Mayor instructs police to shut down speeders

The Iowa Park Police Department was instructed to take a get-tough position on traffic violators in the city, aldermen were told water could become a critical issue, and some insight into next year's cost of city operation, during Monday's regular meeting of the city council.

Mayor Johnny Crawford told Chief Jim Voyles to have his personnel start cracking down on speeders, running of stop signs, and controlling excessive noise of vehicles.

"Our streets are beginning to look

like race tracks," the mayor commented while instructing Voyles. Additionally, the city hall is receiving numerous complaints of loud vehicles, not only on the streets but being worked on in residential neighborhoods.

Voyles explained attempts to catch speeders with the radar unit were often times foiled because of citizen band radio units. "They know where we are as soon as we set up," he told Crawford.

"I don't care how you do it, as long

as it's within the law. But we've got to stop this speeding and make our streets safer," Crawford said.

About excessive noise of vehicles, Voyles said "What you're talking about, we've already started."

WATER SITUATION Not only are the city's water supply lakes becoming alarmingly low, due to dry conditions, but the water treatment plant is so limited in its capacity, that City Administrator Gene Britton is considering increas-

ing purchase of water from Wichita Falls. He explained the cost of producing water in the city's plant is almost as expensive as buying it, a spread of about two cents. The savings of operating the plant part time while buying more Wichita Falls water

might offset the cost, he said. Iowa Park has not taken any Wichita Falls water for about two months, due to an equipment supply problem. That is another reason why the lakes are as low as they are, he told the council.

Britton said the piece of equipment had been on order a month and a half, but the manufacturer's plant was closed by a strike, which reportedly ended this week.

The administrator explained that it requires the same manpower, over a 24-hour period, to operate the city's water plant that produces a million gallons of water daily, as it would if the plant had a three-million capacity. He is studying the possibility of closing the plant at night, during the

off-peak season, to hopefully save money.

BUDGET

In a brief review of the tentative budget, Britton's proposal is to increase most employee salaries, to keep up with inflation. However, in many departments, manpower cuts offset most financial increases, when compared with last year's budget, he explained.

When asked if there was a possibility of a tax decrease or an increase in property tax deduction for elderly, both Britton and Crawford said it was still too early to say yes or no.

Crawford appointed each of the aldermen to areas of responsibility. He named Lita Watson over parks, and also as mayor pro tem; Eldon Thompson over police; Johnny Lee over streets; C.A. Hicks over sanitation; and Bud Adams over sewer and water.

OTHER BUSINESS In other business, the council held a required public hearing on proposals to spend revenue sharing money, but no one other than city personnel had any suggestions; aldermen confirmed hiring of Kurt Cullum, former Wichita Falls jailer, on the police force; heard a report from Britton on a block grant pre-application; held an executive meeting concerning a suit against the city; and heard a report by the administrator about the previously approved project of codification of ordinances.



County re-evaluating portion of Iowa Park

Residents in the west portion of Iowa Park will be receiving notices of



property re-evaluation for 1978 this weekend from the Wichita County tax assessor/collector office.

Miles Graham, appraiser for the office, said notices for 1978 taxes would be mailed this afternoon. Iowa Park has been divided into three sections, for re-evaluation.

This year the area includes that property west of Pacific, north of the railroad tracks, and bordered by the city limits. In 1979, the area affected will be

east of Pacific, north of railroad tracks, to the city limits.

No "open land" is being re-evaluated this year, according to the appraiser, other than where new construction is being completed. Graham included the communities of Valley View, Kamay and Kadane Corner as open land.

He said open land was re-appraised in 1975 and 1976.

The county's re-appraising pro-gram was launched in Wichita Falls last year, causing a considerable their taxes were raised three and four times.



Local resident pays fine following chase

In the wake of a high speed chase that ended Saturday night north of Iowa Park, an Iowa Park man was fined \$297 yesterday in Wichita Falls municipal court.

Usaldo G. Fernandez of Iowa Park was fined \$203.50 after being found guilty of alluding a police officer, and he was fined \$93.50 after pleading guilty to a charge of speeding 100 miles per hour in a 50-mile-per-hour zone, according to a clerk in Wichita Falls municipal court.

The clerk said the state dismissed charges against Fernandez for no driver's license and failure to stop. Capt. W.E. Davis of the Wichita Falls Police Department said the chase began Saturday night on the Old Iowa Park Road inside the Wichita Falls city limits.

Fernandez allegedly floorboarded

his car when Davis tried to stop him after clocking the suspect by radar for speeding.

Davis said the chase took them into Iowa Park via Old Iowa Park Road. through several Iowa Park streets and out east of the city limits. After taking several rural routes and gravel roads, Fernandez was finally apprehended 31/2 miles north of the expressway on FM368, Davis said. Davis, who reportedly fired several

shots at the fleeing car, stopped Fernandez by ramming the suspect's car with his police cruiser.

The chase, which began about 8 p.m., resulted in both vehicles being towed away by wreckers.

The Iowa Park police were not involved in the chase, said Iowa Park Police Chief Jim Voyles.

