Johnson, Farmer chosen Outstanding Girl, Boy

Kathy Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Johnson, and Billy Farmer, son of Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Farmer, have been named Outstanding Girl and Outstanding Boy of Iowa Park for 1978 in the 15th annual project sponsored by the 23 Study Club.

The recipients and their parents will be honored at a luncheon today in the home of Mrs. Glen Miller to conclude activities of the current year for the club. Mrs. Homer Blalock, chairman of the youth committee, will present U.S. Savings Bonds to the winners.

The 23 Study Club sponsors the annual project but does not nominate anyone for the award. The youth committee this year has been composed of Mmes. Blalock, Earle Denny and Earl Watson. They were in charge of distributing nominations forms to all clubs, churches and individuals who desired them, collecting them and getting them to three educators in Wichita Falls to be judged.

Dr. Arthur Beyer, biology teacher at Midwestern State University, Mrs. Merle Anthony, teacher at Wichita Falls High School, and Mrs. D.C. Copelin, a retired teacher, were this year's judges.

Other young people nominated for the honors were Cynthia Flanagan, Carrie Cole, Lydia Bushfield, Patricia Roberts, Dana Mikkelsen, Norman Flowers, Jeff Taylor, Anthony York and Johnny Griffith.

Kathy has a grade point average of 95.6 and has been a consistent Double A Honor Roll student throughout high school. She was named to Who's Who Among High School Students. She was the recipient of the Daughters of the American Republic Good Citizen Award for 1978, Rotary Student of the Month, January 1978. She was the recipient of Club 95 Certificate from Optimist Clubs of Wichita Falls during Youth Appreciation Week, 1977.

Her service to the school constitutes an enviable record. A seven-year member of the band where she plays the flute and piccolo, she was squad leader two years, section leader and first choir, 1977-78; recipient of "Most Spirited" award in Hawk Band in 1977; and has earned Division I ratings in U.I.L. competition.

In Future Homemakers of America, Kathy has really excelled on local, area and state levels. A three-year member and Outstanding Officer for 1977, she has attained levels one, two and three of the Encounter achievement program. She has held numerous offices in the local chapter, serving as president for 1977-78. She was secretary of Area IV and a voting delegate to the National FHA elections at the National Leadership Conference in Seattle, Washington in 1977.

Kathy has been "Little Sister" for the local chapter of Young Homemakers of Texas and for the Area IV Young Homemakers during 1978. She has attended three area meetings, two state meetings and one national meeting.

She is a two-year member of the Thespian Society and has participated in numerous speech tournaments. She is in charge of Senior Index and deposits and helps with the ad section on the annual staff.

Kathy is a member of First Baptist Church where she is a regular attendant and active in the youth work.

Her extracurricular activities have included member of Blue Birds, Camp Fire Girls, worthy advisor of Rainbow Assembly, two-year finalist in Young Designer Event; attended State Farm Bureau Citizenship Bureau at Baylor University in Waco, and North Texas Citizenship Seminar for Outstanding High School students at the University of Dallas, 1977.

Kathy won first place in the Wichita County Pecan Show for three years and Grand Champion in 1977. She was first runner-up in Wichita County Pecan Queen Contest; first place winner in District Make-It-Yourself with Wool Contest 1976 and second place in State that year.

She was a member of the Bicentennial Art Committee and has participated in community clean-up campaigns. She taught two weeks

of beginning swimming lessons as a volunteer, taught a beginner's six-lessons Food and Nutrition Project for 4-Hers. She is a member of Iowa Park 4-H Club. She has served for four years in Red Cross Bloodmobile visits to Iowa Park.

She is a talented pianist and has received honors in the Baroque Festival, Sonata-Sonatina Festival and National Guild Audition for six years.

Billy Farmer has a grade average of 94.93. Several of the individuals who nominated him for the Outstanding Boy of 1978 described him as "rather quiet and somewhat shy, yet sensitive to his environment and well aware of the pitfalls and temptations the youth of today encounters."

