# Trustees reject appeal to continue career education

Iowa Park school trustees Thursday night rejected a request to reconsider dropping the career education program.

The request was made by Tom Venhaus, president of the Iowa Park unit of Texas State Teachers Association, who read from a prepared statement that "the classroom teacher can best see the overall effect of Career Education on the students of Iowa Park."

Board chairman Bill Spruiell, following a lengthy and at times heated discussion of the issue between trustees and Venhaus, said the board would stay by what it had already decided, and not pay from local funds for the program.

Spruiell pointed out that when the former board had approved the program, initially funded by the state, the approval had been made with the understanding, written into the minutes, that it would not continue the program with local funds.

After stating the teachers could see the effect, Venhaus continued reading "It is for this reason that I have been asked to speak for the teachers of the Iowa Park School District concerning the nonrenewal of the Career Education Program."

"We are asking that you reconsider the full reinstatement of the Career Education Program. We do not expect a decision this evening."

"It is our feeling that Career Education is an integral part of our school curriculum. No other program reaches the entire school population for the monetary outlay. If the Career Education Program is terminated there will no longer be any Career Visits or Resource Speakers because of coordination problems."

"The scheduling of Career Visits and Resource Speakers by classroom teachers would require the use of valuable classroom instruction time. Students will no longer learn such values as responsibility, social adjustment, proper work attitudes and good work habits."

"If the Career Education Program cannot be fully reinstated we propose that a committee of trustees, and a teacher from each campus study the feasibility of continuing the program for the next two years," Venhaus read.

Spruiell asked Venhaus why career education was not state and federally funded if it is so important.

Venhaus responded that agencies of both governments are looking at the program from an overall standpoint, and that career education is "among top priorities for 1980." He

then referred to a copy of a report sent to the state agency that the local district would pick up the costs if state did not fund the program.

Spruiell then corrected him by stating the minutes of the board indicated the local district would not continue to fund the program.

The board president, referring to a TSTA meeting of local members at which members voted whether career education should be continued, said he had been told by some teachers they had been required to sign the back of their ballots, thus being accountable as individuals.

Venhaus denied he had instructed members to sign the ballots, as did others of some 30 teachers and staff

personnel seated in the audience.

## OTHER BUSINESS

The board accepted the lowest of three bids to re-roof the junior high gymnasium. Armour Roofing bid \$6,539, B&M Roofing \$8,499 and Menasco Roofing \$10,375.

Trustees approved adjusting the school calendar to use May 20 as a makeup day for time lost during bad weather last winter.

Mrs. Alan Gilstrap presented a proposal that the Kidwell P-TA be allowed to construct playground equipment on the school campus. She said funds would be solicited by the organization to fund the program, and was told that the board had budgeted

\$1,000 for each campus for improvements and that could help.

Another proposal was given concerning improvements at Kidwell. The P-TA is wanting to aircondition the cafeteria, only part of the structure now without airconditioning.

Trustees wanted a more in-depth study, when it was noted that the plans call for 28 tons of airconditioning be installed, and only a five-ton unit was used at the junior high cafeteria.

Band director David Mooney proposed he and Mark Cartwright be allowed to hold a two-week band camp at the junior high campus this summer. Fee would be \$15 for the

clinic, to last June 5-16. The board approved.

Also approved was a proposal that drivers education tuition be raised from \$35 to \$45, and that driving teacher salary be increased from \$5 to \$6 per hour.

The board rejected both bids to sell a 1966 bus, when Bill Steger suggested it was in good condition and the engine alone was worth what was bid.

Steger told the board next year's bus routes would be cut by one.

Cafeteria workers were raised from \$2.55 to \$2.75, and managers from \$3.42 to \$3.65. The mechanic's monthly salary was raised from \$850 to \$900.

Bus driver salaries vary due to time and length of routes, Steger explained. Lowest salary paid this year is \$235 and highest \$290. Salaries will range from \$255 to \$310 next year.

All salary adjustments become effective in August.

Darrell Dick, high school choir director, received a pay raise similar to ones previously approved for Mooney and Cartwright, \$600, making his above-state salary \$2,850.

