## Saturday to climax Clean-Up Week

Saturday will be the climax of Iowa Park's annual Clean Up Week. Through the week, all property owners have been encouraged by the Chamber of Commerce and City to clean up debris around their homes and businesses, in the alleys, and vacant property.

Organizations and individuals are being asked to contribute their time Saturday to help pick up trash along roadsides and in parks.

Workers are being asked to meet at the Chamber of Commerce office at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, from where they will be directed to areas of responsibility.

Keith Aulds is chairman of this year's Clean Up Week.

The Chamber will be serving refreshments to all workers Saturday.

Aulds says he hopes to have the work. Residents who have items too large to be placed in trash containers are encouraged to contact the Chamber office, 592-5441, and a city truck will

be dispatched to pick it up.

The city, as has been the practice the past number of years, will hold the sanitary landfill open all day Saturday, where residents can haul their own debris. No fee will be charged that day.

The sanitary landfill is east of the dam at Buffalo Lake, and can be reached by entering the lake area from

the east side. Signs mark the landfill location route.

"I hope we can have a good turnout Saturday," commented Aulds. "We need to get the trash picked up in the ditches and in the parks before the weeds get too high. We've always had good participation on this project in the past because Iowa Park people are proud of their community, and how it looks to visitors."

## Burglaries increase

Incidents of burglary have jumped, according to Iowa Park police reports.

Police investigated a report Monday that a burglar had broken into a home at 809 N. Jackson.

Hawk senior discus hurler Kip Fuller will be returning to the state track meet for the third time in his high school career, and just like last year, he'll have company.

The husky Fuller placed second at the Region I meet in Odessa Saturday, as did miler Anthony Crittenden. The state meet will be Friday night of next week, in Memorial Stadium on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin.

The third athlete from Iowa Park competing at Odessa was high jumper Dennis Dillard. He had trouble adjusting to the approach area, and couldn't get any higher than 5-10, far below his normal for the season.

Fuller, though disappointed he couldn't beat Sweetwater's entry, had a good day in the circle. His throws all ranged from 166 feet to his best toss of 172-2.

The Hawk strongman was also standing third in the shot put, but was disqualified along with two other athletes in the event after a protest was lodged about their uniforms. His 54-foot toss would have stood him third had he not been disqualified.

Crittenden ran his second best time of the year, 4:29.34, but was second to Burkburnett's Andrew Daniels, who turned in a 4:25.8 clocking.

This will be Crittenden's first time in the state AAA championship meet, but Daniels was there last year, though he failed to place.

Coach Jim Arnold said Crittenden is working hard for the Austin trip, experiencing his two best workouts of the entire year early this week. He said the senior miler is feeling good and feels he can do quite a bit better at

## April good month for construction

Two new homes helped boost the building permits for April over the \$100,000 mark, according to figures reported by the city hall.

April permits were \$104,112, which gave the year's total \$379,057.

After an early slump in the winter, permits are now running at about the same levels of 1977 and 1976, but are

only slightly more than half of this time last year.