He has an enviable record of attainments in both junior high and senior high schools. In junior high school, he received the two highest honors presented. He received the Principal's award and the Outstanding Youth Award presented by Epsilon Sigma Alpha.

Other honors he has received include Outstanding Boy in the Johnson and Johnson First Aid Course, certificates for outstanding accomplishment in social studies and English. He was named the Outstanding Student of the Month in English by the Opti-Mrs. Club in 1977 and the Teenager of the Month, March 1978, by the Benevolent and Protective Order of

Elks. He is a two-year member of the National Honor Society, serving as vice president this year. He is also a two-year member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and vice president for 1977-78. He is a senior representative on the Student Council.

In high school, Billy has participated in debate, played football and basketball and ran track when he was a freshman. He has been on the varsity track team for three years and on cross-country team one year.

A member of First United Methodist Church, he is president of the Youth Fellowship, member of the youth choir and sanctuary choir, administrative board and Board of Missions. The associate youth director stated if he ever needed someone to depend on that Billy was his choice because of three outstanding characteristics: courtesy, devotion and dependability.

He worked as janitor at Kidds Auto Supply during 1974-75, mowed 7 to 10 lawns from 1974-1977 and is presently working as a nurse's aide at Monterey Manor Nursing Home, working part-time during school and full-time during the summer.

His hobbies are weight lifting, boxing, reading, listening to music, oil painting and sketching with pastels.

Billy plans to go to college and become a qualified physical therapist.

Primary absentee voting is begun

Two weeks remain for persons to vote absentee in the May 6 Democratic and Republican party primaries.

By Wednesday afternoon only two persons had cast Democratic absentee ballots at the Iowa Park election facilities housed in the city-school tax office near Kidwell Elementary. No votes had been cast in the Republican primary.

Election officials said Iowa Park residents may vote absentee here until May 2.

While the Democratic gubernatorial contest between John Hill and Dolph Briscoe continues to catch prominent headlines, activity in the local political arena is beginning to increase concerning races for county judge, county treasurer and county clerk.

Winner in the Democratic primary for Wichita County judge will enter the general election unopposed by a GOP hopeful. Tom Bacus, Ann L. Krempp and Tom Schrandt are all seeking the Democratic Party's support.

Josephine Riner is running unopposed on the Republican ticket for the job of county clerk. The race for the Democratic Party's nomination includes Jerry Padgett, Howard Allison and Clyde B. Freeman Jr.

The Democratic Party's choice for county treasurer will be able to coast into the general election without a GOP opponent. Mary Lynn Welborn, Carl O. Wilson and Bob Terry each are seeking the support of Democrats.

Wayne Wiggins is unopposed in his bid as a Democrat to return as district clerk. He will have no opposition from the Republican Party in November.

Gordon R. Hand also is the only Democrat running for county surveyor and will not face a Republican in the general election. Democrat Virgil Hill is in a similar situation as he seeks re-election as justice of the peace of Precinct 3.

Democrat Charles Finnell and Republican Gail L. Sogard are unopposed for nominations by their parties to the 53rd District state representative post, but will face each other in November.

Jacque Allen is running unopposed for GOP county chairman, and A.F.

"Prof" Edwards is in a similar position on the Democratic ballot.

Horse races have developed among both parties in the gubernatorial contest.

Republicans will have a choice of three candidates for governor, Bill Clements, Ray Hutchison and Clarence G. Thompson while the Democrats will choose from Dolph Briscoe, John Hill, Preston Smith, Donald R. Beagle or Ray Allen Mayo.

Jack Hightower is unopposed for the Democrat Party's nomination to the House of Representative from District 13. Larry Kelly and Clifford A. Jones are seeking the Republican nomination.

Gaylord Marshall is the lone name on the GOP ballot for lieutenant governor, while Democrats will decide among Troy Skates, Bill Hobby, James L. McNeese Jr. and John Hill Westbrook.

Jim Baker is the only Republican candidate for Texas attorney general, but the Democrats have a choice between Mark White and Price Daniel Jr.

