# Saturday to climax city-wide clean-up project

As surely as spring arrives in Iowa Park, so will the annual Clean-Up Week.

This week was so designated by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, and Saturday is to be the climax of the observation.

Youth organizations have been asked to work on the community project, as well as volunteer adults, Saturday. Project chairman Joe Matlock has outlined roadsides, vacant lots and parks which are in need of cleaning up by crews.

The workers, who are asked to meet at the Chamber

building at 8:15 Saturday morning, will be given plastic bags, two each. One will be for trash, and the other for aluminum cans. The trash will be picked up by city crews.

Workers are to deposit their aluminum cans in a trailer during the day. Each worker will be given an opportunity to estimate how much the cans will be worth at a recycling plant, and the one guessing the closest will receive a cash prize from Matlock.

Through the day, free soft drinks will be served to workers, compliments of the Chamber.

## CITY PARTICIPATES

Mayor Johnny Crawford signed a proclamation designating this as "Clean-up, Fix-up Week" in Iowa Park.

The city has opened its gates at the sanitary landfill for free dumping during the week. Additionally, city crews not only will be picking up the full bags collected Saturday by volunteers, but is offering to pick up large items at homes.

Those who have large items which cannot be placed in the trash containers are asked to call the city hall and request a pickup, explaining where the item or

items will be.

In his proclamation, Mayor Crawford said: "I call upon the Chamber of Commerce, the youth and other citizens of the community to volunteer their time and, where possible, equipment on Saturday, April 29, for the purpose of gathering rubbish and junk to be hauled to the dump ground as a beautification and health measure, and that during the Clean-up, Fix-up Week there will be no charge for dumping rubbish or junk by citizens of Iowa Park at the dump ground providing the dumping is done according to instructions of the attendant."

# City appears headed for court in gas case

The city of Iowa Park appears to be heading for the federal courthouse in a dispute with the Texas Railroad Commission, according to indications at the city council meeting Monday evening.

An unfavorable ruling by the Commission, which is not yet final but lacks only a formality, has reawakened a dispute between the city and the state agency over the Railroad Commission's legal right to set natural gas gate rates for Iowa Park.

In other business, the council spent slightly more than an hour and a half discussing a proposed new animal ordinance without taking any action, and relieved Bobby Griffith of this duties as water and sewer department superintendent.

A proposed order was sent down by an official of the Railroad Commission (RRC) which would give Lone Star Gas Company about everything it requested in a rate increase proposal a year and a half ago.

City Administrator Gene Britton said Mike Hubbard, former city attorney who has been authorized by the council to continue representing

the city on the case even though he has recently moved to Tyler, is already preparing a response to the proposed order, and it will be heard in Austin in the near future.

Should the appeal not be approved, an injunction will be sought to prevent the rate increase. And if that fails, the city will then seek action through the federal courts, Britton explained to council members.

At issue is a technical case which disputes the RRC's right to establish gate rates for Iowa Park, since the city is served by an interstate gas line.

As Britton explained, the state legislature authorized the RRC to set gate rates for all cities in Texas. The legislature did not, however, take into consideration that some border cities, like Iowa Park, are served by interstate gas lines, and not intrastate lines.

Gate rates are established by the utility company's average price of gas purchase, in and out of state, plus tagging on an eight per cent profit. It also allows for a "cost pass through" which gives fluctuation for what the company pays for the gas at the well head.

Since all the natural gas sold in Iowa Park is produced in Oklahoma, Hubbard contends that gas price is regulated by the Federal Power Commission, which is considerably lower than the price allowed by the RRC.

According to the proposed order Britton referred to, the RRC is to make the order retroactive to September of 1977, and will allow Lone Star to collect a five per cent surcharge until the back losses claimed by Lone Star are collected.

The increase calls for a 11 per cent raise in gate rate, plus the cost adjustment, and the surcharge. Britton said the March gas bill he computed, if the proposed rate were applied, would have been 47 per cent higher than customers payed last month.

In earlier reports concerning the gas rate case, both Hubbard and Britton has received encouragement from an RRC examiner named Austin Bray, that it was doubtful intrastate rates would be applied here. Bray has since resigned, it was noted, and the proposed order was written by another examiner, basing his opinion entirely on written testimony taken in earlier hearings.

