

Baston-Kieren wedding vows are recited here Friday evening

The First United Methodist Church was the scene of a Friday evening ceremony uniting in marriage Miss Catherine Ann Baston and Edward Hayden Kieren, Jr.

Parents of the couple are Mr. and Mrs. Frank Baston of Iowa Park and Mr. and Mrs. Edward Kieren of Wichita Falls.

The Rev. Mike Jackson, pastor, was the officiant for the double-ring seven thirty o'clock nuptials before an altar table centered with an open Bible flanked by tall white candles glowing in gold candlesticks. On either side were triangular arrangements of pink gladioli, burgundy carnations intermingled with baby's breath, leather and emerald greenery.

The background setting featured a brass unity

candelabrum adorned with the chosen greenery and three single white candles, two of which burned during the ceremony and were lifted by the bride and groom to light the meaningful third candle after the exchange of vows. Pink satin bows decorated the church pews.

Providing a program of prelude selections was Kerry Johnston, organist, who played "Psalm", "Peace Be With You", and "Aria". 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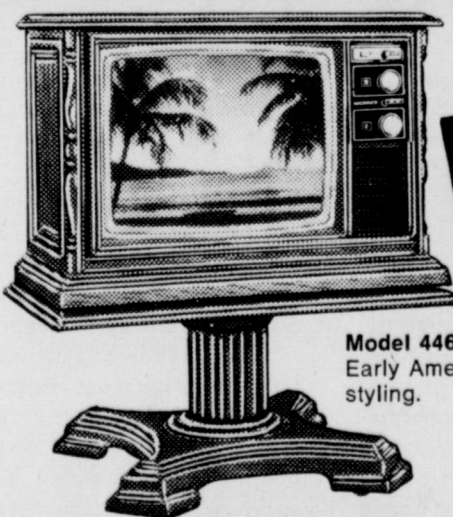

STUDY CLUB TOLD

Working prisoners saving tax dollars

The nave on the wheel of interest in the Texas Heritage program observed Thursday afternoon by the 23 Study Club was a lecture on "Texas Prison Industries" by Mrs. W.G. Steele. Attesting to extensive research, the lecture showed how the prison industries are saving the taxpayers of Texas considerable money and helping the inmates return to communities and make a success of their lives.

Other strong spokes on the wheel were a meditation by Mrs. D.O. James, Texas Mother of the Year for 1978, an original prose reading "There, but for the Grace of God, Go I" by Mrs. Earle Denny, and a tasting tea featuring a variety of foods prepared by club members from foods grown in Texas during the social hour.

The meeting took place in the home of Mrs. T.M. Clark and her co-hostess was Mrs. Chauncey Weiler.

Mrs. Rollins Woodall was leader for the afternoon. Mrs. Earl Watson, federation counselor, discussed the TFWC kitchen project for M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston explaining that its purpose was to accommodate out patients who stay in motels or apartments while receiving treatment at the hospital.

Mrs. James used "A Bouquet of Sweet Ps's" based on Psalm 23 for her devotional topic.

Mrs. Steele's informative talk emphasized how the prison population in 21 units is indirectly contributing to Texas' healthy economy.

"Texas Department of Corrections has turned the

old time penal system into a series of industrial and vocational facilities which turn inmates into skilled, responsible personnel, while, at the same time, removing the cost of their care from the taxpayer and providing a substantial profit to the state", she said in her introduction.

She hastened to say that the state-run lockups do not make every prisoner an exemplary, job holding citizen, but the TDC was trying hard and had come a long way since it was known as "The Alcatraz of Texas".

Mrs. Steele stated that there are now 21,700 inmates in Texas penal institutions and that probably 9000 will have entered and 7200 been released during the year. She attributed the industrial programs in the system to reducing the per day inmate cost to \$5.20, the lowest in the nation. Referring to the extensive vocational programs, she told how enough meat, poultry and vegetables were produced each year to reduce monies spent on outside food purchases to only 76 cents per prisoner per day.

She mentioned the school bus repair program established at the request of school districts as one of the largest prison operated industries within the confines of the state penal

system. Other facilities in which the prisons excel include the shoe factory, which turns out all types of shoes including complicated orthopedic ones and braces for indigent children, a garment factory, broom and mop factory, the Braille project and record conversion facility.

