just as conservative with tax money, too. If we cut career education this year, where do we go next year?"

The fact that the board decided to move the issue down on Thursday night's agenda also raised Boutwell's ire.

Originally, the personnel portion of the meeting was second on the agenda, but was requested to be moved to thirteenth on the list.

When the personnel item finally rolled around it was almost 10 p.m. and the crowd had dwindled considerably.

The board was in executive session until almost 1 a.m. Friday before making its decision public.

Earlier in the meeting, Boutwell said, "There were people there interested in career education. But that's the way the board operates. Our school board likes small crowds."

On a motion by Spruiell, seconded by G.R. "Rusty" Rusk, the board voted 5-1 to delete career education until state funding can be obtained, and that Mrs. Nowell, the superintendent's wife, and Mrs. Lyles would be guaranteed positions elsewhere in the school system here.

STUDENT QUESTIONS

Only one person, student Ernie Soell, questioned the board's action.

C.E. Myers, board president, told Soell the decision had been reached with "mixed emotions."

Myers described career education as a "direct cost to the district ... We do feel it is worth something ... not

including both incumbents. Those filing for three-year terms are, in order as they appear on the ballot, incumbent Roy Boutwell, incumbent Delbert Catlin, Dan Nethery, Jerald Brown and Christy McKenzie.

Three candidates have filed for the unexpired trustee position vacated by Hoyt Watson, which has one year remaining. They are Martha Dudley, Margaret Soell and Jerry Hutchins.

In the city election, three candidates have filed for the post of mayor. They are George Trammell, Gene Lowrey and incumbent Johnny Crawford.

Seeking three alderman posts are seven candidates, including all three incumbents. They include Johnny Lee, incumbent Gregory Ross, Luther Skinner, incumbent Joe Singer, Eldon Thompson Jr., incumbent Lita Watson and Billy Gilmore.

In both the city and school elections, all positions are at-large. Those receiving the most votes are elected, and a runoff occurs only in case of a tie among winners.

2 cloves garlic
2 1/2 salt
2 1/4 t salt
3/4 t pepper
2-3 lbs. chicken

Cook of the Week

No. 2 can tomatoes, mashed
1 t oregano
1 t parsley

In large, heavy skillet lightly brown garlic in oil. Coat chicken in mixture of 1/2 cup flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Brown chicken on all sides.

Combine tomatoes, 1 1/4 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, oregano and parsley. Add to chicken and cook until tender, about 30 to 45 minutes.

Cooked or canned mushrooms also may be added.

POTATO SOUP

6 cups salted water
1 t oregano
4-5 medium potatoes, cubed
2 medium onions, cubed
2 slices bacon, cubed
1 lb. Polish or roasted sausage
2 C. milk
1 heaping T flour
In large pot combine water, oregano, potatoes, onions and bacon. When potatoes are almost done add sausage.

Coarse ground hamburger may be used for meat. (Fry and drain.) Can be frozen.

Sauce: 1 t dry mustard, 1 t salt, 2 t butter, 1 small chopped onion, 1 cup chopped celery, 1 cup catsup, 2 T vinegar, 2 T brown sugar, 2 T lemon juice, 2 T worchester sauce, 1/2 t pepper, 3/4 cups water or liquid from roast.

SPAGHETTI SAUCE

1 lb. hamburger
2 toes garlic
1 large onion, chopped
2 small cans tomato sauce
2 small cans tomato paste
1 pinch oregano
3 t sugar
1 pinch cinnamon
2 or 3 raisins
1 or 2 bay leaves
1 1/2 oz. can beer
Salt and pepper to taste

Brown hamburger, onions, garlic and remaining ingredients. Simmer 3 hours. Makes four large servings.

LEMON BASTING SAUCE

3/4 cups oleo
2 t paprika
1/4 t dry mustard
1 t sugar
1 t salt
1/2 t pepper
1/2 cup lemon juice
1/2 cup hot water
Few drops Tabasco sauce
Melt oleo and add remaining ingredients. Bring to boil and remove from heat.

Excellent for cooking chicken, pork chops or fish on outdoor grill.

