

Alderman alleges double standards

Council chamber was filled to capacity, partially with irate citizens, and Crawford had to call them to order more than once.

But he also had to call to order one member of his own council.

Alderman C.A. Hicks, speaking without recognition from the chair, accused the city of having a "double standard. You've got to be somebody," he said.



The two got into it again later, when during a discussion on a proposed ordinance, Hicks attempted to make a motion without being recognized by the chair and accused Crawford of ignoring him.

Both exchanges came about when the council started on the fourth item on the agenda, "animal ordinance".

City Administrator Gene Britton pointed out to the council he had drafted an ordinance, at the request of Hicks, which would prohibit the keeping of any farm animals, such as cows, horses, pigs or sheep, in the city, and also require the licensing of all dogs and cats.

A neighbor of Walter Spruiell's had reportedly complained to Hicks, charging Spruiell was not legally maintaining a horse in his backyard, prompting the proposed new ordinance.

During the discussion, Spruiell pointed out that he had at one time not maintained the proper distance of his horse from the house, but it had been inspected numerous times since the complaint and had been ruled as legal and proper.

He later stated he would remove the animal to stop the complaint because "I don't want to be the cause of nobody in the city being able to keep an animal."

Crawford, who recognized that there are numerous situations over the city where people are keeping farm animals, legally, pointed out this was the only complaint of its nature in the two years he had been on the council.

Britton said he and others who have purchased property in Quail Valley, mostly five-acre tracts, located there in order to have adequate room to keep a horse. If Quail Valley is annexed into the city, as required in the deeds, those residents would have excess property for no purpose, he said.

This meeting, however, Dan, Bill and Glen Spruiell, owners of the oil company, also attended. Dan pointed out that neither he nor any of the company people, had ever been approached by Woodfin over the alleged problems, and he would like to hear what they were.

Woodfin said the firm's equipment was "not kept in proper order, cable was left lying around, vehicles were tearing up the street and often he couldn't pass equipment in the street."

Spruiell said the property had been operated between 1947 and the time they bought it for their company by Arch Hughes, and it was much more a mess then than it now is. He said there would be no problem in keeping traffic open, but he would expect to be allowed to park vehicles on the sides of the street, just like it was allowed in any other part of town.

Both newly-elected aldermen, Eldon Thompson Jr. and Johnny Lee, said they had visited the area and it appeared to them that the Spruiells were both within their rights, and trying to maintain order and cleanliness.

Crawford pointed out that Woodfin suffers the unfortunate situation of having a home adjoining a designated industrial tract, but that he was the only neighbor who complained.

"I don't think 'no parking' is the solution", Crawford said, Woodfin agreed, and then offered to shake hands with each of the three Spruiells over the issue. And they did.

LENGTHY MEETING

Several other important issues developed during the lengthy meeting.

Britton received permission to try an old method of paving streets, by using a maintainer to spread asphalt, rather than a commercial applicator. He said the cost would be about one-third, and was given permission to pave two blocks on North Colorado

as a trial. Aldermen approved a request from Rip Smith to purchase water for a new home site he plans to develop north of Quail Valley. Smith has sold his home on Johnson Road and plans to relocate.

Over the objection of Hicks, who said non-city residents had all the city services without paying city taxes and would never want to be annexed, Alderman Adams moved for approval, and it was passed unani-

and has been in the city limits for more than 25 years, the City will extend its service to the lot line at no meetings would be held unless the cost to the property owner.

"In an unplatted area which has been within the city limits for more than 25 years, the City will extend the service to the property line. Any further extension will be at the property owners expense and no more than one water or one sewer service will be permitted unless the property is properly subdivided and platted in accordance with Ord. 138. "Any other extensions will be at

the property owner or developer's expense and they will be required to bring their lines to existing city facilities.

"All sewer extensions and water extensions must have Planning and Zoning Commission approval as to size of line to be laid. If the Planning and Zoning Commission requires a larger line because of expected city growth than required to service the property owners land, then the City will bear the additional cost imposed.

"The city reserves the right to refuse extension of service if, due to the distance or lift pump requirements, it is not in a financial position to extend the lines."

Councilmen voted to apply for the grant which would be used to revamp the water system.

In other action Tuesday night the council voted to investigate the possibility of having the Seymour Highway caution light be changed to a stop light and that blinking lights be installed on each end of town.

Councilmen decided to continue with the May animal rabies clinic, and voted to allow the Republican primary election to be held at the city hall.

