

## Alderman alleges double standards

e-election, Mayor Johnny Crawford reelection, Mayor Johnny Crawford
expressed concern over whether expressed concern over whether
Monday's meeting was an omen of what the next two years would be
like.

and Crawford had to call them to order more than once

Alderman C.A. Hicks, speaking without recognition from the chair,
accused the city of having a "double standard. You've
somebody," he said.

That was when Mayor Crawford's
usual coolness broke somewhat. He usual coolness broke somewhat. He
leaned back in his chair, pointed a finger at Hicks and said "C.A. It take
exception to that." He challenged Hicks to give one example. It didn't
come. The two got into it again late
when during a discussion on proposed ordinance, Hicks attempte to make a motion without being Crawford of ignoring him.
Both exchanges came about when on the agenda " City Administrator Gene Britton pointed out to the council he had drafted an ordinance, at the request keeping of any farm animals, such keeping of any farm animals, such as
cows, horses, pigs or sheep, in the city, and also require the licensing of all dogs and cats.
A neighbor of Walter Spruiell's had reportedly complained to Hicks,
charging Spruiell was not legally charging spruiell was not legally prompting the proposed new ordinance.
During the discussion, Spruiell pointed out that he had at one time not maintained the proper distance of
his horse from the house, but it had been inspected numerous times since the complaint and had been ruled as legal and proper:
He later stated he would remove the animal to stop the complaint
because "I don't want to be the cause because "I don't want to be the cause
of nobody in the city being able to keep an animal"
Crawford, who recognized that
there are numerous situations over there are numerous situations over the city where people are keeping farm animals, legally, pointed out this
was the only complaint of its nature in was the only complaint of its nature in
the two years he had been on the council.
