Fund-raising bike ride slated Saturday morning

The annual bike ride, sponsored by the local Epsilon Sigma Alpha chapter of Epsilon Eta to raise money for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, is scheduled to get underway here at 8 a.m. Saturday. Cyclists will start out on the 38-mile route from the junior high parking lot, pedaling their way to Kamay and back again. Registration will begin at 7 a.m.

Entrants, from fourth grade age minimum up, including adults, are to obtain sponsors who will pledge to

donate money for each mile traveled. Children must have an official entry form, signed by their parents, in order to enter.

Rest stops, stocked with refreshments, will be at Burnett Park, Valley View school campus, and at a stand set up across from the post office at Kamay. The same route will be followed returning to Iowa Park.

Security patrols will be manned by ESA members, each with vehicles equipped with citizen band radios, to watch over those making the trip.

As a special feature this year, all cyclists will be eligible to earn t-shirts, back packs and nylon jackets. Individuals raising from \$25 to \$75 will receive a t-shirt; \$75 to \$150 a back pack and t-shirt; and those collecting more than \$150 will receive a nylon jacket and t-shirt.

All prizes will be awarded according to amounts of money turned in by the collection date, which will be announced at the ride.

The cyclist raising the most money over \$200 will receive a portable television set, and second prize for collecting more than \$200 will receive a transistor radio.

"It won't be easy, but it is possible, and the rewards are great," commented Mrs. Kennie Jones, Epsilon Eta project chairman.

"For many of us, riding a bicycle 33 miles is something we've probably not done for years. But giving it a try can make all the difference for little kids everywhere who need our help. And it isn't every day you get this kind of opportunity to help others," she said.

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is the world leader in the fight against leukemia and other childhood cancers. The hospital is ranked among the top 10 cancer hospitals in the United States.

ESA Women International, founded in 1929, is an organization of 30,000 women throughout the world. Members are involved in programs of education, leadership-training and social activities, as well as philanthropic services, of which the "Million Dollar Bike Ride" is the largest.

FOR JAWS OF LIFE

Big street dance on tap Saturday

Still some \$4,000 away from their goal, the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department will sponsor a street dance Saturday evening to raise money for purchase of a "Jaws of Life".

The dance, to begin at 8 p.m. and continue until midnight in the 100 block of West Cash, will be free to the public. Workers hope to raise money through sales at their concession stand, and through contributions during the evening.

Gary Balis and his Good Timer Band from Burkburnett will furnish the dance music. Other area entertaining groups will also make appearances during the evening.

Soft drinks, hot dogs, candy, chips and other foods will be sold at the concession stand.

All proceeds will go to the Jaws of Life Fund. Department personnel say the equipment sought will cost \$5,500, and the fund account at State National Bank had \$1,600 in it Tuesday.

At least two contests will be held during Saturday evening. Mr. and Miss Jaws of Life will be judged from a field of entrants between three and 10 years of age. Each winner will receive a \$25 Savings Bond. Judging will be on the basis of poise and appearance.

A number of prizes, donated by local merchants and individuals, will be awarded to the best dance couple. Judges will be observing dancers through the evening, and announcement of winners will be made before the dance ends.

Latest donation to the Jaws of Life Fund was made by the Iowa Park Middle Schoolers, who voted Saturday to give \$200. The amount is not noted in the fund balance, however.

Texas Electric wants rate hike

True to its word, Texas Electric Service Company is seeking another rate increase, barely more than six months after receiving its last hike.

When the Public Utility Commission (PUC) cut back a 23.6 rate increase to 13.2 last November, Bill Marquart, TESCO president, said his company would only have to come back again in the near future. He was explaining that the increase initially sought was what it needed.

So Tuesday, TESCO filed a system-wide rate increase appeal for a 24.4 percent increase in revenues. Filing took place not only here, but in every city served by the utility company, as well as the PUC office in Austin.

If approved, it would provide the company with an additional \$110 million in revenues.