Bob Bullock is the only Democrat running for state comptroller, and he will not face GOP opposition in November. Ray Farabee is in a similar position in his bid for a return to the Texas State from District 30, as is Calvin Ashley on his Democratic bid to occupy the bench of the 30th District Court.

James W. Lacy is running opposed for the GOP's nomination for an unexpired on the Texas Railroad Commission, but in November must face one of four Democratic candidates including Jake Johnson, Ray Lemmon, Jerry Sadler and John H. Poerner.

The race for the Democratic Party's nomination to the U.S. Senate will be between Joe Christie and Bob Krueger. The winner will face Republican John Tower in the general election.

The more voluminous Democratic primary ballot has numerous candidates fielded who will not face GOP opposition in November. They include:

In addition to the nominations for offices, both parties will be deciding propositions.

Common to both party ballots will be a proposition that the next session of the Texas Legislature enact a bill to permit pari-mutuel wagering on horse races by local option.

Democrats will be asked if the 1979 legislature should authorize higher interest rates on loans under \$5,000.

Republicans will be asked if the next legislative session should enact a bill to provide for the election of delegates to a political party's national nominating convention by the voters in that party's primary.

Republicans also will be asked if they favor the next legislative session proposing a constitutional amendment to place a limit on the amount of taxes which can be levied by state and local governments.

Oscar Park's new pavillion nears completion this week

Steel work on the new outdoor pavillion at Oscar Park is underway, and the project should be completed in the near future, according to Mrs. David Padgett, reporter for the Parks and Recreation Committee.

The concrete slab was poured a few weeks ago, and supporting steel was erected earlier this week. Members of the Future Farmers of America are to weld the sheet metal roof on the structure today.

The east side of Gordon Lake, located in the northeast part of town, has been cleared of all underbrush, and numerous trees, Cedar Elms, Fruitless Mulberries, as well as Crepe Myrtle, have been planted.

Future plans call for the closing of the street through the east side of the park, building vehicle parking areas on the north and south ends, and fencing off a playground area for toddlers.

Almost all of the work on the park is being done by volunteer help,

through two young men who have been employed through a federal government-financed work program, to take care of the area.

The senior citizens center here is requesting \$6,495 of Title III federal funds to continue its information and referral program for the elderly of Iowa Park.

Local matching funds from the United Way are \$7,491, bringing the center's total operating budget to \$13,986, according to Yvonne Hull, Nortex aging coordinator.

The planning commission's executive committee will consider the request at a noon luncheon today in Wichita Falls.

Heights United Methodist Church in Wichita Falls, she will be working with 11 other people from the church.

The tour will be sponsored by Mrs. James Palmer, wife of the pastor of the church. The group will depart from Wichita Falls June 26 for Dallas, thence to Kennedy Airport, New York City. They will spend several days sightseeing in Amsterdam, Holland, Paris, France and Geneva, Switzerland. From Geneva, they will fly to the northern part of Africa for a three-day orientation program to instruct in the culture and teaching procedures they will follow in Monrovia.

Miss Jones will be working with Mrs. Palmer in the hospital in Monrovia for 40 days. Others will work in the field of education, medicine and general areas where help is most needed. Some will go to Ghana and Sierra Leone. All groups will be working and living under the most primitive condi-

tions. The workcamp will be aided by Tony and Keris Tradeley, missionaries from Texas to Liberia.

After leaving Liberia enroute to the U.S., the young people and their sponsors will go by London for five days where they will view historical and scenic places of interest. They will return to Wichita Falls between August 12-15.

Miss Jones, a sophomore at Iowa Park High School, is a Double "A" honor roll student. Her outstanding achievements have been in music. She has studied piano under Mrs. James A. Sewell for nine years. She has played in the Baroque and Sonatina Festivals and Guild Auditions at Midwestern State University.

During the summer of 1977, she was on a mission tour of the Rio Grande Valley, centering around Harlingen, San Benito and Matamoros, Mexico.

we go." Narrators were Tandra Wilkerson and Suzanne Davis.

