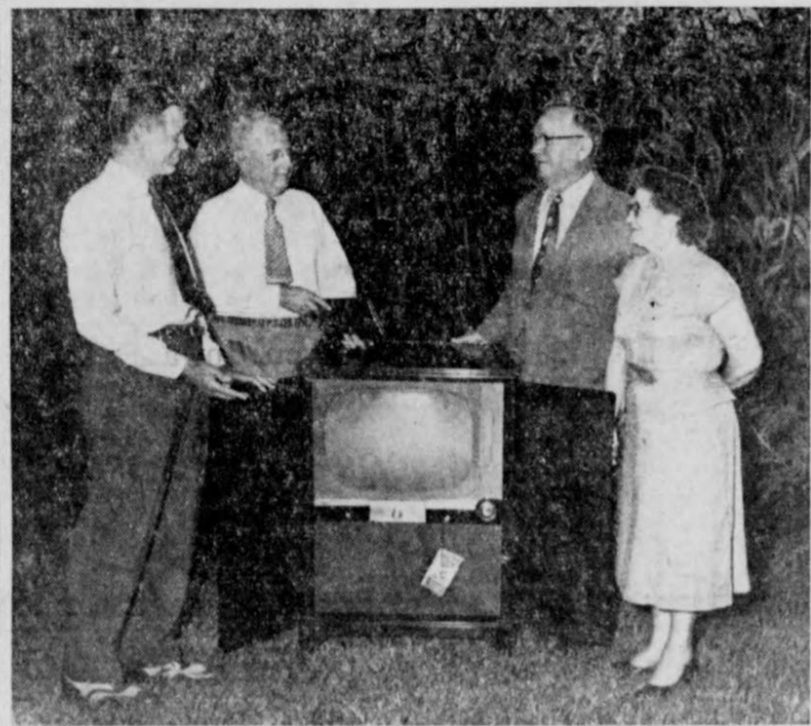

## Friends Honor Bradfords with Party and Gift of Television Set

An Alumna of Iowa Park H. S. A host of friends assembled on the lawn of Dr. and Mrs. Gordon G. Clark last Saturday evening to honor and pay tribute to Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Bradford, beloved educators and citizens.

The reception was planned to show the deep spirit of appreciation the community feels for the Bradfords, who during their 30 years affiliation with the local school system as superintendent and teacher have stimulated almost innumerable people, both young and old, to the highest in education, conduct and character.

As they move to their home at 1007 Brook in Wichita Falls there is a consciousness that the work they have done will multiply through the years and only eternity can efface their imprint upon the warp and woof of the many lives their lives have touched.

The reception proper took place in the backyard area of the Clark lawn where colorful Mexican appointments and wrought iron furniture created a gay and pleasing setting.

Dr. Clark acted as master of ceremonies for the evening's entertainment which was inaugurated with a sing song directed by Mrs. Charles W. Coppock.

Mrs. T. J. Pace, who came to Iowa Park to teach in the high school in 1920, the year Mr. Bradford became superintendent, gave a history of the high school from then until now. The talk showed emphatically that progress of the school during those years has depended largely upon the ability and wisdom of Mr. Bradford.

In 1920 school opened with eight teachers. Mrs. Dave O. Harbour, one of that group, was in attendance at the party Saturday evening. The school had lost its classification and affiliation.

Through the indefatigable efforts of teachers and pupils the school received 8 units of affiliation that year and the next year 11 units. Iowa Park now has 32 units of affiliation and a teaching personnel of 32.

Remembering, Mrs. Pace said their first money making project was a pie supper. In 1924 the W. F. George High School building was completed. The spacious auditorium, gymnasium, laboratory and ample classroom spaces registered the ending of a beautiful fairy tale to those who had worked under such crowded conditions.

In 1940 the new elementary school building was finished and the cafeteria opened.

In praising Mr. Bradford and his work Mrs. Pace asserted, "I feel that we have every right to be proud of our school with its well-balanced program of athletics, its band, agriculture, home economics and other academic subjects. It takes a strong superintendent and a wise board of education to keep a school from becoming over-balanced. We also appreciate having a man like Mr. Bradford handle our school funds; thanks to his honesty, wisdom and ability for the sound financial condition of our school today."