## ANIMAL ORDINANCE

Considerable technical information was provided on the proposed animal ordinance discussion by Dr. Thurman Reitz, local veterinarian.

"If you have a fly, you naturally believe it comes from your neighbor's horse, rather than your own garbage can, and it is not necessarily so," he commented.

Reitz said the dominate fly in this part of the country is the common house fly, and they don't go around the pasture or feed lot. He also stated no cattle disease is transmitted by the fly.

When Alderman C.A. Hicks offered a suggestion that persons be able to keep their goats for weed control, but eliminate the horses from town, commenting "We've got to start somewhere", Reitz took exception with the councilman.

The veterinarian said there was more a problem of small animals, such as dogs and cats, in the community, health-wise, than with horses and cows.

Reitz also said he felt the ordinance's requirement to license dogs by the city was "unenforceable", pointing out that people had not, for the most part, taken their dogs to have rabies shots, and they certainly were not going to voluntarily license them with the city.

The issue was finally tabled for some 30 to 60 days, until the city budget is prepared. Mayor Johnny Crawford said Britton had enough to work on with the budget, and the animal ordinance could wait.

Following a brief executive session, called to discuss personnel, the council re-opened the meeting and a resolution calling for dismissal of Griffith was read and approved.

Griffith has been sewer department superintendent several years, and last year was given the added responsibility over the water department when Tom Compton retired.

There was no explanation of Griffith's firing other than that contained in the resolution, which stated in part "The City Council of the City of Iowa Park hereby declares its want of confidence in Bobby Griffith and the position of Water and Sewer Superintendent is hereby declared vacant upon expiration of Mr. Griffith's annual leave."

In other business, the council took

## Trio charged in theft case

Three Iowa Park men face theft charges in connection with last week's burglary of Paul's Stop and Shop at 104 W. Cash.

Richard A. Young, Heston H. Hill and Ruppert F. Beebee, all of Iowa Park, each was charged with theft over \$200. Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill set bond at \$5,000 on each suspect.

Less than a week after Paul's Stop and Shop was burglarized, a traffic violation Saturday night west of Iowa Park led to the arrests.

Department of Public Safety troopers stopped an automobile Saturday night on Harmony Road. The automobile was weaving, according to law enforcement reports.

Troopers discovered a quantity of CB radios and other electrical equipment in the car. Iowa Park Police Department officers were dispatched to the scene.

A list of the merchandise taken in the burglary matched items in the suspect's vehicle. Young was driver of the vehicle, and Hill was a passenger.

Paul Callaway, owner of the store burglarized, was called to police headquarters here and identified the merchandise found in the car as some of the items stolen from his business.

Theft over \$200 charges were filed on Young and Hill Saturday night and they were arraigned Sunday morning by Judge Hill at the Wichita County Jail.

A search warrant was obtained

Sunday night for Beebee's residence, a mobile home at 405 E. Aldine, where other items taken in the burglary were discovered.

Beebee was at a neighbor's home when he was arrested and later charged with theft over \$200.

Almost all the merchandise taken in the April 18 burglary of Paul's Stop and Shop has been recovered, according to Callaway.

Merchandise taken in the burglary, totalling \$2,000, included radios, tape players, CB radios, a television and stereo speakers.

Other members of the cast who gained recognition were Lydia Bushfield, who made All-Star cast at district and honorable mention at area and regional. Steve Anderson made All-Star cast at district and honorable mention at area. Lynn Wright and Connie Jennings complete the cast as space mother and space child. Debbie McCreary, David Hutson and Lisa Shults are the crew for the play.

Carrollton's Newman Smith High was the other AAA winner, along with Iowa Park, and Jefferson High School's entry was named alternate.

Lightsey was driving east on West Highway when his vehicle collided with the eastbound tank truck operated by G.R. Rusk of 521 Clara. Rusk was not injured.

The two vehicles collided when Lightsey attempted to enter the Sonic Drive In, according to Iowa Park police reports.

