City approves purchase of new police cruiser

City council members made quick work of a light agenda Monday night, approving two bid proposals, appointing members to a board, passing two resolutions and an ordinance, and still had time to hold a general discussion with the audience, all in an hour and a half.

Aldermen, with exception of C.A. Hicks, who was absent, accepted a low bid submitted by Shaw Motor Co. on a new police patrol car.

Shaw's bid, on a vehicle equipped with police equipment, was \$6,349.90. Bates Chevrolet was the only other bidder, submitted at \$6,372.14. Deliver time will be six to eight weeks.

On a heating system for the west side of the Recreation Activities Center, Iowa Park Heating and Airconditioning was the only bidder, offering a new Carrier system for \$1,632. It was accepted.

All members of the Library Board whose terms expire this month were re-appointed. Serving until May 1982 will be George Taylor, Marion Cleveland, Afton Pike and Bob Dawson.

On the first resolution, the council approved a proposal to authorize Mayor Johnny Crawford to enter into contract with Brown Hudson of Wichita Falls to prepare elements of a general comprehensive plan for the city. Sharing the expense will be the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

The other resolution was passed to correct a long-time error in the city plat, changing South Penn from 100 feet wide to 75 feet.

The ordinance receiving approval changes the minimum amount of damage to vehicles in an accident before occupants are required to notify the police department.

The amount was raised from \$25 to \$250 in the new ordinance. It was proposed to reduce the amount of paperwork required by police in filing out reports.

SMALL TRASH CONTAINERS
Council members instructed Steve Morath, city administrator, to make a study of how many wheel-type trash containers would be needed to eliminate any hand pickup of trash in the city.

Prior to the meeting, a demonstration of a sample cart was given to Aldermen. The container, 81

gallon size mounted on two wheels, can be placed next to the house and picked up by the new trash trucks without a city employee getting out of the vehicle.

The units would be used at homes which have no alleys and require street front pickup of garbage. Morath said at least 73 were needed, but a study could produce more in areas where larger containers are now placed in front of homes.

Two of the wheel containers are now in use in 5300th Addition as a homeowner reaction to their effectiveness.

Mayor Crawford said he thought a decision on how many should be ordered ought to be made at the Mar. 26 meeting. "We've been a year on it now," he reminded the council.

No decision was reached on whether a deposit would be required of homeowners using of the \$40 units.

Ronny Cravens withdrew his name Monday from the school board ballot and Loy Williams took his name out of the running in the city council election.

Absentee voting in both elections is set to begin Monday.

Persons may vote absentee in the municipal election from 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. weekdays at Iowa Park City Hall.

School district voters may cast absentee ballots from 8 a.m.-4 p.m. weekdays at the school administration office.

Drawing for placement of names on the school board ballot will have candidates listed in the following

order: Donald "Bud" Mercer, Roy K. Boutwell, Bill Spruiell, John Stewart, Dan Nethery, Martha Dudley and Christy McKenzie.

Order of candidates' names on the city council ballot will be George E. Hammonds, B.J. Gilmore, C.A. Hicks, Bill Cook, Floyd J. "Bud" Adams and Lloyd Smith.

There will be three persons elected to the school board and three Aldermen elected April 7.

For today's homemakers, time is extremely important. So many have fulltime jobs outside the home and more and more, the husbands share the cooking responsibilities with their wives. This is true of Richard and Kathy Hicks who both work at Cryovac.

In submitting their favorite recipes, which is really what the Cook of the Week is all about, they acknowledge the incomparable accent that spices give to foods.

One of their recipes calls for bay leaves from trees resembling the laurel. The leaves reach us from Turkey, Greece, Portugal, and Yugoslavia and are regarded as a truly romantic spice.

The evergreen laurel tree was beloved by Apollo. It was considered a lightning arrester and Tiberius Caesar was reputed to cling to a branch during a thunderstorm. Julius Caesar wore a wreath of its leaves and it has been credited with all kinds of magical effects.

Mrs. Hicks, the former Kathy Withrow, was graduated from Burkburnett High School where she belonged to National Honor Society and OEA. She is a member of Epsilon Sigma Alpha and is serving on the scrapbook committee.