One of the greatest tributes Mrs. Pace paid to the educator came when she described his genuine interest and concern in all young

people. She stressed that he was not only a teacher in the ordinary sense to impart knowledge, but that he took time to counsel with each individual who sought his advice and thereby aided in the formation of sound character and moral habits. Through his recommendation scores of young people have been elevated to enviable positions in the business and professional world.

Mrs. James Sewell paid tribute to Mrs. Bradford and their daughter Mrs. John Guthrie of Denver, Colo., "the superintendent's greatest source of inspiration." She praised Mrs. Bradford for her ability to make and keep a home that is recognized as a radiating point of hospitality and good cheer, and described her as a woman of energy, high ideals, achievement, modesty and unselfish devotion to family and friends. Mrs. Bradford and Mrs. Guthrie were presented lovely corsages by Mrs. Sewell.

Mrs. D. R. Jacquart of Selma, Ala., representing the ex-students of the high school, spoke words of appreciation for the life and influence of Mr. Bradford. She seasoned her talk with humor which featured pranks she and her classmates pulled "behind prof's back."

C. E. Birk, president of the board of education, also spoke words of highest commendation for Mr. Bradford as an educator, executive and man. He then presented the couple with a handsome television set, a gift from a large number of friends. A green leatherette book containing the names and addresses of all those who contributed to the purchase of the television set was presented the honored couple by T. J. Pace, long time member of the board of education.

The following panegyric which appears in the front of the book was composed by Mr. Pace:

On July 1, 1920, W. R. Bradford began his tenure of office as superintendent of our schools and with the exception of three years has since maintained that position.

Thus 33 years ago W. R. Bradford began a career of service to our city and community that will not be forgotten with the passing of the years. His long continued and unselfish devotion to his duties, to the problems of the school in both prosperous and adverse years, has inspired us with a deep respect and esteem that shall long be remembered.

His tireless effort and energy, his wisdom, experience and unassuming dignity enable us not only to weigh him as a public official, but to appreciate his many personal gifts and admirable qualities. Even though his many services during the years have often been unrewarded, one priceless treasure is his, the assurance that those that worked with him most and knew him best, honor his name and will ever hold him in affectionate memory.

And to you W. R. Bradford, we bid a respectful farewell upon your retirement from our schools; but to you Bob Bradford, we extend our best wishes as neighbor and friend.

During the evening Miss Ethyle Kidwell presided at the guest register. Refreshments were served by Mrs. Loys Barbour, C. E. Birk and Thomas Pace.

"The support of the people of Iowa Park in the water conservation program has been gratifying indeed. The Citizens can feel proud of their attitude. All we ask of you is to use some discretion and judgment in the amount of water used.

"Further restrictions will not be necessary unless our water situation becomes more critical; at such time you will be notified through your Local Newspaper.

### Easterwood to Preach Farewell Sermon Here Sunday Evening

Rev. James N. Easterwood will preach his farewell sermon Sunday night at the Baptist church. Seven years ago Sunday he preached his first sermon in Iowa Park. Prior to that he had served 38 months in the air force. He came here from Shawnee, Okla.

In 1946 when Mr. Easterwood came here the average Sunday School attendance was 193; it is now 303. Approximately 600 additions to the church membership have been recorded in these seven years.

During his ministry members have contributed to all missions about \$47,000. Total money raised and expended for all purposes has been \$142,000.

### High Winds Cause Two Injuries in Area; Good Rain Falls in County

Iowa Park and surrounding areas received welcome rainfall last Friday afternoon. With it came hard winds which did some damage out toward Valley View and Kamay, blowing down trees in that vicinity. Precipitation amounting to 2.83 inches was recorded at the experiment station. The temperature dropped 25 degrees in an hour. The showers began to fall around 4:30.

Johany Ray Carson of Valley Farms was slightly injured when struck in the head by a piece of flying sheet metal. He was working on an oil rig near Kamay. He was given emergency treatment at the Wichita Falls Clinic hospital and released.

