Among those items listed by City Administrator Gene Britton which would not be funded, should the council approve the 10-cent tax cut, were: establishment for funds to

purchase new sanitary landfill; replacement of heavy equipment at landfill; portable welder for street department; additional space at police department for interrogation, locked gun rack and officer evidence lockers; painting and remodeling exterior of city hall; preventive maintenance at sewer treatment plant; and replacement pumps at lakes for the water department.

Alderman Bud Adams commented "I don't see how we could reduce our tax rate any, and still take care of our obligation to provide citizens with at least minimum services."

SLIGHT INCREASE

Britton acknowledged that the overall budget represented a 3.7 percent increase over last year, and would be extremely close to operate

The proposed budget calls for expenditures to be \$517,048 operating expenses, \$40,125 capital outlay and \$83,184 debt service in the general fund; \$344,835 operating expenses, \$6,000 capital outlay and \$56,088 debt service in the water and sewer department; \$65,000 federal revenue sharing money to be spent \$25,000 for street repairs and \$40,000 sewer line installation; and a \$9,000 held in reserve for contingencies.

A copy of the proposed budget is available in city hall for view of the public, prior to the budget hearing.

Hicks and Johnny Lee appealed to the rest of the council to increase the \$3,000 tax exemption for elderly to \$4,000. Based on present values, that would reduce revenue to the city approximately \$7,000. Hicks said the additional reduction would be "at least a token to the elderly that the city is concerned over their financial condition."

Britton, responding to a question of how many residents over 65 years of age qualified for the exemption, said he had not counted them, but stated about one out of every 10 who qualified payed no taxes at all, due to the value of their homes.

No action was taken on the exemption request.

Postal increase is this weekend

Postal rates have fallen prey to inflation again.

VOL. IX NO. 38

An event reaching blanket proportions, the new higher rates for all types of postal services will go into effect at 12:01 a.m. Monday -ironically on a day post offices will be closed as the nation observes Memorial Day.

News of the price increase already has sent local graduating seniors scurrying to the post office here in hopes of getting their thank-you notes off at the current 13-cent rate.

Also caught in the unyielding price rise will be summer newlyweds with their mountains of invitations and thank-yous, not to mention utilities, credit card companies, magazines and newspapers which depend on the postal service for their survival.

The most wide reaching increase will be felt in the hike in first class mailings which will jump from 13-cents to 15-cents for the first ounce. The cost of an additional

Council okays cable television

administrator.

Persistence finally payed off for Ben Campbell of CATV Systems, Inc. He was awarded a franchise

Monday evening by the Iowa Park city council to set up a cable television system here.

City councils have in the past awarded franchises for cable systems here, but none ever got off the ground. The last time was about 1972.

It was also in 1972 that Campbell first sought a franchise from Iowa Park's council, but at that time another company had already approached the council and got its blessings.

Campbell, at that time, pointed out that he was working to get franchises in several area cities, and wanted to include Iowa Park in the micro wave

CATV has been operating some two years in Vernon, and has approximately 1,200 customers, he said. The first customers were hooked up for service in Electra two weeks ago. And Monday night Campbell was also present in Burkburnett when that city's council gave his company a franchise to operate there.

The Iowa Park council appeared to be ready to give CATV a franchise about two months ago. But some members wanted to wait to see what transpired in Wichita Falls, after some of the firms seeking franchise in the city said they also wanted to serve Iowa Park.

However, the Wichita Falls council decided to put cable television before the citizens on a referendum, delaying any action.

According to the franchise agreement, CATV will provide a minimum of 10 channels to local patrons. But Campbell says his firm will have at least 20 channels, and initial monthly fee will be \$7.50.

CATV and the council still must work out a contractual agreement for rental space to use a local water tower for installment of a micro wave antenna. Campbell proposes to use the tower at Lake Gordon.

He proposes to construct two small structures at the base of the tower for housing of equipment, with the entire area fenced but providing access to city employees.

· CATV must negotiate leasing agreements with Texas Electric Service Company to use highline polls, in order to reach customers. In areas where underground service is provided, the company plans also to go underground with its cable, Campbell explained.

The minimum channels Campbell agreed to provide includes all three local area commercial channels, 3, 6, and 7, as well as 24 (public); 11 and 39 from Dallas; two 24-hour channels, 8 from Dallas and 17 from Atlanta (Christian Broadcast Network); and a local weather station.