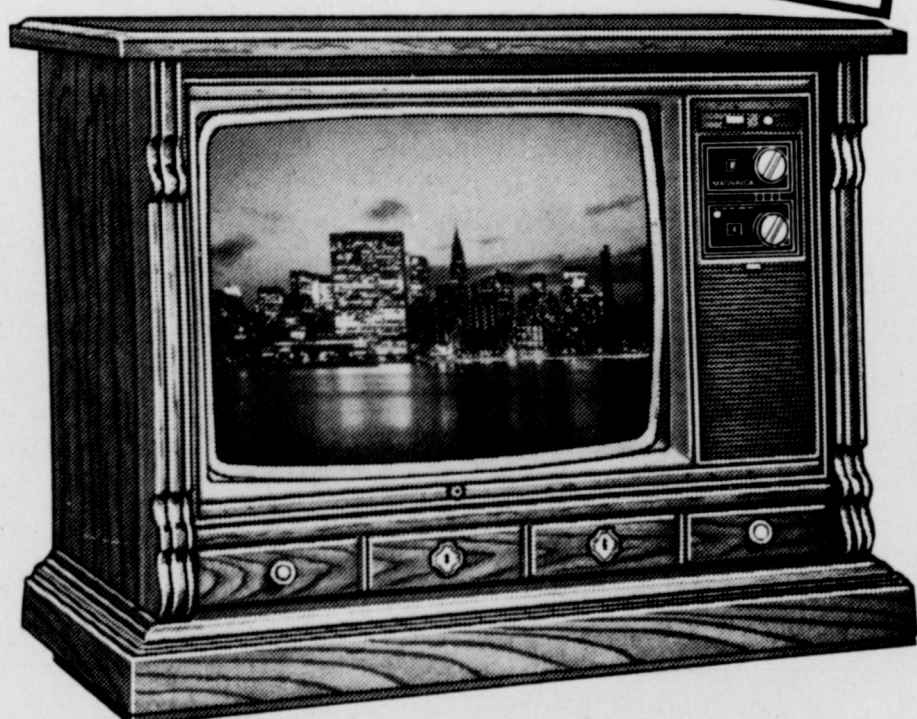

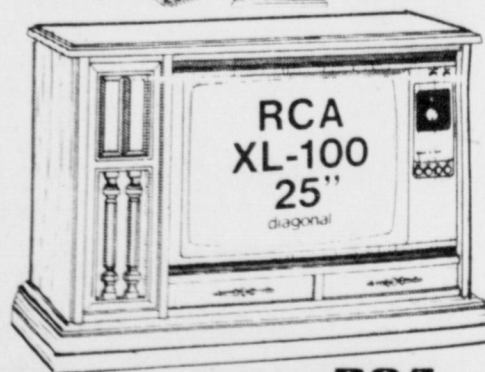
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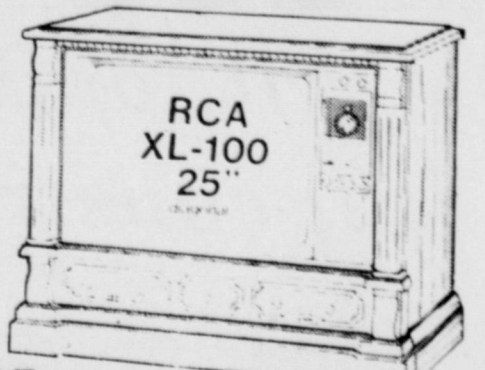

Laura (Mrs. Gerard) Raymond is one of the many cooks that appreciate casserole dishes and refrigerator desserts and consider them a boon to working homemakers. Her Easy Casserole recipe sounds like it is not only easy but nutritive as well. The ingredients are beef, corn, potatoes, butter and seasonings.

Corn is one of the most popular and versatile foods today. It is typically American and is surrounded by mystery and legend. The Indians believed it to be the gift of the Great Spirit. It grew wild in the highlands of southern Mexico and the pre-Columbian Indians "tamed" it and brought it north where

it now satisfies the most cultivated taste.

In considering the popularity of corn today it is interesting to know that the ladies of the 18th century French, La. once staged a "petticoat" rebellion because they ate too much of it. They were accustomed to fancier meals they had back home in France.

The Raymonds moved to Iowa Park from Guam three years ago. He has retired from the Air Force and works as supervisor for Flake Industries. A native of Omaha, Neb., Mrs. Raymond finished high school there and worked for the First National Bank in that city before her marriage. She is currently

employed as a nurses' aide at Wood Convalescent Center. She enjoys bowling and watching baseball.

## EASY CASSEROLE

1-1/2 lbs. ground beef  
1 large can cream style corn  
8-9 potatoes

1/4 cup butter or margarine  
Brown ground beef in pan. Pour off grease. Prepare potatoes into mashed. Butter bottom of medium size casserole dish. Place ground beef in bottom of dish, then corn and place potatoes on top. Dot with pieces of butter. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes or until light brown on top. Serves 4-5.