When it was pointed out that Carolyn Richter was not receiving compensation for sponsoring the junior high pep squad, trustees approved a \$150 bonus, retroactive this year.

Trustees discussed with Supt. Faris Nowell his proposal to offer a reward in an effort to curb vandalism on the school campuses. Unable to reach an agreement on the wording of the reward notice, they turned the

subject over to the school's legal council for preparation.

## Busy school activities

### Classes Saturday

All Iowa Park schools will hold classes Saturday, to make up for a day lost due to weather last winter, according to Supt. Faris Nowell.

Classes will commence at 8 a.m. and be dismissed at 12:15 p.m. Buses will run about 10 minutes earlier than usual, according to Bill Steger.

The administration states the make-up day will be a regular school day, with attendance required. Absence without an acceptable excuse forfeit test exemption status, it was pointed out.

### Baccalaureate Services

Baccalaureate services for the Class of 1978 will be held at 6:30 p.m. Sunday in the high school auditorium.

Sermon will be delivered by Kenneth Flowers, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Others on the program include Kenneth Davis, invocation; scripture, Bob Dawson; benediction, Faris Nowell; special music by the choir; processional and recessional by Janis James.

Commencement exercises will be held the following Friday evening in Hawk Stadium, weather permitting, starting at 8 p.m.

The annual Iowa Park High Spring Sports Banquet will be held at 7 this evening in the school cafeteria. Tickets are on sale at the school, at \$3 per person.

### Project open house

Students of Iowa Park High Building Trades class will hold open house this evening and tomorrow at the project home they built this year.

Hours will be 6 to 9 this evening, and 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Friday, according to Gary Lyles, instructor.

Located at 708 W. Texas, the brick home has already been sold to Mr. and Mrs. Bob Jones. Mrs. Jones is on the school faculty.

The three-bedroom, two-bath home contains 1,590 square feet of living space and has a 496 square foot garage. Construction was begun in September by the 28 students of the class.

Landscaping was done by students of the Ornamental Horticulture class, under supervision of Jimmy Howell.

### Kindergarten

The annual screening and registration program for kindergarten age children is scheduled for Monday, May 29th.

All children who will be five years of age on or before Sept. 1 will be screened according to the following schedules:

Kidwell students will report to their building at 8:30 a.m. and be dismissed at 11:30.

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## Chamber membership drive successful, directors told

Efforts to increase membership in the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce have been paying off, Charlie Lee reported Monday at the monthly meeting of board members.

Seven business memberships were signed up, two were changed from individual to business, and three individual memberships as well, accounting for an additional \$756 annual income for the organization.

Businesses signed up included Auger Sales and Service, Spruiell Drilling, James Maloney CPA, Barbour Insurance, Iowa Park Airconditioning, David Parkey and Gilmore Welding, Mercer Electric and Park Tank changed from individual to business memberships.

New individual memberships reported were O.L. Tucker, Robert Doan and Allen Shewmake.

Directors voted to increase annual dues to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce from \$30 to \$45, and also

to continue the organization's practice to send flowers to formal openings of new businesses in the community.

Directors rejected a request to make a cash donation from the Chamber to the Jaws of Life Fund, but encouraged all members to support the project with donations.

Dates for two Chamber functions were discussed. The annual Crazy Day retail promotion will be July 29, and the Whoop-T-Do celebration will be in September.

Reports on the Clean Up Day project and efforts to build a golf course were made.

Joe Matlock, chairman of the Clean Up Day, said very little individual volunteer help turned out, but response from citizens to have large items picked up by the city, as well as individuals hauling trash to the sanitary landfill, was outstanding.

Alan Gilstrap reported the committee had learned there is no federal money available to help build a golf course, other than a matching fund for purchase of land. The committee

will continue its efforts to determine if the site under consideration is adequate for 18 holes, and in seeking help on design and installation of a course.

