No change seen in city tax rate

Indications are, from discussions during Monday's city council meeting, that the property tax rate will remain at \$1.75 for next year.

During a study of the proposed budget, which was first worked out at \$1.65, which would have meant a 10-cent tax cut, it was pointed out that nothing was left for capital outlay items the city would be needing.

Aldermen set their June 12 meeting as a public hearing, during which citizens would have an opportunity to present oral or written comments on the proposed \$1,121,280 budget for the coming year.

Included in the budget is a general salary increase for all city employees. Among those items listed by City Administrator Gene Britton which would not be funded, should the council approve the 10-cent tax cut, were: establishment for funds to purchase new sanitary landfill; replacement of heavy equipment at landfill; portable welder for street department; additional space at police department for interrogation, locked gun rack and officer evidence lockers; painting and remodeling exterior of city hall; preventive maintenance at sewer treatment plant; and replacement pumps at lakes for the water department.

Salaries for members of the department are slated for an average increase of 12 percent. But after other members of the council discussed the work of local policemen, and Britton commented "I think it's a shame when one of our policemen has to draw food stamps to survive." Hicks later stated "Well, maybe we better keep them (proposed salaries) as we have them."

Hicks and Johnny Lee appealed to the rest of the council to increase the \$3,000 tax exemption for elderly to \$4,000. Based on present values, that would reduce revenue to the city approximately \$7,000. Hicks said the additional reduction would be "at least a token to the elderly that the city is concerned over their financial condition."

Britton, responding to a question of how many residents over 65 years of age qualified for the exemption, said he had not counted them, but stated about one out of every 10 who qualified payed no taxes at all, due to the value of their homes.

No action was taken on the exemption request.

OTHER BUSINESS

Other items on the agenda included:

- * approving a request from the Volunteer Fire Department to hold a street dance in the 100 block of West Cash on June 3, as a fund-raising project to purchase a "Jaws of Life";
- * renewed contract with Mathews, West and Huffines as city auditors for 1977-78;
- * heard a report from City Attorney O.N. Newman concerning a suit against the city concerning alleged damage caused by leaking water line;
- * approved an ordinance codifying city ordinances.

Postal increase is this weekend

Postal rates have fallen prey to inflation again. An event reaching blanket proportions, the new higher rates for all types of postal services will go into effect at 12:01 a.m. Monday - ironically on a day post offices will be closed as the nation observes Memorial Day.

News of the price increase already has sent local graduating seniors scurrying to the post office here in hopes of getting their thank-you notes off at the current 13-cent rate.

Also caught in the unyielding price rise will be summer newlyweds with their mountains of invitations and thank-yous, not to mention utilities, credit card companies, magazines and newspapers which depend on the postal service for their survival.

The most wide reaching increase will be felt in the hike in first class mailings which will jump from 13-cents to 15-cents for the first ounce. The cost of an additional second ounce will go from 11-cents to 13-cents.

Cards will increase from 9-cents to 10-cents. To rent a small private box in the post office lobby here, the cost will rise from \$5.50 to \$8 for six months. Semi-annual rental on a medium size box will go from \$6 to \$11, a large drawer from \$11 to \$15 and an extra large drawer from \$12.50 to \$24.

The minimum rate for mailing a two-pound package parcel post will leap from 90-cents to \$1.35. The minimum for CODs will go from 85-cents to \$1.10, and the cost of certified mail will rise from 60-cents to 80-cents in addition to postage.

Poppy sale is Saturday

The American Legion Auxiliary veteran-made Memorial Poppy will be offered to the public Saturday, according to Jean Watts, chairman of the sale sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary Leo H. Smith Jr. Post.

The workers will be in front at State National Bank, Petal Pushers, Piggly Wiggly, H&S, and White Auto Store to distribute the bright red crepe paper poppies in memory of the nation's war dead, while assisting the needy veteran and his family.

Mrs. Watts said that the American Legion Auxiliary adopted the Poppy as a memorial flower at its National Convention at Cleveland in September 1920. This was followed through with the adoption of the Poppy as the American Legion memorial flower.

Two major projects have been scheduled by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department to raise money for purchase of a Jaws of Life machine for the community. A car wash will be held all day Saturday at Davis' Car Wash, with all proceeds going to the fund.