I. L. Alvey was injured about 5:45 while on his way to work on the Arkansas Fuel lease. The wind was so strong it blew his car off the road into a ditch about 1/2 mile southwest of the river bridge. He received two broken ribs and almost cut his tongue in two.

He was brought to the Park Clinic by Buck Voyles, where he was given emergency treatment. The upset caused about \$700 damage to Mr. Alvey's car. The lease near Valley View where Mr. Alvey was headed was hard hit. Several buildings and tanks were blown down and some moved off their foundations.

At Kamay some 30 houses and business buildings and the Church of Christ were damaged. Telephone poles and all power lines were blown down and put out of commission.

Several power lines along the Wichita Falls-Iowa Park road also were blown down. During this storm and rain has been the only time during the afternoon the temperature has been under 100 degrees in nearly two weeks.

The ground breaking ceremony for the new educational building of the Presbyterian church on Sunday afternoon went according to schedule despite the temperature of 107 degrees.

Members of the congregation and friends gathered in the cooled-air sanctuary for the service. The minister, Rev. Maurice C. Yeagan, presided. Congregational singing included the doxology and a hymn. Organist was Mrs. Gayle Park.

Locke Lowrance, clerk of the session gave a history of the church from its founding in 1890. The church was organized by Rev. W. N. Dickey, evangelist for Dallas presbytery with 11 charter members. Services were first held in the dining room of the Montgomery hotel on the site now occupied by the Methodist church.

Following this the congregation adjourned to the north lawn where

on the corner of Ruby and Yosemite under leadership of John V. McCall who was supplying the Wichita Falls church along with Iowa Park. Dr. McCall built much of this church with his own hands, assisted by members.

Present building was erected in 1920 during the pastorate of Dr. Eugene S. Lowrance, who served 33 years. In 1930 a dining hall and kitchen were added.

An extensive remodeling and re-decorating program was carried out during 1945 and 1949. A Baldwin organ was installed in 1919, and in 1952 air conditioning was added.

Rev. L. McD. Kennedy of Fain Memorial in Wichita Falls brought greetings from the extension committee of Dallas presbytery, and gave the inspirational address.

First building was erected in 1893

the ground breaking took place in the shadow of the trees.

Lifting the first spadeful of dirt was Mrs. C. Birk, age 91, the oldest member of the congregation, and one of the most active. Others taking part were members of the building committee: Chairman John Clapp jr., Locke Lowrance and Luther F. Miller, Miss Clara Lowrance, the other member of the committee, was visiting in Georgia.

Chauncey Weiler made a series of pictures of the event including pictures of the small fry on whom the church depends for growth.

**ELECTION ORDER**

May 11, 1953

THE STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF WICHITA  
CITY OF IOWA PARK

At a regular session of the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, the following business was transacted, to-wit:

The following officers were present:

- R. E. Van Horn, Mayor
- W. G. Steele, Alderman
- W. J. Beasley, Jr., Alderman
- C. L. Metz, Alderman
- Allan W. Berry, Alderman

Motion was made by Allan W. Berry and seconded by C. L. Metz that an Election be held to determine whether the City of Iowa Park shall be authorized to sell the following portions of streets, to-wit:

One: That part of the Street along the South Boundary Line of Blocks 19 and 36 of the Texas Addition to the town of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, which lies West of North Second Street.

Two: That part of West Bank Street, lying West of the South Boundary Line of U. S. Highway No. 287 in the Texas Addition to the City of Iowa Park.

Three: That Part of North Third Street in the Texas Addition to the town of Iowa Park, lying South of West Washington Avenue.

Said motion was carried by the following vote: Those voting yes: W. G. Steele, W. J. Beasley, Jr., C. L. Metz, and Allan W. Berry. Those voting No: None. Whereupon the following election order was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, deemed it advisable to sell certain portions of the streets situated in Iowa Park, Texas, as hereinafter described:

Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that an election be held on the 20th day of July, 1953, at which election the following proposition will be submitted:

Shall the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, be authorized to sell the portions of streets located in the Texas Addition and original townsite of the town of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, as authorized by the revised statutes of the State of

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Texas, said property being described as follows:

One: That portion of the Street along the South Boundary Line of Block 19 and 36 of the Texas Addition to the town of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, which lies West of North Second Street.