## Iowa Park, Holliday schools chosen for education program

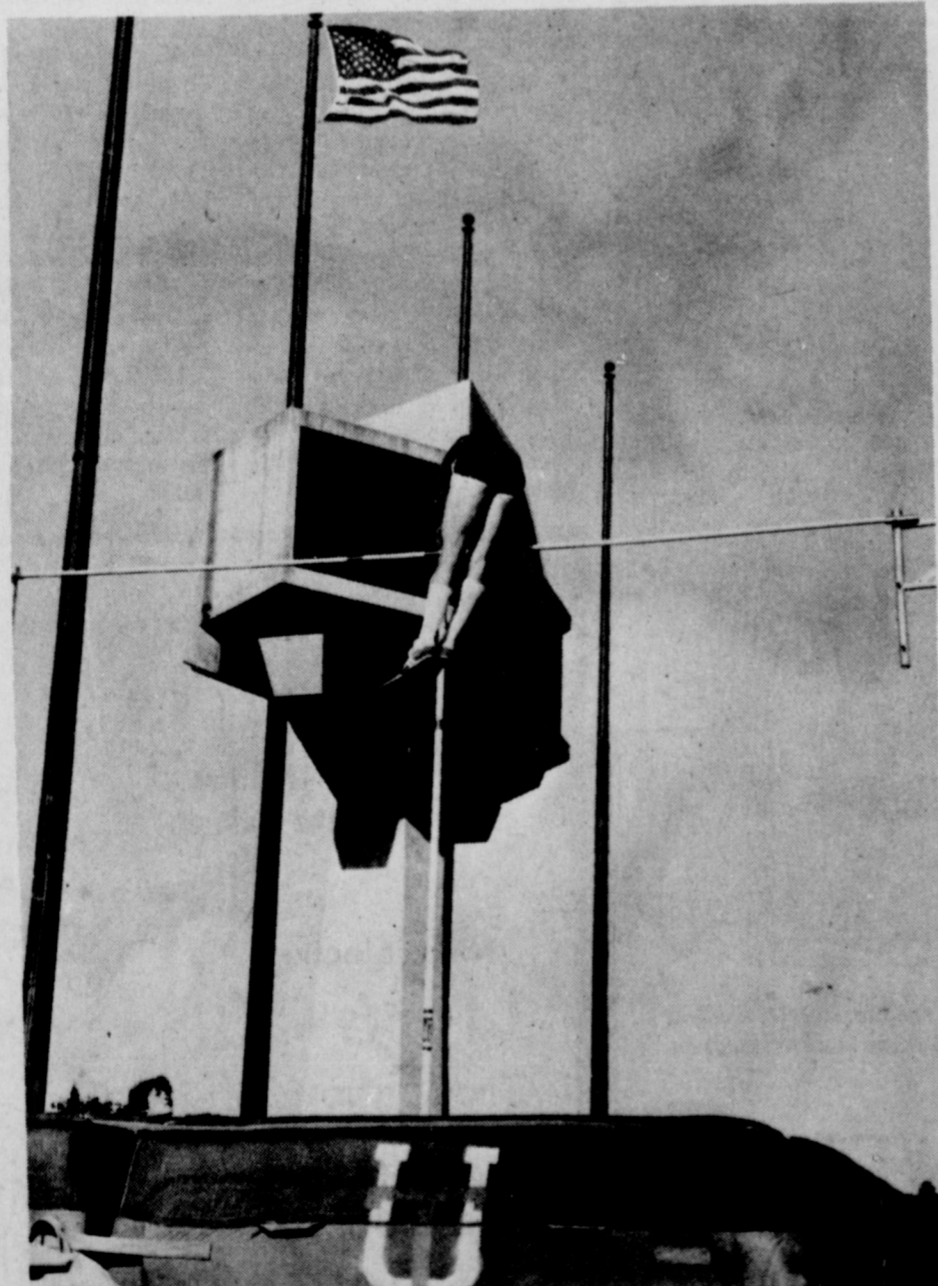
Iowa Park and Holliday schools have been selected by the Texas Education Agency as demonstration schools for "individualized instruction" in special education.

Supt. Faris Nowell said he was informed Tuesday of the selections.

Starting next year, the program will be offered to students in grades one through four at Bradford Elementary. The program is to continue through May of 1980.