The Department received permission Monday from the city council to block off the west 100 block of Cash the evening of June 3 for a street dance. Several other highlights are also planned for that evening, including a dance contest. The Jaws of Life is a unit used in rescue operations, to free auto wreck victims. It costs \$5,500, and a fund was started at State National Bank two weeks ago, where donations are received.

The city is asking for voluntary cooperation of citizens to not water yards, trees or wash cars on weekends until further notice. Mayor Johnny Crawford said the action was necessary until repairs could be made on the water line which carries supplemental water here from Wichita Falls.

Council okays cable television

Persistence finally payed off for Ben Campbell of CATV Systems, Inc. He was awarded a franchise Monday evening by the Iowa Park city council to set up a cable television system here.

of 10 channels to local patrons. But Campbell says his firm will have at least 20 channels, and initial monthly fee will be \$7.50.

The mayor fears that without cooperation of not watering on weekends, a serious shortage could develop on those days. The shortage could not only affect consumption in homes, but fire protection as well.

City councils have in the past awarded franchises for cable systems here, but none ever got off the ground. The last time was about 1972. It was also in 1972 that Campbell first sought a franchise from Iowa Park's council, but at that time another company had already approached the council and got its blessings.

CATV and the council still must work out a contractual agreement for rental space to use a local water tower for installment of a micro wave antenna. Campbell proposes to use the tower at Lake Gordon.

Britton said two weeks ago that the strike had ended at the plant which manufactures the meter valve needed to resume water flow from Wichita Falls. But due to the length of time the plant was on strike, backorders developed, and delivery of orders delayed once the plant got back into operation.

Campbell, at that time, pointed out that he was working to get franchises in several area cities, and wanted to include Iowa Park in the micro wave system.

He proposes to construct two small structures at the base of the tower for housing of equipment, with the entire area fenced but providing access to city employees.

This is the first time water consumption restrictions have been imposed since the summers of 1970 and 1971, when all three city lakes were dry due to drought conditions. At that time, which was before the purchase agreement with Wichita Falls was approved, the city was forced to take water from the irrigation ditch to supply residents.

CATV has been operating some two years in Vernon, and has approximately 1,200 customers, he said. The first customers were hooked up for service in Electra two weeks ago. And Monday night Campbell was also present in Burk Burnett when that city's council gave his company a franchise to operate there.

CATV must negotiate leasing agreements with Texas Electric Service Company to use highline polls, in order to reach customers. In areas where underground service is provided, the company plans also to go underground with its cable, Campbell explained.

Lake water level is again reaching an alarmingly low level.

The Iowa Park council appeared to be ready to give CATV a franchise about two months ago. But some members wanted to wait to see what transpired in Wichita Falls, after some of the firms seeking franchise in the city said they also wanted to serve Iowa Park.

The minimum channels Campbell agreed to provide includes all three local area commercial channels, 3, 6, and 7, as well as 24 (public); 11 and 39 from Dallas; two 24-hour channels, 8 from Dallas and 17 from Atlanta (Christian Broadcast Network); and a local weather station.

Though the franchise is for 20 years, it does not give exclusive cable television rights in the city to CATV. Campbell said work would commence in the near future, as he already has taken some initial steps to service the community. He did not say, however, just when work would start.

Rose Soell will give the valedictory address, and Michelle Bamber will make her salutatory remarks. Invocation will be by Mark Williams, and Robin Combs will give the benediction.

The company plans to have a full-time office secretary and two maintenance men stationed here, he told the council.

The eighth grade choir will provide special music, a selection entitled, "Moving On."

Bob Dawson, high school principal, will award the certificates after he has accepted the class which will be presented by Jimmy Alsop, junior high principal.

Processional and recessional will be played by Lynette Flick. Music will be under the direction of Mrs. Marge Flowers.

Continuing a Tradition of 50 Years of Quality
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Holliday City Council Tuesday night approved the hiring of Lawrence Zimbleman as the city's new police officer, and Mayor Ben Ezzell explained he had secured federal funding to pay the officer's salary for a year.

Ezzell said he received verbal approval Tuesday morning for the patrolman's funding from an official who administers the Comprehensive Employment Training Act in Archer County.

Under the CETA program the officer will work for the city but be paid \$3.75 an hour from federal coffers. He will begin work June 1, the council decided.

CETA also provides funding for the city to work four youths from low-income families during the summer.

Zimbleman, who is a certified police officer in Arkansas, must attend a law enforcement school at Vernon to be certified in Texas. Ezzell also said there was

a chance the city could secure outside monetary support to purchase a new patrol car.