"The revenue increase is needed so Texas Electric can continue changing from expensive natural gas to cheaper, more plentiful lignite coal and nuclear fuel to generate electricity," Wayne House, local TESCO manager, said.

"Changing to cheaper fuel is helping hold the price of electricity down. And lignite coal and nuclear fuel will provide reliable energy when natural gas may not be available for generating electricity at any price," House continued.

When the company filed for its last rate increase, Iowa Park's city council tabled action 90 days, during which time it joined with other municipalities in the TESCO service system, through the Texas Municipal League, to affect a lower rate.

"Our fuel-changing program is in

jeopardy because of an inadequate rate increase last year, coupled with sharp increases in construction costs due to government regulation and inflation," House explained.

In 1977, customers reportedly saved more than \$48 million on their electric bills because TESCO used lignite coal instead of expensive open-market gas to generate percent of their electricity he said.

Texas Electric's fuel-change program has increased its construction spending sharply in recent years. About \$222 million will be spent on construction in 1978. The company will spend more in 1979 and 1980 than it did during the entire decade of the 1960s.

Because of TESCO's deteriorating financial condition, the company canceled plans to borrow in January to avoid losing its credit rating. The move was made by the PUC ruling.

"If our credit rating is downgraded, we'll have to pay higher interest rates on the money we borrow, and that means higher costs for our customers," House said.

Texas Electric has six nuclear-powered generating units in operation and another coming on line in 1980. The company also is building a more lignite-fueled plant and a nuclear-powered generating plant. The plants are joined by Texas Electric, TESCO, Light and Dallas Power & Light.

If the full amount requested is approved, when the council meets June 12, residents would see a 24.8 percent average increase, with large users in the summer and smaller users in the winter. Smaller users would see a smaller increase than large users.

Under the new rates, a customer with a bill of \$10 would see it go up to \$11 per month. A bill of \$40 would be about \$52 per month with the increase.

The increase would take effect July 5, but in the meantime, PUC and city councils have agreed to the request.

Voluntary water reduction asked

Iowa Park residents are being asked to voluntarily reduce their normal water consumption by about half for the next 30 or more days.

Mayor Johnny Crawford explained the reduction is necessary, while the local water treatment plant undergoes long-needed maintenance, repairs and painting.

Iowa Park started receiving water from Wichita Falls Saturday, for the first time since November, and the local plant was shut down at that time.

Crawford said that the citizens, because of the city's contract with Wichita Falls, would have to cut their water use by half voluntarily.

Iowa Park has a contract with Wichita Falls to purchase a maximum of one million gallons of treated water daily. There is no provision to exceed that amount, Crawford emphasized. According to the number of complaints received at the city hall office, and apparently at the city also, last week about the quality of water in the lines, there probably will not be many complaints about the local treatment plant closing down.

The city plant has a capacity of treating a million gallons of water a day, though it can be pushed to a million and a half for a short period of time.

Citizens from all parts of town last week were complaining about the darkness of water they were drawing through home taps, apparently result of two things: need for maintenance and repairs at the plant; and attempting to push too much water through the plant, exceeding its capacity.

Iowa Park hadn't taken any water from Wichita Falls since November, when a meter valve became defective at the Wichita Falls end of the water line. The valve was ordered, but the plant which manufactures it was on strike, which didn't end until some three weeks ago.

Crawford had made arrangements to start the flow of water from the Wichita Falls Friday, even before the meter valve was installed by a factory representative. It requires some 24 hours for water to reach here by gravity flow through the line.

Work at the local plant will require some 30 days, during which some \$25,000 to \$40,000 will be spent to bring the plant equipment up to desirable condition, Crawford said.

During this time, citizens are being asked to curtail water use to about half of normal. During summer months, Iowa Park residents draw as much as two-million gallons of water a day to do their watering and washing, especially on weekends.