After potatoes are fully cooked add milk. To thicken, add heaping tablespoon of flour and small amount of milk to form smooth sauce. Add to soup.

worth the money we put into it." The board was unanimous in its decision to extend the contracts of all other school personnel.

An issue discussed Thursday night but tabled until Monday was building insurance coverage for all campuses.

During a special meeting Monday the building insurance contract bid was awarded to Barbour Insurance Agency.

The 80 percent co-insurance package will cost the district \$20,549. Property insured is valued at \$5,077,500.

Bids on similar insurance packages were submitted by Iowa Park Insurance Agency at \$21,315 and R.W. Hill Insurance Agency at \$21,404.

In other action Thursday night the board:

- Approved an expenditure of \$1,387 to help pay for lighting of high school tennis courts. Bob King, representing Iowa Park Tennis Association, made the request, agreed the tennis buff organization already has secured poles and will

finance half the cost of the lights.

- Accepted a proposal to implement an individualized instruction project guide for special education classes at Bradford Elementary. The demonstration classroom is an effort to gain state-wide acceptance, and will not be financed by local funds.
- Approved a utility easement to TESCO for utility service to a building trades home at 703 W. Texas.
- Approved two minor changes in the budget for band and baseball.
- Hear a report from Bill Steger, tax assessor-collector, that 95.1 percent of the district's taxes had been collected. "That's about average, maybe a little above what they were at this time last year," Steger observed. Steger also submitted routine transportation and cafeteria reports.
- To be paid by the state for their services, Steger and Allen Shewmake were approved appointment to the Texas School Assessment Practices Board.
- Approved appointment of Bud

Mercer, Connie Rowell and Clarence Mahler to the board of equalization. Hearings on local property will begin at 9 a.m. May 26 in the school tax office. Hearings on oil, gas and industry will begin at 2 p.m. June 26 at the school administration office.

- Approved textbook selections, voted to pay bills and appointed Jesse McCullough and C.E. Myers to the bill paying committee.

City council sets meeting

City Administrator Gene Britton is to report to the city council Monday evening on whether a group has been formed to oppose Southwestern Bell Telephone's rate increase request in Austin.

The meeting, to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers, could be the last for some members of the council, as it is the final scheduled meeting before the April 1 election.

Britton said he is to attend a meeting today in Austin with the Texas Municipal League, where discussion of forming a group to intervene in the phone rate case will take place before the Texas Public Utilities Commission.

Other items which possibly will be on Monday's meeting agenda are:

- * discussion of annexation of Lake Iowa Park;
- * possible agreement with the City of Wichita Falls on a cooperative testing for electrician licensing;
- * financial statements to be presented;
- * report on action to sell water to a development on Horseshoe Lake, which has already been approved by the Wichita Falls city council.

Appeal withdrawn in Johnson case

As I See It....

Washington politics is basically trading out. In other words, to get your own bill passed, you've got to swap support for someone's pet bill, to get their support for your's.

What brought this subject about, is a newsletter from Cong. Jack Hightower, announcing he had voted for the so-called "Humphrey - Hawkins" bill, called Full Employment and Balanced Growth Act.

I can't remember a piece of legislation written by the late Hubert Humphrey that I could support. But Hightower dispels some of my fears of this particular piece of legislation, when he makes a strong point the bill does not repeal Texas' coveted "right-to-work" law. I'll just have to take his word on that, because I've not read the bill.

Hightower threw his support behind the bill, when he was able to amend it with a provision that established a goal of full parity for farmers by at least 1983.

The Vernon politician cites comments from hundreds of farmers and agri-businessmen who have visited Washington, that without immediate help on farm prices, they will be forced to leave agriculture, and join the ranks of the nation's unemployed.

"Unlike the original bill, the measure as approved does prescribe programs and policies that the President would have to use to achieve the economic targets," Hightower explains about the unemployment bill. "It establishes priorities for job expansion and mandates by law that top priority must be given to expansion of

conventional jobs in the private sector."

Jobs for the unemployed, even those provided by the government, relieves the government's welfare expense. One top government official told us recently it costs something like \$16,000 to have a person on welfare, but they can hire the same person for \$9,000, saving the taxpayers \$7,000.