"I think there's a good chance we may have a car bought for us through Nortex Regional Planning Commission," Ezzell said.

In the meantime, the council decided to have the old patrol car tuned-up and cleaned-up to suffice until it is either overhauled or a new unit is purchased.

In other business Tuesday night, the council decided to change its meeting nights to the first and third Mondays of each month.

The change was requested by the Archer County News and will become effective June 5.

EMERGENCY LEAVE

In addition to leave with pay allowed municipal staffers when they are sick or there is a death in their immediate family, the council decided to extend emergency leave benefits.

According to Tuesday night's decision, city workers will be allowed an additional day every six months whereby employees will be paid for emergency leave in the case of sickness in their immediate family.

Employees must first check with the mayor and cannot accumulate more than two days of the new benefit during a year's period.

The new benefit is designed to accommodate an employee whose spouse or child is ill and requires a day at the doctor's.

The council will continue its policy to allow employees off for a few hours with pay to attend funerals of close friends and relatives.

Councilmen also decided to pay the deposit to have a telephone installed in animal warden Elvin Hoover's home. Payment of the installation fee will be reimbursed with withholdings each pay period from Hoover's regular city salary.

The council also decided to pay \$7 a month toward the base rate of Hoover's telephone, a practice observed with other city workers.

Councilmen postponed action on a dilapidated building ordinance, and set the second meeting in June for the bid opening on a new sewer line project.

PISTOL PROBLEM

Former councilman Charles Parker appeared at the meeting requesting release of a .38 caliber revolver the city had been holding.

The controversy dates back to the tenure of former policeman Dennis Rees, who purchased a .357 magnum revolver through the city. The city bought the .357 with the understanding that Rees would reimburse the city, it was explained.

While working as a patrolman for the city, Rees' .357 was broken and he asked to borrow Parker's .38 until the larger weapon could be repaired.

When Rees resigned, he relinquished Parker's .38 to the city to be held as collateral until the .357 was repaired and paid for.

However, Rees has stopped making payments to the city on the .357.

"The only thing I'm guilty of is trusting the man," Parker told the council after presenting registration papers to prove he owned the .38.

The council decided to return the .38 to Parker. It was being kept in the safe at city hall.

The council decided to take appropriate steps toward collecting the remainder of the money for the .357 from Rees. If that fails, it was the consensus of the council to prosecute Rees for theft of city property.

Fifty-one Holliday graduates will walk across the stage Friday night, the first commencement ceremony held in the new high school auditorium.

Valedictory address will be given by Donna Ruth,

and the graduating Mankins will make the salutatory address.

Bridget Talley, ranking senior, will style her talk, "Courage -- Key to the Future," while ranking senior Debbie Brown will speak on "Frame Work."

Mrs. Fern McAlister will present the DAR Award, and the Arion Award will be given by Dwade Reinsch, band director.

Bill Crabbs, high school principal, will make a scholarship presentation. He also will present the class, which will be awarded their diplomas by trustees Mankins and Ayres.

Bennie Ezzell, class president, will present the class gift.

For what may be the first time in the history of Holliday's school system, classes will be held on a weekend.

Because of inclement winter weather which caused the cancellation of classes throughout North Texas, the final day of Holliday's current school year will fall on Saturday in order to meet state education requirements.

"In my 24 years in the education business, this is the only time students have ever had to attend classes on a Saturday," said Dan Owen, Holliday's elementary-kindergarten principal. "It's possibly a first for Holliday."

"All our kids will have to come Saturday," Owen said. "Every student not exempt from tests will be in attendance," said Bill Crabbs, junior high-high school principal. He said Saturday had been designated as "Senior Day" to exempt seniors, who will have graduated Friday night -- the night before the last official day of classes.

Friday and Saturday have been designated as final examination days for students under Crabb's admin-

istration.

"I feel like there will be more students out than normal, but I don't anticipate a real low attendance," said Owen. "We're trying to make it as attractive as we can to get them to come."

Owen said classes would be dismissed Saturday at

1:30 p.m.

"We can dismiss at that time and still be counted as a full day," the elementary principal explained.

The controversy stems back to last winter when snow and ice storms caused the closing of many North Texas schools. Some schools

were closed as many as 10 days, Owen said.

"We feel like some schools were penalized," Owen said.