## ICE BOX CAKE

2 boxes vanilla pudding (instant or regular)  
2 boxes chocolate pudding (instant or regular)  
10-12 marachino cherries  
10-15 graham crackers

Prepare puddings as directed on boxes. Set aside. Place one layer of whole graham crackers side by side in approximately 5x8 oblong dish. Pour chocolate pudding on top. Arrange another layer of the crackers on chocolate pudding and top with vanilla pudding mix. Garnish with cherries. Chill. Serves 6.

## YANKEE POTATO SALAD

10-15 medium potatoes  
6-8 eggs  
2 T relish  
1 medium onion  
1/2 cup mayonnaise or preferred salad dressing  
2 T vinegar  
Salt, pepper, celery salt to taste  
2 T mustard  
2 T milk  
Peel potatoes and cube. Boil until tender. Hard boil the eggs. Chop up onions. Mix potatoes, onion and chopped eggs in medium size casserole dish. Sprinkle with salt, pepper, garlic salt and vinegar and set aside. Mix mayonnaise, mustard and milk in small bowl, then pour into potato mixture. Toss until well coated. Garnish with paprika and pickles if desired.

## EASY CHILI

1-1/2 lbs. ground beef  
2 large cans tomatoes  
2 large cans tomato sauce  
2 large cans dark kidney

beans  
Chili powder, salt and pepper to taste

Brown ground beef in large pan; pour off grease. Add tomatoes, tomato sauce and kidney beans. Season with chili powder, salt and pepper. Simmer 30-45 minutes. Serves 6-7.

## LASAGNE

1-1/2 lbs. ground beef  
2 large cans tomato sauce  
2 large cans tomato paste  
1 box lasagne noodles  
1 pkg. mozzarella cheese  
Salt, pepper and garlic salt to taste  
Small amount of Parmesan

cheese  
Brown ground beef in large sauce pan, pour off grease. Add tomato paste, tomato sauce, salt, pepper, garlic salt and small amount of water. Simmer one hour, stirring occasionally. In the meantime, prepare lasagne noodles as directed on package. Line a 5x8 baking dish with layer of noodles, pour on sauce. Put on strips of cheese. Continue layering until baking dish is full, then finish last layer with tomato sauce mixture. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake in 350 degree oven until bubbly on top. Serves 4-5.