SPAGHETTI SAUCE ITALIANO

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/2 lb. bulk Italian sausage
- 1-28 oz. can tomatoes, cut up
- 2-6 oz. cans tomato paste
- 1-6 oz. can sliced mushrooms
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 3/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/2 cup Burgundy
- 1/2 cup sliced pimento-stuffed olives
- 3 bay leaves
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 1/2 t. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 t sugar
- 1 t salt
- 1/2 t chili powder
- 1/8 t pepper
- 2 t cold water
- 2 T corn starch
- Hot cooked spaghetti
- Grated Parmesan cheese

In skillet brown ground beef and sausage; drain off fat. Transfer to crockery cooker. Stir in undrained tomatoes, tomato paste, mushrooms, onion, green pepper, Burgundy, olives, bay leaves, garlic, Worcestershire sauce, sugar, salt, chili powder, pepper and 1/3 cup water. Cover and cook on high-heat setting for 5 to 6 hours. Blend water slowly into cornstarch, stir into tomato mixture. Cover; cook 10 minutes. Serve over spaghetti. Pass Parmesan cheese. Serves 8 to 10.

ROUND STEAK ITALIANO

- 1 1/2 lbs. round steak
- 1 t salt
- 1/2 t oregano
- 1 t pepper
- 1-15 1/2 oz. jar spaghetti sauce with mushrooms
- 1-16 oz. can whole small onions, drained
- Cut steak into 5 or 6 serving-size pieces. Coat with salt, oregano, and pepper. In slow-cooking pot,

pour spaghetti sauce over meat. Cover and cook on low heat for 7 to 9 hours or until meat is tender. Turn control to high, add onions. Cook on high for 10 to 15 minutes. Yield: 5 to 6 servings.

GRANDMA'S HOMEMADE EGG NOODLES

- 2 cups flour
- Pinch of salt
- 2 eggs
- 2 half egg shells of water

Put all ingredients in center of flour. Use fork, mix together. Pour on floured table. Knead until real stiff. Divide dough in half. Roll dough out on floured table till about 1/8 inch thin. Cut several 2-inch strips, placing them on top of each other. With knife very carefully cut floured dough strips into thin noodles. After each half is cut into noodles let dry overnight by mixing out noodles with flour and spread out on table. Cook noodles in chicken broth.

BEEF AND RICE FIESTA

- 1 lb. ground beef
 - 1 medium sliced onion
 - 1 1/2 cups water
 - 1 can condensed mushroom soup
 - 1 can whole kernel corn
 - 1 t salt
 - 1 t chili powder
 - 1 1/2 cups minute rice, uncooked
 - 1 medium tomato, cut in eighths
 - 1 green pepper, cut in strips
- In skillet brown ground beef. Add onion and cook over medium heat. Drain excess fat. Add water, mushroom soup, corn, salt

and chili powder. Bring to a boil. Stir in rice. Add tomatoes and green pepper. Cover and simmer 5 minutes. Fluff with fork. Makes about five servings.

HAMBURGER STEW

- 1 lb. ground beef
 - 1/4 cup onions, cut
 - 2 cups water
 - 5 medium potatoes, cut
 - 5 carrots, cut in slices
 - 1 can (17 oz.) whole kernel corn
 - 1 can (17 oz.) green beans
 - 1 can (14 oz.) whole tomatoes
 - 2 cans (8 oz.) tomato sauce
 - 1 can tomato paste
- In slow cooker put uncooked beef, onions, potatoes and carrots in water. Cover and cook on high five hours. Add remaining ingredients (do not drain corn and green beans). Cover and cook for 2 hours, stirring occasionally.

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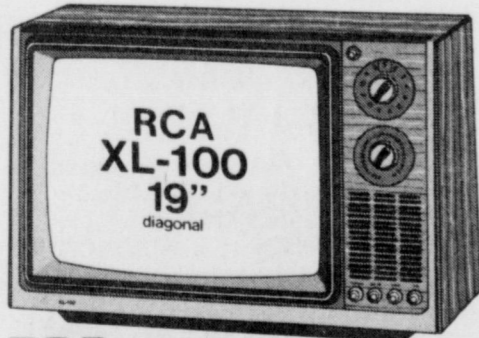

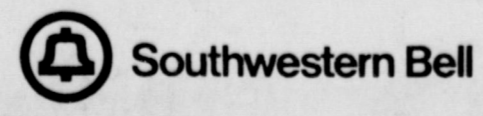

Worth Quoting

Monday, I composed a somewhat favorable column to use in this space agreeing that purchasing water from the City of Wichita Falls would be the best possible solution for longterm water needs for Electra. I had always been in favor of rebuilding the Old Electra Lake, but I wasn't completely sure that I wanted that lake for drinking water supplies or I was just remembering the many pleasant times spent swimming and fishing in the old lake before it was drained.

Anyway, I picked up the Big City News this morning and read where the City of Wichita Falls had "flatly" turned down Electra's request for the purchase of 500,000 gallons of water per day on a stand by basis only so the first column had to be scrapped Wednesday morning.