Nowell said the program is no different than that which has been offered to special education students here in the past, except that representatives of other schools over the state will visit here at various times to observe class in progress.

State support will come in the form of a substitute for Janice Bridwell, teacher, when she is asked to speak at meetings or is asked to spend time with visitors.

## Street dance to be asked

Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department will ask permission to sponsor a street dance at Monday's regular city council meeting set for 7 p.m. in the council chambers.

The fire department will be asking permission to rope off a section of Cash for a June 3 street dance to help raise money for purchase of "Jaws of Life" rescue equipment.

Councilmen are slated to hold a budget work session and select auditors for the 1977-78 fiscal year. May financial statements will be reviewed.

The council also will discuss codification of ordinances and the CATV cable television franchise proposal.

## Sales tax check \$2179 amount

The May payment of \$2,179 for sales taxes collected by Iowa Park merchants brings to \$23,979 sales tax rebates to the city so far this year.

The May payment is down from the \$3,845 rebated to the city for the same time period last year; however, overall reimbursements are up from the \$20,159 which had been returned by this time last year.

The overall rise in sales tax rebated to the city represents an 18 per cent increase for 1978.

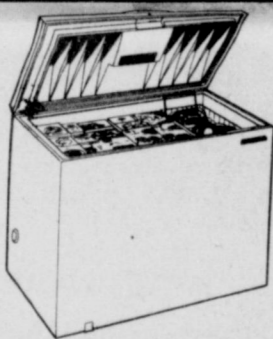
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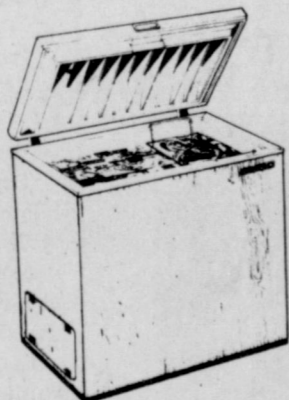
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## Reeves-Nipper vows read in double-ring ceremony

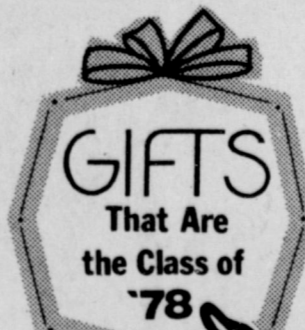

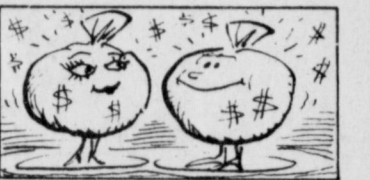

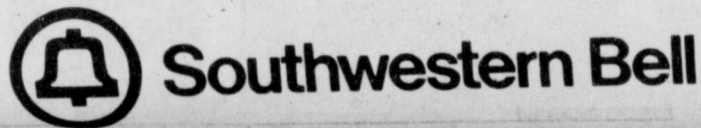

We all need to be reminded repeatedly that vehicles are potential weapons of murder and maiming.

The railroad is undoubtedly the chief noise maker in Iowa Park. If its

operators can't afford protected crossings which preclude the need for whistling all the way through town, they should be invited to build a bypass like the one around the west side of Wichita Falls.

The thundering noise of the wheels on the tracks could be reduced to acceptable levels by building a low earthen wall on each side of the track. If this does not seem worthwhile, check the sound deadening effect of the embankments just east of Bell Road.

For traffic safety in general, we must have signs at all intersections to indicate who has the right-of-way. Otherwise, we all tend to assume traffic codes that give us the most favorable treatment and assume priorities which are not written in the law. More street lighting is needed, especially on thoroughfares like the West Highway. More sidewalks and some bicycle paths are also necessary.

Can we afford such measures? We can't afford not to take every step which can save lives and make those lives more bearable!

# Council decides to hire officer

Holliday City Council has decided against contracting with the county for municipal police protection, opting instead to try its luck once again at maintaining its own one-man force.

At a special meeting Monday night it was the consensus of the council to hire Lawrence Zimbelman, 34, of Wichita Falls as Holliday's new policeman.