Denney and Maier reported on their negotiations with the school board to install a new fire plug at the school campus.

THE FOLLOWING DRAFT ORDINANCE IS BEING CONSIDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IOWA PARK AND WILL APPEAR ON THE CITY COUNCIL AGENDA ON APRIL 24, 1978.

Alonzo G. Britton City Administrator ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE ARTICLE I. Definitions

SECTION 1. When used in this ordinance, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings ascribed to them below:

Animal -- Any live creature, domestic or wild. Animal Shelter -- Any facility operated by a humane society, or municipal agency, or its authorized agents, for the purpose of impounding or caring for animals held under the authority of this ordinance or state law.

Circus -- A commercial variety show featuring animal acts for public entertainment.

Kennel -- Any lot, building, structure, enclosure, or premises wherein 6 or more animals, 4 months of age or older, are kept or maintained for the purpose of breeding, training, boarding, or raising for profit or pleasure.

Owner -- Any person, partnership, or company owning, keeping or harboring one or more animals. An animal shall be deemed to be harbored if it is fed or sheltered.

Performing Animal -- Any spectacle, display, act, or event other than circuses, in which performing animals are used.

Pet -- Any animal kept for pleasure rather than utility. Public Nuisance -- Any animal or animals which do any of the following:

- A. molest passersby or passing vehicles
- B. attack other animals without provocation C. trespass on school grounds
- D. are at large
- E. damage private or public property

F. bark, whine, or howl in an excessive, continuous or untimely fashion

At Large -- Any animal not secured by a leash or lead, and not physically restrained within the real property SECTION 6. Impoundment fees. The following shall be the fees charged as poundage for taking up the impounding for such animals: per head ten dollars (\$10.00); fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per head for the second time within a twelve (12) month period; twenty dollars (\$20.00) per head in any case in which the same owner's animals are impounded for the third or more times in any twelve (12) month period. Fees for taking care of such animals, per head per day two dollars (\$2.00).

SECTION 7. Unauthorized persons not to impound animals. It shall not be lawful for persons other than those designated in this article to engage in catching or impounding stock; nor shall any reward be given for such catching or impounding, and any person detected driving any of such animals into the City, and any officer or person authorized to impound such animals, detected in offering a reward of any kind whatsoever to any person to catch or impound any such animal, or to drive the same within the city limits, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 8. Records to be kept. The animal control warden shall keep a book giving the description of all animals impounded by him and the date of impounding.

SECTION 9. Detention of trespassing animals. If any of the animals named in Section 2 break into the enclosure or are found upon the premises of anyone, the owner or occupant of such premises shall have the right to confine such animal until he can notify the animal control warden or assistant animal control officers to come and impound such animal; provided the same is done within a reasonable length of time. When so notified, it shall be the duty of such officers at once to cause such animal to be impounded. SECTION 10. Quaranting of rabid dogs or animals and animals which have bitten persons; redemption fee. Every animal that bites, scratches, or otherwise attacks any person or persons within the city limits shall be, upon complaint of the injured person, guarantined and held for a period of ten (10) days in any veterinary hospital approved by the Director of Public Health, in the Animal Control Center, or any other facility approved by the Director of to keep or harbor on any lot or tract within the limits of the city more than one hundred (100) pigeons. Every person who owns, controls, keeps, maintains or harbors any pigeons in the city shall at all times keep them confined in proper cages or lofts; provided, however, that pigeons bearing seamless leg bands issued by a recognized association upon the condition that the owner or person who has possession of such pigeons shall not permit them to alight upon buildings or property of others; and provided further that loft space shall not be less than 12 cubic feet per pigeon.

(h) To feed, breed, stable, pasture, or keep any cow or cows, goat or goats, horse or horses, sheep or any other animal of like species in or on any lot, pen, building, parcel of land, stable or other enclosure, is nearer than one hundred (100) feet to any building occupied by any person or persons any part of the day or night, a minimum of one acre shall be required for each animal.

 (i) The place of feeding, breeding, stabling, pasturing or the keeping of any cow or cows, goat or goats, horse or horses, sheep or any other animal of like species shall be kept free of offensive odors, flies, rodents or other pests.
(j) Animals hospitalized under the care and supervision

of a licensed Doctor of Veterinary Medicine on the premises of an approved Veterinary Hospital or Clinic shall be excepted from the provisions of this ordinance.