I should have known something like this would have happened . . . I mean, we all know how much Electra is appreciated in Wichita Falls. We all know that they love for us to spend our dollars over there and they would do just about anything in the world for us as long as it involved a knife in the back.

I've wanted to write a "Boycott Wichita Falls" column for a long time and Tuesday's actions by the Wichita Falls Board of Aldermen is just too much to swallow.

Only Mayor Kenneth Hill and Alderman Curtis Smith were in favor of allowing the purchase of water by Electra and to the rest of that city's leaders I would rather not comment on.

This could possibly be the best thing that ever happened to Electra though. Maybe now we can go ahead and rebuild our lake. We can go ahead and become independent of that City in more ways than one. And maybe now, everybody who runs over to that city with their weekly paycheck will stop and realize that their money is going to build Wichita Falls water reservoirs . . . water that they don't care to share with Electra.

A boycott by Electra may not affect Wichita Falls very much. But how ever mild a protest it may be, we would at least be telling these people that they can stuff it.

Electra has always been independent of the majority of influences by that City and this action by the Wichita Falls Board of Aldermen, I think, will assure a uniting of the efforts of the people of this community to move further from

dependency on anyone but ourselves. I love Electra and when anyone can deny such a necessity to the city I love, or to anyone for that matter, especially when they have an abundance, is simply too much for me to swallow.

As I See It....



Present and future water supplies for communities in Wichita County have made the headlines recently . . . all centering around the Wichita Falls city council.

Iowa Park, as well as almost every community in the area, is buying water from Wichita Falls. And now we're asking for our maximum daily purchase to be increased from a million gallons to two million.

It's still unclear what the Wichita Falls council's decision on our request was, but it's obvious the vote was to not sell water, even untreated water, to our sister city of Electra.

Iowa Park has been buying water from Wichita Falls since 1972, when our lakes dried up and we were forced to build a transmission line to get water for a thirsty community.

Now we're in a drought again, and needing more water. And the majority of the present Wichita Falls council appears against selling any more water than they now sell, if as much.

Curtis Smith, one of the council members, who headed a six-month committee study of the water supply situation, says Wichita Falls has plenty of water and would be in no difficulty to sell what is being asked, including Electra's proposal.

But Hardy McAlister, along with a couple other on that council, want to sell only 20 percent of the safe daily yield to outside entities, whatever that means.

I understand there has been a lot of comments from Wichita Falls

business people, as well as residents, concerning last week's council action. They don't believe their council members are acting in the best interest of Wichita Falls or neighboring communities.

Certainly the council's action was not in line with the thinking of the Wichita Falls Board of Commerce and Industry.

Where those voting against sale of water appear to be jealous of anyone who chooses not to live in Wichita Falls, the BCI's policy has been "anything that is good for the area is good for the city."

I suggest it works the other way, too. What's not good for the area is harmful to Wichita Falls. And that includes J.C. Boyds' bookstore and his precious downtown project.

Iowa Park's mayor, Johnny Crawford, expressed confidence recently that everything will be worked out, and we will be allowed to purchase what water we need. I tend to go along with him.

Every community in this part of the country did what was available to them to secure water, before going to Wichita Falls. Iowa Park, for instance, has built three lakes.

The problem is, Wichita Falls, due to being larger and having a greater financial base, has secured all the lake sites in this part of the country, except the proposed site near Ringgold. OK, I'll give the city the credit for having a few farsighted people as well.

Iowa Park residents for years drank water from the irrigation ditch, and were forced to resort to that source again in summers of 1970 and 1971. I'd go to court with Wichita Falls before I'd resort to that salt water again.

I firmly believe the problem will be worked out. Isolationism may have been popular when this nation was in its infancy, but no longer.

I believe the responsible thinking leaders of our neighboring city will be like cream, and come to the top.