Zimbelman, a certified officer in Arkansas, must take additional police training here to meet Texas' law enforcement requirements, said Mayor Ben Ezzell.

The new officer will fill the vacancy left when the

city's previous officer, Dennis Rees, was forced to resign after he failed to meet the deadline to receive additional Texas law schooling.

Zimbelman, who had applied for the position, appeared at Monday night's council meeting called to discuss the police issue. The council interviewed Zimbelman "and like his attitude," Ezzell said.

He was hired tentatively, contingent on a background investigation and physical examination.

By Wednesday with the aid of other law enforcement agencies Ezzell had completed the background exami-

nation and it appears there is nothing standing in the way of the council formalizing his employment.

"He's alright," Ezzell said, adding Zimbelman still must complete the additional training in Texas law.

Ezell said Zimbelman is to be at the council's next regular meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday. The council is expected to vote to formally hire Zimbelman.

Also the council is expected to hear a report on the condition of the city police cruiser.

Earlier the council had taken bids on a new patrol car, but the mayor and some councilmen would rather have the car they own repaired. It has been taken to a local auto garage to see if it could be restored to a serviceable condition for another year's use.

Included in the program will be standard observances such as the reading of the class will and prophecy.

The final round of activities will be commencement, scheduled for 8 p.m. May 26 in the auditorium.

## OLD-FASHIONED SUGAR COOKIES

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 t vanilla
- 3 cups sifted flour
- 1 t salt
- 1/2 t baking powder
- 1/2 t soda
- 1 cup sour cream
- Cinnamon-sugar

Cream butter, add sugar gradually while continuing to cream. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each. Add vanilla, beat until light and fluffy.

Mix and sift flour, salt, baking powder and soda. Add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Drop by heaping teaspoons on well-greased cookie sheet. With spatula, flatten into 2" circles. Sprinkle with cinnamon-sugar. Bake at 400° 10-12 minutes.

## SALMON SALAD

- 2 cups cooked shell macaroni, drained
  - 1/4 cup French dressing
  - Small can salmon or tuna
  - 1/2 cup diced celery
  - 2 T sweet pickle relish
  - 2 hard cooked eggs
  - 1/2 cup chopped green onion
  - 3 T minced parsley
  - 1/2 cup mayonnaise
  - 1/4 t salt
  - 1/4 t garlic salt
  - 1/8 t pepper
  - 1 t prepared mustard
- Mix all ingredients thoroughly.

## BREAD AND BUTTER PICKLES

- 3 lbs. or 10 medium cucumbers
- 1/2 cup salt (not iodized)
- 5 cups cold water
- 3 medium onions
- 2 cups vinegar
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 t celery seed
- 2 t prepared mustard
- 1 t ginger
- 1/4 t turmeric
- 1/8 t mace

Few dashes red pepper. Wash and cut cucumbers. Put in an enamel or glass bowl. Sprinkle with the salt and add water. Cover and let stand 24 hours. Turn into a colander to drain.

Place in large pan, add onions, peeled and sliced, then vinegar, sugar and spices. Heat to boiling, simmer only 3 or 4 minutes. Pack in hot jars. Yield: 2 quarts.

## FRUIT SADD

- Mix:
  - 1 large can fruit cocktail, drained
  - 2 cans mandarin oranges, drained
  - 1 can pineapple tidbits, with juice
  - 1 pkg. strawberries, with juice
- Sprinkle with 1 small pkg. vanilla instant pudding. Mix and chill several hours or overnight. Add sliced bananas before serving.

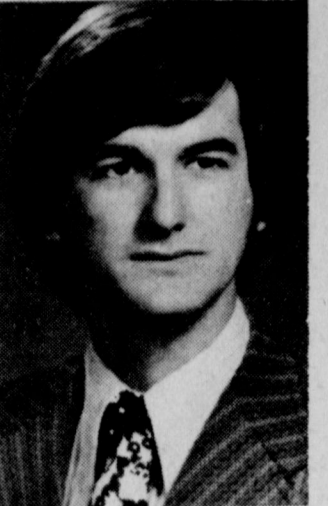
