#### Clarence Roberts Dies In Veterans Hospital; Was Sick Several Years

Funeral services were neld Monday morning at 10:00 for Clarence Roberts, 58, at the Methodist church with Rev. Guy Perdue officiating. Rev. Mark P. Hines of Vernon and Rev. William Greenhaw of Grant Street Methodist church, Wichita Falls, assisted.

Mr. Roberts was born in Kent, Iowa, April 28, 1895. He moved with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Joe Roberts to Denver, Colo., in early childhood. He came to Wichita county in 1919 and married Miss Helen Ecklebarger in Wichita Falls in 1921. They moved to Iowa Park nine years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Roberts operated a confectionery on West Park in 1942 and again in 1944. He was employed as boiler fireman at the Sheppard air force base less than a year before entering the veterans hospitai at McKinney four months ago. He had been a patient at the veterans hospital, where he died last Friday, several time during the past six years.
