

PRESERVING FREEDOM From Phoenix (Ariz.) Cattlelog

A young man who was feeding cattle in Arizona when World War Two broke out, sold his cattle and went into the army. About five year ago he was released and started eeding cattle again, on a small scale since cattle then were considerably higher than when he sold out.

However, cattle kept going up so, like many another, when prices started dropping this ex-soldier was caught with the largest bunch of cattle he'd ever had the nerve to borrow money on. Cattle kept going down—he finally sold them all but the proceeds fell far short of paying what he owed the bank, so he wound up with a long I O U on

He found a day-time job but the pay isn't sufficient to keep his family, cover current bills and pay something each month on his debt at the bank, so from 6 P.M. to 3 P.M., five nights a week, he fries hamburgers at one of the new and modern hamburger places about town. One Sunday night he told us they'd fried and sold 5,000 hamburgers between 6 and 8:30 that evening. We asked if he thought the government should step in and put a support price under cattle.

He said, "That wasn't what we fought for in World War Two. We fought to preserve freedom, and freedom means my right to make money, or my right to lose money when conditions and circumstances prove my judgment faulty. The Government has no money with which to help us, or to spend for any purpose except it take it first from the pockets of the American people. Raising and feeding cattle is a business and there is no more reason to support us than to support all other businesses.

There are just two ways for this country to go. One is the freedom road and sometimes it gets a little rocky. like right now in the cattle business. The other road leads to socialism, and it's an easy road to follow, until you run into the dead end. Once you get there, there is no returning.

Government help-any kind of help-is easy to take when you are hard pressed, but there'll always be a day of reckoning. If the government places supports under cattle prices, if won't be long until it will have to place controls over cattle production, and that's where we'll find the dead end. That's the day we'll wake up to find our country—not a democracy but a dictatorship—fascism, communism, whatever its name! We may not have to worry about losing money after that-we won't have any to lose since our freedom to make money will be gone.



The settling basins inside the building are cleaned every 36 hours to prevent the polution of the water. The large basin outside is cleaned regularly also by draining the water from it and cleaning it by hand.

All the water that is run through the plant is put into the city mains except that that is used as a reserve and to clean the settling basins. 50,000 gallons of clean water was deposited into the mains Saturday morning. At times last summer there was 500,000 gallons of water filtered through the Baird plant in one day. Do you realize how much water that is? That much water would fill 50 railroad tank cars.

When all the city mains, the deep well, and the reservoir are full there would be over 100,000 gallons of nice clean water for the city's use. The reservoir will hold 60,000 gallons and the deep well will hold 49,000 gallons.

The city has in its employment 11 men who are all Bairdites. They all work together, devoting their talent and services to the betterment of the City owned Municipal Light and Power Plant and Filter Plant and services. Each man is a member of one of the five churches here in Baird. Each man who has been employed as many as five years ownes his own home or property and ownes at least one car. Some are members of different clubs or organizations which represent the backbone of our fair

The daily shooting period was extended until sunset and baiting was forbidden altogether. Here are the major rules for