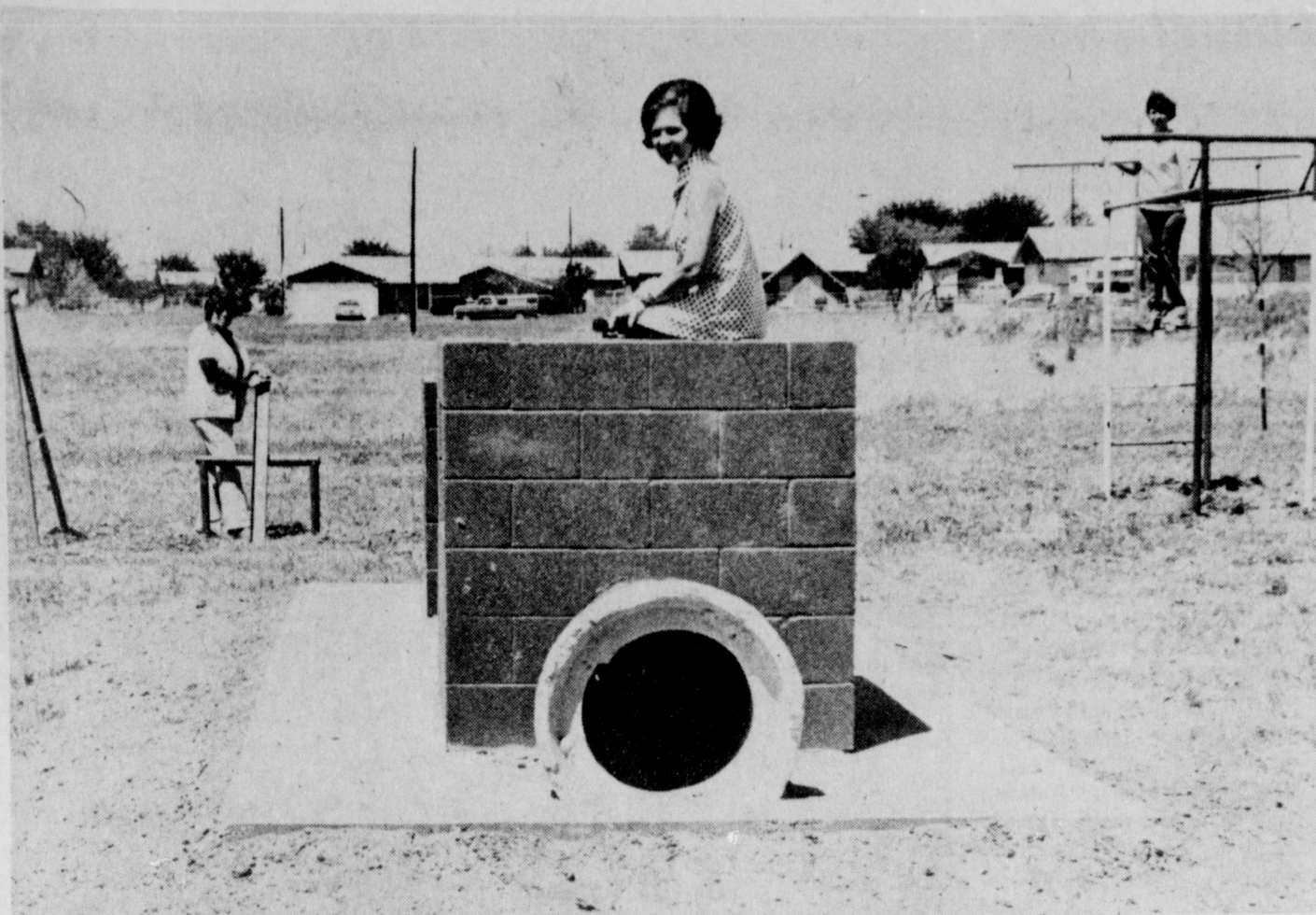

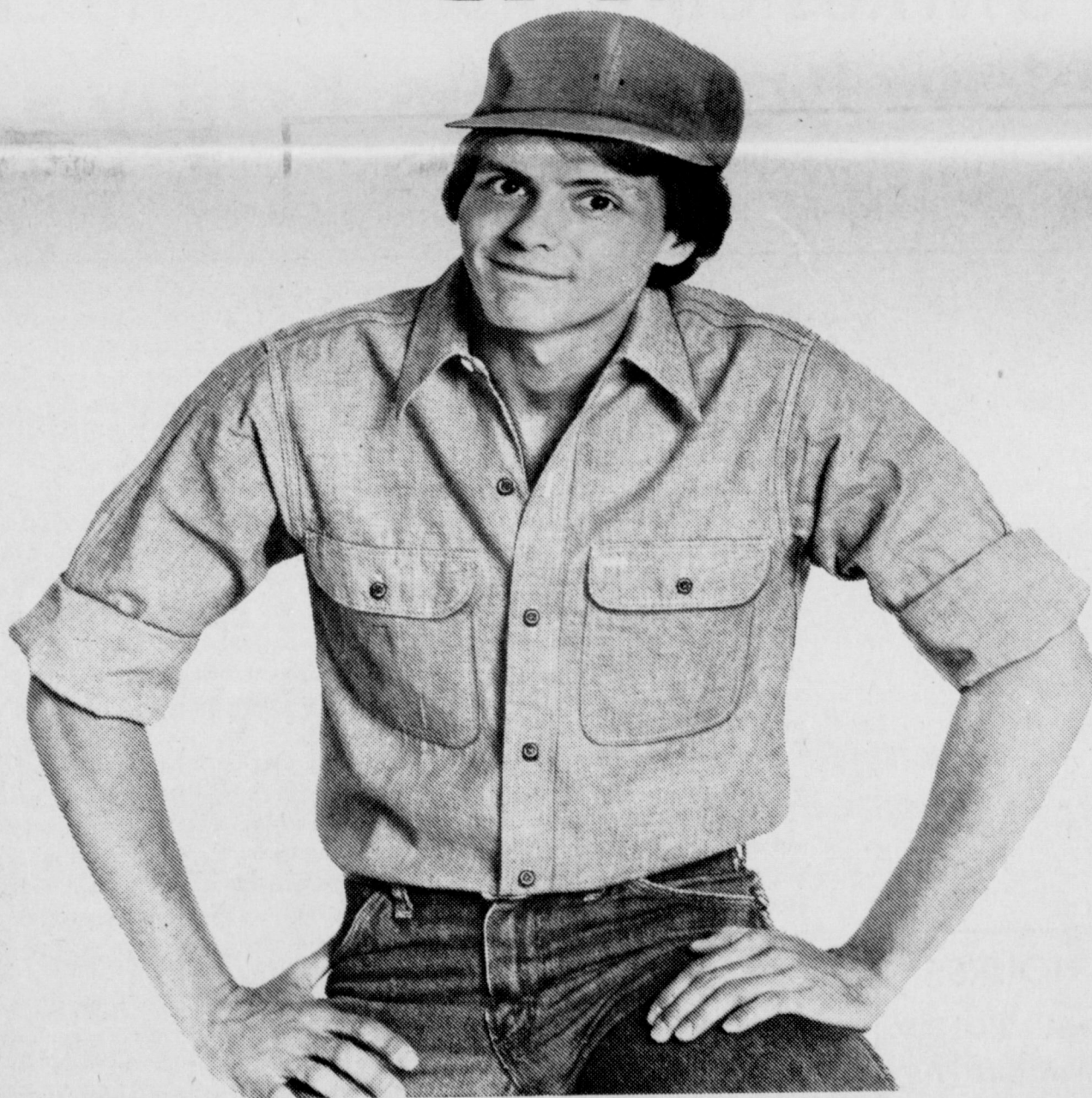

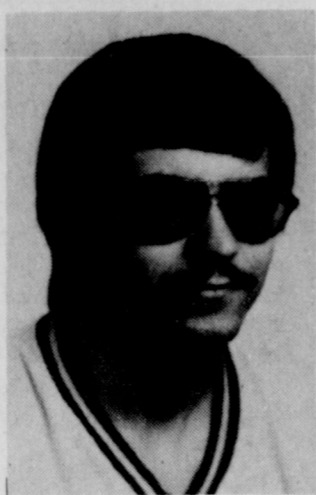
Local student to med school