One of the points about the Humphrey-Hawkins bill that I am dead against, if I'm not confusing it with another bill, is that it allows a union organizer to come into my business, during business hours, and hold a meeting with my employees to explain the "benefits" of belonging to a union. And they can hold as many meetings as they want, bringing the business to a total standstill, on my pay time.

If that is in the bill, I don't care what else is in it, I don't like it, and I don't think people in this part of the country want it. We'll just have to find some other way of helping our

farmers.

We keep talking about big government, but do we really appreciate how big it is? Do you know how much a billion dollars is?

Cong. Omar Burleson recently sent out a newsletter in which he attempted to give some idea of how big the budget was that Pres. Carter submitted. That was \$500-billion, in case you don't remember.

If you started out at the birth of Christ, spending \$700,000 a day, you would just now have succeeded in spending about \$500-billion. It is now proposed that we spend that much in one year.

Burleson said, to spend \$500-billion in a year, the government would have to spend \$953,000 a minute, \$57-million an hour, or a billion and a third every day of the year.

In the span of half a century, government spending has increased roughly 20,000 percent. The 1929 budget was \$2.5-billion, costing the taxpayer close to \$25 a year.

Chamber launches plans for year's activities

Several plans for activities during the coming year were outlined and discussed Monday at the monthly meeting of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

The meeting was the first since the inauguration of new president Bill Steger.

Mrs. D.O. James was recognized for having been selected "Texas Mother of the Year", and was voted "Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce Mother of the Year" on a motion by O.N. Newman.

Mrs. James will be representing Iowa Park and Texas in Iowa in May, where the national Mother of the Year will be named. The Chamber also gave her a potted plant.

Steger named a number of committee assignments: Charlie Lee and Mike Robertson, annual banquet speaker selection; Bill Bates, chairman Whoop-T-Do, assisted by Danny Parkerson; Joe Matlock, chairman Clean Up Day, assisted by Tommy Key, Richard Davis, Wayne House, Dr. Richard Carver, Keith Aulds and Bob Birk; Golf course work committee. Rip Smith chairman; Alan

Gilstrap and Fred Parkey; and membership drive, Lee chairman, House, Key, Luther Shaw, H.M. Nipper and Bob Hamilton.

Clean Up Day will be postponed from April until early May, in order that new sanitation equipment might be installed and operating. Steger said the delay was suggested by Gene Britton, city administrator. The city will cooperate in the activity, as it has in the past.

The new president mentioned the community's need for a golf course at the annual banquet. He said he was hopeful some federal funds might be available to assist in development of a course. No site is yet available, but workers hope to build a nine-hole course initially, and expand to 18 later.

Parkerson, chairman of the Retail Merchants Association, said plans were already underway for promotion of two retail activities, Crazy Day and Whoop-T-Do. Committee members have also discussed painting murals on the old downtown buildings fronting the old highway, he said.

Ezzell's name scratched

Candidate for mayor said to have filed day late

What appears to have been an oversight in enforcing the Texas election law has prompted the elimination of Ben Ezzell's name from April 1 Holliday mayoral ballot.

Frank Douthitt, the city's attorney, said Ezzell filed for election after the deadline and it would be a violation of state law for his name to appear on the ballot, said Judy Nichols, assistant city secretary.

While city officials were busy this week blacking out Ezzell's name from the ballots which already have been printed, Ezzell was contemplating a write-in

campaign for the mayor's post.

The controversy surfaced last week when Alderman Fred Ford Maier read a newspaper account of a similar hassle at Lakeside City.

"I just got to thinking about it ... it's not personal or anything like that," Maier said.

Maier indicated he had a moral obligation to raise the question.

State law says a candidate must file for election 30 days prior to the election. The filing deadline for Holliday's city council election was March 1, but Ezzell filed

March 2. Mrs. Nichols said. City officials said they contacted the city attorney for a legal opinion on how to handle the issue.

Douthitt said the city could either have the ballots reprinted absent Ezzell's name, or mark out Ezzell's name with a black marker on ballots already printed. Mrs. Nichols said.