Mrs. Steele spoke with pride in regard to the educational curricula ranging from the secondary school level, junior college program and even a B.A. degree. In specialized training, she said that many inmates are trained to be dental lab assistants and make partial plates or

dentures for inmates and children and adults under care of the state hospitals and Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Mrs. E.F. Soell directed a short business meeting before the tasting tea. Twenty members were present.

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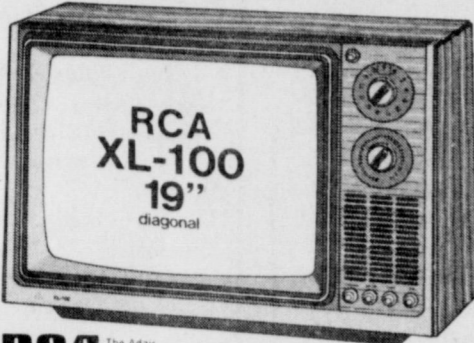



 1/2 t salt
 1 t paprika
 1/2 t garlic powder
 1/2 t pepper
 1/2 cup ketchup
 1/2 cup water
 2 t vinegar
 1 t soy sauce
 1/4 t Tabasco sauce
 1 t dry mustard
 2 T brown sugar
 1 pint sliced mushrooms

Brown chops on both sides; drain off fat and season with salt, garlic powder, paprika and pepper. Mix remaining ingredients together; pour over chops. Cover and simmer one hour; add sliced mushrooms last 10 minutes of baking time.

BAKED CHICKEN AND RICE

1-2 1/2 lb. fryer, cut up
 Season to taste with salt and pepper

Place 2 1/2 cups of uncooked minute rice in baking dish with 1/2 stick melted margarine. Lay chicken pieces on top of rice. Pour 1 can mushroom soup and 1 can cream of chicken soup over chicken. Bake in 350 degree oven 1 1/2 hours.

RICE AND MEAT CASSEROLE

1 onion, chopped
 1 bell pepper, chopped
 Brown onion and pepper in skillet.
 1 cup rice, cooked
 1 can peas
 2 cups cooked meat of your choice, diced
 3 eggs, beaten

Pour rice over onion and pepper. Add eggs, meat and peas. Stir until eggs coat rice, then cook for 15 minutes.

CHERRY MUFFINS

1 cup shortening
 1 cup brown sugar
 4 eggs
 8 oz. jar maraschino cherries
 1 cup pecans
 2 cups flour
 1 t baking powder
 1/2 t salt
 2 t vanilla
 2 T cherry juice

Cream sugar, shortening and egg yolks. Sift dry ingredients together, add to creamed mixture. Add cherry juice and vanilla, then stiffly beaten egg whites.

Grease muffin tins. Put a few pecans in bottom of muffin tins. Drop a little dough on top of pecans; add a cherry and more dough. Bake at 350 about 25 minutes. Yield: 16 muffins.

ICE BOX PIE

1 pkg. yellow cake mix, prepared according to directions and baked.
 1 pkg. Philadelphia cream cheese
 1 pkg. instant vanilla pudding
 1 can crushed pineapple, drained
 1 pkg. Dream Whip
 Maraschino cherries
 Pecans

Mix pudding and let set for 5 minutes; add cheese and beat until smooth. Put on cake and refrigerate for 10 minutes. Add crushed pineapple and let set another 10 minutes. Then top with Dream Whip.

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

Letters to the Editor

Mr. Hamilton;

As you know when I talked with you previously about the arrest of my son on the false charge of DWI by our so called City Police, I stated that I would let you know the outcome of this action. I received word that this charge had been dismissed due to a lack of any type of evidence. It is a sad state of affairs when a City Police dep't has such bad leadership, and such poor quality Police Officers that an incident like this can take place, I realize that due to their inexperience and lack of training and leadership that an Officer can make a mistake in the interpretation of the actions of a person coming into their custody, but there should be only one such mistake of this nature, instead of two. As you may remember another youth was mishandled by the City Police and was very nearly deprived of the medical attention that he required because of their actions in removing and retaining his identification. When a person is involved in a serious accident in which injuries to the face and skull are sustained as in the case of my son, they should receive prompt medical treatment, instead our City Police cancelled an ambulance which they had first called and kept him at the scene of the accident and then transported him to a hospital in a patrol car, (one of the cardinal sins) something that any one with any kind of training knows is not done except in case of extreme emergency, and then right then not later.