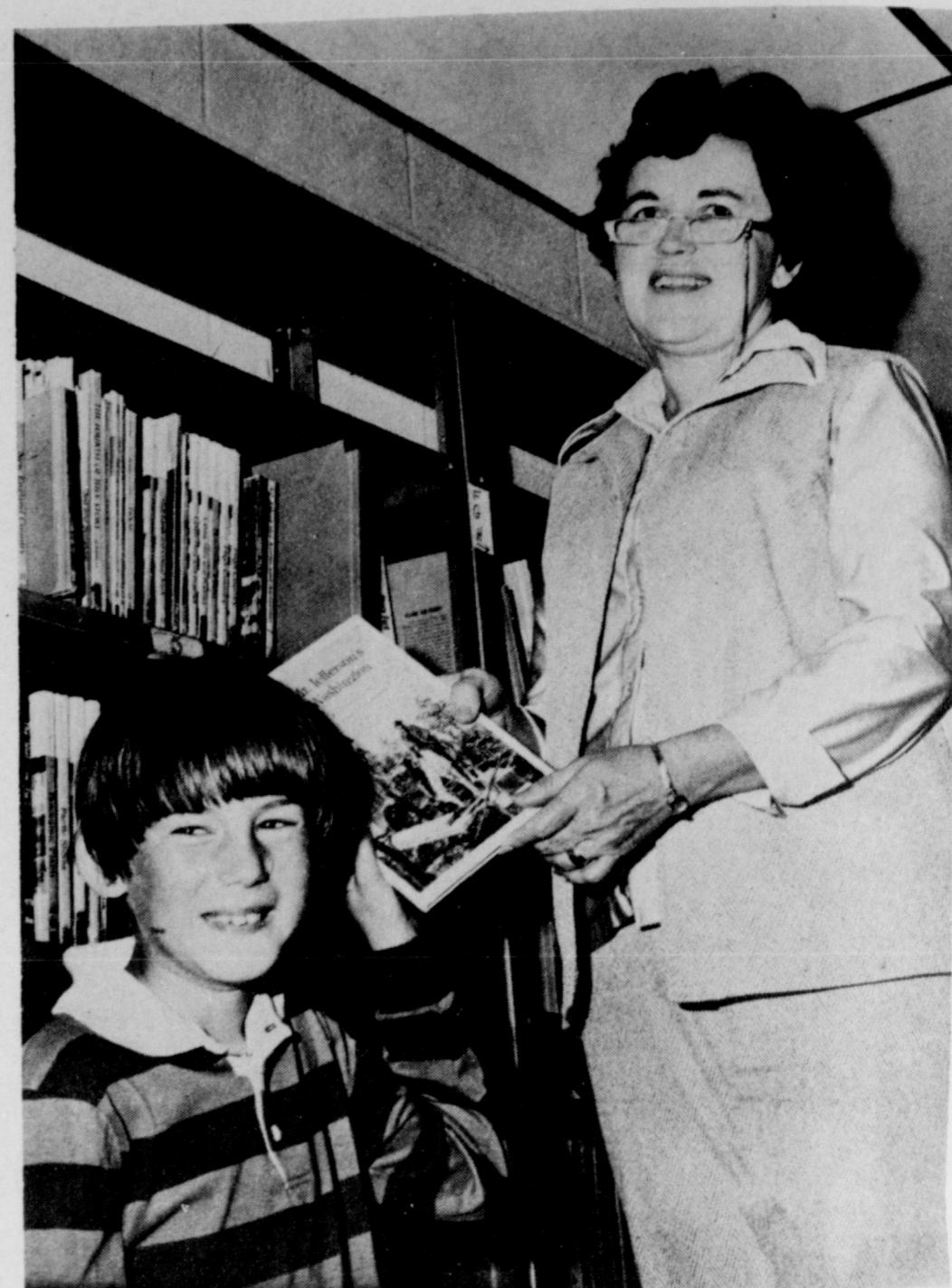

Chamber board hears Clean-Up Week plans

Volunteers, at the end of the day, will be given an opportunity to guess how much money the cans are worth, and the one guessing the closest will receive a \$25 check from Matlock.