Last week the city issued a request for citizens to do watering and car washing only on week days, to allow the overall city consumption to equalize over the week. This would cut down the heavy weekend usage, it was explained, and allow the plant to keep up with consumption.

Crawford said he could not be specific about the period of time the treatment plant would be out of operation, but estimated it would take about 30 days. He emphasized that all available manpower would be working on the project.

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Also, upon term expiration, CD renewals will carry daily interest.

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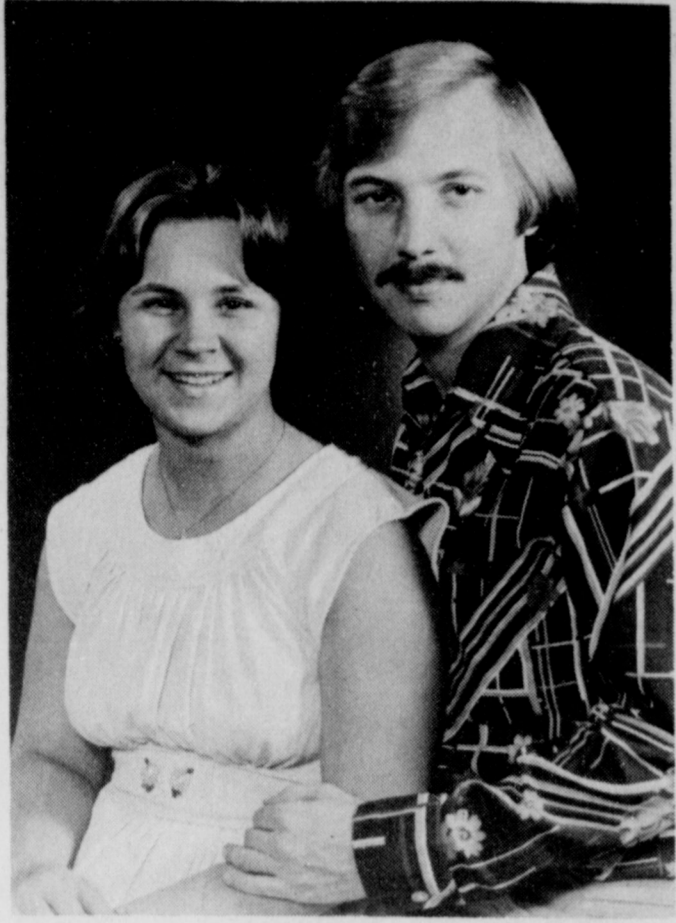

Mrs. Smith has recently returned from a Caribbean trip where she visited the two islands, where the people who have been exploited and plundered by different nations are still very proud and striving to become economically independent.

"What do we owe these people? Should we build their country's progress in modern culture or let them keep their own native culture?" she asked. She

displayed some samples of carving, embroidery, weaving and amber jewelry to show how skilled the women of the islands were in handwork.

Reflecting on some of the most beautiful sights of the Caribbean, Mrs. Smith mentioned the Fortress of San Felipe, a 500 year-old cathedral and the Citadel, once magnificent and viewed as the 8th wonder of the world.

In concluding, the speaker reminded the audience that the story of American history begins at about the same time as the Caribbeans Islands because Columbus, Cortez, Ponce DeLeon and Sir Francis Drake are intertwined in historical events before the Pilgrims landed in America.