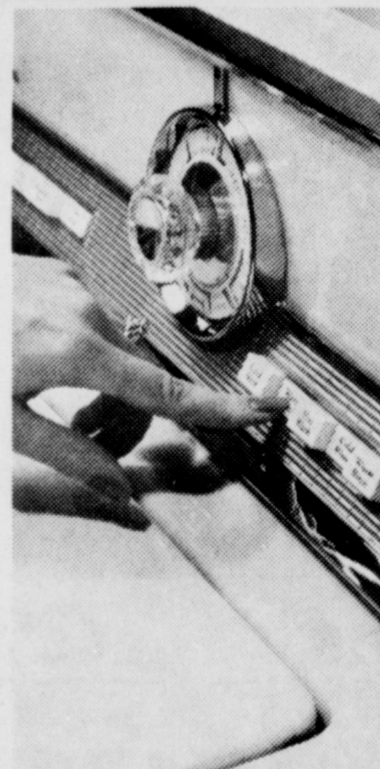

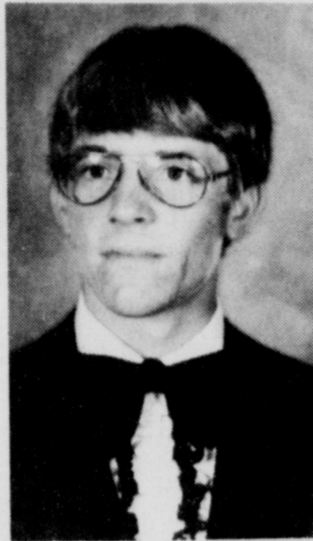

high jump, clearing 6-2, and was declared winner with fewest misses. Jeff Nolen

was fifth. Troy Linticum had problems with his grip on the vaulting pole and had to settle for fourth place with a 12-6 leap. He had cleared 13-0 the week before under far less favorable conditions.

Troy Thompson actually broke one of the oldest division records, the long jump, but could place no better than fourth. His 21-4 bettered the 21-1 1/2 established by Davis of Dunbar back in 1968.

Crittenden was the only Mean Green runner to earn a point during the afternoon. Like Thompson, he also broke a division record and at the same time established one of the better times for the year among high school milers in the state, but failed to win first place.

Both girls and boys seventh and eighth grade teams are to compete in a meet Friday at Vernon.

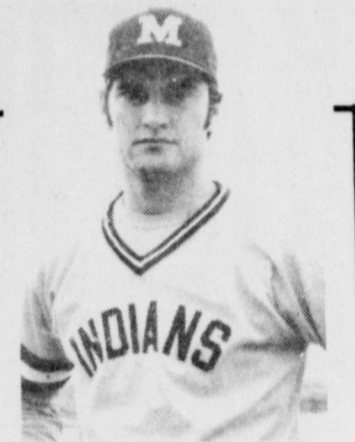
Free clinic for LL

Ten students of Mrs. Billy Hacker participated in a piano and organ recital Saturday afternoon at Faith Baptist Church.

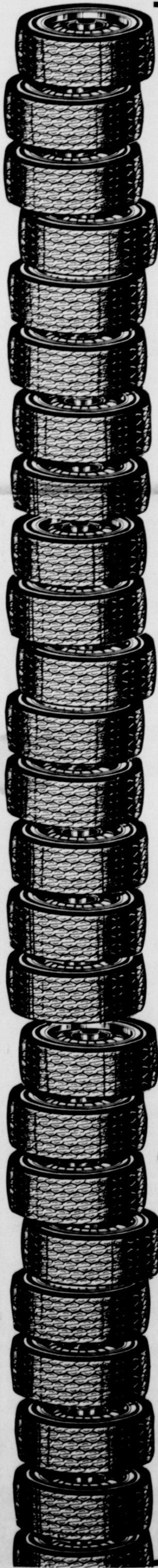

Due to a traumatic birth -- forceps were used, both collar bones were broken and oxygen was delayed -- Christina has mild cerebral palsy.

When she began receiving therapy at the center in July 1977, she could not walk or sit alone.

Budget of the center is \$321,401 and much of that comes from the annual Easter Seal mail-in appeal.

Bob Birk is Iowa Park chairman of the Easter Seal Appeal. He said he is appreciative of the help received in the mail-in campaign from Theta Epsilon chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha.

Horse field day, judging Tuesday on Waggoner

A Horse Field Day and Judging Contest, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be held Tuesday at the W.T. Waggoner Ranch, Whiteface Division Headquarters, one mile south of U.S. Highway 287 on the Wichita/Wilbarger County-Line Road, according to Ed Garnett, District Extension Agent for Extension District 3, and Dick Yeager, Waggoner's Farm and Ranch Manager.

All interested persons are invited to participate in the field day, Garnett said, where 4-H Club members and adults will try their hands at judging, classifying, and evaluating 100 head of yearling Waggoner Estate fillies and geldings. Preregistration with your County Extension Agent is requested.

The program will begin at 9 a.m., with a welcome by Dick Yeager. A response and purpose for the field day will then be given by Garnett.

At 9:15 a.m., B.F. Yeates and Dr. Doug Householder, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Horse Specialists stationed at College Station, will explain a horse's conformation as related to the work it does under saddle.