All the shooting, at least five shots,

reportedly was done inside Iowa Park, in a residential area. Several phone calls were taken at the local police station, complaining about the shots.

Gerald Walsh, a resident of 305 E. Washington, was extremely upset by all the shooting that took place in his neighborhood.

"There were a lot of people who came out of their homes when they heard the siren, and they could have been hit by one of the bullets. Everybody started running when they heard the shots, trying to take cover," Walsh told the Leader.

Walsh said he felt Capt. Davis owed the city of Iowa Park "an apology for what he did here. It's a very serious thing, and could have been disasterous."

Chief Voyles said the Wichita Falls

cruiser had only some 5,000 miles on it when he rammed the car. He, too. was critical of the Wichita Falls officer for firing his gun in the residential area, according to his report Monday at the city council meeting.

Padgett polls most votes in primary Saturday

Iowa Park's Jerry Padgett pulled off a Derby Day finish winning the Democratic Party's nomination for Wichita County Clerk with the largest percentage of votes garnered by any county candidate.

Wichita Falls attorney Tom Bacus skated into the Democratic Party's nomination for county judge, but Democrats will be called back to the polls in June to decide a runoff in the county treasurer's race.

Padgett, a lifelong Iowa Park resident supported by retiring County Clerk Dora Davis and retiring County Judge Hank Anderson, emphasized in his campaign the experience he had as chief deputy county clerk.

Easily carrying the five Iowa Park area boxes, Padgett garnered 10,765 votes throughout the county trailed by Clyde B. Freeman Jr. with 1,376 and Howard Allison with 2,288.

In the November general election Padgett will face Josephine Riner, who was unopposed in her bid for the Republican nomination.

While Padgett captured almost 76 cent of the total county Democratic votes. Bacus was handed the county judge job with almost 63 per cent of the ballots cast.

Bacus, who will not face GOP opposition in November, was nominated with 9,236 votes followed by Ann L. Krempp with 3,737 and Tom Schrandt with 1,779.

With neither candidate gaining a majority of the Democratic ballots, Mary Lynn Welborn and Bob Terry must continue their campaigns into a June runoff election for county treasurer.

Welborn made the best showing with 6.977 votes to Terry's 3,799. Carl Wilson was eliminated with 3,589 votes. Whoever takes the Democratic nomination will not face a GOP opponent in the general election.

Also on the local scene, State Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday was unchallenged in his bid for Democratic renomination to District 53, as was GOP hopeful Gail L. Sogard. They will unleash their campaigns for the November election.

Iowa Park's Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill was unopposed in his quest for the Precinct 3 Democratic nomination and will go unchallenged by Republicans in November.

U.S. Rep. Jack Hightower handily took the Democratic nomination for the 13th Congressional District, and will face Clifford A. Jones, winner of the GOP nomination over Larry Kelly.

In Wichita County Jones received 554 votes to Kelly's 523.

Precincts 32, 33, 34, 35 and 60 combined to give Jones the local GOP nod with 32 ballots while Kelly took 21 votes here.

With the exception of the governor's race, Wichita County Democrats joined Texans in all other races including rejection of two proposals which would have allowed the legislature to enact bills to allow pari-mutuel horse racing by local option and higher interest rates on loans under \$5,000.

Wichita County joined the state in nominating Bob Krueger to the U.S. House of Representatives, Bill Hobby as lieutenant governor, Mark White as Texas attorney general, Warren G. Harding as state treasurer and Reagan V. Brown as agriculture

commissioner.

The importance of name identification also was illustrated in Saturday's primary election with Jerry Sadler gaining the Democratic Party's nomination to fill an unexpired term on the Railroad Commission. As a legislator, Sadler is the only Texas lawmaker in recent times to be publicly censured by the Texas House of Representatives.

Although Sadler succeeded in winning his party's nomination he will face GOP hopeful James W. Lacy in November.

It was in the governor's race that Wichita County Democrats differed from the rest of the state. Attorney General John Hill was successful in his bid to oust incumbent Dolph Briscoe: however, Briscoe took the edge in Wichita County.

Republicans will be fielding Bill Clements against Hill in November. Across Wichita County Clements polled 677 votes, trailed by Ray Hutchison with 438 and Clarence G. Thompson with 28.

Republicans from the combined five local precincts supported Clements with 33 votes. Hutchison had 21 and Thompson garnered two votes.

Quoting from a study by Common Cause (Unsell doesn't like the organization but found its study interesting), labor donated \$2,314,000 to political campaigns in 1976, whereas only \$809,000 was given by all the nation's energy producers, including oil, coal, electricity, etc.

That 1976 labor campaign donation doesn't sound bad, but it went into the campaigns of only 13 candidates in 1976. The energy producer figure was for all politics in 1976.

One of those 1976 recipients of labor funds was Sen. Jose Montoya of New Mexico, who received \$101,000, Unsell said.

The Washington-based Unsell stated that labor was funding only those politicians who are against business. And he said, "I expect, before I retire nine years from now, to see the oil industry nationalized, as well as steel and others, just like Great Britain.'