(k) Fee for collection and disposal of dead large animals. There is hereby established a fee of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) for the collection and disposal of each dead large animal within the City of Iowa Park. This fee shall be paid either directly to the City of Iowa Park, or to such contractor for remittance to the City of Iowa Park. The term "large animals" shall include animals of like or larger size.

ARTICLE IV Rabies Control

SECTION 14. Reporting rabid dogs and cats. It shall be the duty of the owner, and the harborer, and the practicing veterinarian to report to the Director of Public Health all cases of rabies with which he comes in contact or to which his attention has been directed. This report shall be made immediately upon diagnosis or suspicion of such cases or rabies.

upon payment to the City accounting department a ten dollar (\$10.00) impounding fee and to the Wichita County Humane Society the sum of two dollars (\$2.00) for each day held in the City Animal Control Center, for each dog or cat so redeemed. In a case in which the same owner's dog or cat is impounded for the second time in any twelve (12) month period, the impounding fee shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per dog or cat in any case in which the same owner's dog or cat is impounded for the third or more times in any twelve (12) month period, the impounding fee shall be twenty dollars (\$20.00) per dog or cat. EA

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B. It shall be the duty of the Humane Society and/or its Agents to keep all tagged dogs or cats for a period of one hundred twenty (120) hours from the date of impounding, and all untagged dogs or cats for a period of seventy-two (72) hours from the date of impounding. All such dogs or cats not redeemed within the time shall be destroyed, or adopted, provided, however, that should a dog or cat be destroyed it shall be the duty of the City Animal Warden or his appointed agents to supervise such destruction. All dogs or cats destroyed shall be destroyed by injection of a lethal drug or other humane methods, but in no instance by gunshot.

ARTICLE IX. Barking Dogs; Penalty

SECTION 28. Any person who shall harbor or keep on his premises or in or about his premises, or premises under his control any dog or animal of the canine species which, by loud or unusual barking or howling, shall cause the peace and quiet of the neighborhood or the occupants of adjacent premises to be disturbed, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) and each and every twenty-four (24) hour period that such dog shall remain or be kept on any such premises shall constitute a separate offense.

ARTICLE X.

SECTION 29. Dogs' owners shall securely confine their female dogs while in season within an enclosure in a manner that will prevent the attraction of male dogs to the immediate vicinity.

Sterilization -- In the male, a testectomy; in the female, an ovarectomy.

Veterinary Hospital -- Any establishment maintained and operated by a licensed veterinarian for surgery, diagnosis and treatment of diseases and injuries of animals.

Vicious Animal -- Any animal that by reason of its behavior would constitute a physical threat to human beings or other animals.

Wild Animal - Any animal of the canine or feline species normally found in a wild state, and poisonous snakes, raccoons, skunks, opossums, wolverines and badgers.

Zoological Park -- Any facility exhibiting animals that is operated under the auspices of a governmental agency, or possessing a municipal permit.

Animal Control Warden -- The Police Chief of the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

Animal Control Officers -- All employees for the City of Iowa Park, Texas. Animal Control Officers are under the administrative authority of the Animal Control Warden.

City Animal Control Center -- The Wichita County Humane Society located at Route 1, Box 57A, Wichita Falls, Texas 76301.

Wichita County Humane Society - The City Animal Control Center located at Route 1, Box 57A, Wichita Falls, Texas 76301.

Humane Society Agents - All personnel employed or otherwise providing services for the Wichita County Humane Society.

ARTICLE II. In General

SECTION 2. Animals running at large. The running at large of any animal within the City is hereby declared a nuisance, and positively prohibited, and it is hereby made unlawful for the owner or keeper of any such animals to permit the same to run at large within the City.

SECTION 3. City Animal Control Center. The Wichita County Humane Society shall function as an Animal Control Center for the City of Iowa Park and the Animal Control Warden shall establish procedures for deliverance of any impounded animals to the center.

SECTION 4. Impoundment, disposal of animals, referenced in Section 2 above, found running at large. The animal control warden and animal control officers shall take up and impound any animal found running at large in the city limits. The animal control warden shall immediately deliver said animal to the City Animal Control Center. The City Animal Control Center shall have complete care, custody and jurisdiction until said animal is claimed by rightful owner, adopted, or disposed. Provided that if such animal be diseased or afflicted in any manner to render it worthless or a menace to public health, advertisement that it has been impounded may be dispensed with, and when certificate of any licensed veterinary surgeon shall be filed with the city clerk appropriately describing such animal and the infirmity from which it suffers, and declaring that no reasonable expectation exists for its restoration to a marketable condition, such animal may be destroyed in the manner directed by the Animal Control Warden.