Though the franchise is for 20 years, it does not give exclusive cable television rights in the city to CATV. Campbell said work would commence in the near future, as he already has taken some initial steps to service the community. He did not say, however, just when work would

The company plans to have a full-time office secretary and two maintenance men stationed here, he told the council.

watering only on week days,
consumption would be reasonably equalized.

During week days, very little watering is done while residents are at work. But on weekends, most people do their yard work, which includes watering.

The mayor fears that without cooperation of not watering on weekends, a serious shortage could develop on those days. The shortage could not only affect consumption in homes, but fire protection as well.

Britton said two weeks ago that the strike had ended at the plant which manufactures the meter valve needed to resume water flow from Wichita Falls. But due to the length of time the plant was on strike, backorders developed, and delivery of orders delayed once the plant got back into operation.

This is the first time water consumption restrictions have been imposed since the summers of 1970 and 1971, when all three city lakes were dry due to drouth conditions. At that time, which was before the purchase agreement with Wichita Falls was approved, the city was forced to take water from the irrigation ditch to supply residents. Lake water level is again reaching

an alarmingly low level.

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
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Holliday City Council Tuesday night approved the hiring of Lawrence Zimbelman as the city's new police officer, and Mayor Ben Ezzell explained he had secured federal funding to pay the officer's salary for a year.

Ezzell said he received verbal approval Tuesday morning for the patrolman's funding from an official who administers the Comprehensive Employment Training Act in Archer County.

Under the CETA program the officer will work for the city but be paid \$3.75 an hour from federal coffers. He will begin work June 1, the council decided.

CETA also provides funding for the city to work four youths from low-income families during the summer.

Zimbleman, who is a certified police officer in Arkansas, must attend a law enforcement school at Vernon to be certified in Texas. Ezzell also said there was

a chance the city could secure outside monetary support to purchase a new patrol car.

"I think there's a good chance we may have a car bought for us through Nortex Regional Planning Commission," Ezzell said.

In the meantime, the council decided to have the old patrol car tuned-up and cleaned-up to suffice until it is either overhauled or a new unit is purchased.

In other business Tuesday night, the council decided to change its meeting nights to the first and third Mondays of each month.

The change was requested by the Archer County News and will become effective

EMERGENCY LEAVE In addition to leave with pay allowed municipal staffers when they are sick or there is a death in their immediate family, the council decided to extend emergency leave benefits.

According to Tuesday night's decision, city workers will be allowed an additional day every six months whereby employees will be paid for emergency leave in the case of sickness in their immediate family.

Employees must first check with the mayor and cannot accumulate more than two days of the new benefit during a year's period.

The new benefit is designed to accomodate an employee whose spouse or child is ill and requires a day at the doctor's.

The council will continue its policy to allow employees off for a few hours with pay to attend funerals of close friends and relatives.

Councilmen also decided to pay the deposit to have a telephone installed in animal warden Elvin Hoover's home. Payment of the installation fee will be reimbursed by witholdings each pay period from Hoover's regular city salary.

The council also decided to pay \$7 a month toward the base rate of Hoover's telephone, a practice observed with other city workers.

Councilmen postponed action on a dilapidated building ordinance, and set the second meeting in June for the bid opening on a new sewer line project.

PISTOL PROBLEM

Former councilman Charles Parker appeared at the meeting requesting release of a .38 caliber revolver the city had been holding.

The controversy dates back to the tenure of former policeman Dennis Rees, who purchased a .357 magnum revolver through the city. The city bought the .357 with the understanding that Rees would reimburse the city, it was explained.

While working as a patrolman for the city, Rees' .357 was broken and he asked to borrow Parker's .38 until the larger weapon could be repaired.

When Rees resigned, he relinquished Parker's .38 to the city to be held as collateral until the .357 was repaired and paid for.

However, Rees has stopped making payments to the city on the .357.

"The only thing I'm guilty of is trusting the man," Parker told the council after presenting registration papers to prove he owned the

The council decided to return the .38 to Parker. It was being kept in the safe at city hall.

The council decided to take appropriate steps toward collecting the remainder of the money for the .357 from Rees. If that fails, it was the consensus of the council to prosecute Rees for theft of city property.

All members of the council were present at Tuesday night's meeting including eight visitors.