I would still like to know why they

charged him with DWI and on what grounds, as it is required that a person show a minimum of .10 not .02 as was the case of my son, I realize that making an arrest looks great for the Officer involved, except when, as in this case, it reflects back on that Officers training and leadership. You remember when we had all the problems a couple of years back? About investigation of those being hired for the Police Dep't, it seems we still have that problem, as one of the officer's involved was fired by two Security organizations in Wichita, and was going to be fired by the Law enforcement agency he was working for at the time he was hired by our City. I wonder if this or the fact that Wichita Falls P.D. turned down his application for employment after conducting a background check was brought to the attention of our city leaders prior to his employment?

Bob; I could go on and on with this dep't of ours but I doubt if it would accomplish anything useful, the only thing I can say right now is I am not sure if I am going to accept the dismissal as sufficient for my family's peace of mind or whether I will pursue this matter further, as every time I look at my son and think about all the Medical treatment that was required after his release from Jail and the fact that he could have died in there as a result of the Police Dep't's action, well I'm wondering if further action would or should be necessary as an object lesson to the City.

permit rearrangement of lights at the high school courts.

Johnson eligible for parole now

Convicted Iowa Park grain dealer H.C. Johnson is eligible for parole.

U.S. District Judge Robert Hill modified Johnson's sentence, making him eligible for parole earlier. In modifying Johnson's sentence, Hill left the time of Johnson's parole to be determined by the parole board.

Johnson, who had requested that his sentence be reduced, was convicted on eight counts of issuing false grain warehouse receipts.

In February 1978 he was sentenced to 16 years in federal prison. Johnson began serving his term about a year ago at Leavenworth, Kan., but later was transferred to the federal facility at El Reno, Okla.

As I See It....



With everybody's cost of living and doing business zooming up like skyrocket these days, it's easy to listen to the gloom and doom folks about how we're all heading toward the stone age again.

There's so much talk about how bad things are, and how much worse they will be, it's no wonder people are worried sick about the situation.

But it ain't necessarily so. One of the top economists in East Texas spoke at a meeting I attended over the weekend. He's regional manager for E.F. Hutton. You know the folks. "When E.F. Hutton speaks, everyone listens".

Our country has been on a high for the past few years. That's called an expansion. And he said with every expansion, there's to be a contraction. He was indicating what the government people have been saying, that we're facing a recession.

But before you jump out your upstairs window, let's hear what he said about the recession. A recession isn't necessarily all that bad.

According to the Hutton man, the recession will be soft, with

unemployment running no more than seven percent over the nation. That's not much.

What will pick us up quickly will be the money available for long term loans.

He said most of the money people have deposited today is in short term notes. That's where all the big interest payments are now. Not long term.

Short term interest will be lowered, to a point where long term investments will once again become attractive to investors. That's when we will start building homes at reasonable interest rates again, as well as businesses, land acquisitions, business investments, etc.

Another indicator about the future is that the speaker said he expects prime interest rates to drop down around 8 to 8.5 percent.

Oddly enough, he said that Saturday, and Monday one of the leading banks in the Dallas area lowered its rate a few points.

Another basis Hutton has for believing the recession will be a short term is the business and manufacturing inventory.

He said a recession comes about when items are over produced, and purchasing slows down. Then the recession will last until the stocks in inventory are reduced to a normal level.

His point was, that since the recession of 1974, manufacturers and businesses have kept their inventories at a very low level. In fact, many industries do not even purchase their raw materials until the merchandise has already been sold. Then they produce the items sold, and they don't have to hold anything in inventory.

So, if we do feel a pinch of recession here, which is always less than it is in other parts of the country, I feel pretty well assured that it will be short-lived.

Then there's better days ahead. And so it goes . . .

Ezzell resigns; Maier removed

Unrelated actions leaves Holliday city council shorthanded

Holliday's municipal government was left operating on the bare essentials when Ben Ezzell resigned Monday night as mayor and Alderman Fred Maier was removed from office.

However, it did not appear Maier's removal or Ezzell's resignation were related.

About halfway through the two-hour regular council session Monday night Ezzell announced he had a statement to read.

"After much consideration and due to many different circumstances, the following statement and action has

become necessary," Ezzell said, reading from a prepared letter.