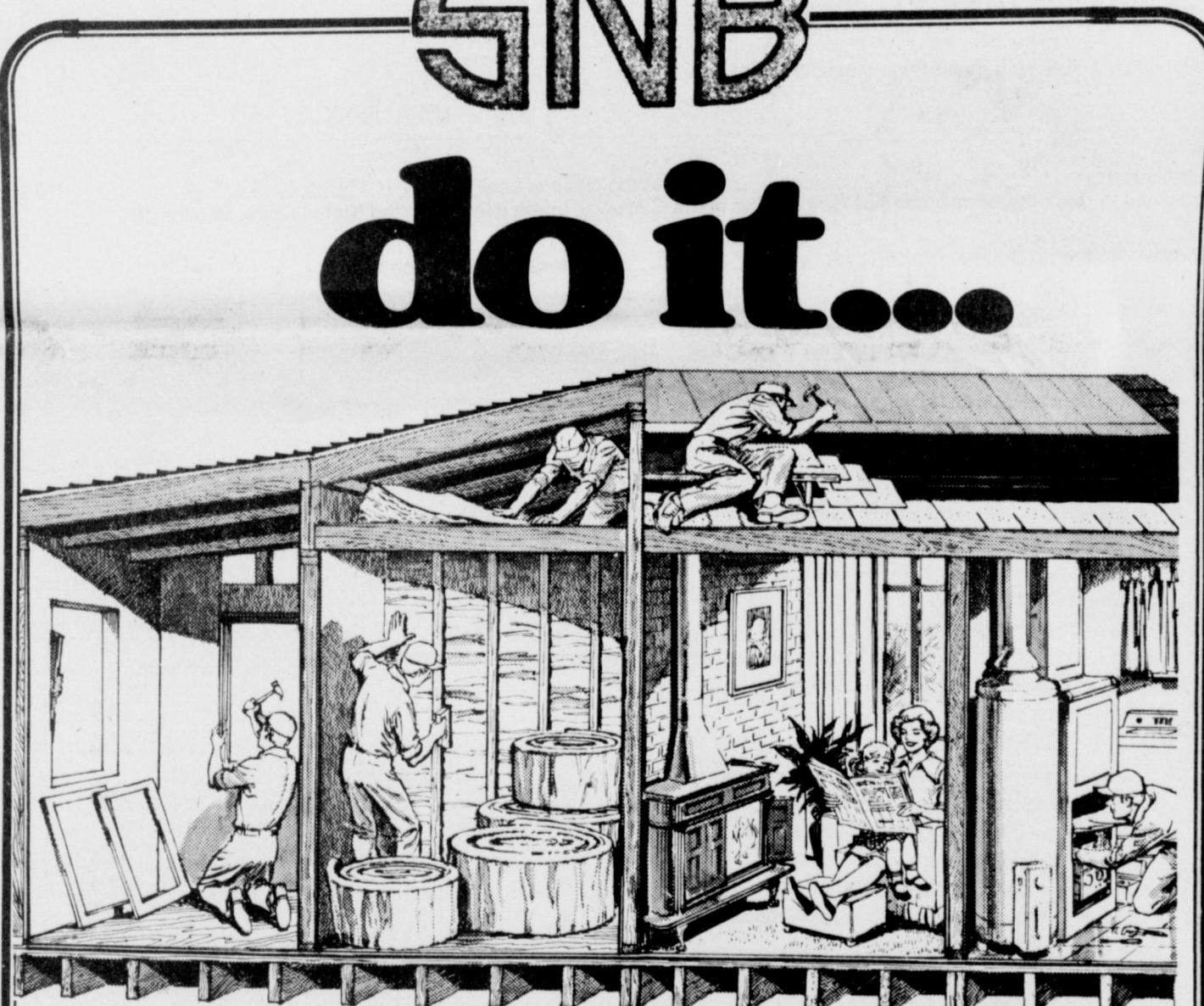

"Oh, yes. A much shorter day than I usually work."

### Building A Raft

After reading the book, "Huckleberry Finn," my brother and I were so impressed with Huck's adventures we decided to have some of our own. We took our trusty, but dull, hatchet and one of Dad's handsaws and set out to a spot down on the creek where a large grove of willows grew.

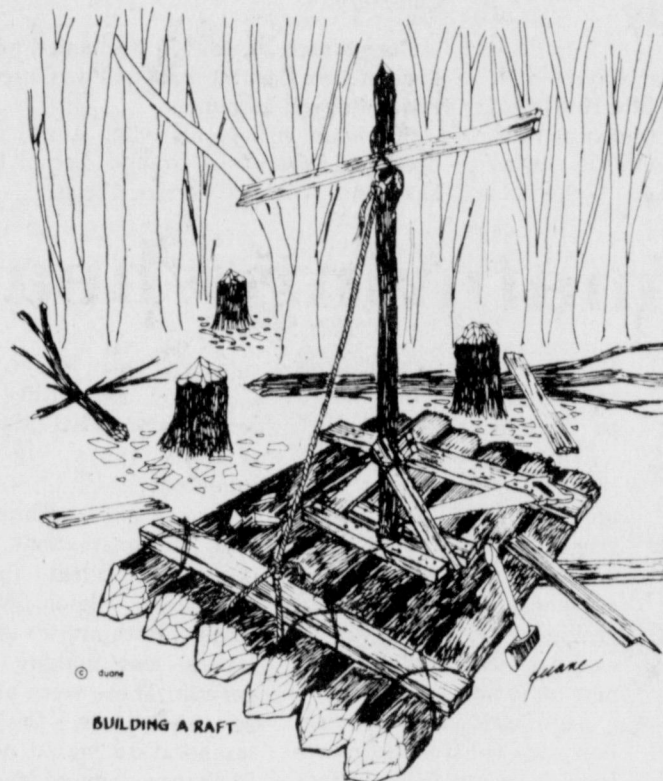
We would cut down a few trees, build ourselves a raft and the next time the creek flowed we would ride the stream clear to the coast (only about five hundred miles away). 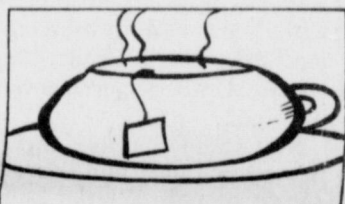
When the rain finally came we rushed down to the creek