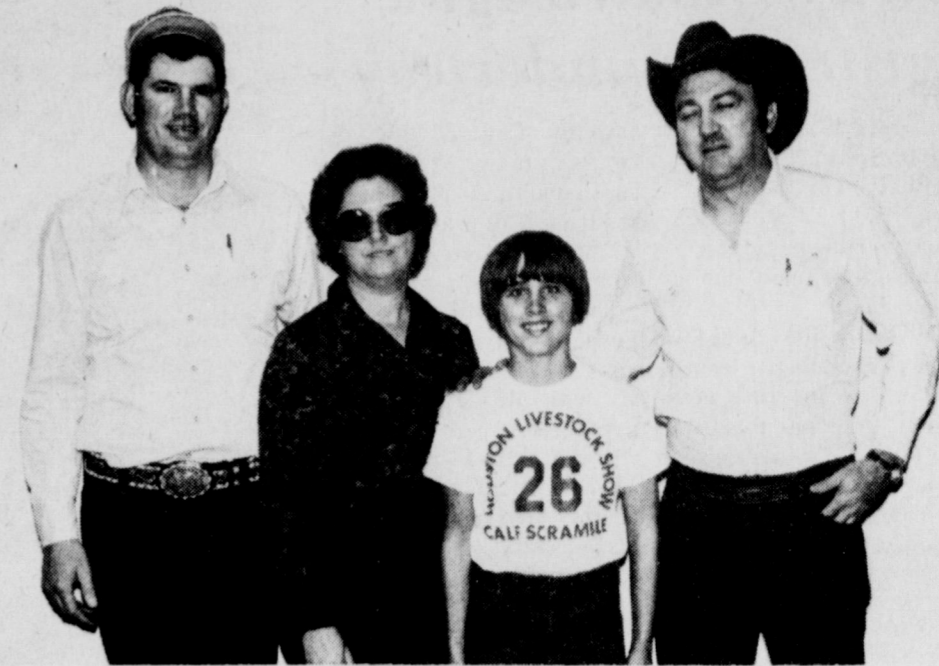
At 10 a.m., everyone attending the field day will evaluate 100 head of young Waggoner Estate horses and classify them.

Following the horse evaluation, lunch will be served. During the lunch break, Frank Handley, who once broke horses for the Waggoner Ranch, will tell how horse breaking was in "the old days" along with a few other yarns.

A judging contest, with four classes of horses, will be held at 1 p.m. Official placings will be made by Yeates, Householder, and Dr. Jim Heird, Texas Tech University Horse Judge Instructor.

There will be three divisions in the judging -- adults, seniors from 14 to 19 years of age, and juniors 13 years of age and under. One class of mules will be judged for the purpose of breaking ties in the Horse Judging Contest.

Following the judging, Wes O'Neal, Whiteface Division Foreman, and some of the Waggoner cowboys will explain their methods of breaking horses.

No benefit seen

Skip-row planting of cotton does not pay, according to a demonstration by James and Loys Barbour in the Wichita Valley. The skip-row pattern was two rows planted and

one row skipped. Barbour laughs and says, "This demonstration wasn't planned; it just turned out that way. A shaft key was missing on the new planter, and I planted about 20 acres with one box not planting. It made a perfect two in and one out row pattern across the field".

The cotton with every row planted made 520 pounds of lint per acre compared to

385 pounds of lint for the skip-row cotton. The yield was reduced by 135 pounds by skip-rowing. This represents a \$70.25 loss from this practice.

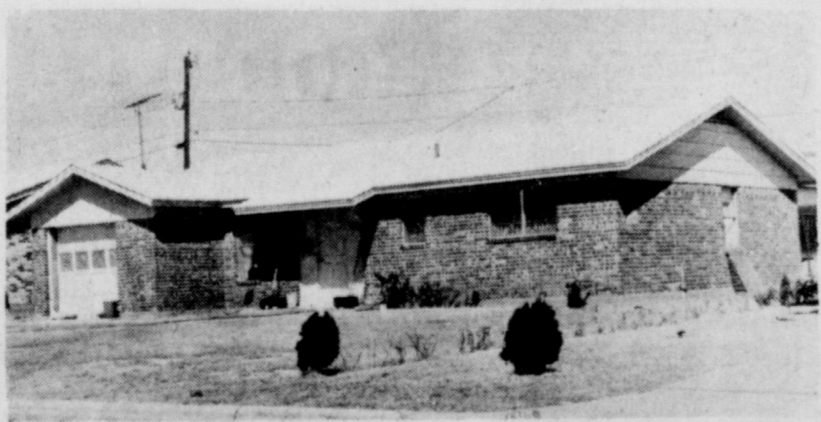