Ezzell said he discussed the situation last Friday

with Mayor Jim Darr and Maier. Ezzell said he asked the councilmen to postpone marking his name off the ballot "until we had received written legal advice" from Douthitt and Ezzell's private attorney.

By Tuesday Ezzell's name had been scratched off about half the ballots.

"If they've scratched out that many it may be too late

to do anything now," Ezzell said.

Asked if he intended to take any legal action against the city, Ezzell said, "I don't intend to sue the city. I wouldn't. It would only hurt the city."

Will Ezzell continue his efforts to be elected mayor of Holliday?

"If I can feel enough support I'm going to stage a write-in campaign," Ezzell said.

Names appearing on the April 1 mayoral ballot will include Ray Briggs, Jim Darr, Fred Daume Jr., Tom Hall and Charles Parker.

The Iowa Park Leader was again judged one of the best newspapers in North and East Texas Press Association, according to results of judging announced Saturday in Tyler.

Presentation of awards, based on entries of 1977 editions, was made at the final dinner of the association's convention.

The Leader was tied with the Naples Monitor and Grapevine Sun, for points earned on individual events, with the publication earning the most points being awarded Sweepstakes.

Naples' paper was awarded Sweepstakes, on the basis of having placed in five contests, while Iowa Park and Grapevine placed in only three.

Iowa Park received a first place plaque for newswriting, second place certificate for best column, and third place for general excellence.

The Leader was not eligible to compete in community service, local news photos and sports coverage contests, because the rules prohibit previous year's winners from entering. Iowa Park received the Sweepstakes award last year.

Competition in which the Leader entered was for newspapers of 2,500 circulation or less. The Association includes all northeast Texas, with Iowa Park and Granbury on the west, and Conroe on the south.

Grapevine won a first in feature story, second in news writing and third in community service.

Naples placed second in feature story, third in best column and sports coverage, and fourth in community service and local news photos.

Friendly Door sets anniversary May 1

The Friendly Door will observe its first anniversary May 1, according to Bill Steger, one of the founders of the organization for the elderly in Iowa Park.

Steger spoke Tuesday at the Noon Lions Club, pointing out the services rendered to members of the Friendly Door.

Three hundred, thirty seven members have joined the organization, and between 40 and 50 are fed daily at the First United Methodist Church, headquarters.

Additionally, 12 to 15 meals are carried by volunteers to members who cannot get out. Donations of 75 cents are accepted from all those fed, but not required, Steger said.

Other services include volunteers taking an average of 25 persons to a drug store or grocery store to do shopping, each week, and some 20 referrals are made daily to persons wanting information or services for the elderly.

The Friendly Door was financed the first year through a grant from Nortex Regional Planning Commission through Title III of the

Older Americans Act. Three-fourth of the year's

\$12,000 budget came from the grant, and the balance from the United Way and local donations.

The second year's \$13,000 budget will be shared 50-50 through the grant and United Way. The grant is to diminish another fourth the third year, and phase out the fourth year, Steger said.

One of the major features of the Friendly Door is to those who do not need financial assistance, but seek the fellowship of others their age. Activities include exercise programs, recreation, trips and visitations with other similar organizations in the area.

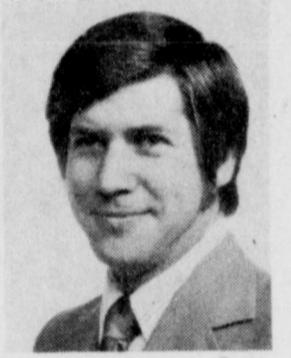

Dear Taxpayer, Parent and Citizen:

As a trustee of the Iowa Park School System, I voted to discontinue Career Education until such time as the state will approve the funding of the program. I also voted to assure the Career Education personnel of a position for the 1978/79 school year. One as a classroom teacher and the other as an aide.