## Insects pose threat to maturing wheat

Greenbug and winter grain mite infestations are light; however conditions are right for an armyworm outbreak. Wheat crop prospects are excellent. Moisture is adequate in most areas of the county as wheat is in the booting and heading stage. Well fertilized fields are looking particularly good.

Wheat in some areas of the county is suffering from lack of moisture. An area about midway between Punkin Center and Burk Burnett is experiencing a moisture deficit. Bill Brockriede says, "Some of our wheat is going downhill everyday due to a lack of moisture. There is a strip through here which has missed nearly all of the rain showers. This is the same strip which seemed to catch every shower during the two previous years."

There is little possibility of damaging levels of greenbugs and grain mites for the remainder of the year; however, growers will want to watch their fields for armyworms and fall armyworms. Adult armyworm moths have been observed around lights. These moths lay their eggs in masses. Larvae begin to feed upon the foliage when they hatch. Since the larvae feed at night, damage may go unnoticed for several days. Heavy feeding prior to the dough stage can significantly decrease yields.

Greenbug populations are light throughout the area, according to Tim Goetz, wheat insect scout for Wichita County. Populations are ranging from only 1 to 6 per foot of drill row. Winter grain mite populations are decreasing from the previous week. Producers can inspect those fields which have been in wheat or other small grains for several years to evaluate the winter grain mite situation. Beneficial insect populations are controlling greenbugs in most fields. Predators now attacking greenbugs are primarily lady beetles, lacewings, spiders, pirate bugs, and nabids. Lady beetle and spider populations are averaging up to eight tenths per foot of drill row.

The County livestock committee is considering the possibility of sponsoring a tour for small swine producers or those considering a small swine operation. This proposed tour would visit two swine operations which feature excellent management in minimum investment facilities.

Three producers, Don Gibbs, Mac Reeves, and Mike Mitchell, have already indicated an interest in a one-day tour. Anyone else interested in the tour can contact the county extension office. We will visit a 12-sow operation of Paul Winkler and a 250-sow farm of Kermit Miller near Gatesville. Incidentally, Miller was a vocational agriculture student under Earl Sargent several years ago at Jonesboro.

Two grain sorghum hybrid demonstrations have been established in the northwest region of the county. Both are up to good stands and making rapid growth. These were planted as early as the soil temperature would permit. They were planted when the soil temperature reached 55-60 degrees. The early-as-possible planting is aimed at getting ahead of the hot, dry summer days.

Joe Koehler planted his test on April 21. Approximately 1 1/2 acres were planted to each hybrid. Carl and James Brockreide planted their demonstrations on April 14. Both sites are exceptionally good land near the Red River, and they were fertilized with about 60-80 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Varieties included were Taylor Evans TE Y101, TE 66B, Warner 839T, W664, W665, McNair 535, Dekalb B39, and Dekalb C42Y. Yields will be measured with a combine since these are field size plots.

## Envelopes to meet standard

"Use up your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," Jack D. Watson, sectional center manager and postmaster, reminds customers. That is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The Fort Worth postmaster said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 1/2 inches high or five inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmaster Watson said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three

years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

"Many customers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery," Watson said.

The regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future they must be at least seven-thousandths of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged.

The standards also affect oversized and odd-shaped pieces of mail, Watson said. For first class mail weighing one ounce or less, there will be a surcharge of seven cents for pieces more than 6-1/8 inches high or 11-1/2 inches long.

## Finnell bill passes house

Rep. Charles Finnell Friday won passage of legislation which would decrease the paperwork for farmers who must file unemployment compensation reports.

The bill, H.B. 2109, which changes the current statute to allow for farmers to file full reports on their employees quarterly now passes to the Senate where it must also be approved.

"A bill such as this would cost the people of this state nothing," said Finnell, "yet it will save the agricultural employer time now lost in a tangle of bureaucratic red tape."

The bill had previously been passed unanimously by the House Committee on Agriculture and Livestock.

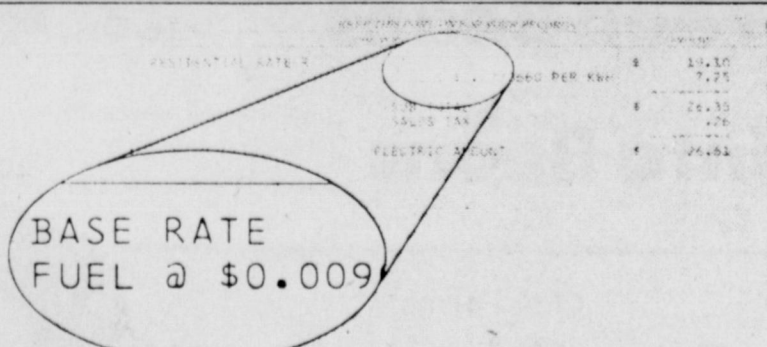

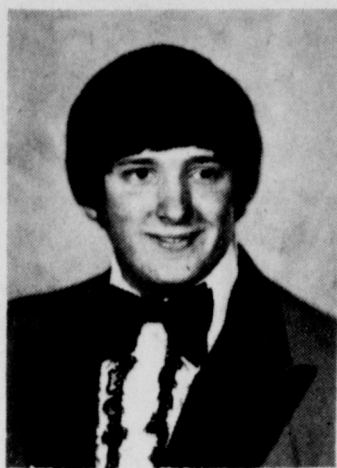

## Improvements set for area highways

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has approved \$238 million program of highway rehabilitation and improvement in every part of the state.

The program includes rehabilitation work, safety improvements and general betterment of U.S. and State Highways and Farm to Market Roads.

A total of 845 projects in 203 counties are involved

with more than 72 percent of the work scheduled for state and federal numbered highways.

Altogether, the program will result in improvements on 5,253.5 miles of the 71,000 mile state maintained highway network.

District Engineer Bob Schleider of Wichita Falls said projects included in the program in Wichita County are:

...On Loop 370 from Johnson Road in Iowa Park to FM

1814, a distance of 2.4 miles, seal coat at a cost of \$30,600.

...On Loop 370 from Loop 11 to the Scott Street Railroad Overpass, a distance of 2.0 miles, additional surfacing at a cost of \$98,200.

...On SH 240 (in Wichita and Wilbarger Counties) from US 287 to SH 25, a distance of 6.2 miles, seal coat at a cost of \$48,700.

...On FM 368 at Antelope Creek near FM 1206, a distance of 0.3 miles, widen

bridge and reconstruct approaches, at a cost of \$85,500.

...On FM 368 from SH 258 to FM 1206, a distance of 2.7 miles, seal coat at a cost of \$19,800.

...On FM 2326 from SH 25 to the Wilbarger County Line, a distance of 4.1 miles, seal coat at a cost of \$31,000.

...On FM 1180 from the Wichita River to the Archer County Line, a distance of 3.6 miles, seal coat at a cost of \$24,200.