Following a Texas Education Agency ruling, some schools were relieved of their days missed "and we were not," Owen said.

"All we asked was to be relieved that one day so we wouldn't have to go to school on Saturday and they (TEA) turned us down," he said.

TEA ordered schools not to gain lost ground by requiring students to attend during otherwise scheduled spring or Easter vacations, he said. The agency also ordered for schools not to extend into June.

"We could have gone on Monday, but that's Memorial Day. We felt like our people would rather go on Saturday, rather than come back on Memorial Day or even next Tuesday. That's why we wound up having to go on Saturday," Owen said.

Superintendent Ray Coe was not available for comment due to a death in his family.

Although Holliday began classes in August last year while most schools did not begin until after Labor Day, TEA subsequently has ordered all systems to begin classes earlier next year to avoid similar conflicts.

Lions Club observes 50 years of service

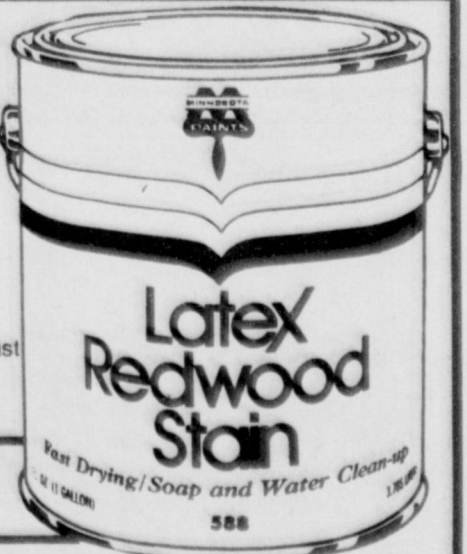

Heat pineapple juice to boiling point, remove from heat. Add sugar and lemon jello and stir until dissolved. Add remaining 1/2 cup cold water. Chill until syrupy. Line pan with Graham cracker crust. Set aside. Prepare Dream Whip, milk and vanilla according to directions on package, fold in syrupy jello. Fold in jello cubes. Chill 5-8 hours.

ENCHILADAS
1 dozen corn tortillas
1 large can tomato sauce
1/2 cup fat
1 medium onion
1 1/2 lbs. Longhorn Cheddar cheese, grated

Put 1/2 cup fat in heavy iron skillet. Place tortillas in skillet just long enough to heat through. Remove and put in center of each tortilla approximately 1 T of onions, cheese and sauce (below). Roll and place in Pyrex casserole dish (square); continue until all tortillas are rolled. Place over top of enchiladas the remaining cheese, onions and sauce. Set aside until ready to use, then place in hot oven for 10 minutes or more.

SAUCE
2 T chili powder
3 T bacon drippings
1 t comino seed, crushed
1 pod garlic
1 pint of water or more
Salt to taste
1 T flour, or less
Put 2 T bacon grease in pan over low flame. Rub into this the chili powder until smooth (do not scorch). Add water and spices. Dissolve flour in about 3 T of this mixture and cook until sauce is like gravy.

PRESSED CHICKEN

4 cups chopped chicken
1 1/2 cups chicken broth
1 cup salad dressing
1/2 cup chopped nuts
4 chopped hard-boiled eggs
1 small jar stuffed olives, sliced
1 small jar pimentos
1 T lemon juice
2 cups chopped celery
Salt and pepper to taste
Dissolve four packages unflavored gelatin in water and melt completely in hot chicken broth. Stir in all other ingredients and place in oiled mold or two-quart baking dish. Chill overnight and cut in squares.

MEXICAN RICE

1 cup long grained rice
1/2 small onion, sliced
1/2 sliced green pepper (optional)
1 small can tomatoes, chopped
Salt and pepper as desired
1 T cooking fat
1 t cumin
1 t garlic
Water
Brown rice in hot fat. Turn in onion and pepper and finish browning when pepper and onion will brown a little, then turn in tomatoes. Add enough water to cover rice. Cook slowly without stirring for approximately 30 minutes.