The local funding of the program for 1977/78 amounts to \$16,920.00 for salaries, with \$2,275.00 for material, travel and services for a total of \$19,195.00 local tax dollars. The 1978/79 total cost would be approximately \$20,465.00 and approximately \$21,735.00 for 1979/80, totaling \$42,200.00 local tax money. The increases for 78/79 and 79/80 are based on salary increases only. If materials, travel, and services continue to rise in cost, the amounts would be even more. The estimates do not include costs of bus drivers salaries and gasoline as well as wear and tear on the buses.

In 1980 the state will fund the Career Education program if funds are appropriated. Until that time, why should we pay \$42,200.00?

Occupational Orientation is a funded vocational program. I do not believe the state will cut a funded program because we cut an unfunded program.

As far as the legality of the board's action, Career Education was listed on the personnel list of recommendations. Had the personnel been listed and no mention made of programs, campuses, etc., it might have been considered illegal.

For those of you who are unaware of the actual Career Education program it works as follows:

The classroom teacher decides on a fieldtrip for her class, gets approval from the principal, who in turn gets permission from the superintendent. The approval form is then passed on to the Career Education Coordinator who sets up a visitation appointment and arranges for transportation. (The above can be handled in a few minutes by the principal and teacher). The Coordinator goes on the fieldtrip, snaps a few pictures, puts the developed slides into a carousel projector, makes a tape recording to coincide with the slides, shows it to other teachers around the district, area, and state. If the teacher decides to have a speaker or demonstration for the students in the classroom instead of a fieldtrip, the Coordinator also arranges for the program. The Career Education Department prepares bulletin board materials for the classroom teachers, depicting various career jobs in addition to the above.

If all our taxes were not among the highest in the area, and if we had a couple million dollars extra, I would say go ahead. But, with today's rising costs, we must have meat and potatoes on the table before we can serve strawberry shortcake.

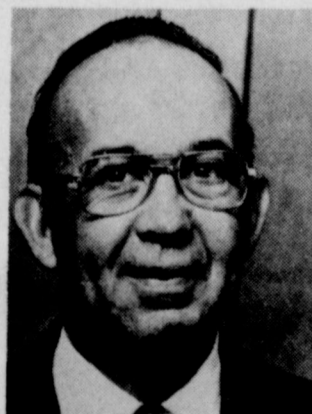

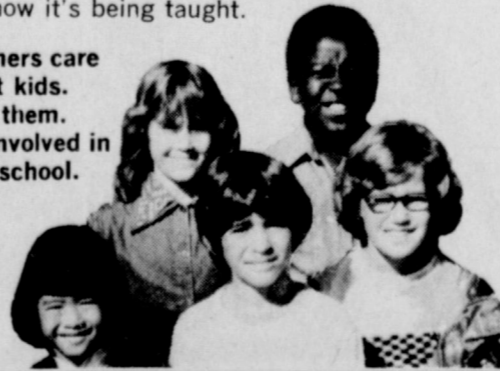

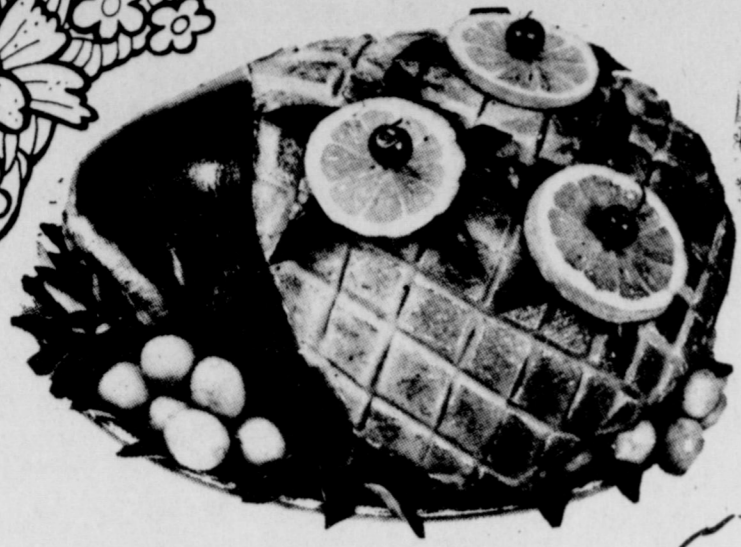