Cook of the Week

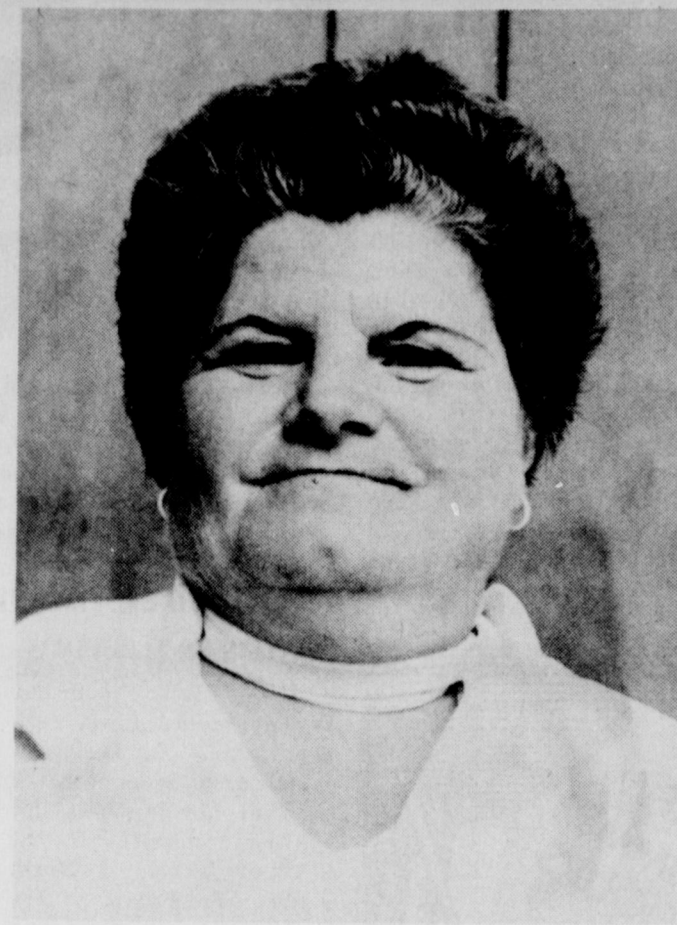
When it comes to cakes, perhaps none has stood the test more than the Pound Cake. Good cooks have attained high stature with family and friends, to these many years, by serving plain pound cake.

Margaret Sangster could have easily been describing this baked mixture when she said, "Oh, cakes and friends we should choose with care, not always the fanciest cake that's there is the best to eat."

Mrs. Herman Daymude treasures and uses her mother's Golden Pound Cake recipe, and she shares it with us this week. Three of her other recipes she got from friends in Maryland when her husband was stationed there in the service of his country.

"I would advise any person to finish high school before he/she gets married," Mrs. Daymude said as she expressed her happiness over earning her GED this spring through the Adult Education program in Iowa Park. GOLDEN POUND CAKE

2 cups flour
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 t salt
1 cup shortening
5 eggs
1 1/2 t lemon juice

Cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs, one at a time; add flavoring. Add dry ingredients in three additions, beating well after each. Bake in greased and

floured loaf pan (5 1/2 x 10 1/2) about 90 minutes in oven preheated to 325°.

BOSTICK'S BANANA BREAD

1 1/4 cups flour
2 t baking powder
1/4 t soda
3/4 t salt
1/2 cup shortening
3/4 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 cup mashed bananas (ripe)
two or three

Sift flour, measure, resift three times with baking powder, soda and salt. Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time and beat well after each addition. Add bananas and mix; then add flour in four portions, beating until smooth after each addition. Turn into a well greased bread pan and bake in moderate oven (325-350°) about 50 minutes.

1 lb. hamburger meat
1 1/4 oz. box Rice-A-Roni
1 small onion
1 egg

Mix onion and egg into hamburger meat in a large bowl. Roll meat into medium-size balls, then roll balls in Rice-A-Roni. Mix sauce that comes in the box and pour over the meat balls. Place in dish and bake at 350° for 30-45 minutes.

Mix margarine, flour, sugar, salt and baking powder. Add milk and blend. Spoon over melted margarine. Do not stir.
Add 3 to 4 cups sweetened fruit or berries; do not stir. Bake at 375° about 30 to 40 minutes.

Democrat voters return to polls

An event that leaves many voters yawning, Iowa Park area Democrats will be asked to return to the polls Saturday to help decide two runoff elections caused by nip-and-tuck primary races.

Democrats in Iowa Park's five local boxes will be voting on runoffs for Wichita County treasurer and an unexpired term on the Texas Railroad Commission.