SECTION 5. Redemption of impounded animals. The owner of any animals impounded may redeem the same by: (1) Paying an impoundment fee at City Hall

(2) Furnishing evidence of a current Rabies Shot to the City Clerk when redeeming a dog or cat or paying for a rabies shot at City Hall.

(3) By delivering to the Animal Control Center a receipt showing evidence of payment of impoundment fees and paying to the Animal Control Center two dollars (\$2.00) for each day the animal has been impounded. owner. In the event an owner of the subject animal has not been identified, the victim at his option may elect to have the dog examined by a licensed veterinarian or have tissues submitted for laboratory examination. The costs incurred will be borne by the victim.

Public Health. Any such animal, prior to being redeemed

by an owner, shall be examined by a licensed veterinarian,

and the cost of such examination shall be borne by the

ARTICLE III

Keeping of Domestic Animals

SECTION 11. Keeping of swine prohibited. It shall at any time be unlawful for any person to keep a hog or hogs, a pig or pigs, within the city limits of Iowa Park, Texas.

SECTION 12. Keeping of dogs or cats. Dogs or cats may be kept within the city limits subject to the following:

(1) Each dog or cat shall be registered at City Hall and a tag, good for January 1, to December 31 of each year shall be purchased. An annual fee of two dollars (\$2.00) shall be charged for each tag issued.

(2) Proof of a rabies shot within the past 12 months will be required prior to issuance of a tag.

(3) Each animal must wear the tag at all times.

(4) Compliance with the animal care and rabies control sections of this ordinance.

SECTION 13. Keeping of domestic animals excluding swine, dogs or cats. Keeping of any domestic animals other than swine, dogs or cats shall be subject to the following:

(1) It shall be unlawful to keep domestic animals, other than a dog or cat, within the city limits except in an area zoned for general agriculture.

(2) In addition to being in an area zoned for general agriculture the following steps must be complied with: (a) An animal permit obtained from City Hall which shall be valid from January 1, to December 31 of each year. The animal permit fee shall be two dollars (\$2.00).

(b) At least once a year the health officer or his authorized representative shall inspect every area or place for which a permit has been issued for the keeping of animals or fowls. In case the health officer discovers the violation of any item of sanitation, he shall make a second inspection after the lapse of such time as he deems necessary for the defect to be remedied, and the second inspection shall be used in determining compliance with the requirements of this ordinance. Any violation of the same item of this Ordinance on such second inspection shall call for immediate suspension of the permit.

(c) The person or persons, firm or corporation keeping animals or fowls within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park, shall upon request of the health officer or his authorized representative, permit access to the area or places of keeping of animals or fowls.

It shall be unlawful for any person, person, firm or corporation to violate any of the following:

(d) Keep, harbor, maintain or permit the presence on any lot or parcel of land within the City of Iowa Park any poultry or fowl of any kind, sex or description, closer than one hundred (100) feet to any building being occupied by humans, and then not more than one for each ten square feet of floor or ground area.

(e) Keep any poultry, fowl or fowls within any structure in the City of Iowa Park without scraping the floor of the room, coop, box or compartment and thoroughly cleaning the area within which such fowl or fowls are kept at least once every forty-eight (48) hours and so maintaining such structure or enclosure that no offensive odors are emitted therefrom.

(f) Keep any chickens or turkeys within any structure the interior of which is not whitewashed at least once every six months and without spraying crude oil or some disinfectant on the roosting places at least once in each calendar month to discourage insects, fleas, mites and flies.

(g) Pigeons -- Conditions for Keeping - Releasing in the City Limits. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons SECTION 15. Quarantining of dogs and cats exposed to rabies. Any dog or cat that has rabies or symptons thereof or that has had positive exposure to rabies shall be at once released to the Animal Warden for disposal or, at the direction of the Director of Public Health, confined in a veterinary hospital aproved by the Director of Public Health and shall not be released until a regimen of anti-rabies treatment has been administered.

SECTION 16. Vaccination required. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog or any cat to keep or maintain such dog or cat unless it shall have been vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian or approved anti-rabies clinic with rabies vaccine within one (1) year preceding the date on which such dog or cat is kept and maintained.

SECTION 17. Vaccination of redeemed dogs and cats. Any dog or cat at the City Animal Control Center must be vaccinated against rables subject to the provisions of Section 17 of this article with-in seventy-two (72) hours of being redeemed.