"With the city business becoming more and more time consuming, I've neglected my personal business to a critical point. I'm unable to devote the time required to operate both businesses, so it now becomes necessary for me to step down as mayor of Holliday...This resignation is effective immediately," Ezzell said.

When he finished reading the statement, Ezzell gathered up his paperwork and took a seat in the

audience at city hall.

Mayor Pro Tem Jim Virdell then took charge of the meeting.

A few minutes earlier the council had voted 3-1 to remove Alderman Maier from office. Alderman Melvin Bills cast the lone dissenting vote.

Maier, who had missed the last three meetings without requesting a leave of absence, could be removed from office according to Texas law, Virdell said.

Ezzell and Bills argued against Maier's removal, largely because he had been

what they considered a good councilman and because he had not filed for re-election.

But the votes of Virdell, Mary Denney and Mike Parker formally removed Maier from office.

Ezzell's resignation and Maier's removal threw a proverbial kink in the works at city hall.

For beginners, Virdell had to assume the mayor's post which leaves only three persons on the council barely constituting a quorum.

Add to that the fact that Maier was the treasurer. With him and Ezzell gone new persons must be authorized to sign checks for Friday's payroll.

The council chose Parker to handle the treasurer's

duties.

Ironically, the next council election is less than three weeks away—but it's too late to change the ballots.

From Monday night's discussion it appears nothing will be done until after the April 7 election at which time councilmen probably will choose among themselves someone to guide them through the year remaining on Ezzell's term.

The council could hold a special election or appoint someone to fill the vacancy on the council caused when someone among their ranks assumes the mayoral duties.

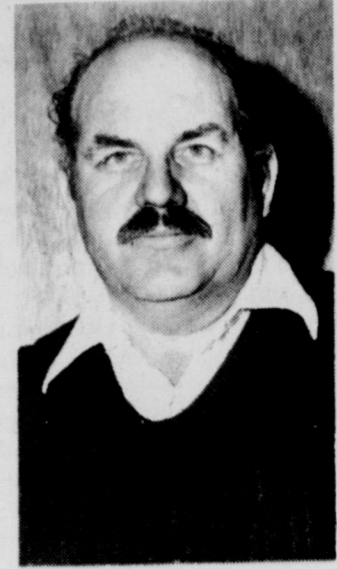
In other business Monday night the council voted to retain its 1 percent sales tax

on electric and gas utilities charged residential users here. The tax adds about \$3,000 annually to municipal coffers.

Councilmen indicated abolition of the optional utility tax would have little effect toward lowering individual bills.

The council discussed problems of picking up trash during inclement weather and water superintendent Elvin Hoover said driving down muddy alleys was tearing up the trash truck.

Joe Conway, 17, was formally hired as a general maintenance employee, and councilmen discussed filling the tax assessor-collector's position.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF IOWA PARK, TEXAS, providing that the code of ordinances be amended by revising SECTIONS 18-6 AND 18-7 OF SAID CODE; PROVIDING FOR AN INCREASE IN THE MINIMUM AMOUNT OF PROPERTY DAMAGE NECESSARY FOR CONSTITUTING AN ACCIDENT REPORT.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

Section 1. That section 18-6 and section 18-7 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, be amended so that such sections shall read as follows:

"Sec. 18-6. Accident reports-Required; time period.

The driver of a vehicle involved in an accident resulting in injury to or death of any person, or property damage to an apparent extent of TWO HUNDRED FIFTY DOLLARS (\$250.00) or more, shall immediately by the quickest means of communication give notice of such accident to the police department if such accident occurs within the city."

"Sec. 18-7. Same-Forwarding written report.

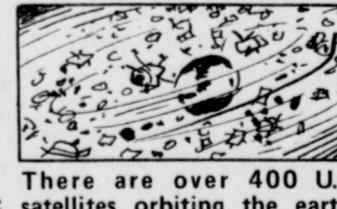
The driver of a vehicle which is in any manner involved in an accident resulting in injury to or death of any person or total property damage to an apparent extent of TWO HUNDRED FIFTY DOLLARS (\$250.00) or more shall, within twenty-four (24) hours after such accident, forward a written report of such accident to the police department. The provisions of this section shall not be applicable when the accident has been investigated at the scene by a police officer while such driver was present thereat."

Section 2. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.