## Time change this weekend

To the cheers of some, and sneers of others, Iowa Park residents are to join with the rest of the nation this weekend in changing their clocks to Daylight Saving Time.

Residents should set their docks ahead one hour before going to bed Saturday night, in order to be in time with everybody else when they get up Sunday morning.

The official time change is at 2 a.m. Sunday, when all government clocks are set up to 3 a.m.

It'll cost you an hour's sleep Saturday night, but you can go to bed an hour earlier [by the sunset time] Sunday to make up for it.

## Absentee voting is light locally

Using absentee voting as a yardstick, it appears Iowa Park voters have their work cut out for them in the May 6 party primary elections if they hope to continue boasting about Precinct 32 being the biggest box in the county.

By Wednesday afternoon only 10 Iowa Park Democrats had cast absentee ballots in their party's primary election.

Republicans here had not attracted a single voter by Wednesday afternoon.

Absentee voting in both primaries will continue through Tuesday at the city-school tax office located just west of Kidwell Elementary School.

Although absentee voting is far from furious, campaigning for the governor's office and several key county posts is beginning to pick up some speed as the May 6 election date nears.

And the Democrats seem to have a

monopoly on the excitement, at least in this part of the state with John Hill and Dolph Briscoe squared off in the race for the Democrats gubernatorial endorsement. Preston Smith, Ray Allen Mayo and Donald R. Beagle want the Democratic nod also, but are running campaigns nearly as obscure as the GOP hopefuls including Bill Clements, Ray Hutchison and Clarence G. Thompson.

About the only other excitement in the primary can be found in the races for Wichita County judge, clerk and treasurer where a trio of Democrats are butting heads in each race.

Ann L. Krempf, Tom Bacas and Tom Schrandt are on the Democratic ballot for county judge, while Mary Lynn Welborn, Carl O. Wilson and Bob Terry are vying for the Democrat's pledge for county treasurer.

Clyde B. Freeman Jr., Jerry Padgett and Howard Allison are

running for county clerk on the Democratic ballot.

Both parties are asking voters if they think the next session of the legislature should enact a bill to permit pari-mutuel wagering on horse races by local option.

1/8 t salt  
2 T lemon juice  
2 ripe mashed bananas  
9 oz. can crushed pineapple  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/2 cup chopped pecans  
Maraschino cherries, halved  
Mix all ingredients except cherries and pour into muffin pans that have been lined with paper liners. Freeze for at least 6 hours. Remove papers from pan and garnish each with a cherry. Yield: 12 to 14.

### DEVILED EGG MOLD

2 envelopes unflavored gelatin  
1 cup cold water  
2 t salt  
3 T lemon juice  
1/2 t worcestershire sauce

1/4 t pepper  
1/2 t dry mustard  
1 1/2 cups mayonnaise  
1 T grated onion  
1 cup finely diced bell pepper  
1/2 cup chopped pimento  
8 boiled eggs, peeled and chopped  
1 cup finely diced celery  
Sprinkle gelatin over water in large pan. Place over low heat. Stir until gelatin dissolves; remove from heat and stir in salt, lemon juice, worcestershire sauce, bell pepper and dry mustard. Let cool. Stir mayonnaise into cool gelatin mixture; add onion, celery, pepper, pimento and eggs. Spoon into a 6-cup mold. Place in refrigerator for 6-8 hours or until gelatin is firm. Remove from mold and garnish with parsley, lettuce or cherry tomatoes.

### FIESTA CASSEROLE

2 lbs. hamburger meat  
1 large onion  
1 can mild enchilada sauce  
1 small can chopped green chilies  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1 can evaporated milk (1 1/2 cups)  
1 lb. Velveeta cheese, cubed  
15 corn tortillas, cut in quarters  
Brown meat and onions. Drain grease. Combine other ingredients, with the exception of the tortillas. Add mixture to the meat and onions. Put a layer of tortillas in casserole dish, add meat mixture, and so on until all ingredients have been used. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes to one hour. Can be frozen.

# As I See It....

Money doesn't always do the talking. Sometimes it is talked about.

Like right now, for instance. It's contract time for a couple of groups I've been keeping up with in my reading, and they're talking money.