ARTICLE V. Keeping of Wild Animals

SECTION 18. No person shall keep or permit to be kept on his premises any wild or vicious animal for display or for exhibition purposes, whether gratuitously or for a fee. This Section shall not be construed to apply to zoological parks, performing animal exhibitions, or circuses.

SECTION 19. No person shall keep or permit to be kept any wild animal as a pet.

SECTION 20. The Animal Control Warden may issue a temporary permit for the keeping, care, and protection of an infant or injured animal native to this area which has been deemed incapable of surviving on its own.

SECTION 21. The Animal Control Warden with the advice and consent of the Texas Game Management Officers shall have the power to release or order the release of any infant or injured wild animal kept under temporary permit which is deemed capable of survival.

ARTICLE VI.

Performing Animal Exhibitions

SECTION 22. No performing animal exhibition or circus shall be permitted in which animals are induced or encouraged to perform for entertainment through the use of chemical, mechanical, electrical, or manual devices in a manner which will cause, or is likely to cause physical injury or suffering.

SECTION 23. All equipment used on a performing animal shall fit properly and be in good working condition. ARTICLE VII.

Animal Waste

SECTION 24. The owner of every animal shall be responsible for the removal of any excreta deposited by his animal(s) on public walks, recreation areas, or private property.

ARTICLE VIII.

Running at Large, Impoundment and Redemption of Dogs or Cats

SECTION 25. Running at large declared nuisance. The running at large of a dog or dogs, cat or cats within the City is hereby declared a nuisance, and positively prohibited, and it is hereby made unlawful and deemed a misdemeanor for the owner or keeper of any dog or dogs, cat or cats to allow the same to run at large within the city limits.

SECTION 26. Impoundment. It shall be the duty of the City Animal Warden or his deputies to cause to be taken up and impounded all dogs or cats loose and at large, in violation of the terms of this Article.

SECTION 27. Redemption rights; disposal of unredeemed dogs or cats.

A. The owner of any dog or cat impounded in accordance with this Article shall have the right to redeem the same

ARTICLE XI. Animal Care

SECTION 30. No owner shall fail to provide his animals with sufficient good and wholesome food and water, adequate shelter and protection from weather, veterinary care when needed to prevent suffering, and with humane care and treatment.

SECTION 31. No person shall beat, cruelly ill treat, torment, mentally abuse, overload, overwork or otherwise abuse an animal or cause, instigate or permit any dogfight, cockfight, bullfight, or other combat between animals or between animals and humans.

SECTION 32. No person shall abandon an animal.

SECTION 33. No person shall give away any live animals as a prize for, or as an inducement to enter, any contest, game or other competition, or as an inducement to enter, a place of business; or offer such animal as in incentive to enter into any business agreement whereby the offer was for the purpose of attracting trade.

SECTION 34. Any person who, as the operator of a motor vehicle, strikes a domestic animal shall immediately report such injury or death to the animal's owner; in the event the owner cannot be ascertained and located, such operator shall at once report the accident to the appropriate law enforcement agency or to the local humane society.'

SECTION 35. No person shall expose any known poisonous substance, whether mixed with food or not, so that the same shall be liable to be eaten by any domestic animal or person. This Section is not intended to prohibit the prudent use of herbicides, insecticides, or rodent control materials. No person shall expose an open trap of metal jaw type that shall be liable to injure any domestic animal or person.

ARTICLE XII. Enforcement

SECTION 36. The civil and criminal provisions of this ordinance shall be enforced by those persons or agencies designated by municipal authority. It shall be a violation of this ordinance to interfere with an Animal Control Warden, an Animal Control Officer, the Humane Society or the Humane Society Agents in the performance of their duties.

ARTICLE XIII. Severability

SECTION 37. If any section, sentence or clause of this ordinance should be declared invalid, all other provisions shall remain valid and enforceable. This ordinance repeals all other ordinances previously passed which dealt exclusively with the control of animals or pets.

ARTICLE XIV. Penalties

SECTION 38. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance except Section 28, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00). If any violation be continuing, each day's violation shall be deemed a separate violation. If any person be found guilty by a Court of violating Article IV, his permit to own, keep, harbor, or have custody of animals shall be deemed automatically revoked and no new permit may be issued.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, That the Aldermen of The City of Iowa Park, Texas adopt the above Animal Control Ordinance.