Voters in precincts 32, 33, 34, 35 and 60 all will vote at the Iowa Park ASCS Office, according to A.F. "Prof" Edwards, Wichita County Democratic chairman. The poll will be open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Saturday.

Continuing to stir dust on the campaign trail have been Mary Lynn Welborn and Bob Terry, who were thrust into the runoff after a close race for county treasurer in the May

primary.

Mrs. Welborn is deputy county treasurer, and Terry is a Wichita Falls grocer.

In the primary, Mrs. Welborn polled the most votes in the five local boxes with a combined total of 508 ballots.

Terry received 327 votes from local Democrats in May.

Whoever wins the runoff decision will not face GOP opposition in the November general election.

The runoff for an unexpired term on the railroad commission will attract Democratic votes from across the state as John Poerner and Jerry Sadler butt heads.

Locally, Sadler, former land commissioner and the only lawmaker to be publicly censured by the Texas House in recent years, polled the most votes with 461 ballots.

Poerner realized 347 votes in the May primary among the five local boxes.

The winner in that runoff will face Republican nominee James W. Lacy in November.

A sure sign of a slim voter turnout, only six Iowa Park voters cast absentee ballots in the runoff with 227 absentee votes registered county-wide.

No funnel is spotted

Despite reports to the contrary, an Iowa Park Police Department official said no tornado was spotted in Iowa Park during Sunday's spell of turbulent weather.

At 4:03 p.m. Sunday a National Weather Service official called to advise the Iowa Park Police Department that a funnel cloud might be in Iowa Park.

The police log showed a 4:44 p.m. entry that the department had received numerous calls from citizens wanting to know why storm sirens were not sounded.

Sgt. Charles Whittingstall, who was on duty at the time of the turbulent weather, said a funnel was spotted about eight or nine miles north of Iowa Park but that it never touched ground.

A funnel was never spotted near Iowa Park by local police of Department Of Public Safety weather watchers, Whittingstall said.

Daryl Frazier named to NAIA All-Star team

Daryl Frazier's ability as a baseball pitcher has earned

him a trip to the Orient. The Iowa Park High graduate and son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Frazier was notified by telephone Tuesday that he had been named to the NAIA All-Star team.

Frazier has set almost all the pitching records at Midwestern State Univ. during his two years at the school, where he has been named All Conference and District 8 All-Star two years, and this year to the District All-Tournament team.

Lubbock Christian College coach Larry Hays, who will be one of the NAIA All-Star coaches, told Frazier 20 players were named to the team from across the nation, and two are from LCC.

Nineteen of the 20 players are All-American, but not Frazier. Thirteen of the players are to sign professional contracts this year, he was told.

The All-Stars are to gather at Portland, Ore. by July 13. From there they will play various All-Star teams on the west coast, enroute to San Francisco.

From there they will go overseas, playing teams in Japan, Taiwan and Korea, with an option to play a three-day stand in Hawaii. Overall, the trip will last approximately 30 days.

Frazier likes the whole idea except two things: he's got to get all his immunization shots; and he'll miss work this summer, which possibly will require him to lay out of school the

fall semester, to earn money for school.

But he feels this a real opportunity for exposure to professional scouts, who will be expected to be watching the progress of the team and players. He wants to play pro ball, more for the experience it would give him in the future as a coach, than for the money, he explains.

Midwestern still hasn't made a decision as to whether it will have a varsity baseball team next year, but Frazier says he has received several offers to other schools should the program be cut.

Prior to transferring to Midwestern, Frazier played a year as quarterback at Fort Lewis College at Durango, Colo. Celebrating his 21st birthday last week, he stands 6-2 and weighs 190 now.

The Indians didn't have one of their better seasons this spring, 18-28. But Frazier was credited with half the wins, going 9-6 on the season.

During the year he set a season record for most strike outs, 17 against Austin College; most wins for a season; and lowest earned run average.