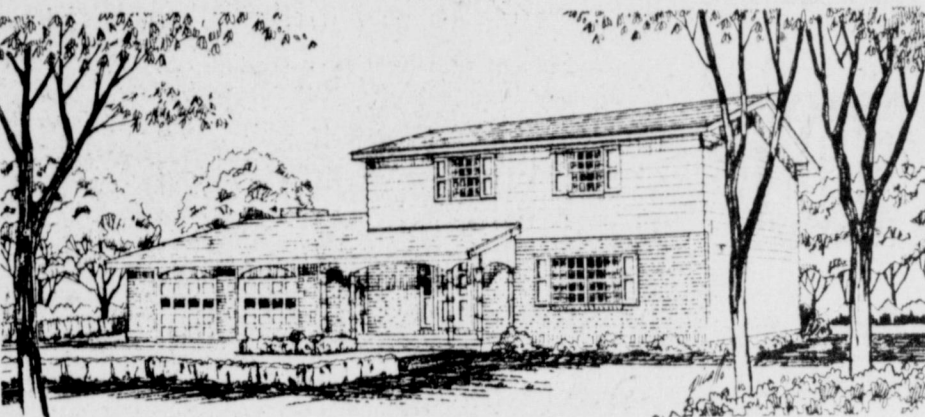

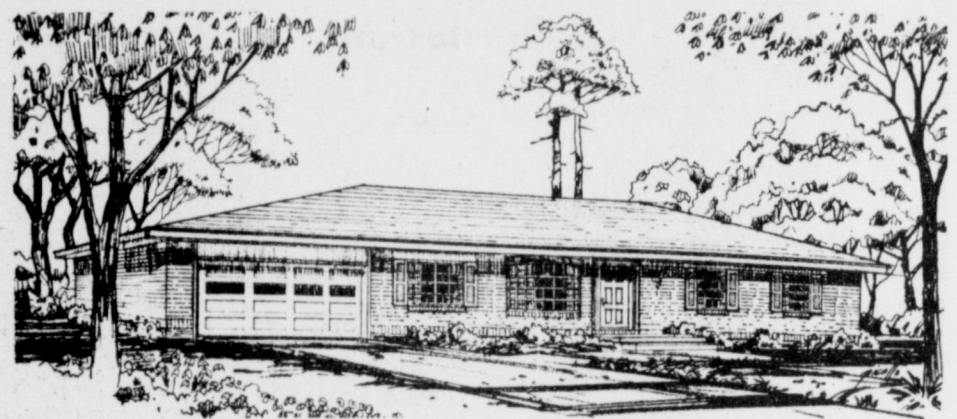

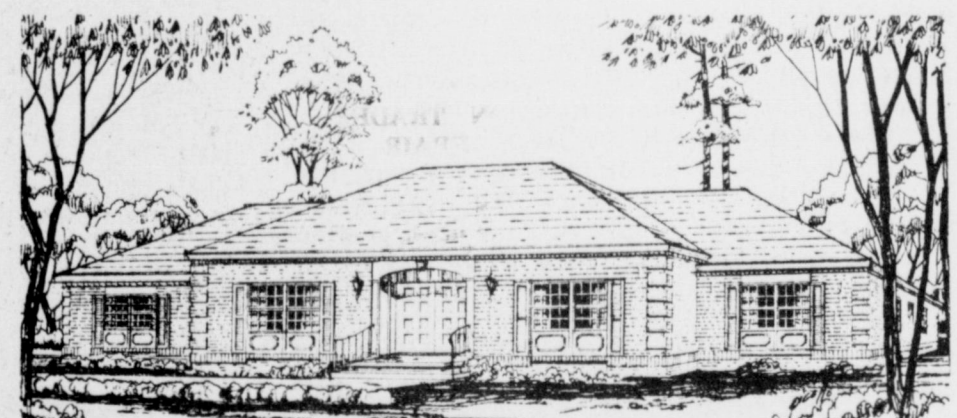