For instance, the postal employee union is making a lot of noise, now that negotiations for a new contract are underway.

According to the wire stories, the postal union people say they've got to have more money. That comes from a group that is reportedly the tops, or among the tops, in salaries among any of the federal employees.

It comes at a time when there have already been mentions about raising postal rates for public mail. Or let me put it another way, keeping personal mail at the same rate, but raising the business mail to 16 cents for an envelope.

Of course, newspapers have been undergoing postal rate increases the past 10 or so years. Like mine is some 400 percent above what it was five years ago, and has automatic built-in increases for the next couple of years. They call it "phasing" up the costs.

I wasn't too shocked when I read about the postal union wanting more money.

What shocked me was a story in the Andrews County News Sunday edition, in which a story reports a meeting between the school board and a group of teachers called the

"Join Faculty Communications Committee".

Andrews is, and has been for many years, among the top three teacher salary schools in the entire state. It's reputation for teacher pay scale is known to about anyone who keeps up with Texas public education, or reads much.

Well, that "committee" wanted to discuss the pay raise for next year, and was concerned because there had not been any agreement on how much it would amount to, yet.

One trustee suggested a six per cent increase, but the "committee" likes 13 per cent more.

A paragraph in the story also caught my eye. It reminded me of several other paragraphs or stories I've been noticing in some of the community newspapers I read from over the state.

The "committee" was there to function as a "voice for the two local teacher organizations, the Texas State Teachers Association (TSTA)

and the Texas Classroom Teacher's Association (TCTA)."

Since the TSTA and TCTA affiliated with the national organization recently, they've started acting more like a union.

In those exchange papers I mentioned, whenever there was a teacher contract in dispute, there was a TSTA "observer" out of Austin in attendance, and he did more talking than observing, according to the articles.

Some of the more conservative educators who voted against national affiliation said this was what was coming. They were right.

And unless the TSTA makes a break from the national group, and starts acting like Texans once again, there's going to be turmoil in public education in this state in the future. The TCTA was militant long before the groups affiliated nationally.

But you can put that last paragraph in your scrap book and refer to it in five years. You'll see what I mean.

## Vocation training taxpayer's bargain

Besides training students with employable skills, the vocation department at Iowa Park High a real bargain for local taxpayers, the Noon Lions Club was told Tuesday.

Harold Cowley, director of

vocational training, said almost 65 per cent of the school's 742 enrollment is costing local taxpayers very little, less than \$11 per student.

Besides most of the equipment and teacher salaries being paid by the state, students themselves have raised some \$40,380 to offset their costs and expenses, Cowley said.

The average daily attendance in vocational courses, through April 25 of this school year, was 479. Costs from local funds have been \$5,137.45, he explained.

Breaking down the departments, number of averaged daily students, local tax money spent, per student expenses, and funds raised by students, Cowley reported: Occupational Agriculture, 91.3 students, \$1,426 cost, \$15.62 per, \$1,426 raised;

additional person was needed in the system, that of job placement. He reported numerous calls are received by the department on a regular basis, from potential employers seeking trained students.

Cowley said he would like to see vocational enrollment increase from its present level to 70 or 75 per cent of

the high school student body.

He pointed out, however, that the classes are operated in such a manner that vocational students can also be adequately prepared for college. The national average, according to studies, shows only 20 per cent of the jobs require a college education, he said.

council to supply a deputy for police protection inside the city limits of Holliday.

A factor in his decision to reconsider the request, Hoggins said, was the fact that he furnishes inner city police protection at Archer City. He said he wanted to be fair with Holliday.

Sheriff's department protection in Holliday is

expected to be handled similar to the operation in Archer City.

The City of Holliday would be required to purchase a new patrol car and pay Archer County \$1,200 a month for use of the special deputy.

The sheriff's department would supply the officer and pay his salary, insurance and retirement in addition to

maintaining the operation of the patrol car which would be replaced every three years by the county.

Hoggins said he would require the officer to live in Holliday.