In other business, Bill Steger, president, reported 475 tickets were sold for the annual banquet, at a gross of \$2,375, and expenses were \$2,011.

He pointed out that Richard Davis is to be the chairman of next year's banquet, slated for Feb. 10.

Reports were made on the Chamber's membership drive progress by Charlie Lee, chairman; Whoop-T-Do plans, tentatively slated for Sept. 22; and groundwork being carried on to achieve a golf course for the community, made by Rip Smith, one of the workers.

Buddy Berryman was announced as a new Chamber member, and attended the meeting.

Council to consider animal ordinance

Iowa Park city council will consider adopting a revised animal control ordinance Monday, when they meet at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

The ordinance was first discussed at the regular meeting two weeks ago. Because it affected most animal owners, small and large animals, one councilman suggested the proposed ordinance be published in the Leader, to encourage public opinion input, other aldermen agreed, and it was printed.

One portion of the ordinance calls for the required registration of all dogs and pets, as well as rabies shots.

An optional portion of the ordinance, which drew most of the comments at the previous meeting, was not allowing any farm animals to be kept inside the city limits.

The proposed ordinance has consolidated two ordinances already on the books, with a few changes.

Other items which possibly will be on the agenda, according to City

Administrator Gene Britton, are:

- Amend traffic ordinance for placement of new traffic signs.

- Resolution on street opening policy, similar to one just passed on extending water and sewer to property in the city.

- Open bids to sell police car and old fire truck.

- Possible executive session concerning personnel.

- Discussion of annexation of Lake Iowa Park.

- Discuss bad debt collection.

After a lot of in-fighting, both the Democratic and Republican parties have a straw vote on their primary ballots whether the legislature should enact a bill permitting pari-mutuel wagering on horse races in the state.

The big push to get the issue on the ballots came from the Texas Thoroughbred Breeders Association. The issue, by the way, has been voted down twice in the past few years, by narrow margins.

Wichita County residents played a big part in getting the issue on the ballots, by getting petitions signed.

In the March-April issue of The Texas Thoroughbred magazine, workers who got signatures on petitions were listed. County residents identified were all from Wichita Falls and Burkburnett, none from Iowa Park or Electra.

Burk's Stanley Cornstubble was

the leading worker in the county, turning in 470 signatures. He was followed by Cliff Wilson of Wichita Falls, 278.

Another Burkburnett man, Moses G. Castro, turned in 10. Other Wichitans listed were: George Barritt, 100; Mac Connedy, 9; Bill A. Cope, 6; Gene Richie, 26; L.L. Johnson, 21; Carl M. Hall, 15; John McGregor, 11; McGregor Ranch, 13; Garritts Livestock Supplies, 10; and W.R. Lewis, 5.

I expressed my displeasure to Bill Clark, state representative from Tyler and Atty. Gen. John Hill's son-in-law, Tuesday that Hill hadn't seen fit to visit Iowa Park during his campaign trips to the area.

Clark and a group of four workers pulled into town Tuesday morning, handing out campaign literature for a short period.

I told him I thought Hill should be interested in visiting here because we do have the largest voting box in the county, Precinct 32, and since Hill had

been in Wichita Falls some three times in the past few months, he should at least make one stop here.

The same goes for any other candidate, including Gov. Dolph Briscoe. I think any community of 5,000 or larger is due a visit by any candidate for governor.

Speaking of referendums, the action by the Wichita Falls city council, calling for a public vote concerning cable television in that city was about the biggest copout I've ever seen pulled by a governmental body.

It only points out how much clout a handful of people have in that city.

By all rights, the council should call for a referendum the next time a service station proposes to open there. It's no different.

At issue is whether to allow a business to operate in the city of Wichita Falls. Once the business is established, then the people's will can be asserted, whether they buy the service or not.