Two: That part of West Bank Street, lying West of the South Boundary line of U. S. Highway No. 287 in the Texas Addition to the City of Iowa Park.

Three: That part of North Third Street in the Texas Addition to the town of Iowa Park, lying South of West Washington Avenue.

Said election shall be held at the City Hall in City Park in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, Wichita County, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election:

- Earle L. Denny
- M. E. Banks

Said election shall be held under the provisions of the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters of said City shall be allowed to vote.

And all voters desiring to support the proposition to sell said portions of said streets shall have printed on their Ballots "for the sale of said streets," and those opposing shall have printed on their ballots, "Against the sale of said streets."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas, regulating General Elections.

A copy of this order signed by the Mayor of said City shall serve as a proper notice of said election and the Mayor is directed to cause notice of said election to be posted at the places described for holding said election at least twenty (20) days prior to the date of said election, and have at least twenty (20) days notice of said election by publication of said notice duly signed by the Mayor in the Iowa Park Herald published in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, at least once a week for three weeks consecutively preceding said election.

**Soil Conservation**

A locally organized Soil Conservation district provides the framework and conservation leadership within a district. The stubble mulching field day at Punkin Center sponsored by the district did this.

Assistance was received from chambers of commerce, implement dealers, agencies located in the district, clubs, Midwestern university, farmers and ranchers.

The supervisors believe that cooperative efforts led by the district can best serve the conservation movement.

Ed Fester of Electra is constructing a farm pond.

Open type irrigation ditch checks were completed for John Hund of Wichita Falls. Frank Rauschuber of Iowa Park was the contractor.

Progress is being made in installing a complete conservation irrigation system on a farm owned by Charles Prothro and J. J. Perkins. The farm is located at Valley View. Ditches, borders, roads and leveling on 79 acres is now being done by K. P. Caldwell of Iowa Park.

Terracing has been slow up to date. However, several have said they will start soon after harvest. If farmers are unable to obtain a contractor, the district will attempt to obtain a contractor for the area.

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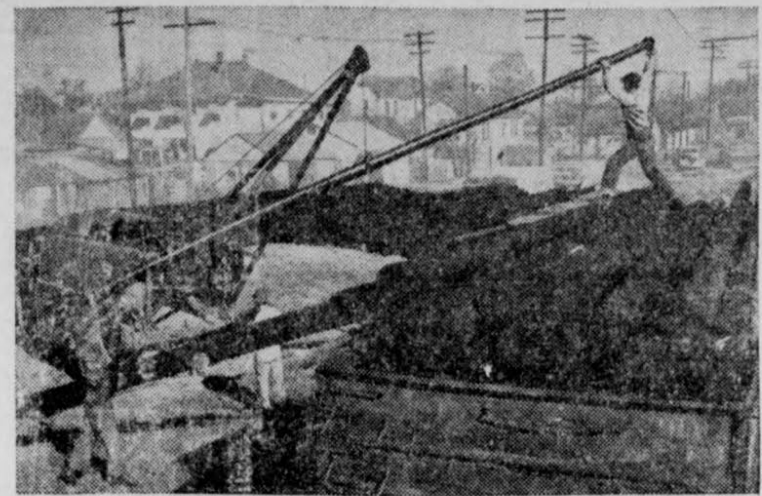

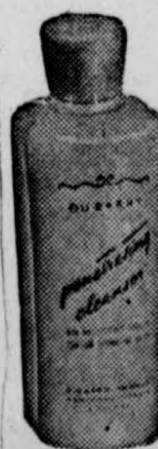

### Air Force Seeking Pilot, Observer Trainees

An aviation cadet selection team has been established at Hensley Field, Grand Prairie. Supplied with the most current and factual flying training information, the team will visit colleges, universities, air bases and cities in a wide area around Wichita county.

Cadets are trained to become pilots or aircraft observers. An observer is schooled in an aircrew specialty such as bombardment, navigation, radar or aircraft performance engineering.

Upon completion of one year of training, a cadet receives his silver wings and a commission as second lieutenant in the USAF reserves.