PUBLIC NOTICE

ADOPTING ORDINANCE NO. 270 AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING AND ENACTING A NEW CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF IOWA PARK, TEXAS; ESTABLISHING THE SAME; PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF CERTAIN ORDINANCES NOT INCLUDED THEREIN; PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF SUCH CODE AND A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER OF AMENDING SUCH CODE; AND PROVIDING WHEN THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IOWA PARK, TEXAS:

Section 1. The Code of Ordinances, consisting of Chapters 1 to 20, each inclusive, is hereby adopted and enacted as the "Code of Ordinances, City of Iowa Park, Texas" and such Code shall be treated and considered as a new and original comprehensive ordinance which shall supersede all other general and permanent ordinances passed by the city council on or before July 11, 1977, to the extent provided in Section 2 hereof.

Section 2. All provisions of such Code shall be in full force and effect from and after the 1st day of August, 1978; and all ordinances of a general and permanent nature enacted on final passage on or before July 11, 1977, and not included in such Code or recognized and continued in force by reference thereto are hereby repealed from and after the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 3. That the repeal provided for in Section 2 hereof shall not affect any of the following:

(a) Any offense or act committed or done or any penalty or forfeiture incurred or any contract or right established or accruing before the effective date of such Code;

(b) Any ordinance promising or guaranteeing the payment of money for the City, or authorizing the issuance of any bonds of the City or any evidence of the City's indebtedness;

(c) Any contract or obligation assumed by the city;

(d) Any right or franchise granted by the City;

(e) Any ordinance dedicating, naming, establishing, locating, opening, paving, widening, vacating, etc., any street or public way in the City;

(f) Any ordinance relating to municipal street maintenance agreements with the State of Texas;

(g) Any ordinance establishing or prescribing grades for streets in the City;

(h) Any appropriation ordinance or ordinance providing for the levy of taxes or for annual budget;

(i) Any ordinance relating to local improvements and assessments therefor;

(j) Any ordinance annexing territory to the City or discontinuing territory as a part of the City;

(k) Any ordinance dedicating or accepting any plat or subdivision in the City;

(l) Ordinances not inconsistent with such Code prescribing traffic regulations for specific streets, such as ordinances establishing speed limits or designating one-way streets, no parking areas, truck routes, stop intersections, intersections where traffic is to be controlled by signals, etc.;

(m) Any urban renewal ordinance;

(n) Any zoning ordinance;

(o) Any subdivision ordinance;

(p) Any ordinance prescribing personnel policies and procedures;

(q) Any ordinance enacted after July 11, 1977.

Provided, this ordinance may be amended from time to time to incorporate any of the matters listed above into the Code of Ordinances, at which time said exception or exceptions will be deemed to be deleted, whether expressly done so or not. The repeal provided for in Section 2 hereof shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or part thereof that has been repealed by a subsequent ordinance which is repealed by this ordinance.

Section 4. Whenever in such Code an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or a misdemeanor, or whenever in such Code the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful, and no specific penalty is provided therefor, the violation of any such provision of such Code shall be punished by a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200.00), as provided in Section 1-7 of such Code.

Section 5. Any and all additions and amendments to such Code, when passed in such form as to indicate the intention of the city council to make the same a part thereof shall be deemed to be incorporated in such Code so that reference to the "Code of Ordinances, City of Iowa Park, Texas" shall be understood and intended to include such additions and amendments.

Section 6. In case of the amendment of any section of such Code for which a penalty is not provided, the

general penalty as provided in Section 4 of this ordinance and Section 1-8 of such Code shall apply to the section as amended; or in case such amendment contains provisions for which a penalty, other than the aforementioned general penalty, is provided in another section in the same chapter, the penalty so provided in such other section shall be held to relate to the section so amended, unless such penalty is specifically repealed therein.

Section 7. A copy of such Code shall be kept on file in the office of the city secretary preserved in looseleaf form, or in such other form as the city secretary may consider most expedient. It shall be the express duty of the city secretary, or someone authorized by the city secretary, to insert in their designated places all amendments or ordinances which indicate the intention of the city council to make the same a part of such Code when the same are printed or reprinted in page form, and to extract from such Code all provisions which may be from time to time repealed by the city council. This copy of such Code shall be available for all persons desiring to examine the same.

Section 8. It shall be unlawful for any person to change or amend by additions or deletions any part of portion of such Code, or to insert or delete pages, or portions, thereof, or to alter or tamper with such Code in any manner whatsoever which will cause the law of the City of Iowa Park to be misrepresented thereby. Any person violating this section shall be punished as provided in Section 4 of this ordinance.

Section 9. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed.

Section 10. This ordinance shall become effective on the 1st day of August, 1978.