"His primary job would be right here in the city of Holliday," Hoggins told councilmen. If the deputy were needed outside the city limits in an emergency, he

would be dispatched beyond his normal patrol limits, Hoggins said. Likewise, Hoggins said he would not hesitate to send deputies elsewhere in the county to assist the deputy stationed in Holliday.

Several particulars in the proposal remain to be ironed out, especially in deciding who the Holliday deputy's direct superior would be. It was suggested if the council were disgruntled over police work, they would direct their comments to Hoggins, who would be directly responsible for the Holliday deputy.

On a motion by Alderman Fred Maier, the council unanimously voted to advertise for bids on a new patrol car and pursue negotiations with Hoggins.

If approved, it would be at least two months before the program becomes effective to allow for delivery of a new patrol car and the hiring of an officer.

In airing the pros and cons of the proposal, Maier noted the city had been spending about \$1,100 a month to furnish its own officer.

The county will be able to pay the Holliday deputy a higher salary, plus insurance and retirement which the City of Holliday does not provide.

Holliday also would receive protection seven days a week. The Holliday deputy would work mostly nights, five days a week. On his nights off, another Archer County deputy would assume duties inside the city limits.

Holliday has been without police protection since Feb. 24 when officer Dennis Rees resigned. It was estimated Holliday is without police protection about two months of the year due to high turnover.

Hoggins also said misdemeanors such as traffic violations and public intoxication would be filed in Holliday's municipal court.

#### DOG CATCHER HIRED

Elvin Hoover, city employee, was contracted by the council to be the city animal warden.

Hoover will receive an additional \$50 a month plus use of a city pickup and gasoline. Hoover asked the council to clearly define his duties to avoid conflicts.

John Harrigal, fire chief, asked the council if city employees could periodically check the fire trucks for flats, dead batteries and other mechanical malfunctions. The council agreed with Harrigal's request since city workers are near the fire fighting equipment daily.

Harrigal's request that Holliday host a fireman's convention in September also was approved. Only cost to the city will be use of water for competition among departments.

On a 3-2 vote with aldermen Jim Virdell and Melvin Bills dissenting, the council voted to table action on a proposal to deed three lots on the Iowa Park Road to the city.

The land had been given to the fire department by Garland Ray. Harrigal said the fire department wants to give the land to the city.

On a motion by Alderman Mike Parker, the council decided to table action to allow time to study the deed and property.

In other action Tuesday night the council:

-Voted to apply for a federal community development block grant to be used for water system improvements.

-Heard a committee report from Bills on possible appointments to various city posts such as city judge, fire marshal and building inspector.

-Heard a report from Mayor Ben Ezzell that Arthur Carter, Archer County commission, would be willing to help the city with a street paving and resurfacing project.

-Heard a report from Ezzell that the state highway department will make a survey of traffic on Seymour Highway to decide the need for a stop light.

-Discussed dump ground operations with Tom Hall. All members of the council were present Tuesday night in addition to nine visitors.

The annual municipally-sponsored rabies vaccination clinic is scheduled for May 20, said Evon Carter, city secretary.

A licensed veterinarian

will be at Holliday City Hall from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. May 20 to vaccinate dogs and cats. There will be a \$5 fee for each animal vaccinated. Mrs. Carter said.

Three Hawks thinclads will advance to Saturday's regional track meet after qualifying in the Dist. 4-AAA meet last Saturday at Vernon.

Jim Dooley won the pole vault, as did Kip Fuller in the discus event, and miler Anthony Crittenden placed second.

The Hawks placed seventh among varsity teams, not getting a break at any turn, other than Fuller recovering from a season-long back ailment.

They were only three and a half points out of fifth place. Easily those few points could have been made up had sprinter Troy Thompson been physically ready, or a handoff not been missed in the sprint relay, or half miler Scott Stubbs not been edged by a scant three-tenths of a second and also qualifying for the regional, just to name a few.

4 AAA gold medal, but he was frustrated by not being able to set a new standard. Graham's Grimes set that mark last year, 14-3, when he beat Dooley for the conference crown.

Crittenden continues to run in the shadow of Burkburnett's Andrew Daniels in the mile event. The Hawk distance man turned in a respectable 4:33.30, but the Bulldog runner had a
